



About the year 305, it was decreed in the West, in the council of Elvira, that the ministers of the Church should live in continence, even if they had been married before ordination. This law held good only for the West, and did not pre-vail in the East, as the Council of Nicaea refused to impose it upon the whole Church. It appears, though, that about the middle of the fifth

century, the law of celibacy, which xisted among the Latins, prevailed also, in certain parts of Greece, namely Thessaly, Macedonia and Achaia.
