





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NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.

6. To provide Bibles, Prayer Books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Churchwardens, and others elected by the Society, being members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust, (e) the interest of the Sustentation Fund.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Church Society was held at the National School Hall, on Wednesday, 6th February.

There were present:—Rev. Canon Von Iffland, Rev. G. H. Parker, Rev. A. J. Balfour, Rev. H. J. Petry, Rev. L. W. Williams, Messrs. W. G. Wurtele, John Hamilton, G. R. White, George Veasey, George Lampson, W. H. Carter, C. Judge, E. J. Hale, and the Secretary.

The Rev. H. J. Petry in the chair.

After prayers, the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The reports and the accounts of the Central Board, the Diocesan Board, and the Clergy Trust Committee were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The accounts of the Church Society, the Diocesan Board, the Clergy Trust Fund, the Bishopric Endowment Fund, and the Local Endowment Fund, were adopted and ordered to be printed.

The following were elected members of the Corporation: Rev. E. B. Husband, Rev. W. A. Adcock, Rev. J. E. Hatch.

A hearty vote of thanks was then tendered to Com. Gen. Irvine, C.B., and John Hamilton, Esq., for their valuable services during the past year.

The Rev. Mr. Petry having to leave, the chair was taken by W. G. Wurtele, Esq.

The Vice-Presidents were re-appointed, omitting the name of the Rev. C. P. Reid, deceased.

The following gentlemen were elected to serve on the Central Board:—Messrs. C. Judge, F. Montizambert, W. H. Carter, H. J. Pratten, R. P. Campbell, E. Pope, John Hamilton, W. H. Tapp, E. J. Hale, R. R. Dobell, Rev. E. I.

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The Honorary Counsel of the Church Society were then re-elected, viz.: The Hon. George Irvine, J. Dunbar, Q.C., and George Lampson, Esq., and a vote of thanks were tendered to them for their valuable services during the past year.

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The following were elected members of the Diocesan Board:—Rev. G. H. Parker, Very Rev. the Dean of Quebec, The Venerable The Archdeacon of Quebec, Messrs. Robert Hamilton, W. H. Carter, C. Judge.

The thanks of the Church Society were then given to the Auditors for their valuable services during the past year.

The following by-law, read for the first time on the first day of February, 1888, was now finally considered and adopted:—

"Whereas under the Statute of the Province of Quebec, 45 Vic., Chap. 88, this Society is authorized to consolidate the Endowment Funds, for the support of various Parishes and Missions within the Diocese of Quebec, placed and hereafter to be placed in the hands of this Society under deeds of trust for investment, so far as to distribute any losses that may occur through failure in investments proportionately over the whole; and whereas by such consolidation every Parish and Mission would in great measure be secured from loss which might occur by the total or partial failure of its investments, therefore it is enacted:

"That all the Endowments so placed and hereafter to be

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placed in the hands of this Society be, and the same are, consolidated for such distribution of losses; provided nevertheless; that no Parish or Mission shall be affected by, or come under the operation of the present By-Law, until this Society shall have received a formal certificate in writing, signed by the Incumbent and Churchwardens of every congregation in the Parish or Mission, declaring that it has been decided at a regular meeting of said congregation, that the Parish or Mission consents to come under the operation of the present By-Law, and to incur the obligation imposed by such consolidation, and desires to obtain the benefits which may arise therefrom. That in the event of loss in any Endowment Fund of any Parish or Mission which has so certified its consent and desire to come under this By-Law, such loss shall be distributed over all the Endownents which are under the operation of this By-Law, and shall be borne proportionately by the whole of such Endowments."

The following alterations of the Society's by-laws, considered for the first time on the 15th day of November, 1888, were then finally adopted:—

In Article V., Page 39, By-Laws-

In Second Line expunge the words "Ten Shillings" and substitute "Two Dollars."

In Second Paragraph expunge the words "Twelve Pounds Ten Shillings" and substitute "Fifty Dollars."

Article VII., Page 42, By-laws-

In the Seventh Line substitute the words "One Dollar" for the words "Five Shillings."

Article XIII., Page 50, By-Laws—

Fourth Line, Paragraph B, substitute the word "Mission" for the word "Sustentation."

Eighth Line, Paragraph B, Page 51. substitute "Two-

Thirds " for "One-Half."

Second Line, Paragraph C, Page 51, after the word "President" insert the words "the Archdeacon of Quebec," and in the Eighth Line, after the word "Board" insert the words "of the Treasurer of the Synod."

In Eighth Line, Page Fifty-Three, substitute "1889" for "1885."

In Twelfth Line, substitute "\$700" for "\$650." In Thirteenth Line, substitute "\$750" for "\$700." In Fourteenth Line, substitute "\$800" for "\$750." In Fifteenth Line, substitute "\$850" for "\$800."

The following were then read for the first time and await final consideration:—

In Article XIV., By-Laws, add to Paragraph 10, Page 58, the following:—"Any Clergyman who accepts employment in another Diocese, or who shall be on leave of absence for a period of more than six months, for other cause than ill-health, either of himself, wife or children, shall be considered to have removed from the Diocese, for the purpose of this by-law."

In Article XV., By-Laws, Page 61, add a new clause, 14:—"Any Clergyman who shall leave this Diocese, and accept employment in another, or who shall be on leave of absence for a period of more than six months, for other causes than ill-health, either of himself, wife or children, shall not, in the event of his return to work in the Diocese, be allowed to count the period of his former services therein, in determination of Pension."

The meeting was then closed with the Benediction.

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45 VICT., CHAP. 89.

An Act to authorize the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, to consolidate certain Endowment Funds.

[Assented to 27th May, 1882.]

Whereas the Church Society of the Diocese of Preamble. Quebec has, by its petition, represented that it is in charge of certain endowment funds for the support of various parishes and missions within the Diocese of Quebec, and has prayed that the said Church Society should be authorized so to distribute any losses which may occur, through failure in investments, as to make them fall proportionately over the whole of such endowments held by the society; and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petitioners; Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec Consolisis authorized, so far, to consolidate the said endow-dation of ment funds, so placed and hereafter to be placed in ment the hands of the said society, under deeds of trust funds of for investment, as to enable the said Church Society certain to distribute any losses that may occur through purposes. failure in investments proportionately over the

whole.

2. The said consolidation of the said intrusted Consolidation endowment funds shall extend, only so far as to limited. enable the said Church Society to distribute any losses that may occur, through failure in investments proportionately over the whole, and for no other purposes whatsoever.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1888.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 6th, 1889.)

