## Who Is to Blame?

A few weeks ago some neighbors of mine received a visit from a young relative who is just at the most foolish school girl age. She is a very talkative young person and chatters continually, saying all the silly, extravagant, ridiculous things that school girls love to say, and saying them in a loud tone and with much noisy laughter.

Her aunt and cousins, who are all much older than she, were totally excluded from the conversation, but instead of trying to quiet her they laughed continually at her nonsense, and if by any chance she did say a bright thing now and then, repeated it to each other and to their visitors.

I was calling there one day, after this guest had gone, and her aunt apologized for her. "She is a bright girl, but she is spoiled," she said. "Her manners are atrocious, and the way she monopolized the conversation was terrible. She says some bright things, but so many silly ones. I hope she will improve in the next few years."

If I had dared I should certainly have told the solicitous relative one thing, and that is, that her little niece will not improve if she is with people who treat her as she does.

Why should she change? Why shouldn't she keep on saying silly

things when gets the reward of attention and laughter for all the nonsense she cares to utter?

Almost all abnormal development in any member of society is partly the fault of some other member or members who permit or encourage it.

When you find a spoiled child you can know here is a spoiling mother in the background; when you find an excessively vain man you can know there is some woman feeding his vanity.

And those who encourage by laughter, when they ought to rebuke by disapproval or at least by silence, are partly to blame for the faults they help to develop.

One of the finest girls I ever knew had one very bad habit—she would make fun, and sometimes most unkind fun, of any and everybody. Of course it was wrong of her, and yet I always felt it was just as much our fault, for she was very clever and witty in her sarcasm, and we always spurred her on by laughing at her and applauding her.

Again and again I have heard the very girls who had been urging her on, speak disparagingly of Barbara's sharp tongue the moment they went out of ear-shot. And I used to boil inwardly—and sometimes boil over too—at the two-faced injustice of them. What right had they who had given the approval of their laughter to blame her? None whatever.

Laughter and applause are as powerful stimulants and sense destroyers as champagne or brandy, and those who offer them to others are partly responsible for the unfortunate results they create.

## Household Notes.

To remove coffee stains from light material, brush the spot with glycerine, then rinse in lukewarm water, and press on the wrong side.

French kid gloves can be cleaned by putting them on the hands, then washing them in some spirits of turpentine, then hang them in the air to dry.

A good way to clean feathers—put them into a paper bag with a cupful of Indian meal, half a cupful of flour and three teaspoonfuls of borax, then shake.

Cold mashed potatoes from yesterday's dinner make very nice croquettes by the adding of one egg. Shape them, roll them in crumbs and fry in fat.

Very excellent orange extract is made by putting grated orange peel into a bottle half full of pure alcohol. Allow it to stand for three weeks, then strain.

A palatable way to serve cold, boiled potatoes is to put them through the sieve. Season them well with butter and salt; form into cones and brown in the oven.

Bronze ornaments when cleaned should first have all dust brushed out, then apply a very little sweet oil all over the article. Polish with a soft duster and finally with a chamouis.

Holes in kid gloves can be successfully mended by first buttonholing around the hole, then filling in with buttonhole stitch. This should be done with thread matching the glove.

Hair brushes can be successfully cleaned by putting ammonia in cold water and dipping the brush in, being careful not to allow the wood to go into the water; then rinse in clear cold water.

The hair mattresses which are filled with black hair are much better than those filled with white hair, because the latter has generally been bleached and is deprived of its springiness.

To clean a raincoat, it should be dipped in cold soft water, spread on a table and scrubbed all over with a large nail brush and soap. Then put it on a coat hanger and, if possible, dry in the open air.

When you wish to break a bottle evenly, soak a piece of string in turpentine, and tie it around where you wish the break to come. Then fill the bottle up to the point with cold water and set fire to the string.

Pickles and vinegar should be kept in glass jars or bottles. When kept in glazed ware the vinegar acts on the glaze and forms a poison.

Nutmegs will grate more satisfactorily if started from the bottom end. Spread one or two rashers of lean bacon on a baking tin, cover it thickly with slices of cheese and sprinkle a little mustard over it. Bake it in a slow oven for half an hour and serve the bacon slices on dry toast.

Solid dancing slippers of light color can be successfully dyed in ink. Either blue or black ink produces a pretty art blue shade. Ink must be fresh and applied with a small pad of cotton wool. One application is sufficient.

When black silk or woolen dresses are stained with mud, first let the material become absolutely dry and brush off the mud. The stain that remains should be washed with a piece of flannel dipped in hot coffee to which a little ammonia has been added.

