John Murphy, No. 2, a Baggage Man on the Great Western Railway arrested at Noon to-day.




Fenian Celebrities.

HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The Terronto *Telegraph* openly accuses the Hibernian Society, of Toronto, of be-ing a Fenian circle. This is no more than whata great many suspected from its recent conduct with regard to Mike Mar-phy. A Fenian aper published in New York has acknowledged it fraternally, and perhaps asid more in its favour than was conducive to its health or existence. The *Telegraph* gives the recent history of the three of the members, and what they are doing for their country as fol-lows.—A few years ago a follow named Lomesnay worked in the *Globe* office here. He was a violent Fenian in his langtage, and possessed of sufficient fool-hardiness to be as violent in lis actions. He belonged to the Hibernian Society, and we believe, held some minor office therain. He left the city shortly before the troubles began in Ireland, went to New York, and thence to Ireland in com-pany with many others. In the army of the Republic he held the rank of cap-tain, with a promise of immediate pro-motion should the undertaking prove successful. Unfortunately for him and others it was the reverse. He was cap-tured near Cork, tried and found guilty, and sentenced to prison for a very long term. We have on it pretty good authority that the notorious Captain McKay is no other than Lomesnay, the former *Globe* compositor and Toronto Hibernian.