In presenting the Forty-seventh Annual Report to the Church Society, the Central Board has much pleasure in announcing an increase in each one of the Society's funds, as will be seen by the following comparative statement of accounts for the years 1887-1888:—

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Pursonages, in the support of Schools, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

The following grants have been paid during the year, viz:—\$400 to the Education Fund for use in paying salaries of Teachers in various districts; \$100 each to new Churches at Portneuf, Kingsey Falls and Scotstown; \$150,

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Increase,

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e year, paying to new ; \$150, outfit to three Clergymen; \$150 to a new Endowment at Louiseville, and \$41.50 in aid of the Fund for the Education of the Children of the Clergy.

The following applications for aid are still under consideration, viz: For new Churches at Stanhope, Barnston Corner, Compton and Fitch Bay, and a new Parsonage at Waysville.

While acknowledging with much pleasure the slight increase of \$161.75 over the previous year, your Board would earnestly recommend this Fund to the kind consideration of all the members of the Church Society.

When we consider the variety of objects assisted hereby, and the great encouragement and help thus afforded to draw out local generosity, all must see that this Fund deserves the sympathy and help of every one; and it is to be hoped that every Parish or Mission in the Diocese will give the General Fund its generous and handsome support, so that we may no longer have the miserable spectacle of applications for assistance standing over from year to year, simply because all available funds have been exhausted.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payments of the Stipends of Missionarirs in connection with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, Assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the interest of the Invested Capital of the Sustentation Fund, administered by the Dioresan Board.)

A full account of the Missionary operations of the Society will be found in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Board, and the Missionary reports of the Clergy, and also in the valuable report from the St. Francis District Association.

The financial returns for the past year shew an increase over the previous year of \$1,168.54, but this includes Mrs. Porteous' legacy of \$1,000.

This again is a Fund that claims the sympathy and help of all Church people in the Diocese, particularly at the present time, for never perhaps before in the history of the Diocese have such opportunities been offered for opening new Missions, and planting the ministry of the Church, especially among the Eastern Townships, as at the present time. Two new Missions have been opened lately, viz.: Barnston and Fitch Bay, and two more at least are crying loudly for sub-division, viz.: Danville and Hatley, and there is no calculating what good might be done by the blessing of God, if we could only seize hold of the present occasion, and render at once the assistance that is so loudly called for,

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and infirm Clergy.)

Three clergymen have been placed on this Fund, since our last report, viz: The Rev. W. S. Vial, in June, and the Rev. J. Kemp and the Rev. T. S. Chapman to commence January 1st, 1889.

These extra demands will strain the resources of this Fund very severely, and should any one else apply for a Pension it is difficult to see how his application can be entertained unless this Fund is largely augmented by offertories on Thanksgiving day and the annual subscriptions, or by reducing pro rata the Pensions already granted, a course which would be most deplorable.

This Fund having reached the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars and over, a scale has been adopted in accordance with the By-law Art. XV., Sect. 6, and has received the written sanction and approval of the Bishop of the Diocese, by which clergymen who are incapacitated for work, either by illness or old age, will receive a Pension of \$400, \$500, or \$600, according to length of service in the Diocese.

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By the bequest of the late Dr. Reid, of Sherbrooke, of \$1000, this fund shews an increase over the previous year of \$996.66.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

ABSENCE OF THE BISHOP.

The members of the Central Board desire to place on record their sincere regret at the absence of their beloved and respected Bishop; a feeling shared by the whole community, and especially for its cause, viz.: the impaired health of Mrs. Williams, who has been ordered by her medical advisors to seek a more genial climate for the winter, and they fervently hope that in a very short time they may welcome once more their spiritual father and his beloved wife, to dwell amongst them again, and diffuse those varied influences which have helped to raise the Diocese of Quebec to so high a place in the annals of the Church of England in Canada.

OBITUARY.

Several friends and members of the Church Society have been removed during the past year, amongst whom we may mention:—

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Mr. J. H. Richarson, who was one of the most regular attendants at the meetings of the Central Board, and on the Education Committee; where his valuable experience in the cause of Education was of the utmost assistance; and whose kind and gentle manner made him respected and esteemed by all who knew him.

Your Board has also to express the deepest regret at the death of the Rev. C. P. Reid, D.C.L., late Rector of Sherbrooke, and Rural Dean of the District of S. Francis, Dr. Reid was a Vice-President, a life member, and a regular and liberal supporter of the Society.

For some time past, in consequence of age and infirmity, Dr. Reid had ceased to take an active part in parochial work, but almost to the day of his death he evinced a keen interest in the general welfare of the Church in this Diocese, as proved by his constant benefactions, and by his liberal bequest of \$1000 to the Pension Fund, and \$500 to the Ladies' College at Compton.

To a blameless life, he added zeal for his Master's service, and will long be affectionately remembered by all who ever had the privilege of knowing him. His work on earth is done; but the influence of that work and of that beautiful life remains, and will be handed on and on in the lives it influenced and coloured to the end of time.

Your Board has also to record the death of General Sir Charles Trollope, K.C.B., a life member of the Society, who died on the 5th of July last.

Mrs. William Poston, a life member of the Society, and a tried friend of the Church, and ever a liberal subscriber to the Society's Funds, has also just recently passed away from amongst us. RESIGNATION OF THE FORMER SECRETARY,

Your Board has also to report, with much regret, the loss of the valuable services of the former Secretary of the Church Society, the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, who, after more than thirty years' faithful work in this Diocese, for sixteen years of which he was the Society's energetic Secretary, has, on account of health, left us to take charge of a Parish in the Diocese of Connecticut, in the United States.

Advantage was taken of a meeting of the Central Board, held during the session of Synod in the month of June last, to present Mr. Fothergill with an address, which contained the following clause: - "They," that is the members of the Central Board, "feel it both a pleasure and a duty to express in as marked a manner as possible their strong recognition of the ability and assiduity with which Mr. Fothergill has always fulfilled the duties of his office. They are fully aware that his thorough and intimate knowledge of the whole Diocese has rendered these services peculiary valuable."

In repeating this clause, the members of the Central Board will only add that the memory of Mr. Fothergill's warm, genial temperament and business like habits will not easily be forgotten, and while wishing him and his family every prosperity in their new home, they feel it will be a very long time before those valuable services will be in any manner adequately supplied.

The following is the abstract of the Revenue Account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1888:—

The above statement shows that there has been no falling of in the amount of assessments received and that all the liabilities of your Board have been met without calling upon the Clergy Trust Fund for any assistance. The balance in hand at the close of 1887 has, however, been reduced by over \$1200. And as the increased scale of stipends will involve a heavy additional expenditure it is not anticipated that in the future the missionary work of the Diocese can be carried on without a large measure of aid from that fund.

