**PUBLIC NOTICE!**

The following sections of Chapter 28 of the Consolidated Statutes (2nd Series) and the Act in Amendment thereof, are published for general information:

Sec. 12.—When any death takes place in this Colony, information of the same shall be furnished or posted within 48 hours thereafter to the proper officer appointed under this chapter to receive the same in the form of Schedule A, under a fine not exceeding Ten Dollars for every neglect to do so. The obligation to furnish this information shall rest, in the first instance, on the medical attendant; secondly, on the undertaker; and falling thereon, on the next of kin to the deceased person.

Sec. 14.—No sexton or other person having charge of a cemetery or burial place shall permit the burial of any person in such cemetery or burial place without first having received a certificate signed by a MEDICAL ATTENDANT, a CLERGYMAN, or TWO RELIABLE PERSONS cognizant of the facts, certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting forth so far as is known the cause of death; and all such certificates shall be forwarded monthly to the registering offices concerned.

This law does not apply to the City of St. John's, where special and more strict regulations are enforced.

"About me?" Sydney flashed such point-blank interrogation as her companion blinked under. "Anxious? Why? Do I not satisfy her?"

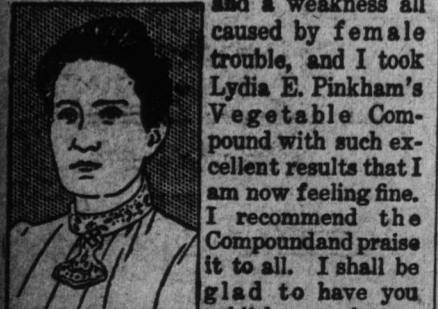

Cross-examined by Mr. Howley, K. C.—The Bank owns and holds the note. It was discounted for Job's by the Bank. It has not been paid. I cannot say when it was discounted.

Mr. Howley asked that the record of the Bank be produced and the transaction shown. The Court ordered the witness to return this morning with the data required.

The Court then adjourned until 11 a.m. to-day. TUESDAY MORNING. Mr. Carman.—To Mr. Furlong, K.C. The note was discounted on Nov. 18, 1912. It was not paid by the maker.

The Court decided to allow the addition of the Bank of Montreal as plaintiff. The Chief Justice gives decision of Court. Costs considered. Time will be allowed for additional defence, but in view of witness being here, the case had to go on.

Mr. Justice Emerson concurs with the Chief Justice. Mr. O'Brien (cross-examined by Mr. Howley, K.C.)—I entered the employment of J. McMartin Dec. 1911, left April, 1912. Did not know him previous to that. Mr. R. H. Reid put me to work on building when I met McMartin. Mr. Reid knew me 16 to 18 years. Mr. Reid put me in touch with J. McMartin in March, 1912. I ceased superintending for John McMartin in March 1913. I was outside superintending. I received orders from Mr. Reid, who had charge of the work. I met McMartin 15 or 20 times during this period. I met Mr. Reid every day. Mr. Reid paid me and settled my wages and my duties. I did no office work. McMartin had an office in New York of four compartments. Mr. Reid gave orders and paid money on construction work. I do not know if there was any other business transactions except construction work. On one occasion I had to do with McMartin after business hours. This was in December, 1912. This was the only occasion I remember. I remember in March, 1913, Mr. Erskine and I had an argument as to my powers. Mr. Reid was out of the room. Mr. Erskine's stenographer, Miss Hunt, was present. I told him he would receive telegraphic instruction from J. McMartin as to my authority. I don't remember having any conversation as to my relations with Reid. I don't know where Reid is now. I saw him last four or five weeks ago. I left New York by the Florizel on May 8th I was in New York a month before that. I saw Reid in New York three or four weeks before I left. I had a telegram and a letter since I saw him last. I received the letter in New York in May from Montreal. I understood he was to come to give evidence in this case. After leaving McMartin I kept up my friendship with Reid. I met Mr. Reid and Mr. McMartin at the Belmont Hotel about 12:15 on Oct. 20th or 21st, 1912. Mr. Reid was going away to Halifax. I did not consult about work. He stated he was going to Halifax. It was desirable I should know his whereabouts. I met him in the lobby. Mr. J. McMartin and Mr. Massey were there. Mr. Reid told me a month ago it was Mr. Massey. We were talking about the evidence in this case. We discussed the note. I never discussed it with Mr. McMartin. I discussed it with Mr. Paulding. I don't remember discussing it with Mr. Reid and Mr. Paulding together. They were great friends. Mr. Reid asked Mr. McMartin if he had the note. Mr. McMartin said he had. Mr. McMartin looked at a note. Mr. McMartin handed the note to Mr. Reid. It was not folded. It was open. I was about two feet away. I saw the note was for \$100,000. I saw three names on it. It was the largest note I had ever seen.

