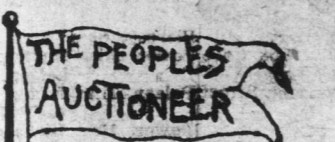

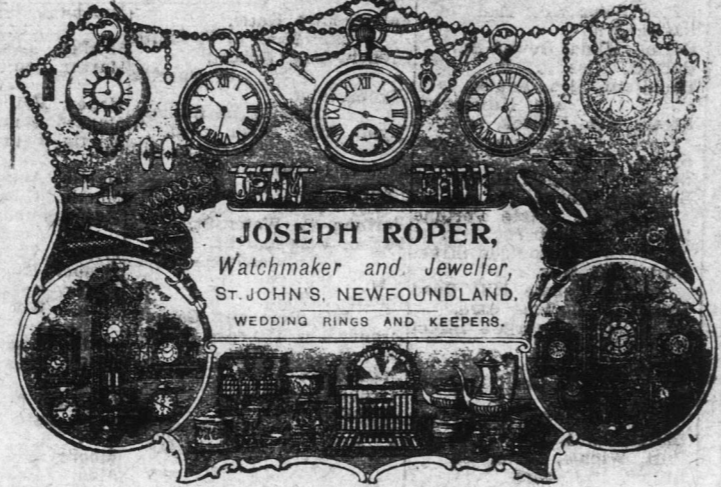

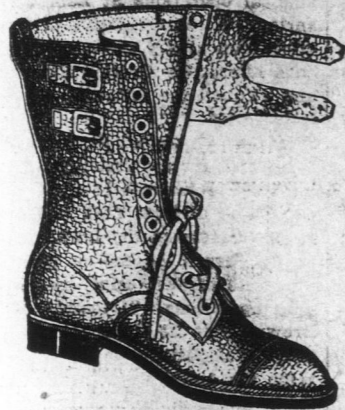

In answer to my query as to how they were opposites, she further explained that he was light haired and she dark, that he liked to read and she didn't, that she was fond of society and he was reserved and quiet, that he liked cold weather and she warm, and several other similar differences that I cannot recall.

As to the effect of the contrast between light and dark hair on their matrimonial happiness it would be difficult to predict, but as to the effect of the other differences cited, I should think the most simple-minded could be an accurate prophet.

That is, unless he were blinded by that most foolish and misunderstood of catchwords—"the attraction of opposites."

I think that the notion that the more two people differ from each other, the more natural it is that they should love each other and be happy together, because of this law of the attraction of opposites, is a popular fallacy that does actual harm.

Again and again I have heard people refer to differences in taste and

attitude as likely to promote a happy match—"It's the attraction of opposites, you know."

If there is anything at all in "the attraction of opposites" it is, of course, in the attraction between opposites in temperament.

It may be that the phlegmatic and the highstrung, the even tempered and the impatient, the lover of action and the conservative objection-raiser, the reserved and the chatterer, get along well together, although it has always seemed to me that people of similar temperaments are quite as likely to understand and bear with each other.

But the contrary of tastes should ever be regarded as a desirable condition in the Siamese-twinship of marriage, would be unbelievable if it were not so.

Similar tastes make similar interests.

And every interest which married folks share is one more bond between them, one more bond to counteract the wending power of selfishness and individual interests and the neutral tendency of all souls towards isolation.

Of course, you may point me out two people with widely diverging tastes who apparently have a happy married life.

But I can show you a blind man who is a leader in his community. And you will not think that he attained that position because of his blindness, will you? You will know that he has done what he has in spite of his handicap, not because of it.

I firmly believe that any two people with widely diverging tastes and interests are undertaking a mighty perilous voyage when they embark on the sea of matrimony together.

And I wish that that foolish catchword, "the attraction of opposites," could somehow be stricken from the language for I believe that a misinterpretation of it has caused more young folks to be mistaken in regard to their fitness for each other than we would like to reckon.

## Avondale Notes.

Unearthing the potato crop which engaged the attention of our people during the past fortnight is finished. The crops are not even up to an average one, complaint being general of a big shortage. This will have the effect of increasing in the spring the already high price prevailing.

Appropos of agriculture, it is a deterrent circumstance that people do not endeavour to grow larger quantities of farm products, rather than to be content with a limited quantity of potatoes for family use and a balance sufficient for re-planting in spring, together with cabbage enough till the first of March. This is about to which the operation of the average land owner go in the provisions of this class of food. Turnips receive less attention than formerly, parsnips, carrots, etc., scarcely any; whereas with plenty of land, increased energy in this direction would provide a plentiful supply of all these food products for the winter, and thus lessen the consumption of other more costly foods.

It has been unusual of late years to have wintry weather in the present month, but to date this year we have had two snowy days—October 21 and 22, and to-day.