Your Board regrets to observe that the fallling off in the contributions to the Mission Fund in 1886 has not been made up since. This is very much to be deplored on many accounts. The Guarantee Fund for new missions will be exhausted by the end of 1890, and during the intervening period the signs indicate that a reduction in the present

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grant of the S.P.G. will be made. It would be unreasonable to expect, nor has the idea ever been entertained, that the new missions will be able to maintain themselves by that time. The work already achieved has been most hopeful and encouraging, and there can be no doubt that the labour already expended and the labour to be added during the next two years will bear Irnit abundantly; but these missions, like many others started under similar circumstances, will still need a considerable measure of aid for some years to come. From what source can this assistance be derived except from the Mission Fund of the Church Society? This is the only source of income which is possessed of an expansive nature, but if it shoul lose this characteristic, the prospect of being able to extend the necessary fostering care to these new missions is by no means bright, and besides the three missions to which reference has been made, it is evident that there are other places in the Diocese which at this moment present such openings for Church extension as your Board feels ought not to be neglected. The reports of the Clergy, and notably the report of St. Francis District Association, place this beyond the range of doubt. But where is the money needed for this work to come from if not from the only source capable of augmentation.

It is not the actual decrease, as compared with 1886, which your Board views with alarm, but the inference this seems to point to in a certain loss of interest in the Mission Fund and a feebler grasp of the important work depending upon it.

Your Board then, while gratefully acknowledging the ready Christian spirit which prompted so liberal a response to the special appeal made on behalf of new missions in 1886, would nevertheless press upon all members of the Church in the Diocese the urgent need and the clear duty of supporting the Mission Fund of the Church Society. If work of the Church is to grow in the future as in the past. If members of the Church themselves amply supplied with the means of grace desire the same blessings, in some measure, for others. If the work already taken in hand with hopeful heart and bright outlook is not to be labour in vain. And if work equally promising is ever taken up at all, must depend, under God upon largely increased subscriptions to the Mission Fund.

Your Board would respectfully refer the members of the Church Society to the reports of the clergy hereunto appended, for an account of the condition and prospects of their respective Parishes and Missions.

It would not be possible in a report such as this to do more than convey a dull epitome of facts and general results, which in the individual narratives themselves are presented with details and incidents of work carried on, without which it would be difficult to fix the attention and evoke interest.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted at a

recent meeting of the Diocesan Board:

"That the Diocesan Board strongly disapproves of the assessment being received by the Clergyman in kind, and that the Clergy be requested to do their utmost to discourage the practice."

Two self-sustaining Parishes, Durham and New Carlisle, have resumed their connection with the Board during the past year, in accordance with the terms of Canon VII, last clause. There are, therefore, now six Parishes subject to all the rules and regulations of the Diocesan Board, (except as regards the appointment of the Rector.) without receiving any pecuniary aid.

In the course of a long ministry they have been called upon to labour and endure hardness, and your Board would express an earnest hope that for the days which yet remain to them they may be vouchsafed the rest and comfort they are so fully entitled to.

Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for the Year 1888.

Owing to the fact that several parishes or missions have sent in no report, it is obviously impossible to give a complete statement of the work and condition of the District as a whole. Still, from the amount of money raised and the character of the work done in the parishes and missions reported, a fair idea of the state of things prevailing in the District may be obtained.

But before noting reference to statistics, one or two points

of interest claim our attention.

1. Mention must be made of the marked success which has attended the efforts of the Church to extend her work by the establishment of new missions within the District. Two of these missions, Newport and Barnston, are now in active and successful operation. Another is being established, at the present moment, with Fitch Bay as its centre, and taking in a portion of the Mission of Magog and Georgeville. This new Mission of Fitch Bay is the direct fruit of the labour of Revd. Jas. Hepburn, who has held regular services in Fitch Bay for three years, and has visited and ministered to the people, at intervals, for a much longer period.

The great work of the District has been that of the new Mission of Barnston, in which two churches, completed and paid for, were opened for service on St. Andrew's Day; and a Parsonage, now occupied by the Incumbent, has been built and paid for. One of the churches, it is true, was paid for by trust funds, left in the hands of the Bishop for such purpose. But the other works were entirely the fruits of the mission itself. Such a result, after little more than a year's work, seems almost unparalleled in the history of the Church in the District. It is believed to be only the earnest of what may be done in other places in these townships if men and money are forthcoming.

The present time seems to be the Church's opportunity in these townships. Not only are there six new churches either completed or in course of erection, in the District but the signs of readiness to receive the Church's ministration are abundant in many quarters. In this connection

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portunity churches District, ministraonnection especial reference may be made to the Parish of Hatley and Waterville, whose prospects of growth are so good that the Rector is urgently pressing for the separation of Waterville and adjacent parts from his charge. He is persuaded that there is abundant scope for a new parish, with ample field for the employment of its Incumbent, in the section of country including the three villages of Waterville, North Hatley and Capelton, and embracing an area of about 50 square miles.

2. Mention must not be omitted of the flourishing condition of Bishop's College and School, and the excellent prospects of Compton Ladies' College. The latter institution has this year a larger number of pupils than it has had at any time since its re-opening in 1886. In view of this promise of success, and in the hope of stimulating others to take part in the good work, the late Rev. Dr. Reid offered \$500 towards the debt on the College building, upon condition that a sum of \$1000 was raised to meet it before December 31, 1888. The authorities of the College are doing their best to secure this generous offer.

Surely, it is time our people awakened to the importance of distinctive religious education. We cannot afford to leave the training of the young to the colourless institutions of the State, still less to the biassed institutions of other bodies of Christians.

3. The past year has been one of many changes in the clerical staff of the District. One of our most earnest missionaries, the Rev. I. M. Thompson, has resigned his charge and is now working in the Diocese of New York.

The year is marked by the death of the Venerable Dr. Reid, whose name has been, for so many years, a household word throughout the District and whose fatherly presence and wise counsels will be sadly missed at the meetings of the Association. The report from Sherbrooke well says "there was in Dr. Reid's exemplary life and holy character a power of influence that attracted towards him all with whom he came in contact." Thank God the influence of such a man does not cease with his death.

In six parishes the work of the Church has been interfered with by the change of clergymen, an event always likely to affect for a time the apparent prosperity of a church, especially in its financial aspect. Death too has been busy in many places among the laity: removals have been numerous, and the season has not been so abundantly fruitful

as is usual in this favoured land. That results should be what we find them, notwithstanding all this, is surely cause

for devout thankfulness and great encouragement.

There are now 20 parishes and missions with resident clergymen, within the limits of the District. From only 15 of these, however, have full reports been received by this Association. Reports have also been made by the Ven. Archdeacon Roe, upon the missionary work done during the year by the students of Bishop's College; and by the Rev. Dr. Adams upon the work done in the College itself. From the financial statements appended to these reports it appears that the total amount raised, within the year, by the reporting parishes and missions, has been \$21,233,33. Of this, the sum of \$3,187.43 has been devoted to objects outside the parochial limits within which it was raised.

ACTON.