TRAIN ACCIDENT.

CAR TURNED TURTLE—PASSENGER INJURED. A train accident occurred near Come Bay on Sunday and one passenger, Mr. Joseph L. Ross, our veteran farmer and cattle dealer, who was coming home from Nova Scotia with a cargo of cattle that he had purchased, was injured. On Sunday afternoon, between three and four o'clock, when the east bound freight train was passing the place mentioned above, the caboose, which is the rear car of a freight train and which is used for the train hands to house in, left the rails, the car turning bottom up. Mr. Ross, the only person in the caboose at the time of the incident, was knocked about violently, sustaining three broken ribs and was otherwise badly injured. He was rescued later by the train hands and had to be taken out of the disabled car through a window and brought on board the east bound express, which stopped at the scene of the accident. Mr. Ross arrived in the city last night in a very weak condition and had to be tenderly lifted in a carriage and driven to his home near Quidi Vidi Lake. This morning he was attended by Dr. Macpherson. Mr. Ross received a severe shaking up internally. A man of advanced years and though of robust physique, it is thought that the accident will materially affect his old-time vigour.

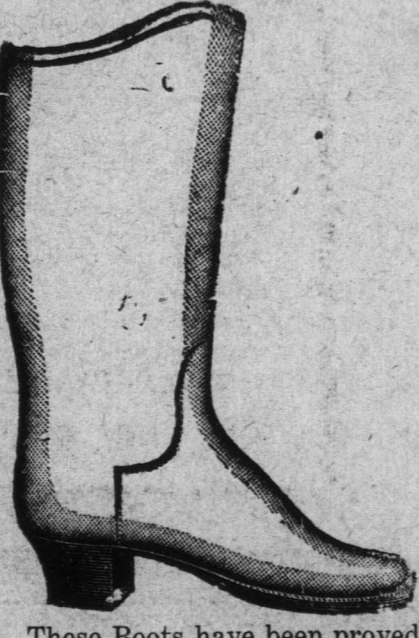

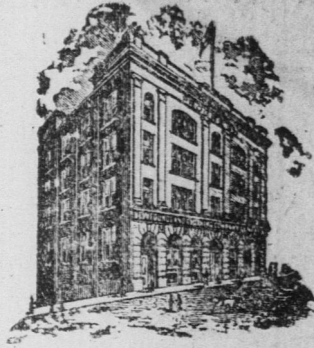

## Within an Inch of Death.

By Colonel "Buffalo" Jones, the Famous Big Game Hunter and Scout.

Colonel "Buffalo" Jones is a new kind of big-game hunter. Instead of shooting the animals he captures them alive with a lasso. Lions, rhinos, hippos, leopards, and panthers have all been caught in this manner, and he is now embarking on an expedition to the French Congo to obtain gorillas by the same method.

In my experience, lions are the most dangerous animals to hunt. They are after you like a flash, and unless you are well mounted they'll get you. If you have a gun, of course the lion stands no chance; but, personally, I don't approve of taking life. On my last expedition we released many of the animals after we had roped them. What's the use of killing them? If everybody were to kill, there would be no wild animals left for posterity. Once you have roped a lion he is at your mercy. You could pull him to pieces if you wished.

