With no commodity is waste so apparent as it is in the handing of eggs.

During the past few years special ndeavor has been made to bring this matter to the attention of producers and the wholesale trade. This appeal. nowever, is addressed more particudarly to retailers, many of whom do not seem to realize the extreme perishability of eggs.

It is a common practice at this season of the year for many retailers to advertise the increasing egg supply and the rapidly falling prices by displaying piles of eggs in their store windows. 

MATING THE BREEDING PEN

The mating of the breeding per should not be the work of a few minutes or a few hours, it should be the result of weeks and months of study The old way was to keep over two or three cockerels and let them run with the whole flock and then when hatching eggs were wanted they were simply taken out of the general collection and set. Such methods are obselete-or rather they should be.

When the pullets are put into win ter quarters they should be leg banded and "trap-nested" and a careful record kept of the laying of each bird. It is from the pullets that lay heaviest in the winter months, that is, November, December, January and February that the breeders should be selected. If sufficient yearlings of the type mentioned have been retained for breeders well and good; but if not don't be afraid to use well matured pullets. They will be far from poo breeders. In-fact, they are generally more prolific and the eggs hatch fully as well or better, but the vitality of the chicks is frequently not as good

as those from the hens. In selecting the breeders, not only should they be good winter layer, but they should be strong, vigorous birds well up in size. The male to head th pen should be the son of a heavy winter layer. He should be very strong Hearse sent to any part of the County and vigorous, standing on legs that are not too long and that are set well apart with no inclination to knockknees.
