ACCIDENT IN PILKINGTON.—A young
man, aged 18 years, son of Mr. Wm.
Beale, Pilkington, while driving cattle to
Guelph, on Wednesday last, was struck
by the tongue of a sleigh in the back,
and knocked down, the horses and ve-
hicle passing over him. His injuries are
very severe, one leg being terribly crush-
ed and broken. His medical attendant is
of the opinion that amputation will be
necessary.

A TEMPERANCE NEWSPAPER.—We have
received from the Pure Gold Publishing
Company, Toronto, the first number of
The Prohibitionist, a weekly journal de-
voted chiefly to the advocacy of temper-
ance, and the prohibition of the liquor
traffic. Like every one of the above
named company's publications, typog-
raphically it is very neat, while the matter
it contains is appropriate and exceedingly
interesting.

W. G. & B. R.—The *Hamilton Times*
learns that Col. McGivern and the dele-
gation accompanying him to Bruce, have
won another victory over the Toronto
narrow-gauge advocates. The Town
Council of Walkerton have voted, despite
of Toronto influence, to submit the By-
law granting a bonus to the Wellington,
Grey and Bruce line, to the electors. This
is a grand triumph on the part of Col.
McGivern and those who are aiding him
in the Railway enterprise.

"OUR CANADIAN ARMY GALOP."—We
have received from the author, Mr. W.
Philp, of Port Hope, the recently pub-
lished "Canadian Army Galop." No more
appropriate subject could have been
chosen than the military force of the
Dominion, and the music is in every way
worthy of it. As a composition it is
highly creditable to the author, and will
doubtless have a large sale. Copies can

in Town.

THE ELORA PORK PACKING HOUSE.—The
newly organized Pork Packing Co., in
Elora are doing a good business. Mr.
Harrison, of Guelph, is managing the
establishment, and no more competent
manager could they have got. At present
they have more than 2000 hogs on hand,
and large quantities are coming in daily.
The premises used for the business are
underneath the large warehouses owned
by Mr. Roberts, and occupied by Messrs
McBride & Ferguson, and Messrs. Smith
& Livingston, being very favorably situ-
ated for the purpose. The capital embar-
ked is from \$30,000 to \$40,000.

BOLD ROBBERY IN FERUS.—The *Ex-
press* says:—On Saturday last a man
from the Township of Garafaxa, whose
name we could not learn, walked into the
shop of Mr. S. Marshall, watchmaker,
Fergus, ostensibly for the purpose of hav-
ing a small gold ring repaired. While Mr.
Marshall was examining the article, a
gentleman came into the shop, examined
a number of watches, finally selected one
and paid for it. The watches, with the
exception of one which the aforesaid per-
son had in his hand, looking at it critically,
were replaced in the show case, and the
work of repairing commenced. So intent
was Mr. M., engaged, that he did not
"smell a mice," when the man, after chat-
tering him to hurry up his work, walked
out saying he would return shortly. In
the course of a short time the watch was
missed, and search was made for the sup-
posed thief, but in vain. However, dur-
ing the afternoon, he was found in one of
the hotels with the watch upon his per-
son. He was bound to die game, and
squared off, in the most improved pugil-
istic style, when restoration of the prop-
erty was demanded. Constable Ling-
wood compelled him, however, to disgorge
his ill-gotten gain, and he was allowed to
go unmolested. He said he only took the
watch in security for the ring,—the watch
was worth \$20, and the ring \$1—and that
they might do their best. Penitentiary
for a term would have a good effect upon
the janus.

THE late Baroness Weld has left
the bulk of her property to Archbishop
Manning for religious purposes, including
a large sum for building a Roman Catho-
lic church at Oxford.

Working Men's Club.

The meeting of Mechanics and other
working men, of which we gave notice a
few days ago, was held last (Thursday)
night in the Temperance Hall, and con-
sidering the state of the weather, and the
fact that there were other gatherings the
same night, it was well attended. Mr.
Malcolm McLean was appointed chair-
man and Mr. Tinker secretary. The fol-
lowing resolutions were carried:

Moved by Mr. H. H. Maddock, seconded
by Mr. Jas. Barry, that it is desirable
to form an Association of working men,
the object of which will be their mutual
improvement and social intercourse, to be
known as "The working men's Club."

Moved by Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr.
Arnold, that a Reading Room and Library
be formed in connection with the Club.
Moved by Mr. Murphy, seconded by
Mr. Murray, that a Committee be ap-
pointed by the chairman to draft By-laws
and Regulations for the guidance and
government of the Club. A committee
was formed in accordance with the resolu-
tion.