#### Lions and Rhinos.

One of the lions we captured last trip was pretty wild when we first saw him, but he soon realized that we meant to get him, and before the rope was actually round him he was almost begging like a cat. He hid in the long grass, scared out of his wits. We threw the rope round his head first, but it is a peculiarity of lions that their heads are smaller than their necks, and the rope came off. Or it may have been that he swelled the muscles of his neck and jerked the rope off. We got him round the neck again, and the same thing happened. Then, as I said, he knew we were determined to have him, and he hid in the grass under a hillock. I dropped down on top of the hillock and threw the lasso round one of his feet.

Rhinos are tough creatures to catch. They possess such enormous strength. One I caught weighed about 6,000 lb. When you've caught a rhino you can hardly do anything with him. Strain your horse as much as you will, you can't make Mr. Rhino budge an inch.

We catch rhinos in a different way from other animals. Instead of chasing them you must let them come after you. A rhino will bolt away right enough, but directly he finds his pursuers drawing uncomfortably near, he jumps in the air and charges back. It is a close call then, unless the hunter's horse is nippy.

#### Braver than their Husbands.

My practice is to let the rhino chase me, and, at the right moment, when one of his thundering hoofs is off the ground, I throw the lasso behind me and catch him round the hoof. Mind you, I've been handling a lasso for fifty years.

When I said that lions were most dangerous just now I meant the female of the species. Lionesses are more plucky and more vindictive than their husbands. If you kill or wound a lion, his wife promptly comes on your track and tries for vengeance. But should you injure a lioness you need not expect trouble from her hubby. He will be only too ready to slink away lest a similar fate befalls him. At the headquarters of our last expedition nineteen deaths were attributable to lionesses, and four to lions. These figures speak for themselves.

I have had some close calls in my time, many of them, I suppose, but I forget them. One of the nearest was when a buffalo had me at his mercy on the ground. He would have tossed me up in the air and put fins to my career, or he might have done it by stamping on me, if I hadn't had the presence of mind to lie perfectly still and pretend to be dead. He sniffed at me, walked round me and then ambled off. I have saved my skin several times by shamming death. A wild animal prefers to tackle something alive. If it has a hunter on the ground, and he doesn't move, and other people in the vicinity are moving, it will leave the prostrate body and attack the moving object. I don't know if lying perfectly rigid would save you if you happened to be alone with a lion. I have never tried it!

#### Hunting for Gorillas.

It is this preference for animation on the wild animals' part that permits a cinematographer to take pictures in the jungle. The camera man is rigid, all around him native boys and hunters move and make a noise. Naturally the animal goes after one of them and permits the photographer to get the cinema films in comparative peace.

A cinematographer accompanies us on this new expedition, and, besides operating a camera, he will work a graphophone in order to get voice records of a gorilla. A gorilla's roar is far louder than that of a lion, and he is harder to catch. A fully-grown gorilla has never been seen alive in captivity, though young ones have been brought to civilization. I don't know how we shall hunt them; per-

haps climb trees. Other wild animals defend themselves with teeth, tusks, or claws, but the gorilla arms himself with a club. We are taking twenty "nigger dogs"—bloodhounds from New Mexico—to put us on the scent of the gorillas, who raid the villages at night, looking for bananas. Once our dogs get their smell we shall be up to them in half an hour.

#### Billy the Kid.

You want to hear some of my American adventures? Well, I have had plenty. A cautious headpiece has saved me from being snuffed out many times when Indian fighting on the plains. I can remember the days when the redskins hated us white men, because they said we interfered with their cattle. Perhaps we did! Once when I was busily skinning a buffalo I had just killed, and happening to look under my arm, I saw an Indian preparing to cover me with his rifle. Had I made the slightest sign that I was conscious of danger he would have put paid to my account right away, for my rifle was lying on the other side of the dead animal. I walked around the carcass as if continuing the skinning operation, then grabbed my gun and had the drop on the redskin before he could wink. Perhaps this doesn't seem very exciting to read, but it was a near moment for me. Anyway, I was everlastingly getting into trouble with Indians.