The Rev. Louis C. Wurtele reports :--

This mission still consists of the township of Acton and

municipalities of Danby and West Wickham.

The usual Church services have been maintained during the year, viz: On Sunday, Matins and Evensong in St. should be ely cause

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during in St Mark's Church, Acton Vale, and Evensong, or Litany, alternately, in Danby; whilst in Wickham fortnightly, on Monday evenings, the people came together for service in a private dwelling house.

The chief festivals were also observed by Divine Service in St. Mark's Church. The administration of the Holy Communion took place on the first Sunday of every month. During Lent a series of services on week days brought the congregation together in the Dissentient school house.

Since the great fire in Danby, 15 months ago, the congregation has been compelled to assemble for Divine Service in the school house, but the little church has been rebuilt and will soon be re-opened for Divine Worship.

The attendance on the service of Church has not been as

great as could have been desired.

The average attendance has been at St. Mark's Church,

264; at Danby, 164; and at West Wickham, 117.

This last summer Mrs. O. C. Brown suggested the idea of starting a Sewing School in connection with the Church; to teach the young to sew and fit garments, and, therefore, "The St. Mark's Sewing School" was organized under the patronage of Mrs. O. C. Brown and Mrs. L. C. Wurtele, and it is wonderful the interest taken in it. The young and their teachers meet every Friday afternoon in the Dissentient school-house, and much good has been the result.

Another matter for which we are thankful, is that the mission has been able to avail itself of the generosity of Robert Hamilton. Esq., who had offered \$100.00, to the Local Endowment Fund if \$50.00 were raised in the mission. That amount has been forwarded to the Treasurer at Quebec, and \$150.00 have been added to our fund.

During the year our socials had their usual work to do in cementing our Church members in closer friendship.

By their means, \$26.05° were notted towards Church expenses.

On June the 28th, 1863, St. Mark's Church was first opened for Divine Service, when our beloved Bishop preached in it his first sermon as Bishop. He had been consecrated on the previous Sunday in Quebec. During the week he had attended the Convocation of Bishop's college, and on the Saturday came to us.

It was a privilege which has been ever remembered by us all. This reminds me that for over a quarter of a century I have been in this misson, in which I have found that my failings have ever been overlooked and nothing but kindness has been tendered to me.

ASCOT AND WESTBURY.

The Rev. R. Waller Colston reports:—

I am happy to be able to make to your Society a much more cheerful report of this mission than last year. In reviewing the events of the past twelve months there is much to be thankful for.

The services in all the churches have been better attended. The number of communicants has increased.

A greater interest in the Church has been displayed.

It is true that in these particulars there is still much room for improvement. It is satisfactory to know that we are advancing, be it ever so slow.

I wish I could report that the Sunday services had been kept up with unfailing regularity. The storms of last winter and this fall prevented my keeping some of my ap-

pointments.

In the early part of the fall a movement was made towards the erection of a Parsonage for this mission. A lot of land was purchased in the village of Angus, from Messrs. Wm. Angus & Co., and a subscription list opened. In a couple of weeks a sum of \$265 was promised in the village alone. We expected to have the building ready for occupation by the New Year. Unfortunately the mill which was to have furnished the dimension lumber disappointed us, and so the work had to be put off till next spring, much to the disgust of pastor and people. We are every much indebted to F. P. Buck, Esq., for the very great interest he has taken in the Parsonage and the very practical way in which he showed it.

Another important event in the history of the past year is the opening of a Sunday School in East Angus. Its beginnings are small, but we hope to make it a power for good.

Our Temperance Society in East Augus is struggling on; living and that is all.

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The Ladies' Guild of Angus has been hard at work for the Church, resulting in the reduction of the "Organ debt," by \$75. Since the inception of the guild the Ladies have raised over \$200 for church improvements.

In financial matters this mission has had a great struggle. The congregations of Angus and Ascot have adopted the "Envelope System." In the former the success has not been very marked. This is chiefly due to the fact of our population being a largely floating one. In the latter the system has only been two months in operation—so it is hard to say how it will work—there is no reason why it should not succeed. I look upon it as a grand means of educating the people to systematic giving.

The Westbury congregation have succeeded in meeting all their obligations with comparative promptness.

The churches of Ascot and Westbury are in good repair, but need painting. I hope next summer to have this done.

The church at East Angus, wretchedly built, to begin with, was badly shaken by the big blow last June. I am afraid that at least \$200 will be required to make it even presentable. I see no immediate prospects of these repairs being done.

I have to thank the people of this mission for many acts of kindness shown to me and above all for their great forbearance. I wish especially to thank "The Boys" of the Angus Pulp Mill for a very handsome and comfortable fur cap which they were good enough to place on the annual Christmas Tree for me.

BARFORD.

The Rev. Chas. B. Washer reports :--

I send in my financial statement. Appended are a few notes.

Dixville.—Congregation as usual, somewhat better perhaps. Seventeen candidates confirmed. Sunday-School rather smaller. Communicants increased. Indications of Church

growth and deepening root. Offertory maintains its ground and shows increase. Encouraged to believe there is spiri-

tual progress.

St. Lawrence.—Work here has gone on in the even tenor of its way. Services maintained, with two exceptions in winter, and summer Sunday-School kindly conducted by Miss Ward.

Stanhope.—The Church proposed in last report is built, and would have been consecrated by now, had the contractor completed his work within the time specified; finishing touches have now to be given and furniture added, when the edifice will be ready for consecration. I have been disappointed in the non-payment of some subscriptions, and much encouraged by the cheerful and ready payment of the others. The erection of the Church has been rendered possible by the sale of land given by the benefactress of the mission, Miss Green, by subscriptions of Churchmen outside, and the local contributions referred to. The building account will not be closed in time to be included in this report. The Sunday-School has continued, and still suffers for want of lay help.

Perryboro.—Services maintained at this distant station, with three interruptions, owing to impassable roads. Number of communions rather fewer,—in some instances from absence of persons from locality. Assessment now contributed by offertory (envelopes being used), and the Scriptural mode, laying by on the first day of the week, obtains, and

God's blessing undoubtedly will be added.

Averil,—This is a new station five miles east of Stanhope, occupied by us a year ago, and is served monthly, after a third service on the Sunday. The congregation increases, and there is more encouragement than I expected. There is urgent need of more frequent opportunities of public

worship.

Hereford—This station was closed about four years ago through the action of the Diocesan Board, and no effort has since been made by the people to pay arrears. Hardly any visits have been paid here during the year. It is beyond the strength of one man to serve this station in addition to the rest of the work. The new station recorded is nearer head-quarters, and marks the limit of the present missionary's power of endurance.

BARNSTON.

