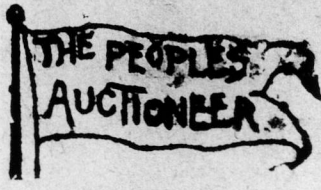

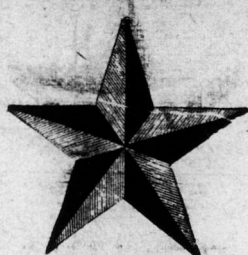

To be clever is

**Household Notes.**  
 Some of the sheer cotton fabrics re-  
 quire a lining. A simple way is to  
 have the material made up without a  
 lining. Then have a fitted lining of  
 wash china silks. Baste this into place.  
 This makes it possible to wash the lin-  
 ing—and the lining to a summer gown  
 does need laundering frequently.  
 Nothing is quite so pretty for the  
 summer home as the dainty cretonnes.  
 The designs and colors are varied, but  
 the green and white, blue and white  
 and the rose-scattered patterns are  
 about the most attractive. Cretonne  
 cushions, pillows and hangings from  
 an important part in the furnishings  
 of the little cottage.  
 To pack away summer or winter  
 clothing so that it will not be attacked  
 by moths, get a large packing box,  
 line the box throughout, lid and all,  
 with tar paper, overlapping it in tack-  
 ling it together so that no light can  
 get into the box. Those who have tried  
 this declare it to be absolutely satis-  
 factory as a moth-proof clothes box.  
 To preserve the color in linen dress-  
 es, launder them in bran water.

Take half a pintful of bran and pour  
 scalding water over it; let it stand for  
 half an hour and then pour the water  
 off. Wash the colored linen dresses  
 in this, using no soap or starch, and  
 rinse them in two weaker waters.  
 They will iron beautifully and be of  
 sufficient stiffness.

 more and the lather is dry enough to

month or so is sufficiently frequent for  
 this treatment.  
 Difficulty is often experienced in  
 removing a ring that is too small for  
 the finger. The ring may be removed  
 very easily by means of a strong piece  
 of coarse thread. Wax one end of the  
 latter, and force it between the finger  
 the end pointing toward the wrist.  
 Now, wind the remainder of the thread  
 tightly around the finger, leaving each  
 strand close to the next as it is on the  
 spool. Next, take up the end that was  
 forced under the ring, and gradually  
 unwind the thread, pulling out on it  
 as you wind. The ring will follow the  
 thread down over the thick portion of  
 the finger that has been bound by  
 the thread.

**Zachary Taylor.**

Zachary Taylor, twelfth Pres-  
 ident of the United States, died  
 62 years ago to-  
 day after only  
 one year in the  
 White House. His  
 death was  
 mourned by ev-  
 erbody except  
 Mexico, from  
 which he had re-  
 moved several  
 square feet of  
 territory some years previous. As a  
 scrapper, Zach Taylor has not been  
 excelled by any of our presidents ex-  
 cept T. Roosevelt, who has just taken  
 the hide of some of our most prom-  
 inent bosses. He was a very com-  
 pact man, being constructed somewha  
 on the lines of a square piano, and ha  
 a concise form of speech, biting of  
 his consonants and throwing then  
 at the enemy in a new state. Soor  
 after he entered the army General  
 Taylor was ordered to the frontier  
 which was then about four miles west  
 of Coney Islands, and send word to  
 the Indians to keep off the grass.  
 Chief Blackhawk retorted in a long  
 speech about squatter sovereignty, but  
 finally had to detail so many squads  
 of pal-beaters that he was short a  
 quorum in his effective force, so he  
 surrendered with a pained look.  
 Shortly after this the United States  
 decided to separate the state of Texas  
 from Mexico, and see if Mexico would  
 miss anything. History relates that  
 Mexico missed Texas at once and  
 she kept on missing everything she  
 shot at during the war. General  
 Taylor was sent over to see that Texas  
 did not move, and before returning  
 found it necessary to slaughter a large  
 number of inoffensive and odoriferous  
 Greasers. His chief debate took place  
 at Buena Vista, where an old gentle-  
 man named Santa Ana fell on him  
 heavily with 21,000 men. Taylor had  
 only 5,000 troops, but nearly all of  
 them could hit the pavement if they  
 jumped off the roof. Santa Ana was  
 dispersed to such an extent  
 that no attempt was made to collect  
 his fragments. After this spiking  
 Texas to the map, General Taylor re-  
 turned home and was injected into the  
 White House in spite of his struggles.  
 He was called "Old Rough and  
 Ready," a nickname which fittingly  
 typified his rugged courage and old-  
 fashioned honesty, qualities with  
 which his name will ever be insepar-  
 ably connected.

