


The following Regulations, under the provisions of the Inspection of Foods Act, respecting the sale of condensed or evaporated milk, approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published for general information:-

1. No person shall sell or offer or expose for sale any condensed or evaporated milk containing less than eight per cent of milk fat.

2. The Medical Health Officer, Government Analyst, or any Inspector appointed for the purpose of the Inspection of Foods Act may enter any tore or any other place where any condensed or evaporated milk is kept or exposed for sale, and may take or purchase any reasonable sample of such condensed milk for the purpose of having the same analysed.

3. Any person who shall sell or offer for sale or expose for sale any ondensed or evaporated milk which is found on analysis by the Government Analyst to contain less than eight per cent of milk-fat shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, or in default of payment, to imprisonment for a penot exceeding thirty days.



ANOTHER FRENCH ADVANCE.

Grand Headquarters of the French Army in France, Aug. 26 (By Associated Press)-The gallantry of the French troops before Verdun carried them forward again to-day when they attacked between Mormont Farm and Lachaume Wood, and advanced another 1,000 yards, capturing nearly 1.000 prisoners. Territory south of Peaumont heights and woods and alost the village of Beaumont fell ino their hands, despite most severe German counter attacks which came under vigorous fire from French artillery. The first attack in the centre was checked for a time, but the re-; sistance of numerous nests of machine guns was overcome by the wonderful dash of the French troops who would not be denied. The German artillery which seems to be weakening has bombarded heavily lately before retiring under pressure, but the fire has been wild and little harm has been done.

GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED.

PARIS, Aug. 27. Strong German attacks were made last night on the Aisne and Verdun fronts. The war office announces that the assaults were broken up by the French fire, and that all French positions were maintained. More than 11,000 prisoners were taken up to yesterday

FURTHER BRITISH PROGRESS.

LONDON, Aug. 27. An official from British headquar ters in France to-night reads: A heavy rain has fallen throughout the day. This afternoon our troops attacked the enemy's positions east and southeast of Langemarck. First reports indicate that we have made satisfactory progress. The enemy attempted a raid on one of our positions north of Lens this morning, but was driven off with loss. Bombing raids and observation work for artillery were carried out vigorously yesterday by our airplanes. Enemy battery, transports and infantry were effectively engaged with machine guns. During the fine intervals the enemy the air fighting four German air planes were brought down, three others were driven down out of control. Two of ours are missing.

GERMAN OFFICIAL RESIGNED.

MacMILLAN'S DISCOVERIES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27. The important survey of the coast of Ellesmere Land including the establishing of the definite position of two new islands and the discovery of a heretofore unknown ice glacier which has been named "American Museum Glacier" second in size only to the Mumboldt glacier, was announced in a telegram received here to-day by the American Museum of National History from D. B. Mac-Millan, explorer and his party who have landed from the rescue ship Neptune at Sydney, N.S., and who expect to reach here Thursday. A valuable collection gathered by Mac-Millan is being shipped here by express. The telegram received to-day describes in detail the hazardous trip to Etah from Cape Herschell where MacMillan turned back. He states he found legible records of the British expedition in 1876 left there by Sir George Nares who was in command for his two ships the Discovery and Alert, left by Sir Arthur Young of the expedition and also the mail Pandora who subsequently visited the depots of Nare's expedition