Work at the foundation site of the new church is progressing favourably. Many men are absent, and there have been a number of vacant days owing to disagreeable weather; still, notwithstanding, the job is no light piece of work, the finished site is ebbing more and more to view.

In the recent examination under the auspices of the C. H. E. we note the Superior School at Avondale is represented by five pupils in the Intermediate Grade—two in first division and three in second, with distinctions in Arithmetic, Geometry, and Mensuration, and two Preliminary Passes, Second Division, with distinctions in Arithmetic and Geometry.

A case of typhoid fever is receiving the attention of Dr. Jones at present. It is of such duration now as to satisfy the doctor that no other case outside of the same family will develop through contamination from the one under treatment.

Master Gregory Lynn, son of Captain Patrick Lynn, has entered St. Bonaventure's College to pursue higher studies. "Greg" was a very successful candidate at the Superior School in Avondale, being one of the two for the present year on the pass lists of the Intermediate Grade, in the first division, with distinction in Geometry.

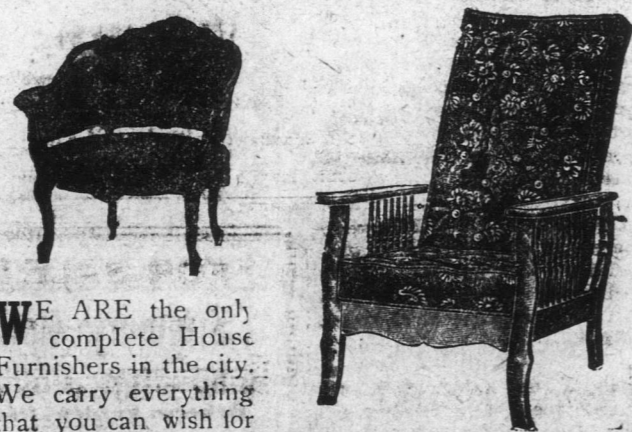

### "Blindfolding the Devil in the Dark."

There is a "joke" on between the Daily News and the Chronicle on the subject of "blindfolding the devil in the dark," which shows how the pick-nickers love one another. On Friday we pointed out that the Morning organ was having a "Dig at the Evening" Sir Edward Morris, who in 1906 had charge of the Licensing Bill, which became law that year, and we quoted what the Daily News had to say about the framers. The citation ran thus:—

"It may be that the appointment of a Licensing Board was 'simply a case, to put it vulgarly, of blindfolding the devil in the dark.'" We confess that we have had suspicions in that direction; but now that the statement is made without qualification by one who was in the confidence of the framers of the Act, suspicion becomes certainty."

The author has never denied the soft impeachment, but the Chronicle indignantly denies it, and tells us we do not know what we are writing about. On June 8th, 1905, Mr. Donald Morrison wrote in the Daily News thus:—

"If my main object in life was what the man in the street called political success, I might have taken pattern by Sir E. P. Morris, who is such a warm friend of Temperance reformers and rum-sellers alike at one and the same time."

### Mining and Pulp Operations.

Dr. Arthur Selwyn-Brown who arrived here from New York by the S. S. Pretorian about five weeks ago is about to set on foot extensive pulp and mineral operations at Labrador next spring. A representative of the Telegram was kindly given an interview with him at the Crosbie Hotel to-day, and gleaned the following interesting information.

Dr. Brown visited St. John's, Newfoundland, for the first time last summer in the interest of some wealthy capitalists of New York and London. In his travels on the Island with Mr. M. F. Parrell he saw a good many prospects of successful mining and pulp operations. "I found," said Dr. Brown, "that the claim holders did not show a disposition to go on and develop the different properties held by them, so on my return to New York I formed up the 'Northern Mining Development Company,' with a capital of \$300,000 to undertake mining development operations in Newfoundland. The directors of this company have decided to commence work next spring. The London Company with which I am associated will undertake the erection of a pulp and paper mill in Newfoundland. We have acquired large timber areas on Labrador where we propose to erect a pulp mill to feed the paper mill in Newfoundland."

Dr. Brown has great hopes of the future prospects of mining and pulp operations here and at Labrador. He will leave by the S. S. Pretorian for London on next Thursday and after finishing his business there with the Pulp Company will return to New York to finalize all arrangements with the Northern Mining Co. which has taken several options on Newfoundland mining properties and expect to secure more next year. He will return to Newfoundland about the New Year to take up the thread of his mining business.

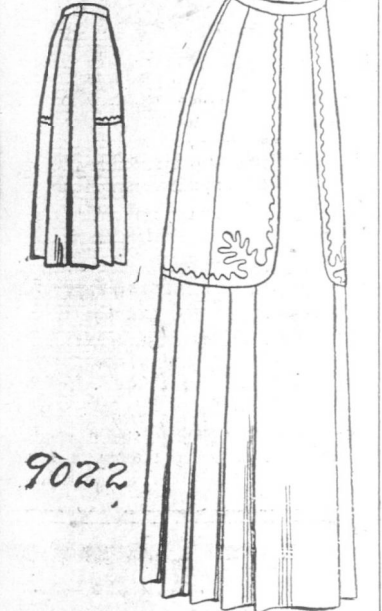

**Romances of the Peerage.**

Shop Assistants Who Founded Noble Families.