The Rev. J. Eames reports:

I am devoutly thankful to say that the hopes expressed in my last report to the Society have been more than fully realized. The two new Churches and Parsonage house, which existed only in our minds a year ago, are now really things of a material existence.

The Incumbent is now residing in the Parsonage and begs to express his appreciation of the many kindnesses received from the good people of Barnston Corners, Way's

Mills and vicinity.

On St. Andrew's Day—a day long to be remembered in Barnston—the two new Churches at Way's Mills and Barnston Corners were formally opened, amid much rejoicing, for the Service of Almighty God.

I cannot speak in too commendable terms of the untiring energy and zeal of the Church and Parsonage building Committees. Suffice it to say they spared neither time nor

pains in the performance of the work undertaken.

The Church at Barnston Corners has, through the liberality of the Congregation and some kind friends outside, been beautifully furnished with carpet for Chancel and Nave I desire here to record my gratitude to Mr. Hollis Shorey, of Montreal, for the beautiful memorial Chancel window; also, for two Chancel chairs and two Coronal pendants, costing altogether the handsome sum of \$190.

An Organ Fund has been recently started, which has now

reached the sum of \$50.

Of the Church at Way's Mills the people feel justly proud, and also grateful to our beloved Bishop for building them and their children one of the prettiest churches in this part

of the Eastern Townships.

Divine Service, I am happy to say, has been carried on throughout the year with very little interruption. The attendance on all the services has been on the whole very good and very much interest evinced. I may remark this as specially true of Baldwin's Mills. From an average attendance of five a year ago it has now reached twenty. Fortnightly week evening services have been regularly held at Libbytown school-house.

The Sunday-School there has been conducted very acceptably during the past year by Mr. Wm. Davidson. The Roll Book shows an attendance of 35 and 4 teachers.

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A Sunday-School, with a small attendance, was opened at Barnston Corners, but owing to some of the children being sent away to school had to be abandoned for the present.

On repeated invitations from the people of a settlement called the "Sutton Neighbourhood," on the border of the Parish of Hatley, to visit them and begin to hold services I consulted with the Rector of Hatley, with the result that we decided to give them, between us, a fortnightly week evening service.

I cannot close my report, however, without an expression of gratitude to the many kind and liberal friends in Quebec, Sherbrooke and elsewhere who have so liberally contributed to our needs here

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNONVILLE.

The Rev. Dr. Adams reports:-

The services in the Chapel have been maintained as here. tofore. A weekly celebration of the Holy Communion, a celebration on Saints' Day, on Thanksgiving Day and on Convocation Day. Daily services, morning and evening; some occasional services have been held during the vacation, notably daily morning prayer during the Teachers' Institute, in July; at this there was a large voluntary attendance. During the Lenten season a short daily special service was held, of fifteen minutes duration, at 7.45 a.m.: a Litany and reading formed the office; the voluntary attendance of the students averaged two-thirds of their number. The special offices of those resident in Dr. Allnatt's house have been maintained: one such office, weekly, is held in the College Chapel on Fridays, at 5.10 p.m.: this service consists of a Litany or Prayer and a short address by the Professor of Pastoral Theology. This service is intended to form a link between the general college life and the special training of the Professor's house in which the graduates who are being prepared for Holy Orders live.

The Bishop of Quebec has formed a guild of lay readers

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in the College, thus throwing into an organized form the labours which have been put forth for many years by the students of the College, who are candidates for Holy Orders. This, the practical side of their training, like the more theoretical part of Pastoral Theology, is under the direction of Professor Allnatt, D.D. Since the last report was written, J. A. Shaw, M.A., Ontario, has been ordained Deacon, and the following have been ordained priests: C. E. Belt, B.A, A. H. Robertson, L.S.T.

Of the 29 students now in College 21 are candidates for Holy Orders: of these 21 three have not as yet been accepted by a Bishop, but have expressed an intention of preparing for Orders: of the remaining 18 one is from Ontario, four from Montreal, and thirteen from Quebec Diocese.

A class of 24 in the school is now being prepared for Confirmation, the Principal having received valued help in his work from his colleagues, Archdeacon Roe and Dr. Allnatt.

The Missionary Union has held its meetings as usual. Helpful sermons and addresses have been given by Archdeacon Roe, the Rev. I. M. Thompson, Canon Thorneloe, and the Rev. W. G. Faulconer, of Cookshire, late missionary on the Pacific Coast.

Interesting papers have also been read by Messrs. Hibbard, Fothergill and H. E. Wright, amongst the students: and it is chiefly to a suggestion made at one of the missionary meetings that the organization of the Lay Readers' Guild is due. The prayer of those under whose care the students are, is that all, especially those who purpose dedicating themselves to the holy ministry, may from the very beginning of their residence here devote themselves to their work in all its branches as a sacred duty and live a life of devotion and of sacrifice.

In the school three classes are taught every Sunday by

Senior Class.—Communicants — Prayer Book and St. John's Gospel, in Greek and English

Intermediate Class.—Preparation for Confirmation and Catechism.

Junior Class.—Teaching of the Church for every Sunday—Catechism.

The Rev. P. C. Read, M.A., left us in June for England; his place on the staff of the Chapel has been supplied by

his successor in the classical chair, the Rev. B. Watkins,

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M.A., a Cambridge graduate in Priest's orders.

Two interesting features of the year may be mentioned. First, that on Sunday, June 10th, when most of the local Clergy were attending the Synod in Quebec and joining with the Bishop in celebrating his 25th anniversary, the churches within a considerable distance of Lennoxville were kept open by means of the ministrations of the students; and secondly, on Sunday evening, November 4th, a service in memory of the Rev. C. P. Reid, D.C.L., was held the venerable Archdeacon Roe repeating, by special request, the sermon he had preached at Sherbrooke.

Archdeacon Roe has also brought before us the local work of the Church and her pressing needs in a practical and interesting manner which will, it is hoped, stir us all

up to increased devotion.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Venerable Archdeacon Roe reports:—

The superintendence of the missionary work done by the students of the Bishop's College has lately been committed to the Professor of Pastoral Theology, and will for the future be reported by him. During the past year the only College mission progress under my care has been that of Lake Megantic. Mr. Herbert Dixon was placed in charge of it during the summer vacation and gave services every Sunday in the evening, with a Sunday-school at Ditchfield; and in the evening at Agnes. These services were well attended and much appreciated. Mr. Dixon undertook also the common school at Ditchfield, giving half his time to it. This rendered his work at Ditchfield doubly valuable. A small church, long projected, has at last been begun at Ditchfield, on a site given by Mr. James B. Simpson, one of the resi-The outside of the church has been completed and the result is very satisfactory. The inside work will be finished in the spring. I visited this very deserving settlement twice in the spring and once in the autumn, administering both the Sacraments and doing what I could to Watkins,

