





A Bio Prorestron.—A gentleman at the Falls has stated that if he was given the exclusive right of taking visitors under the sheet of water he would agree to build a stone wall along the bank of the river from the Falls to the Suspension Bridge, and pay a good rental beside. The distance between the two points is about two miles and a half, and a stone wall four feet high that distance would cost no small amount of money. Such a wall is required, as it is very dangerous, and especially at night. At many places a deviation of a foot or two from the road will precipitate a person down a perpen-dicular bank 100 feet high on jagged piles of rock.
