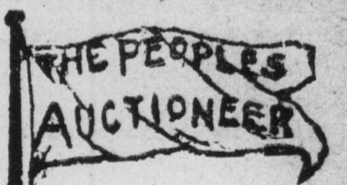

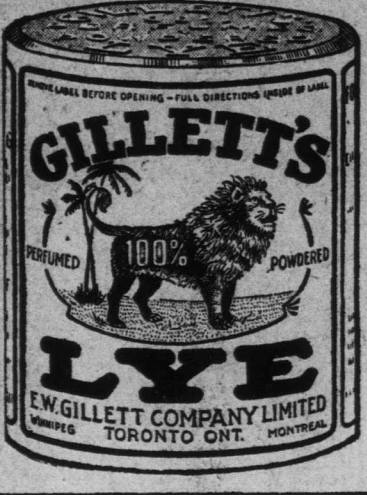

Did she not understand? Ah! he had known how well, how far to well, she understood, he would have spoken very differently, and the game of cross-purposes would have come to an end there and then.

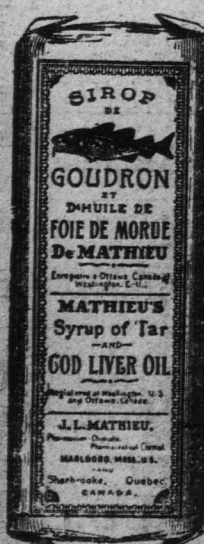

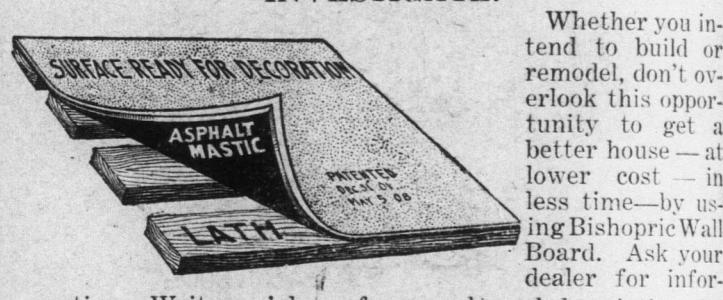

THE RETREAT FROM MOSCOW
 1812. Napoleon entered Russia in June with an immense army of some 500,000 men. In September he entered Moscow intending to make that city his winter quarters, but a few days after the city was set on fire and became a mass of blazing ruins, forcing Napoleon to begin that terrible retreat in which the severe winter and the unceasing attacks of the Russians annihilated the Grand Army. Less than 10,000 men re-crossed the border.
LORD PALMERSTON died 1865, aged 81. British Statesman, whose life-long ambition was to make England feared and respected abroad. Blind to the economic side of national development, he was led to exaggerate the value of diplomacy and prestige.

LEIGH HUNT born 1784. English essayist and poet, the friend of Keats, Shelley and Byron. It is chiefly as an essayist of the Addisonian Order that he claims attention.
DEAN SWIFT died 1745, aged 78. He was a master of the art of satire. The grave irony with which, in professing to plead his opponents' cause, he pours ridicule upon it is as unmatched as the simplicity and lack of ornament of the medium through which it is expressed.

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Oct. 17.
 The London morning newspapers published interesting editorials this morning on the Mexican situation. The Graphic, confessing that Britain has been betrayed into the wrong course, that President Huerta's own action has shown the States to be right and Britain wrong, urges the Government to take immediate steps to withdraw its moral support from the Huerta Administration. The Post thinks President Wilson's resolve to avoid a policy of intervention will be put to a severe test and expresses belief that even if the other Powers withdraw recognition, General Huerta would still remain defiant.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 17.
 There have been no student demonstrations of any sort in the capital or elsewhere so far as is known up to the present; the threatened withdrawal of the Judges of the Supreme Court consequent upon interruption of the sessions of the Court, has been averted by a decision of disaffected jurists that they continue their functions. Four judges who were said to be dissatisfied with prevalent conditions threatened to absent themselves, but the court was in session with customary attendance.

PARIS, Oct. 17.
 The Foreign Office received a telegram from the French Legation in Mexico City suggesting that a warship be sent to Mexico. The Government is considering the matter of following the usual practice of sending a warship when a French Colony requested one, and probably one of the French vessels already in the American waters will be detailed to Mexico.

First Pitched Battle

OF THE CAMPAIGN IN HARBOUR
MAIN DISTRICT - HOLYROOD
THE BATTLEFIELD - GOVERN-
MENT AND OPPOSITION MEM-
BERS PRESENT - GLORIOUS VIC-
TORY FOR LEWIS AND CARTER.