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cheer and encourage the settlers. Mr. George Murray also paid them one visit this antumn. I feel very warm sympathy for the little handful of Churchmen who cling so lovally to their Church in the settlement of Ditchfield. The clergyman always finds a home in Ditchfield, at Mrs. Chatfield's, or her son-in-law, Mr. D. W. Buet's. All the settlers shared the honour of entertaining Mr. Dixon. Agnes does not present so encouraging a field, the Church people of the place for the most part being, on the occasions of my visits, conspicuous by their absence. The thanks of the Church are due to Mr. and Mrs. Albert Pope for their generous hospitality towards both elergy and students on all occasions of services in Agnes, and also to W. Kelly for the lighting and heating of the building used for Divine Service. During the long vacancy in the parish of Durham, Mr. J. M. King took duty there for several months, and subsequently at Scotstown and Lingwick, in the parish of Bury. Mr. G. II. A. Murray also took duty for a month at Shigawake and Port Daniel, and for a shorter period at Danville during the vacancies of those missions. The work done by all these students was faithful and painstaking, and left very favorable impressions upon the people.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

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BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. Thos. L. Ball reports :-

Notwithstanding impaired health, I am thankful the Services of the Church and parochial visiting have been kept up during the year. I was assisted part of the winter by the Rev. Wm. Watkins, now of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, while A. A. Briggs, Esq., at the request of the Congregation, gave a second service at Windsor Mills. Four Sunday Services are thus held in the District and the Holy Communion administered monthly in each of the Churches.

The Endowment Fund has become available. The Canada Paper Co. kindly contributed \$100: 50 acres of wild land has been secured from the Government, the proceeds of which, when sold, will also go to this Fund. The three Churches have been painted and it is hoped the fencing and improving the Church Grounds will be looked to as soon as possible. At Windsor Mills, the head-quarters of the Missionary, progress has been made in a Fund for a Parsonage. The Ladies' Association here still continues in active work. The Sunday-schools have been well sustained and the Teachers have my hearty thanks for their pains-taking. At Hardwood-Hill a Union Sunday-school is held every Sunday. I can only visit this Congregation fortnightly. The Church in building has been used for service during the summer, and it is hoped the Church Society will make the usual grant for completion the coming year. At Brompton Falls services are held alternately with the Rector of Sherbrooke at the Orford Line. It is evident these two points will have to be centralized for permanent work.

The Rev. H. S. Fuller reports :-

During the last year the usual services have been main-

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tained in four Churches and a like number of School-houses as follows:—

St. John's Church, Dudswell Road.—Service fortnightly

at the hours of 9 A.M., and 3 P.M., alternately.

St. Peter's Church. Lingwick.—Service fortnightly at 3

P.M., and 7 P.M., alternately.

St. Alban's Church, Scotstown.—The services at this point are maintained by a Student from Lennoxville and myself, each in turn taking two Sundays.

On occasion of Students visits a service is held at eleven o'clock and a second at seven P.M.—While on the two Sundays falling to my lot an evening service takes place.

The Student (Mr. King) has also taken up his residence in Scotstown, during his vacation, and visited members of the Church and others, and I am glad to say his services, have been much appreciated, while his genial kindly ways have won for him many friends.

At Bown's School-house and Sherman's (the old St. Thomas Church District). This congregation, for some years in a rather languishing condition, had the misfortune to lose a new Church, which was in course of erection, by a wind storm, and serious troubles arising within the Parish to damp the ardor of our good Church people, the work of rebuilding was never resumed. The only hope for this section, is the erection of a Church; but the how? or where? are questions at the present time to me insolvable.

The services at all points, I may return as well attended by orderly and attentive congregations, the behaviour at all our stations during Divine Worship leaving little to be desired.

The Church at Robinson has been thoroughly overhauled during last summer and is now in a good state of repair. While in the case of St. John's Church we have some money in hand toward necessary repairs. I hope, all well, at the close of another year to report all the Churches as being in good order and properly furnished.

en main-

Our Children's Guild, upon which I touched in my last report, has, under Mrs. Mclver's superintendence, done good work during the past year. The weekly meetings have proved very popular among the little folk and can scarcely fail to be productive of much good.

To this we shall add shortly a branch of "The Young Girls' Friendly," for the older girls of the parish and also a

guild taking in the married women of the parish.

I have to report St. John's, St. Paul's and St. Alban's as meeting all dues promptly. Canterbury and Lingwick as slightly in arrears, but do not doubt these are matters

which time will set right.

For myself I have met with much kindness and courtesy every where and trust that the uniform civility exhibited on all hands is an evidence of the growth of good feeling and brotherly kindness among our Church people one toward another. To many of my people I am deeply indebted for ready and continued helpfulness in Parish affairs, also for many substantial tokens of good-will received at their hands by myself and family.

We have now in the Parish four Sunday-schools, with an

attendance of some 175 scholars and 22 teachers.

CAPE COVE.

The Rev. William Gore Lyster reports :-

There is little of interest to report concerning this Mis-

sion for the past year.

In June we were all shocked by the sudden death of Silas Vibert, an excellent and promising young man, who was killed by an accident in his father's saw-mill. He with his father and twin brother had, with immense perseverance and labour, just completed their mill, and had mounted a circular saw,— a new thing here.— when the sad occurrence took place.

For the poor father and the surviving brother universal

sympathy was felt.

In August an effort was made to effect some most necessary repairs on the parsonage and barn; and the latter building, which was fast becoming ruinous, has been put in a fairly good condition and will probably last for some years. Funds would not allow of much being done to the parsonage; but some further repairs will be attempted, I hope, at an early date.

If the Congregation were more numerous, and in better circumstances, no difficulty, I think, would be experienced in getting work of this sort done when necessary. But in weak missions, as this is, Church work of any kind is an up-hill business, and a few have too often to bear the prin-

cipal part of the burden.

During a part of the year only one of our schools, No. 1, aided by the Church Society, has been in operation. The reason of this was the small number of pupils in the other districts able to attend in summer; there was also a difficulty in securing the services of qualified teachers.

Mr. Gaudin, who held a situation on the North Shore in summer, has resumed, temporarily, charge of No. 2 school, which will be kept open during the winter months.

Our Sunday-school was better attended than last year. I myself took charge of the senior class, numbering ten, on three Sundays in the month, and was pleased with their improvement during the session.

Most of these children live at such a distance from the Church that it is quite impossible for them to attend, once

the severe weather sets in.

At Percé a small Sunday-school has been taught regularly by Mr. Elias Tuzo, who has for some time past proved a most useful and zealous lay-helper.

Under his tuition and care, the little choir has improved wonderfully; and I may say the same thing of the organist. Miss J. Tuzo, who is now very efficient. Indeed the musical portion of the services is creditable and encouraging. The old organ having become defective was sold a few months ago, and the price supplemented by donations from a few liberal friends outside as well as within the mission, was expended in the purchase of a new and more satisfactory instrument.