## Wolgast Wins With Aid of Referee.

Strange to Say the Defeated and Victor Were Both Knocked Out in the Final Round.

Vernon Arena, July 4.—Ad. Wolgast, with the aid of Referee Jack Welsh, retained his claim to the lightweight championship to-day in the Vernon Arena, when he was given the decision over Joe Rivers of Los Angeles in the 13th round. Rivers had had a slight shade, in the 12th round Wolgast, tired and bleeding profusely, suddenly struck Rivers a vicious left in the groin. At the same instant Rivers' right landed flush on Wolgast's jaw, and the champion went down and out. Disregarding claims of foul made by Rivers' manager, Referee Welsh counted the Mexican youth out, and then turned, picked up the unconscious Wolgast and declared him the winner.

"It was the worst case of robbery in the history of the American ring," said Manager Levy. "Never before have I seen a referee pick up a man and then give him the decision. The foul blow struck by Wolgast was seen by every man near the ringside. It was the fourth or fifth foul the champion had landed on Rivers. The sum total of it all is that Wolgast knew he was whipped and resorted to his foul tactics to save himself."  
 No one connected with Wolgast's camp would say a word, and all of them jumped in an automobile and quickly left the pavilion. Welsh declared all bets off.

## Colored People Celebrate.

Chicago, July 5.—News that Jack Johnson had won in the Las Vegas championship fight was the signal for the beginning of a celebration by hundreds of negroes in the neighborhood of the champion's home here. The delirium of joy gained such momentum that a riot call was sent to the police, and the niggers who had begun a parade through the streets were routed by a small army of blue coats. One of the negroes grew enthusiastic enough to fire a revolver several times in the street, and he was promptly arrested. Another Johnson admirer carried a long pole with a side of bacon at the top, signifying "Bringing home the bacon." The returns were received in nearly every cafe, saloon and theatre in the "Black Belt."

## Canadian Oarsmen Criticised.

Wonder That the Argonauts, of Toronto, Do Not Benefit by Their Defeat at Henley Regatta.

London, July 5.—The defeat of the Toronto Argonaut oarsmen at Henley yesterday is followed to-day by considerable criticism of the Canadian style. One expert describes the contest which the Australians won as a real stogging race. After being behind to the half-mile mark, Australia went ahead and won by a length and a quarter. The Canadians went away at forty-six a minute, as fast a stroke as has been pulled at Henley for a number of years. The Australians were content with six less, and at this were able to show their best, for their bodies and oars moved like one man. When the Canadians swishing stroke commenced to slacken the Australians began to gain, and when once they had levelled up, the race was never left long in doubt. It was by no means an easy win, both crews being much exhausted. The time, 7 mins., 4 secs., was fast, but conditions were quite good.

Another expert commenting on the race, says: "The Argonauts have been frequent visitors to Henley, but I always wondered why they don't benefit by their continued defeats. Their style hasn't altered one whit, and until it does, and they can learn to get a real hard sharp beginning and eliminate the terrible hoist at first, the chances of victory are small."

**DOG-FISH DOING DAMAGE.**—At various northern settlements dogfish are prevalent and are hampering operations when fish are plentiful. The fishermen report considerable damage being done to traps by these pests.