Moved by Mr. C. Maddock, seconded
by Mr. Gooder, that the members of the
Club meet on Thursday the 1st February
in the Temperance Hall, when the By-
laws will be submitted for approval, and
the election of officers will take place.
We are glad to learn that the Club has
been organized under the most favorable
auspices. There are already about 250
names on the list of members, with the
promise of large additions when the Club
gets into working order.

NEWS ITEMS.

BRANTFORD wants to have a Central
Fair.
Lord Walter Campbell, Princess
Louise's brother-in-law, is at Toronto.

THOS. BOWLES was elected by acclama-
tion Warden for the County of Peel.
The Orange Hall and other buildings
in Belleville were burned on Thursday
morning.

An illicit still was seized on Friday
last, in the township of Adajla. Twenty
barrels a day was its capacity.

DURING the snow storm on Thursday
the ferry boat plying between Fort Erie
and Black Rock was run aground. The
Grand Trunk ferry between Buffalo has quit
running till the storm subsides.

The show room of Anthony Brothers'
carriage factory, Brampton, was discover-
ed to be on fire about 2 o'clock on
Thursday morning, and was in a very
short time consumed. The loss is about
\$1,500. Insurance \$600. Cause sup-
posed to be a defective stove-pipe.

SHOOTING EXTRAORDINARY.—On Wed-
nesday the long talked of match made
between the champion, Mr. James Ward,
and Mr. W. G. Day for one hundred
dollars a side, came off in Toronto. Mr.
Ward took eighty-five out of one hun-
dred snow birds. Ward accomplished
the feat easily, having killed eighty-six
birds.

LOSS OF A STEAMER AND MANY LIVES.—
The steamship *Naida*, on her voyage to
Alexandria, encountered a heavy gale.
The steamer was crowded with natives,
many of whom were on deck. During
the thickness of the storm a sea swept
the decks from stem to stern, and 35 native
passengers were carried overboard and
drowned.

HAMILTON AND ERIE RAILWAY.—The
County Council of Hamilton have rat-
ified the By-Law for granting sixty-five
thousand dollars bonus, to aid in the
construction of the Hamilton and Erie
Railway. It was adopted by a popular
vote of the people in several townships,
grouped together for that purpose, some
time since. The final adoption of this
By-law will ensure the construction of
the road at the earliest day possible.

STORM IN BRITAIN.—A despatch from
London on Thursday morning informs
us that a terrific storm raged over the
British Isles the previous evening. The
lower portions of London were flooded,
and the roof of the Parliament building
was penetrated by the rain in several
places. The telegraph wires were blown
down in all directions, and consequently
communication was greatly interrupted.
No wrecks were reported, but it is feared
much damage has been done to the
shipping.

VACCINATION.—The *Ottawa Times* say
that one of the leading physicians there
has received a letter from Dr. Ballard,
of London, England, who was appointed to
report to the Privy Council on the sub-
ject of vaccination. Dr. Ballard states
that the old theory of renewing vaccina-
tion every seven years is exploded, and that
infant vaccination holds good in the
system until the age of fifteen years, or
thereabouts. It should then be renewed,
and after forty, vaccination is now con-
sidered of little or no use to the system.

BOILER EXPLOSION IN CHATHAM.—The
lard rendering boiler in Coate & Lamont's
soap factory, Chatham, was blown up on
Thursday, causing a large amount of
damage. It was hurled through the roof,
which was all crumpled in, to the extent of
sixty feet from the building, landing di-
rectly against the opposite side of a high
pile of wood. The engineer, Wm. Leith,
was dangerously injured, having had one
leg broken, and his head fearfully cut.
There was no steam-gauge on the boiler.
A few nights before, in the same establish-
ment, a tank burst and ran a large quan-
tity of soap down stairs, on which occa-
sion a Mr. Thos. Catling nearly lost his
life.

MATERIAL FOR MAKING PAPER.—They
are again working in England about the
scarcity of material for paper manufacture.
Rags are, of course, scarce; there is not
enough to supply the large demand, and
as it is with us, the cheaper publications
use a paper made of straw and wool. In
Germany even china-clay is converted
into paper. The British paper manu-
facturers have tried almost everything
containing fibre, in order to escape the
rag-market, but the species of Spanish
grass called "esparto" has alone met
their sanguine expectations lately, and
now the supply of that article threatens
to fall short, and another "paper famine"
is apprehended. "Esparto" was first
used successfully in 1863, when it cost
nine English shillings per ton. Last
year one hundred and fifty thousand tons
were imported into England, and the
price has risen from nine to two hundred
shilling (ten pounds sterling a ton!) The
consumption of paper has doubled in
Britain since esparto was introduced.