In September the Gaspé clergy had the privilege of attending the first archi-diaconal conference ever held in the district.

Very few of the laity, and they chiefly from the immediate neighborhood,—Port Daniel,—were able to attend, the immense distance to be travelled, and the season, being the busiest of the year, having proved insuperable hindrances.

Those who were fortunate enough to be present, were, I am sure, amply compensated for their trouble in coming, and I think much good was done. But I am not alone in the conviction that in the present condition of the coast, travelling being both difficult and uncertain, such meetings will always fail in securing the attendance of the laity. The isolation of the coast missions and of their clergy can only be overcome by a railway from the Basin to New Carlisle, a distance of one hundred miles.

It has taken fifteen years of patient, persistent, hard work, to bring the people to see the beauty of, and heartily to

enter into, the Church services as they now do.

At Belknap's Mills a weekly service, on Wednesdays, has been kept up with regularity, the people in the neighbourhood attending and taking part heartily in the services. I hope ultimately to be able to induce the few Church people in the neighbourhood to attend the services of the Parish Church, and not, as heretofore, to remain content with a week day service.

During the summer a new porch has been added to the Church at North Coaticook, which will greatly add to the

comfort and appearance of the building.

The Sunday-schools at both the Churches are kept up during the whole year, and are well attended by the children

of both congregations.

In one of these Sunday-schools I take the senior class every Sunday myself. On the second Sunday in every month I have a service for the children in which they appear to take a very deep interest, as is manifested by their reverent demeanor, hearty singing and responses, and the large number which attend.

I am persuaded that this is the very best way to train our young people to take a part in the public services of the Church, to which, as they grow older, they will become

more and more attached.

I devote ten to lifteen minutes nearly every Sunday to catechising the whole Sunday-school. I look for good results

from this practice also.

During my absence in England last summer, Mr. H. A. Brooke, of Bishop's College, took my duty, and did it faithfully and to the entire satisfaction of all my people. I am indebted to the Rev. C. B. Washer, of Dixville, for kindly administering Holy Communion and attending the sick during my absence.

COMPTON.

The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:--

The Parochial work has been carried on as usual. On Sundays there are, as a rule, three full services and Sunday-schools. Daily Evensong in the Church from May to October, and Daily Matins and Evensong in the College when in session. The Ladies' College is growing in numbers and favour. This Term we are opening a part of the Building (which has up to the present been closed) to make room for new pupils. There are at present thirty-two pupils—twenty-five boarders and seven day scholars, with a staff of four teachers.

The past year has been one of sadness and loss to the Parish through the unusual number of deaths, taking from our midst prominent members and causing irreparable loss, inasmuch as we see no prospect of their places being taken by others.

COOKSHIRE.

The Rev. W. G. Faulconer reports:--

As I have only had charge of this Parish, but a few months, I must ask to be excused making a lengthy report. I have much pleasure, however, to state that with regard to Cookshire, Sandhill and Johnville generally, there are many tokens of good work going on beneath the surface, and I feel assured many are anxiously inquiring of the deeper and more spiritual things.

Our Congregations, I am glad to say, are on the increase

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at each of my stations and I have no doubt, by God's Blessing, that another year will be an interesting one to report upon.

The regular evening Congregation at Cookshire is also an encouraging one, as a special feature in it is the attendance of many young men whom I trust will be a powerful factor in the strength of our Church here in its future.

"The Ladies' Guild," "Missionary Auxiliary" and the "Girls' Friendly," are a great assistance and blessing to our parish since they are always in readmess to assist any good object brought before them; our Sunday-schools, both at Cookshire and Johnville, are steadily increasing and the young are being taught the principles of our Holy Religion. I hope to start a Sunday-school at Sandhill, after Easter, if things progress as I trust they will.

DANVILLE AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:-

There is little in the way of change to note in a country Clergyman's work from year to year. In the Mission of Danville and Tingwick, it has been simply "the daily round a common task." The services have been regularly performed; for a portion of the year, the Danville Congregation had two services every Sunday, and one service during the week, and on all the principal Festivals; but when the Kingsey Falls Church was finished I gave a service there every Sunday evening. To make up for the loss to Danville, I held extra services during the week, but as it was but a short time before I left the Mission that the Kingsey Falls Church was completed, the Congregation of Danville did not lose many services.

In addition to the services held in the Church, fortnightly services were held in Mr. Wright's, house, Pinnacle Settlement and in the Pinnacle School-house. Also in Lodge School-house, Mr. Hall's, Nicolet Falls, and cottage services in Mr. Mill's brong mean Walton Line.

in Mr. Mill's house, near Walton Line.

Troutbrook had a regular Sunday service during the year, with regular cottage services during the winter months, at the houses of invalids and aged persons who could not attend Church. These services, I believe, were blessed to many. At Lorne, there was also the regular service every Sunday, and occasional services in Mr. John Bagley's, and Mr. James McKeage's, and in the Maple's School house. These informal services were always appreciated and well attended.

The Finances of the Mission were in good condition, the people responding, according to their ability, to all demands upon them. The assessment towards Church extension was paid up to the end of June. One cannot estimate the spiritual growth of a people, so as to put it in a report, but so far as outward things can tell there was some evidence of spiritual improvement to be gathered from the fact that at the last Communion services held by me in the Mission, there were in Danville 88 communicants, Troutbrook 55, and Lorne 39. His Lordship the Bishop held a Confirmation in June, at which there were 35 persons Confirmed, at the same visit His Lordship consecrated Kingsey Falls Church, and was greeted by a large and attentive congregation.

In many ways and for many reasons it was very painful for me to leave Danville and Tingwick Mission, for many, very many of the people were very dear to me, and I believe I was in many respects equally so to them.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports:—

As I have been only a month in charge of this parish. I cannot profess to send in a report of work done. The services have been arranged to the satisfaction of Danville. Lorne and Troutbrook, but Kingsey Falls claims, also, a regular Sunday's service, which it is impossible for any man alone to supply regularly, in addition to the three other Churches. The work here is beyond any one man's powers and assistance is imperatively needed if progress is to be made.

I have been kindly received and warmly welcomed by my people. During my brief incumbency the parish has met a great loss by the death of Mr. G. Nelson Cleveland, an aged resident of the village, a good Churchman, and a man respected by all. The collections for the Church ring the winter ons who ve, were rular ser-Ir. John Maple's vays ap-

The organ debt at Lorne has been paid, chiefly by the aid of Mrs. Bagley, to whom the Congregation extend their thanks.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. G. Scott reports:—

This has been a year of quiet but I trust steady progress. The congregations continue to be very fair. On Christmas Day there were 43 communicants, 24 early and 19 at the late celebration, and on Easter Day there were 45, 24 of whom came at 8 o'clock, at which time the celebration is as far as possible choral. When it is taken into consideration that only a few of the English people live in the village and that the others have, on an average, from four to six miles to come to Church, I think these numbers are tolerably satisfactory. The special services during Holy Week, and the three hours' service on Good Friday were well attended.