## Loss of the Schr. Empire

Captain Benson, Mate R. Francis, Cook J. Sutton, Bosun Jas. Button, and Seamen Ned Snow and Frank Reardon, of the ill-fated schr. Empire, arrived in from Cape Broyle on a construction train at 3 a.m. to-day. To the Telegram Capt. Benson said that the Empire was out 30 days from Oporto to St. John's with sand ballast and wine, and had head winds but fine weather until Sunday, the 30th of June, when a dense fog enveloped the ocean. At 1 p.m., while the captain was below, with Bosun Button at the wheel and the fog horn blowing and the vessel running at an 8 knot clip, she struck an immense dead sulphur bottom whole stem on, and reeled from the shock. The collision took the stem completely out of her and water began pouring into the ship in torrents. The pumps were immediately manned and some of the crew kept balling with buckets out of the fore-hold, and from then until Thursday, the 4th July, they kept hard at work keeping her afloat. By that day the crew were entirely exhausted, had to give up pumping, and provisioning their boat and taking some of their effects they left the vessel. Before doing so Capt. Benson threw kerosene oil about the cabin and fore-castle and set fire to the vessel. The boat being small and the weather bad, shortly after leaving they had to throw their effects overboard to make room and lighten her. The accident occurred 490 miles S. E. of Cape Spear, and all Thursday it was foggy with a gale of S. W. wind and heavy sea. That night they had to leave with a sea anchor out, and with varying gales all Friday they sailed towards Newfoundland on a N. W. course. Friday night, the 5th, they saw a steamer in the distance, burned flares and signalled her, but she took no notice and held on her course to the westward. Saturday at noon, when all felt most depressed, the Lunenburg banker Lucille B. Creaser, apt Arthur Creaser, loomed up out of the fog, coming directly towards them and taking the shipwrecked men on board treated them with every kindness and landed them at Cape Broyle. Fred Ring, a young chap of Farvey & Co's. office, who was across the vessel on a health trip, Capt. Benson says proved himself a plucky lad. He had learned how to steer on the voyage and also the use of the compass, and while the men pumped he steered, but for which they might have been forced to leave the vessel earlier and in bad weather, and would risk their lives. Fred Ring is son of Mr. Wm. Ring, keeper at the Lunenburg Asylum, and he never murmured at his position though he was frenched to the skin for hours owing to wearing faulty oil clothes. Capt. Benson only saved a sextant, and all his crew as well as himself lost their clothing and effects.

### Alone in Home.

CHILDREN SCARED BY MAN, WHO IS ARRESTED.

Their father having gone to the fishery at Grosis Islands, and their mother being an inmate of the Hospital, four little children have been living alone in their residence, Patrick Street, for some time past. They are Lucy Reid, aged 12; Lilly, 8; Gladys, 6, and Arthur, 5. According to the story given Sergt. Mackey and a Telegram reporter by Lucy last night, a man, who she described pretty minutely, entered their home at 6 p.m. yesterday, and pinching her cheek made some very suggestive remarks and later, she alleges, tried to induce her to accompany him to his house further up the street. She went part of the way towards his house but then returned to her own home. The little ones were frightened and Lucy later reported the matter to her grandmother and aunt, residing on Bambrick Street, and they informed Sergt. Mackey, who at 8.45 last night visited Patrick Street and found the man answering to the description of the party who visited the Reid residence prowling about the place. The officer promptly arrested him, took him to the Western Station and calling a cab conveyed him to the lockup. He was particularly identified by the child owing to a cap which he wore and which had a brown leather peak. The children would have been taken in and cared for by their grandmother and aunt of Bambrick St. but that scarlet fever is in their home. Last night, however, the children were so frightened that they for a while were in their relatives' house and ran the risk of contracting the disease. If the man had designs on the eldest girl, which from her story seems likely, he will no doubt get the punishment he deserves, for not alone did he frighten these little ones, but was the means of jeopardizing their health. The danger of the children being allowed to live alone is quite apparent and they should be cared for by somebody or they may set fire to the place.

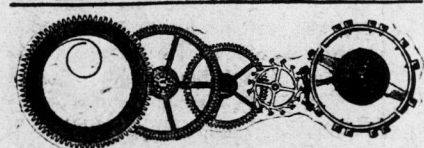