Cobden once asserted that "the British aristocracy was cradled behind city counters." While there may be some exaggeration in the statement, a study of the genealogical trees of our aristocracy reveals many romantic stories of humble folk who have founded families which to-day figure largely in the peerage. Mr. Thornton Hall, who is unequalled as a popular writer on the records of our noble families, devotes an interesting chapter in his recently published book, "Love Romances of the Aristocracy" (Warner Laurie), to the subject, and shows how in the veins of scores of the proudest English peers runs the blood of ancestors who served customers in city shops.

Among the forefathers of the Duke of Northumberland, for instance, we find such names as William le Smythesonne, of Thornton Watious, husbandman; William Smithson, of Newsham, husbandman; Ralph Smithson, tenant farmer; and Anthony Smithson, yeoman. "It was this Anthony whose son Hugh left the paternal farm to serve behind the counter of Ralph and William Robinson, London haberdashers, and thus to take the first step of that successful career which made him a baronet and a man of wealth. From Hugh, the London 'prentice, sprang in the fourth generation that other Hugh who won the hand of Lady Elizabeth Seymour, and with it the vast estates and historic name of Percy."

**A Remarkable Record.**  
The Duke of Leeds numbers among his ancestors Edward Osborne, a London apprentice who gallantly saved the life of the daughter of his employer, William Hewitt, a merchant of Philip Lane, when the fair maid fell into the Thames and was in danger of being swept away. Wedding bells followed this brave exploit, and in due course Osborne became Lord Mayor of London.

**The Great Family of Smiths.**  
Then, again, the Earls of Denbigh have for ancestor one Godfrey Fielding, who served his apprenticeship in London, made a fortune as a Mill Street mercer, and was Lord Mayor when Henry VI. was King. One of the founders of the family fortunes of the Earl of Warwick was William Greville, citizen and woolstapler, who died five centuries ago after amassing considerable wealth; while his father of the noble house of Dudley was William Ward, the son of poor Staffordshire parents, who was apprenticed to a goldsmith and made a fortune as a London Jeweller.

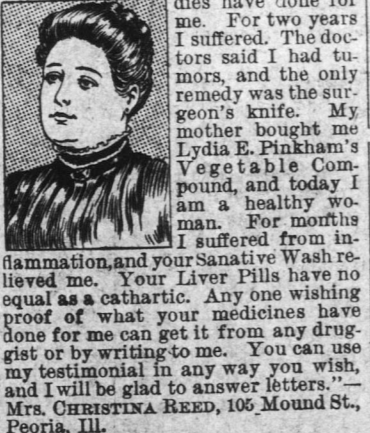
The present Earl Carrington, to the great family of Smiths, and owes his wealth and rank to a respectable Nottingham draper named John Smith whose descendants blossomed into bankers and members of Parliament one of whom was raised to the peerage by George III., and created Baron Carrington. 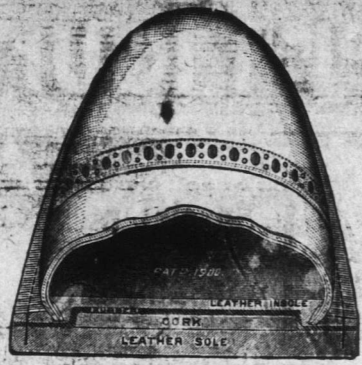

Indignation at Bay of Islands.

We learn that recently one Patrick Brown, of Placentia, was sent to Bay of Islands, having been created a "Tide-water" to do duty for fall and winter months in that section. As a result the people of the place are highly indignant with the Government and they would like to know what Premier Morris means by foisting this individual upon them. If it were necessary to make such an appointment, there are many eligible young men at Bay of Islands who would be only too willing to undertake the work without the necessity of drawing on other districts to supply such officials. But there is another phase of the matter which shows great unfairness to the predominant denomination of the place. There are already from Humbermouth out to Lark Harbor (two Roman Catholic) and two Methodist sub-collectors, and the Church of England people have been left completely out in the cold. Their opposition to this latest appointment is certainly justifiable under the circumstances and they intend seeing the matter rectified. They are asking where their representative, Mr. Downey, is and why he doesn't interpose to obviate this unfairness. There is a "rod in pickle" for him when he next comes to seek the suffrages of the electorate, and he will feel it to his cost, as well as the Premier, his master. Mr. W. K. Morrissey is also at Bay of Islands doing special duty.