Now, here is something that really will interest you. I am the only man alive who ever held the drop on Billy the Kid. Probably you have never heard of this young fellow, but he was the most outrageous bad man who ever lived in the West. He didn't care a scrap for human life, and when killed at twenty-two years of age had altogether slaughtered twenty-three men. I have never seen a more handsome chap. Tall, perfectly shaped, with a complexion that a beauty queen would envy, it seemed incredible that he could have committed the cold-blooded shootings he did.

#### His One Last Wish.

As a deputy-sheriff I went after him with the sheriff and another deputy. We captured him, and with me pressing a revolver muzzle right against his heart we marched him to the blacksmith's shanty to have some temporary irons put on his wrists. As the smith fitted on the irons, he said, "Are they tight, Billy?" "They'll cut my wrists to pieces," answered the desperado. "Never mind," said the sheriff, "fasten them up." Billy the Kid flushed crimson, and blue veins stood out on his forehead. He changed from an angel to a devil, but he didn't start anything, for my gun was against his shirt.

We got him to the rough prison safely, and he was tried and sentenced to be hanged. The morning of the execution he broke down and cried like a child. When a deputy came he found him with his head in his arms rocking in anguish. "I have got one last wish," he said. "Let me drink a cup of coffee like a free man before I die. And don't let my mother know that I died in irons."

#### Where His Sweetheart Lived.

Billy had strong regulation handcuffs on his wrists and shackles on his legs, whilst the deputy held two loaded revolvers. He was touched by the outlaw's pleading, and, as there seemed no risk, unlocked one of the cuffs. This was just what the handsome young scoundrel had schemed for.

"Did the sheriff come home last night?" he inquired. The sheriff's house was directly opposite the prison, and the deputy turned his head to see if any smoke was coming from the chimney, in order to answer the outlaw's question. Quick as thought Billy the Kid had raised his manacled wrists and brought them down on the unsuspecting deputy's head. He dropped like a stone.

Billy then picked up his two guns and deliberately shot him dead. Hearing the reports, the sheriff and the deputy who had assisted in Billy's capture came running across to the prison. They thus played into the outlaw's hands for he shot them as they ran.

His next move was to visit the blacksmith and force him at the revolver's point, to break his shackles. He acquired a horse by the same determined means, and then made for a wild part of New Mexico, where his sweetheart lived. If I had been in the vicinity when he broke loose he would have got me for sure, for it was one of his boasts that he had killed every man who had held a gun up to him.

Ultimately he was shot dead by a Santa Fe railway detective, who obtained special leave and tracked him down. The detective was himself shot dead shortly afterwards, so I am the only man alive who has held the drop on Billy the Kid.

### Grand Falls Road Board.

O'Flynn was appointed Secretary, and after a few pertinent questions were put and answered, the nomination of candidates began.

There were twelve nominated, and of these the five elected were: Messrs. Josiah Goodyear, John Lambert, Patrick F. Dwyer, Wm. R. Down, and Fred W. Lake, and the result seems to be generally most popular. These gentlemen possess the respect of the people of Grand Falls, and some of them have had very extensive experience previously in matters of this kind. The public took considerable interest and quite evidently did not shrink their civic responsibilities, and all feel sure that the newly elected Board will amply justify the confidence placed in them.

At a meeting of the Board held on Friday, the 15th, Mr. Goodyear was made chairman. The consensus of opinion is that no more suitable choice could be made. Mr. Goodyear has had experience extending over many years, and is a man of practical knowledge and the highest integrity; in the fulfillment of his new duties he will have the co-operation of all.

### Constabulary Notice!

I hereby notify the owners and drivers of all horse drawn vehicles that the following section of an Act respecting Municipal affairs, passed during the last session of the Legislature, and which became law on the 11th of March last, will after this notice be rigidly enforced by the city police:—

Section 3:—"It shall be unlawful for any person under the full age of eighteen years to drive, or use for payment, hire or reward, whether direct or indirect, any carriage, cart, truck, express, wagon, sleigh, slide, catamaran, or other horse drawn, vehicle plying for hire or for any commercial purpose within the limits of the city of St. John's; and any person under eighteen contravening the provisions of this section, or any person paying, hiring, employing, or re-warding such person shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for every offence a sum not exceeding ten dollars."
