





Our Departed Heroes.

hailing from Newfoundland to give up his life for the Empire, the first cas ualty list of our Naval Reservists who offered their all for King and Country is published to-day. In all 25 Newfoundlanders are reported as going down with H.M.S. Viknor. How the Viknor met her fate is unknown, whether by submarine torpedo, mine or storm is unknown. But there is no doubt of her fate, as bodies with lifehelts have been washed ashore at Port Rush, Ballycuslle, Larne and elsewhere on the coast of Ireland.

The Viknor was a esmall steamer of 200 tons, formerly the Viking, used in the Isle of Man packet trade, and taken over by the Admiralty and converted into a cruiser. The Newfoundlanders who perished were among those who went over on the Franconia and the Carthaginian. Many towns and settlements have lost one or more of their residents, but fortunately, if we can use the word in connection with such a severe misfortune, the loss is distributed widely. The 25 vcitims come from 21 different settlements. Brigus loses three young men. Bay Roberts two and St. John's two. Among the electoral districts, Port de Grave suffers most, as it loses five men out of a small population. The Bonavista district also loses five and Trinity Bay four. The districts of Fogo, Harbor Grace and Placentia Bay lose two each: and Bay de Verde, Harbor Main, St. Barbe and the two divisions of St. John's one each.

Newfoundland has been called upo to pay the price of Admiralty, and the twenty-six men from the Quarter Deck and the Lower Deck have set an example which will be an inspiration to others. They have given their all for their King and Country.







STEAMER SUNK IN IRISH SEA.

FLEETWOOD, To-day. The German submarine 21, on Saturday, torpedoed the North Shields steamer Ben Cruachen off this port. The entire crew numbering twenty, anded here. The same German subnarine is reported to have sunk two other vessels in the vicinity where the Ben Cruachen went down. The captain of the steamer says he was overtaken by the submarine and ordered to leave the ship within ten minutes Hardly had the crew got into the boats when the torpedo fired and the steamer went down. The Ben Cruachen which was 1,978 tons, belonged to the Morrison Shipping Company, Fleetwood, one of the principal fishing shipping ports and watering places on the West Coast The crew of the British steamer Kilcoan was landed at the Isle of Man, Irish Sea, by the coasting steamer Gladys. The rew reports the Kilcoan was sunk by a submarine. The Kilcoan was a small steamer of 456 tons. At least one other vessel besides the Ben Cruachen was sunk by the German submarine 21. This fact became known when the trawler brought 11 members of the crew of the steamer Blanche which was sent to the bottom by the German raider. The Linda Blanche was on the way from Manchester to Belfast when the submarine suddenly appeared alongside The officers came aboard and ordered the crew to leave the steamer. As soon as the men of the Linda Blanche were in their boat, the German attached a mine on the bridge, another forecastle vessel was destroyed. The Germans told the British sailors they could find a trawler by proceeding in a certain direction. The crew were picked up when the fishing boat was reached.

THE GRAPHIC CHASED.

LIVERPOOL, To-day. The Ben Cruachen left Cardiff on Tuesday with five thousand tons coal and was on its way to this city, according to the Liverpool Post, when t met a submarine steamer. 

LONDON, Jan. 30. The Governor, Newfoundland: The French Government reports progress in the region of Nieuport and the positions won on the 27th consolidated.

French airmen dropped bombs on the enemy's camps near Laon, La Fere, and Soissons.

HARCOURT.

THE ENEMY SUFFERS HEAVY

ST. PIERRE, via Paris, Jan. 30. In general, the 29th was relatively quiet with artillery contests in Belgium. Near Givenchy, La Bassee, the British army repulsed the attack of three German battalions. The enemy suffered heavy losses.

North of Arras, near Neuville St. Vaast, our heavy artillery gained the range of a German battery, and blew

up the Caissons. In Albert, Roye, Soissons, Craonne, Rheims and Perthes sections were artillery duels to our advantage.

In Woevre, near Flirey, the Germans exploded a mine intending to blow up our trenches, but only resulted in overthrowing their own.

ON THE WESTERN FRONT.

The French War Office this afternoon issued the following statement: The struggle during the day of the 30th was confined on almost every front to artillery combats. Cannonading was very intense on one side or the other. At numerous points our artillery has everywhere secured ad-

Before La Bassee the British army retook all the trenches momentarily

Germans have cannonaded the belfry and church of Fonqueville, to the South of Arras.

In the section of Arras and Soissons Rheims and Perthes, our batteries have destroyed two of the enemy's pieces, several field works and a certain number of lance bombs, and dispersed several concentrations of

troops, bivouacs and convoys. In Argonne a slight withdrawal of our troops is reported, and their organization on lines within 200 metres to the rear of these, which they had occupied, has been actively disputed to the south. The losses of the enely have been very high; ours were

HEAVY GERMAN LOSSES.

PARIS, Jan. 31. The following official statement was issued by the War Office last night: It is confirmed that the enemy has left a great number of dead on the field of battle to the north of Lombaertzyde, also before the English lines near La Bassee. There has been a bombardment of some intensity of Arras, Rourie and Rochlincourt. On the plateau of Nouvron the Germans exploded a mine without result.

TWO RBITISH VESSELS TORPE. DOED.

PARIS, Jan. 31. Two British vessels were torpedoed by a German submarine in addition to the Ben Cruachen and Linda Blanche, whose sinking was reported last night. This was made known by an official communication given out here totday by the Minister of Marine. The British steamer Tokomaru has been sunk by a torpedo from a German submarine. An English vessel also was torpedoed in the same locality on the Irish Sea when the British steamers Linda Blanche and Ben Vruachen were torpedoed. Hitherto the Germans, before attacking a merchant vessel, always allowed the crews sufficient time to embark to the ship's boats. That custom has now been abandoned, as is shown by the bombardment of the Admiral Gen Therme which was filled with Belgian women and children refugees. The German Marine has decided to violate, systematically and deliberately, international law.

ADVANCING ON KOENIGSBURG.

PETROGRAD, Jan. 31. Three great Russian armies are now advancing upon the strongly fortified German seaport of Konigsburg. Developments of a new offensive, south of the railroad leading from Instersburg to the East Prussian capital, was indicated in despatches from the front today.