In making potato chips, first select medium-sized potatoes; pare and slice them very thin, then put them in cold water. Allow them to remain about twenty minutes, then take them out and lay them each slice singly on a cotton cloth to absorb the water. Have a pan of boiling fat ready and drop each slice in, not allowing the pan to be crowded. They should be taken

### Notes and Comments.

The Graballs Must Go!

Morris has made good with the Graballs, but not with the country.

People will not let Morris finish his work. The fishermen are up in arms against him and are determined to oust him from power next fall.

Morris has not made good with the country on the matter of the Bait Protection Service. There was the Corkum incident, which showed much slackness on the part of the Government.

On the Trefethen and Lord Agreement, Sir Robert Bond expressed an opinion that it was detrimental to the preservation of bait for Newfoundland fishermen.

He said: "I am not under the impression that the agreement repeals the Bait Act, but I say it practically and I use the word advisedly, nullifies the Bait Act."

In reply to the Government's contention that the contractors could not sell bait to foreigners, he pointed out that there was a substantial doubt and that being so he asked why they did not remove the doubt by inserting words which would make it clear, beyond any doubt, that the contractors should not sell bait to foreigners.

The Hon. John Harvey, in the course of a speech on the same agreement, said: "Is it not a fact that to-

day American boats are fishing off the New England coast with Bay of Islands herring? That the entire banking fleet will fit out with Bay of Islands herring? It is impossible for Newfoundland to follow those herring when they have once left our shores. It is impossible for even the man who takes the license with this undertaking attached to it to control the disposal of the herring after he has reached his destination."

"Now are we to extend this system to every Bay in the Island? Are we to further weaken the Bait Act which we all talk and profess so much about?"

"It is not a question of a technical breach of the Act. It is a tangible and practical weakening of the whole policy. From the Premier's speech and from the preamble to this contract itself wherein the Government express the desire to facilitate the business in the marketing of frozen fish, it would appear that we are intended to support the export of frozen bait from Placentia and Fortune Bays. Once launched, can it be stopped without raising a question of vested interests?"

Then again, we want to know precisely what concessions were offered to the Booth Company last year. In the Halifax Morning Chronicle we find a sub-heading under an extract published from the Gloucester Times: "The Chicago firm is reported to have the inside track on Newfoundland Bait" and in the body of the article we find the following statement: "The Newfoundland Government has never sold an ounce of bait or ice to foreigners, and the satisfactory terms of the contracts made with the Booth Fisheries Company give that company exclusive concession for 15 years for these vital materials." We know this has been denied, but in view of the doubts about the Trefethen and Lord contract, it is most desirable that the terms of the concession should be submitted to the closest scrutiny.

In conclusion we draw attention again to the protests of the Board of Trade against Govt. slackness in enforcing the Bait Act and to the message to the marketing of Newfoundland Bank fish next year owing to the storing of smuggled Newfoundland Bait at St. Pierre.

### Next Sunday's Collection

AT THE CATHEDRAL. Ecclesiastical Student Fund.

His Grace the Archbishop occupied the Cathedral pulpit on Ash Wednesday. Before touching upon the subject of Lent and the coming Mission His Grace wished to say a word on the subject of the collection announced for Sunday next. He spoke in part as follows:—

In every well regulated and flourishing Diocese it is understood that the priesthood should be formed from subjects of the Diocese. It is a very regrettable thing for us to consider that while here in Newfoundland we are far from having the supply of priests that we require, yet outside of the country both in Europe and America there is a very large number of priests, natives of Newfoundland, either working upon the Missions or filling honourable and distinguished places in the cloisters of Religious Orders, or in the Halls of Institutes of Learning. The reason is that we have no College or Seminary in the Diocese for the education especially of subjects for the priesthood. Many years ago the late Illustrious Bishop Mullock made an effort to found such a Seminary, when he opened St. Bonaventure's College, and immediately several young students were prepared for the priesthood and became Missioners in their native country. In latter times, however, the current of the Educational stream seemed to take a more secular trend. It appears, however, that the time is again approaching when a new impetus is about to be given to the fostering of the Ecclesiastical Vocations and in the not distant future, we may hope to see this Diocese assuming its proper place among the Churches of the Catholic fold by having her own Diocesan Seminary. The immediate object of the Collection which has been called for next Sunday is to help to defray the expenses of the young men now studying in foreign colleges for the (Continued)

There are at present about 16 of these of whom 11 are for the Diocese of St. John's. Some of these are paying their own way, others are provided for by generous patrons who have founded burses in various colleges. But there still remains a considerable amount to be paid, and as there is no Diocesan Fund for this purpose it constitutes a heavy drag upon the resources of the Archbishop. During the past few years about \$1000.00 a year has been disbursed for this purpose. It is hoped that in the course of a few years a fund may be established which will enable us to commence on a small scale the erection of an Ecclesiastical Seminary.

