



Loss of the Schr. Empire

Captain Benson, Mate R. Francis, Cook J. Sutton, Bosun Jas. Button, and Seamen Ned Snow and Frank Reardon, of the ill-fated schr. Empire, arrived in from Cape Broyle on a construction train at 3 a.m. to-day. To the Telegram Capt. Benson said that the Empire was out 30 days from Oporto to St. John's with sand ballast and wine and had head winds but fine weather until Sunday, the 30th of June, when a dense fog enveloped the ocean. At 1 p.m., while the captain was below, with Bosun Button at the wheel and the fog horn blowing and the vessel running at an 8 knot clip, she struck an immense dead sulphur bottom whale stem on, and reeled from the shock. The collision took the stem completely out of her and water began pouring into the ship in torrents. The pumps were immediatemanned and some of the crew kept bailing with buckets out of the forehold, and from then until Thursday the 4th July, they kept hard at work keeping her afloat. By that day the crew were entirely exhausted, had to give up pumping, and provisioning their boat and taking some of their effects they left the vessel. Befor doing so Capt. Benson threw kerosene oil about the cabin and foreboat being small and the weather bad shortly after leaving they had to throw their effects overboard to make room and lighten her. The acciden occurred 400 miles S. E. of Cap Spear, and all Thursday it was fogg with a gale of S. W. wind and heav sea. That night they had to heave to with a sea anchor out, and with vary ing gales all Friday they sailed to wards Newfoundland on a N. W course. Friday night, the 5th, the saw a steamer in the distance, burn ed flareups and signalled her, but sh ook no notice and held on her course o the westward. Saturday at noon when all felt most depressed, the Lun inburg banker Lucille B. To Detect Icebergs. Barnes of McGill Has Invented a Device.

In the realms of experimenta physics Canada has produced some great men. On it, too, lustre has been shed by other brilliant men who has come and gone like birds of passage-men who, coming to Canada practically unknown, have

Just now the attention of the world of experimental physics is focused upon one who is essentially Canadian in upbringing, in tradition, in education, and also in the particular direction in which his genuis is manifesting itself.

This man is Prof. Howard T. Barnes, D. Sc., F. R. S. C., the Director of the Physical Laboratories and the Macdonald Professor of Physics at McGill University. Canada knows something about ice, and it seems peculiarly fitting that it should have produced a man

ice that the world possesses. That I think I can say, is the title that is generally conceded by the greatest scientific authorities to Prof. Barnes.

During the past few years Prof Barnes has been devoting the best energies of his mind to experiments the express object of which has been to make impossible such a disaster at sea as that which occurred to the Titanic. He now has in his laboratory as the concrete result of those experiments, an instrument, which he declares, and which his brotherscientists believe, should for all time prevent a repetition of such an ccident. This instrument he calls micro. thermometer. It is, in fact, thermometer of superlative sensitiveness, which, he declares. will infallibly detect an iceberg at a distance of not less than two miles