Dear Mr. Editor.—Last night at
Holyrood a meeting was held which
brought out the mettle of every voter
present. The Star of the Sea Hall was
filled to its utmost capacity and several
were obliged to remain on the
outside. The meeting opened at 8.15
o'clock and on motion, Mr. M. Dunlop
was appointed chairman, and after
introducing the speakers called on
Capt. Lewis to address the meet-
ing. This he refused to do, contending
as the hall was hired by the
Government candidates, it was their
place to speak first. He declared that
a challenge had been sent to Mr.
Woodford and colleague asking per-
mission to speak after they would
finish, which request was readily
granted. Now they backed out and
Capt. Lewis told them if they (the
Government candidates) were not
willing to outline their plan of cam-
paign, if Mr. Woodford was able to
give an account of his stewardship
why not do so. Lewis's contentions
were ably upheld by his colleague, Mr.

nounced Woodford's cowardliness in

sectarianism. It was a detestable,
mean, contemptible falsehood, he
said, and in support of his assertion,
Mr. Whalen, of Avondale, at his re-
quest read the copy of a letter writ-
ten by His Grace Archbishop Howley,
clearly showing that there was no-
thing in the constitution of the F. P.
U. to prevent any Catholic from join-
ing it. Woodford and Gibbs had the
audacity to deny its genuineness. Amid
ringing cheers the captain resumed his
seat.

The next speaker was Mr. Kennedy
who praised the Morris Government
for taking the duty of God and tea-
therly enabling all the ladies to in-
dulge in a good cup of tea of which,
he knew, they were very fond. After
giving utterance to a few more deat-
her sentences he "threw up the
sponge."

CARTER UNDER FIRE.

The next to take the platform was
Mr. Leo Carter, the surprise of the
evening. Captain Lewis could scarcely
have chosen a more brilliant, and
able colleague. He treated Gibbs
with withering scorn and told the
Tory candidates that spoke badly
for their intelligence and abilities "to
have to get a 'wet nurse' to fight
their campaign for them. His sound
and logical arguments so eloquently
and effectively put forward
forced the encomiums of all present.
Captain Lewis then left the plat-
form followed by Mr. Carter and called
upon all those who stood up for the
good Old Liberal cause, those who
were not afraid to show their man-
hood, to follow him and leave the
hall. Of over one hundred and twenty
voters twenty-two remained in the
hall.

The meeting, with a few exceptions,
was orderly. Three or four hirelings
joined for the occasion, interrupted
the speaker and his colleague, and
policy to Holyrood I should say that
the interruptions were made by hirelings
from adjacent settlements. One
of the hirelings was so impudent
as to call the speaker a "clown" and
his blackguardism. The others
have near friends who may get hurt
after the ballots are counted. Lewis
and Carter are sure of a decisive vic-
tory. They are most assuredly the
people's choice. Does this not plainly

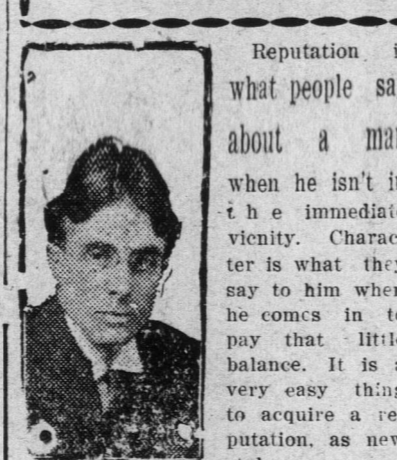

Chasing the Wind and Struck a Whirlwind.

THE TORY CANDIDATES REAPING
WHAT THEY SOWED.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—The standard bearers of
the United Opposition are sweeping
all before them in this district. From
information received from all parts of
the Bay, there can be only one con-
clusion arrived at, and that is that on
October 30th Sullivan, Summers and
Carty will represent this district for

them to attend a joint meeting. Al-
though Devereaux boasted before
leaving St. John's what they would do
to the Liberal team when they met, he
and his two men did not seem over-
joyed at the prospect of a joint meet-
ing, notwithstanding the fact that they
were under the impression that Hay-
stack was with them. They had been
boasting that they would follow the
Liberal around until they caught
them, stating also that the Liberal
team was afraid to meet them. Well,
they met last night and the Tory trio
are sadder and wiser men to-day. We
venture to state they won't want any
more joint meetings. Each candidate
had the option of speaking for twenty
minutes, and at the end Mr. Devereaux
had five minutes to reply. Mr. Sullivan
closing with a five minutes' speech.
When Sullivan, Summers and Carty
had shown up their wilful neglect of
the small settlements for the past four
years, feeling ran so high that Mr.
Morris was continually interrupted

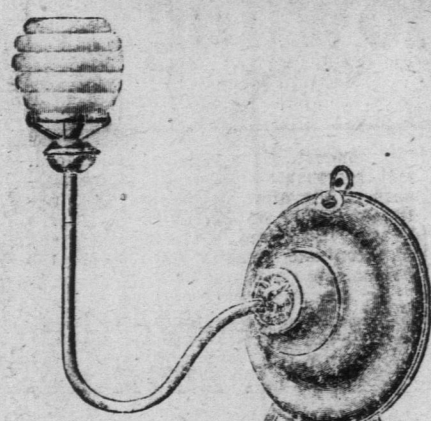

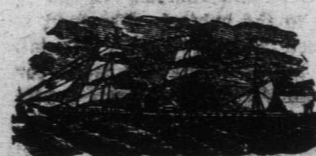