His Grace guaranteed that any money collected for this purpose over and above immediate expenses will be placed in a separate fund and used only for the purpose for which it is subscribed.—Com.

### Feat of Photography.

The "Canadian Colliers" of the issue of February 1st, publishes as its front-piece a very striking picture from a photograph executed by Mr. R. Holloway, photographer of this city. The photograph was taken by Mr. Holloway last season from a canoe which was moored below the "Big Falls" of the Upper Humber River. The picture of the Falls is a graphic one but the striking feature of it is that when the photographer was manipulating his camera he snapped a

salmon in mid-air as it leaped in its ascension of the Falls. The fish was a thirty pounder and the exposure in snapping it only occupied the 1/1500 of a second. It is recognized to be the best salmon jumping picture ever taken. The fish can clearly be seen taking its leap and so perfect is the work that in the original photo the eye of the fish can be distinctly seen. The work reflects the greatest credit on Mr. Holloway.

## Mfld. Cod Oil Duty.

At the hearing before the Ways and Means Committee at Washington Jan. 6th, on Schedule A, Chemicals, Oils and Paints, a statement advocating the removal of the duty of 5c. per gallon now levied on Newfoundland cod oil was presented by Robert Badcock Jr., representing W. S. Job & Co. Mr. Badcock's argument was presented in condensed and business-like shape and will be published in greater detail in one of our coming issues.

In addition to the technical points Mr. Badcock brought before the committee the following facts and arguments; Cod oil is an indispensable article in the manufacture of belting, harness and lace leather, patent leather and domestic chamois. Over 90 per cent. of the tanners and leather manufacturers producing these goods favor the removal of the tariff duty. Newfoundland cod oil is a raw material, being simply collected in tanks and then exported. It does not compete with domestic cod oil which is in limited supply.

In answer to certain statements, made on the other side, Mr. Badcock said that Newfoundland cod oil is not controlled from London, and no English house has a branch in the United States. The falling off in consumption is due to the high price of the oil, augmented as it is by an average duty of over 21 per cent, and not to the improvement of the domestic product. The removal of the duty will lessen the production of domestic oil because cod oil is a by-product of the codfish, and the American fishermen will continue to catch cod the same as before after this duty is removed.—Fishing Gazette.

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

**HAMBURG, To-day.**—The German Dutch steamer lines announced the steerage rate from Europe to Canada would be cut \$30 instead of \$40, the cut including also the Austro-Canadian service from Trieste, Austria, to Montreal.

**LONDON, To-day.**—A suffragette scene occurred in the Commons last night. While a division was being taken, R. D. Harben, a well known Socialist and Liberal, shouted from the Strangers' gallery denunciations of the Government's treatment of women. Together with another similar disturber he was ejected.

**LONDON, To-day.**—Bryce, British Ambassador at Washington, has been appointed by the British Government a member of the Permanent Court of Arbitration at the Hague. It was announced at the time of Ambassador Bryce's resignation that his departure from the States would depend upon the settlement of the Panama Canal question between Britain and the States. Sir Cecil Spring-Rice will be Bryce's successor at Washington.

**LONDON, To-day.**—The House of Lords dismissed the appeal of the American Thread Company against the judgment of the Court of Appeals in the matter of the income tax at Britain. Last February the Court of Appeals confirmed the judgment given by the King's Bench Division of the High Court, Justice, on February, 1911, declaring the American Thread Company which is incorporated under the laws of the State of New Jersey, liable to income tax. Britain's profits amounting to \$900,000.

**LONDON, To-day.**—A Constantinople despatch to the Mail says there are rumours there of a heavy Turkish loss at Gallipoli, but Mahoud Shekret Pasha has given assurances that only unimportant skirmishes occurred. Regarding the reported renewal of peace negotiations, the Grand Vizier would only say the Powers are continuing their efforts to favor peace, but the situation is not clear. A despatch to the Daily News says heavy fighting has been going on for two days at Gallipoli and that the Bulgarians have won all along the line. The Turks by their own admission lost 5,000 men. Fighting began on Tuesday. Bulgarians advanced from Kedikl towards Kavak which the Turks occupied. The fight lasted until evening when the Turks retired to Bulair. Another Bulgarian force on Marmora coast occupied Myrsohio. It is reported the Bulgarians before leaving Rodosto burned all the military buildings.

