



Inter - Denominational Education.

SOME NOTABLE OPINIONS

There can be no doubt that Interdenominational Education is the system favored by nearly every rightthinking man in the country to-day. Many have pronounced their approval of the principle, while many more, who have not done so, consider it right and the only right one. Some time ago we published the opinions of some prominent men on the important subject, and to-day we append more. That they are clear-cut and sharply-defined is evident, and each one is worded in such emphatic and decisive language that there can be no mistaking its meaning. Possibly the most interesting of to-day's list is that of Mr. Dugald Munn, who, as he states, is prepared to give Twentyfive Thousand Dollars to Education if it be Interdenominational. Naturally, such a pronouncement as this does much to bring forward a system as the one on which the following quotations have been given.

Rev. J. W. A. N. Nicholson, Moderator of Halifax Presbytery, and now Supplying in St. Andrew's Church, Says:- "The closer co-operation the different denominations have in education the better for the dominion, and for that reason the proposed amalgamation is a step in the right direction. As an outsider, I may say that I do not understand how the present "system" could have been tolerated for so long.

Mr. Charles P. Ayre, of the firm of Ayre & Sons, a Prominent Church and Business Man, Says:—"The adoption of Interdenominational Education will mark a great step forward in-the training of the young people of this country. In most of the outports it will make possible properly graded, better staffed, and more efficiently equipped schools, in which the teachers, instead of working alone, will have the advantages that come from personal contact with others of the same profession. The scholars will benefit by a larger environment and a more practical system. Compulsory education will be made feasible in all the more populous centres."

Rev. D. B. Ashford, of the Congregational Church, Says:—"Education is a National affair, and ought not to be in the hands of the Churches, as such, at all. or subject to the whims and wiles of party politics. But bearing in mind the evolution of our present system, I believe that Interdenominational Education would be a great step forward, and would make for both efficiency and economy. The Churches have no right to allow vested interest or denominational jealousy to stand in the way of a more perfect system of educa-





Royal Naval Reservists will submit their Certificates (R.V.2 N.) to "The Paymaster, Department of Militia," as soon as possible.

A Preliminary Payment of War Service Gratuity will be made on September 1st.

Application forms for Separation Allowance will be distributed as soon after September 1st as possible. Payments of this allowance will commence as soon as the forms have been returned completed, and passed by the S. A. Committee.