Wellington County Council

Jan. 25.
The Council met at 3 p. m. All the
members present with the exception of
Dr. Orton.

The Warden read a letter from the
County Solicitor, adhering to his former
opinion regarding second-class County
Roads.
The Warden read communication from
certain ratepayers, resident in Pilkington,
of Union School Section No. 5 in the
Townships of Nichol and Pilkington re-
garding certain alterations which have
been made therein, and to which the pe-
titioners object and pray to have disal-
lowed. Referred to the Education Com-
mittee.

Moved by Dr. Mandley, seconded by
Mr. McMann, that in the event of new
buildings being required for the Province
of Ontario, representations be made to
the Government, by this Council, in be-
half of the just claims of Guelph, and
that they memorialize the Government
for that purpose. Carried.

The Warden read the reply of the Hon
Peter Gow to the telegram despatched
yesterday regarding the North Riding
Registry office. It stated that the matter
had not yet come before the Government
for its decision, and consequently he was
unable to say what action, if any, would
be taken in the matter.

The Council then adjourned till to-
morrow morning at 10 a. m.

Jan. 26th, 10 a. m.
The Council met pursuant to adjourn-
ment. Members all present.

The Warden read the report of Special
Committee upon the communication from
the County Council of Lambton:

Your Committee having considered
the petition from the County Council of
Lambton, fully concurring in the senti-
ments of said petition, and would recom-
mend that a similar one be drawn up and
signed by the Warden and Clerk, and for-
warded to the Governor and House of As-
sembly of this Province.

W. LESLIE, Chairman.
Moved by Mr. Leslie, seconded by Mr.
Johnston, that the Report of the Com-
mittee on the County Council of Lambton
be adopted. Carried.

Mr. Dawson's name was added to the
Standing Committee on Finance.
Mr. Nicol read the reply to the War-
den's address.

The Special Committee on the Warden's
Address beg leave to report as follows:—
That your Committee would fully con-
cur in the opinion of the Warden in amend-
ing the law so that the expense of sum-
moning and remunerating Jurors, and all
indemnity paid Crown witnesses, be made
Provincial, and your Committee would
recommend that Government be petition-
ed to that effect.

And also that the charge of one dollar
per diem paid Constables for attending
hearings before Justices of the Peace
should be charged with the other costs
and not against this Council as has been
done hitherto.

Your Committee recommend that the sug-
gestion of the Warden in the 3rd clause
be carried out with reference to Jail sup-
plies not being paid until said accounts
have passed the Audit Committee, pro-
vided such arrangements shall not inter-
fere with parties furnishing said supplies.

The last clause of the Address in refer-
ence to the proper manner of providing
for and maintaining the County Roads,
your Committee would consider it more
within the province of the Standing
Committee upon said roads to deal with.

Wm. NICOL, Chairman.
Mr. Darby read report of Committee on
Roads and Bridges as follows:—
Your Committee beg to report that
having examined the report of the late
Reeve of Maryboro' for the Centre Side
Line in said township find vouchers for
the full amount granted, with an account
of \$42 25 unpaid, and for the road be-
tween the 2nd and 3rd cons. in said
township find vouchers for \$788 05, being
\$11 95 without vouchers, and \$29 85
unpaid, making a total of \$77 10 of an
expenditure over the amount of grants

which your Committee cannot recom-
mend to be paid by this Council. And
having examined the report of Mr. Rose,
appointed to report on the grant on the
East and Nichol Town Line, find the
same correct, leaving an unexpended bal-
ance of \$18 25.

Your Committee having considered the
petition of the ratepayers of the Town-
ships of Luther for building a bridge on
the Town Line between the Townships
of Luther and Preston, recommend
that \$200 be granted on condition that
the County of Grey grant an equal amount.

Your Committee would recommend that
the petition of Robert Chambers and
others for the opening up of the Town
Line between the Townships of Pilk-
ington and Woolwich, and of the Corpora-
tion of the Township of Maryborough for
the Township of Maryborough for the
road over Spring Creek, be
laid over until the June session of the
Council, and that they be then considered.
Geo. A. DARBY, Chairman.

On motion made and seconded the re-
port was adopted.

How the Narrow-Gauge Works.