## City Team Will Get Ready.

In view of the probable visit of the Halifax Wanderers hockey league will arrange at once for the selection of a team from whom will be chosen the team to represent the city in the series of games with the visitors, as but a week remains between this and the coming of the out-side team so that there is not much opportunity for the combined team to practice. As our boys are in pretty good shape, no doubt, a few practices will be sufficient. The visiting club is a strong aggregation, probably the strongest that has yet visited here and on this account the local team will have to comprise the very best material that can be procured.

**IMPORTANT MEETING.**—At the monthly meeting of the A. Society to be held on Sunday next a very important discussion will occur.



## Drowning Enquiry.

The enquiry into the tragic happening of Saturday last, was continued yesterday afternoon. Wm. Sullivan, who was standing on the Furness Withy Line wharf when the tug went to rescue the three men and when she was towing the boat, was sworn and examined. He stated he heard the men in the boat distinctly sing out to those on board the tug to let go the tow line. The evidence of Mr. A. Whitwell, who was near Sullivan and witnessed the boat being towed up the harbor, was then taken, as was also the testimony of Mr. W. H. Hynes, who saw the predicament of the boys at the outset, when they discharged their guns for assistance and that he 'phoned the tug Company with the result that the 'John Green' responded hurriedly. This forenoon Andrew West, who was deck hand on the tug, and one of the principal witnesses in the case, was sworn. He said he did not hear any of the men in the row boat shouting to stop when the tug was towing them, and he was stood near the tow line. He further stated that he told Moyst and his two ill-fated companions to go aft in the boat which was filling with water, but they refused. Most of West's evidence was practically the same as already told. The court adjourned at 1 p.m. At 3 o'clock this afternoon the enquiry will be continued when deck hand Ricketts and Capt. Roberts will be examined.

## Government Remissness.

**GAME BIRDS AND EGGS DESTROYED IN CLOSE SEASON.**

Last summer and fall certain Americans and Canadians who were here went up country and in the neighborhood of the Gaff Topsails engaged in the extermination of young partridge and other game birds. Over a large area they hunted for the eggs of partridge and hundreds if not thousands of these were taken from the nests and "blown" i.e., the meat taken out of them and they were then carefully packed for exportation. Not alone this, but men, our informant says were paid from \$2 to \$5 per dozen to secure these eggs for the collectors. Men who knew of this and went over the grounds were not surprised at the scarcity of the birds about the Gaff Topsails, but were disgusted to see such a proceeding allowed to go on unchallenged. At Baccaleeu Island on several occasions, the same has been done with eggs of sea birds. If a poor fisherman were to go out and shoot birds in the close season, he would soon be dropped in jail, but foreigners are allowed to come in and not destroy the birds alone in the close season, but the eggs, the means of their propagation. Yet this is called the "People's Party." What a misnomer. Provided they get their fat salaries and pickings and picnics, the present Tory crowd didn't care if all the people of Newfoundland were in well, or a warmer climate, than they are enjoying at present.

### Smallpox Outbreak.

The Smallpox outbreak at Broad Cove continues to spread despite the precautions taken by the authorities to stamp out the disease. Yesterday afternoon, Dr. Brehm was apprised of a new case, the patient who contracted the ailment, being Mr. Eli Squires. There are now twenty-five patients with Smallpox in the settlement and all are of the same name. We hear that the attending physician is experiencing great difficulty in enforcing the health laws to guard against the disease, as some of the female residents refuse to be vaccinated.

**INTERESTING CONTENT.**—The Morwenna left 30 minutes before the Invermore yesterday. Both are bound to Sydney and up to Cape Race their positions had not altered. A wireless from the Morwenna last night stated she was then 5 miles ahead of the Invermore.

### Road Again Open.

The first express to leave here for Fort aux Basques in a week, left at 6 p.m. yesterday, taking a large number of passengers including some naval reservists.

Rotary No. 1, is now in commission and left this morning to go over the Topsails. No. 2 rotary was at Le-Manche yesterday and goes to the Topsails where she will be kept with No. 1 to keep that section of the line clear. The men are still kept at Leach's Brook where they are engaged keeping the ice off the tracks and guarding against any damage to the temporary trestle there.

The express which left here Friday arrived at Bay of Islands last night and should reach Port aux Basques this evening.

