Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the s la bead of a tamily, or any male over 18 years old. may homestead a quarter section o available Dominion land in Manl obs Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency; on certain conditions by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending omesteader.

Daties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each o within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres sciely owned and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a homesteader i section-slongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre Daties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-emption six months
