DuMaurier Dead.

London, Oct. 11.—George DuMaurier, the artist and author, who has been suffering for some time with heart and long trouble, died at 2.30 o'clock this morning. His death was peaceful.

Palmer DuMaurier, artist and author, was born in Paris, March 6, 1834, and educated in that city, but was a British subject. He was a member of the Académie des Beaux-Arts in Paris, and the author of "The Story of a Feather," "The Story of a Feather," and many other books. In 1882 DuMaurier published a novel "Peter Abbotson," in which he introduced his own novel "Trilby" appeared. Hill as a Fruit Market.

DEAR SIR,—In this year of what is almost a superabundant apple crop and is certainly a record for the quantity of apples in the market of the distributing system, it may be some time to point out that Great Britain is not a land of one or two ports. London and Liverpool, of course, head the list; but there are a dozen other ports, of which Hill appears to take the lead, that can give a good account of three or four fruit boats a day. Hill herself manages to absorb the contents of more than five daily, as the subjoined table, which is culled from official sources, will show.

Great Britain's Debt. Despite enormous expenditures every year for new ships, Great Britain is steadily paying off its public debt. In 1817, at the close of the Napoleonic wars, the total debt was \$4,430,360,185, and since that date various wars have caused additional indebtedness amounting to \$1,828,000,000, making a grand total of \$6,258,360,185.

At present, however, the debt is only \$3,273,945,510, showing a reduction of \$3,000,000,000. Before the great war of 1817, the total debt was \$1,000,000,000, and it was not until 1817 that the debt was reduced to its present level.