**MORE DIPHTHERIA.**—Yesterday, a case of diphtheria developed on King's Road. The patient was taken to hospital.

### Winter Fishery.

The Customs, yesterday, were advised that during the week cod was plentiful on the S.W. coast but gales from S.W. and N.W. retarded operations. Drift ice was also in evidence and several boats could not hold the ground owing to it. On the 30th ult., several boats were driven off the grounds by the ice and 17 which managed to remain had all they could do to get back to Channel. Next day nine boats which went out got a good catch. Rose Blanche reports a good season in prospect though ice prevents the boats getting out.

**BROUGHT LARGE CARGO.**—The s.s. Durango, Capt. Chambers, reached port yesterday afternoon from Halifax, after a passage of fifty-three hours. Favourable weather was met with. She brought 1,000 tons cargo and will start unloading as soon as the Almeriana sails, the latter occupying the Furness Lane pier.

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

**SOFIA, Feb. 6.**  
The Turkish army occupying the Peninsula of Gallipoli, in defence of the Dardanelles, suffered defeat at the hands of the Bulgarians, south of the River Kavati, yesterday. The Ottoman troops are said to have retreated in disorder toward the town of Balair, a small place to the north east of the city of Gallipoli. They were pursued by the Bulgarians. As a result nearly the whole coast of the sea of Marmora, as far as Balair, is now in the hands of the Allies.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.**  
Apart from the capture of Adrianople, the main object of the Bulgarians is to reach the Dardanelles Straits and clear them for the passage of the Greek fleet into the sea of Marmora, whence they will be able to attack Constantinople directly. Reports say that there is fighting in the north of Gallipoli peninsula and that King Ferdinand's troops are marching straight for the city of Gallipoli. They have occupied the village of Mediste, Blavak and Bulali on the neck of the peninsula, but have not yet met any large Turkish forces of which there are said to be 70,000 on the peninsula. These, in the opinion of military experts, should owing to their favorable position, be able to offer strenuous resistance to the Bulgarian advance. The guns of the Dardanelles forts also may be trained toward the land side, so that the Bulgarians have a severe task before them, particularly as the bombardment of Adrianople is in progress, and the troops are centered on the Tchatalja lines.

**GRAND FORKS, N.D., Feb. 6.**  
Hundreds of thousands of tons of coal are being consumed in the western part of this state by fires in undeveloped mines. Action is being taken by the State Legislature to stop the destruction. Evidence regarding this great waste of national resources was heard yesterday, when the exploiting of Dakota's coal resources was being discussed. The State geologist reported that there are about 20,000 square miles of coal in the State with an estimated 500,000,000 tons.

**ANN ARBOR, Feb. 6.**  
W. A. Smith, of Kalamazoo, submitted to an operation at University Hospital, which, it is said, has never been before performed. A portion of his brain was removed and the brain of a dog substituted. Smith had been suffering from an abscess on the brain and the operation was resorted to as a last effort to save his life. Last night he had come from under the anæsthetic, and was resting comfortably.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.**  
The diplomats of Europe are convinced that the war will not last long. The financial embarrassment of all the combatants and the loss of enthusiasm by the people of the countries involved, lead to the belief that peace negotiations will soon be resumed. The Turkish government is apparently of the same mind, for the leader of the Turkish Peace delegation has received instructions from his government to remain in London a few days longer.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.**  
A Constantinople paper, Le Turc, says that a force of 20,000 Albanians are marching on Uskub, which was captured by the Servians, and is now occupied by them.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.**  
There is much uncertainty as to operations at the front. That the Bulgarians appear to be moving their positions westward along the Tchatalja lines indicates that they fear an attempt to outflank them, but so far there is no confirmation of the rumor that the Turks are moving troops by the sea to Rodosto and Midia. They appear to have met with reverse near Gallipoli, but it is not known whether or not the main force was engaged. No Naval movement has been reported. Dr. Danoff returned to Sofia to-day. The Ambassadors had another meeting in London this afternoon.

**LONDON, Feb. 6.**  
The Postmaster General has declined to release the Marconi Company from its contract to erect a chain of wireless stations throughout the British Empire. This decision has been taken on advice of the Marconi Parliamentary Inquiry Commission. The Lawson order before the Commission still continues. Yesterday he asked Lord Hugh Cecil who was examining him on the subject of his allegations, as to ministerial interest in the Marconi boom, not to treat him as if he were a prisoner in a police court. Lawson admitted heat in writing his articles. He had written several things that he would certainly not write again.