(From the Hamilton Spectator.)
It is scarcely proper or manly to strike
an antagonist when he is down; but if
that antagonist will persist in efforts to
bite and gouge, he must not find fault if
he is duly punished. The Narrow Gauge
people, who resort to unfair and tricky
methods to injure a rival scheme, seem
to be getting only open and fair blows in
return; but these so far have been of
the most staggering description. And
now, it seems, they are being smitten in
the house of their friends. They have
their road built and running to Mount
Forest; but they cannot get traffic for it.
A correspondent of the *Guelph Mercury*
shows that in eighteen days 50,672
bushels of wheat were shipped on the
Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway at
the single village of Cliford; while in
three months but 39,165 bushels were
shipped from all the stations on the To-
ronto, Grey and Bruce Railway combined.
During the same eighteen days 278,947
pounds of pork were shipped from Clif-
ford over the Wellington, Grey and
Bruce Railway, an amount exceeding by
nearly 40,000 pound the total shipped
from all the stations on the narrow gauge
road for three months.

The correspondent shows that this
wonderful difference is not owing to any
great difference in the nature of the
two countries through which the two lines
run, for the narrow gauge to Mount
Forest traverses a very good country, but
simply to the fact that Toronto is not so
good a market as Hamilton. Prices
range higher in Guelph than in Toronto
and it is a fact which bears out, and
even exceeds the representations of the
Wellington, Grey and Bruce advocates,
that farmers actually drive from the line
of the narrow gauge road over to the
Wellington, Grey and Bruce line to sell
their produce.

EDITORIAL ITEMS.

Rev. Vicar-General Kelly, of Kingston, died on Thursday.

Messrs. Mitchell and Cotton have got the contract for excavations at the deep cut on the Welland Canal.

Westward, Ho! is to be the name of a new paper which will shortly appear at Ottawa, in the interests of emigration.

The Lord Mayor of London has called a public meeting for Tuesday, in aid of the British expedition for the relief of Dr Livingstone.

Lady Franklin has offered a reward of £2,000 for the recovery of the records of the Erebos Terror, supposed to have been deposited in King William's Land.

EDUCATION IN SWITZERLAND.—In Switzerland there are 7000 elementary schools, conducted by 6000 masters and mistresses. They are visited by 400,000 pupils. Further, there are 276 secondary schools and 46 seminaries for the education of Teachers. These numbers give an average of one school, for 371, and one Teacher for 433 inhabitants.

It seems that the ashes of Columbus, which have already made almost as many voyages as the living navigator, are to be again disturbed. The Havanese, who have had possession of the mortal relics of the discoverer of America since 1746, propose to remove them to a new cemetery, and erect over them a suitable monument.

The expedition organized by the Royal Geographical Society of England, to seek for Dr Livingstone, will, it is expected, speedily overtake the American expedition headed by Mr Stanley, who appears to have become involved in disturbances with the natives. It is stated that the last letter received from Dr Livingstone was dated May 30, 1869, from Ujiji, Lake Tanganyika. In June, 1870, the British Government granted \$5,000 to supply fresh stores and men to Livingstone, which were sent into the interior by the consul at Zanzibar. A native in charge of a portion of these stores is reported to have received a letter from the Doctor, dated Oct 15, 1870. It appears probable that he is detained in the interior against his will.

Rosa D'Erina's Concert.

Omaha, Jan. 25.—Reports from the stations along the Union Pacific Railway show indications of the worst blockade of the winter at Rawlins.

New York, Jan. 26.—A special cable despatch says that Thiers is endeavoring to secure the complete evacuation of France by the German troops, and Prince Bismarck has given his consent on condition that three milliards of francs be paid earlier than previously agreed upon. The announcement stimulates the tobacco monopoly project.

During the recent crisis Thiers said to Gen Crissay that if Napoleon had fifty million francs he would be in power in fifteen days.

In the Spanish Cortes Diaz Quentera said that it was quite time to annex Cuba to the United States, and he was howled down by the whole House.

Ontario Legislature.

Toronto, Jan. 25.

Hon Mr. Scott moved that Messrs. Ardagh, Boulton, Boulton, Fitzsimmons, Farlee, Prince, Clarke (Wellington) Perry and Fairbairn do comprise a committee to consider the resolution adopted by the House yesterday respecting the charges made by Mr Cameron concerning the resignation of Mr. Wood, but in consequence of some objection made by Mr. M. C. Cameron, it was put it as a notice of motion.

Mr. Rykert enquired of the Ministry whether they were prepared to recommend His Excellency to offer a substantial reward for the apprehension and conviction of the murderers of Thomas Scott.

Mr. Blake—They are.

In answer to a question Mr Blake said it was not the intention of the Government to deal with the Municipal Loan Fund this session.