A Wonderful Climb.

Its issue in li and slender volum is a novel feature the new Encyclopaee Britannica (11th ed published by the Cambridge Univers Press.

A DRAWBACK SURMOUNTED The great drawback to the Encyclopaedia Britannica in the past has been its size: volume weighed nearly 7 lbs. and measured 3 inches in thickness. Two hands were not to take it from its shelf, and it could be only at a table or desk. In too many instances therefore, the Encyclopaedia Britannica seldom opened, was regarded solely as a reference, to which recourse was had in the last resort. Thus its size openly conflicted with the purpose which its editors, the beginning, had kept consistently before them, namely, the preparation of a book intended, not only for reference, and for student reference, but also for reading.

THE EMPLOYMENT OF INDIA PA

But how was the drawback of cumbersome to be avoided in the production of a book over 40 million words? There was, in truth, solution of the problem. It was recognized employment of India paper would at once reduce bulk by two-thirds. The Cambridge University had long been famous for its India paper. The idea of using India paper in the production of containing 27,000 quarto pages was too revolting to find immediate acceptance—how revolutions were judged from the fact that the normal output of India paper in England for a whole year would not print off only some 5,000 or 6,000 copies of new Encyclopaedia Britannica. Experiments, however, did bring out the advantages of India paper, publishers of the new Encyclopaedia Britannica that, from the point of view of its usefulness, popularity, this purely material change is a cost saving scarcely less important than the recent change of its information and the systematic manner in which this information is presented. For the practical of an encyclopaedia depends upon the extent to which it is used, and for once that the old cumbersome Encyclopaedia Britannica was opened and read, the new volumes will be used a hundred times.

20 INCHES AGAINST 7 FEET.

The illustration which accompanies this announcement is reproduced from an actual photograph representing the new (11th) edition standing in front of the previous (10th) edition. To those who are acquainted with the 10th edition it will seem scarcely credible that the 29 slender volumes here shown in the foreground are indeed the equivalent of the 35 old volumes which stand behind them. As a matter of fact, they cover over two million words more, and the reduction has been achieved without any diminution in the type. Each of the old volumes, containing 800 pages, measured nearly 3 inches in thickness, weighed close upon 7 lbs. The new volumes cost 900-1,000 pages each, but in the India paper impression each is slightly less than 1 inch in thickness and weigh only 3 lbs. The old volumes made a row over 7 feet wide and weighed 240 lbs. The new volumes occupy a width of 28 inches and weigh 30 lbs.

A BOOK TO BE READ WITH COMFORT.

It is easier to take an India paper volume off a new edition from its shelf with thumb and forefinger than it was to lift one of the old volumes in two hands, whereas the reader of an old volume had to sit at a table, the new India volume is light enough to hold in one hand, while the reader sits back at his ease. The reader, indeed, the thin India paper volume offers another convenience besides that of its lightness, namely, flexibility. The ordinary paper book, bound in boards with a stiff back, is ruined if it is doubled back to cover, and a quarto volume, however light, is inconveniently large when held open. Indian paper, on the other hand, lends itself to flexible covers and is conveniently large when held open. India paper, in the new Encyclopaedia Britannica is thus able to end it double, back to back, so that the quarto book makes a handful no larger than an ordinary octavo volume of magazines when it is held open.

SPECIMEN PAGES PRINTED ON INDIA PAPER.

Nor will the reader, upon nearer acquaintance, find any reason to discount the evident conveniences of India paper. For the wonderful characteristic of this material is that with extreme thinness it combines an extraordinary degree of opacity—thus the print does not show through from one page to another. More over, India paper, made almost exclusively of rag, and slaked with a hard surface, absorbs the ink less than ordinary book paper, and thus yields a very sharp impression from type and illustrations. On these points the reader may judge for himself, since the specimen pages accompanying the prospectus for which he is invited to read are printed upon India paper.

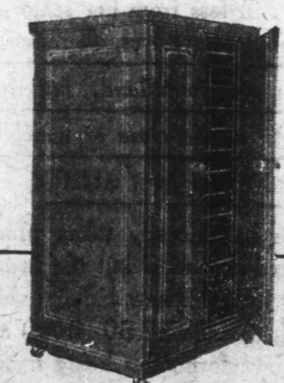

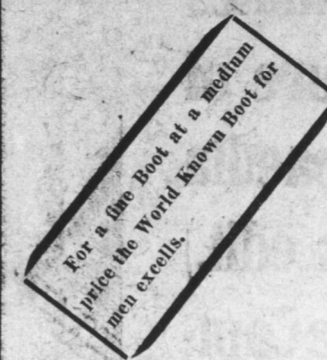

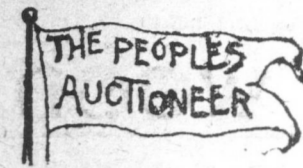