Since the last report we have adopted the envelope system, and find it in every way an improvement on the old plan. The subscribers pay regularly and without feeling it, and it is no longer necessary to keep perpetually dunning people, which used to be the case.

The past year has been remarkable for the amount of sickness and the number of deaths in the parish; but I trust that these afflictions have brought home God's chastening love to the hearts of many, and that they have helped to unite the parish in common bonds of sympathy and love.

Unfortunately, we have to deplore the loss, through removal, of several active workers. As far as the English people are concerned, this parish is in a dying condition. Almost every year diminishes our numbers, and the families that come in to the vacated farms are nearly always French.

I have to thank Miss Watts and Miss Macdougall, for kind help in the Sunday-school, and other Triends for many proofs of affection and support.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. Thos. S. Chapman reports :---

Three services have been maintained every Sunday throughout the year in my two Churches, as well as week day services in the seasons of Advent and Lent. General attendance very fair. The work of the parish has borne rather heavily on the Incumbent on account of advancing years as well as impaired health, and he now at the end of an incumbency of almost 39 years and an active service of 40 years, retires in favor of a younger and stronger man.

On the 8th day of March, 1850, in accordance with a numerously signed petition by the inhabitants of Dudswell, I was licensed to the Mission of "Dudswell, South Ham and Parts Adjacent." Then, there were no Churches or Church property of any kind, very few families who had been brought up in the Church of England, and not many who claimed attachment to it. Now, the entire district from Marbleton to Sherbrooke, 25 miles, is studded with Churches.

During this long time, I have laboured hard to promote the best interests of my adopted home, the Township of Dudswell, in every thing that has had a bearing upon progress, whether moral, intellectual or material. Three good nount of
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oromote ship of on prose good architectural Churches, largely the work of my own hands, attest my interest in the moral welfare of my people; a large and expensively furnished Model School, entirely my work, attest the interest I have felt for education, and lastly, how ardently I worked to promote the material prosperity of the people, is evidenced by my long and arduous labours from the very inception of the Quebec Central Railway, until its final successful completion in the connection, in iron bonds, of our inland city, Sherbrooke, with the Ancient Capital.

At Christmas, as a parting token of regard, I was presented with a handsome suite of parlor furniture and a

purse of \$32.30, with other valuable presents.

It is my purpose, if the Lord so wills, to spend the small balance of my life where I have lived and laboured so long, a place now consecrated to me by the memories of departed ones.

The Model School is well attended and is doing a good work. Several of our pupils are trying to qualify themselves as teachers.

An exhaustive canvas of the parish has been made, in which I bore a part, and the result is a guarantee, through the "Envelope System," of \$350 towards the stipend of my successor.

My parochial and financial statement is as follows:-

DURHAM.

The Rev. Alex. H. Robertson reports :-

On 13th June, of this year, I was duly inducted as Rector of this parish in Holy Trinity Church, Kirkdale, by the

Venerable Archdeacon Roe, D.D.

The day following I held my first service at South Durham, and on the following Sunday met the congregation at L'Avenir. I received a hearty welcome from all my parishioners, and they were very glad to have a clergyman amongst them once more.

The parish had suffered, as a parish always will, from being so long without a regular elergyman, but I trust that we are getting into good working order again.

The wet summer, and the very bad state of the roads have interfered both with parish visiting and with the attendance at Church, but I am glad to say that there is a growing interest in the services, and that the people attend well.

At Kirkdale, the ladies took charge of the parsonage repairs, and had it nicely painted and tinted before my arrival, at an expense of over \$40.00

The Sunday-school has been carried on by Mrs. Jas. Trenholme and Mrs. Blackwell; and Miss Abbie Lyster has been a faithful and efficient organist for some years.

At L'Avenir a Sunday-school was organised, with Mr. Geo. Atkinson as Superintendent, and carried on with great enthusiasm till the roads grew so bad as to prevent the children coming from a distance, but it was a good beginning and will be resumed next spring, or sooner if possible.

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At South Durham the congregations have kept up well, in spite of the fact that a number of our members have left the parish.

The singing at this Church is particularly good and the warmest thanks of both elergyman and congregation are due to Miss Julia Leighton our organist, for her energy and zeal in training and keeping up the choir.

The financial state of the parish is good. The assessment

and other expenses have been promptly met.

I have held week day and cottage services at various places during the year.

The parish owes a debt of gratitude to the Venerable Archdeacon Roe, for his valuable advice and assistance, during the time of the vacancy.

Our thanks are also due to Mr. Blackwell and Mr. Robt. McCaig, who acted as lay readers at Kirkdale and L'Avenir; except for their valuable assistance these Churches

would have been sometimes left without a service. Baptisms, 7; Marriages, 3; Burials, 5.

EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix J. Boyle reports:—

As I have gone over the same ground so often, I have not much new to report this year.

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The services in my two Churches the past year have been duly kept and well attended, with the exception of a few Sundays,

In my last I intimated that I expected a P w tamilies to to return from the United States, and sure enough three families came back this last spring, and have taken up what they call their permanent homes in Frampton. This is quite an addition to my Hemison congregation, and I have reason to believe more will join us from the same country, either next spring or shortly after.

I am sorry to say we have had no school in this Mission for some time, not being able to procure a suitable teacher, but as our trustees are at present negotiating with a young lady Teacher who resides at Shawville, Que., I trust this great want will soon be removed.

My people have not contributed quite as liberally this year to Church purposes as on some former occasions, and this is easily accounted for.

Most of them are farmers, and the past year has been the hardest on that class of men that I ever experienced.

In this locality, at all events, early frost nipped the crops in the bud, then the heavy and protracted rains prevented the unfortunates from saving what was left, even in a fit state for fodder, so as the produce of the soil is the entire support of nearly all my people, I do not wonder if we have fallen short a little.

At present we are honored with a visit from the Venerable Archdencon Roe, with the view of again uniting the two Missions, East and West Frampton in one. What will be the result of his visit, I am not at this moment in a position to state.

WEST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports :-

The year has been a hard one for keeping up the work of the Church over long distances. Last winter was very severe, and so much rain during the summer made the roads very bad. To make matters worse my horse met with

an accident which ultimately rendered him entirely uscless to me. I did the best I could in keeping my appointments, but failed several times to get back from Cranbourne to Frampton in time for evening service.

Our services have been attended as usual. In some res-

pects there have been improvements.

Our Sunday-school has been carried on by my eldest

daughter and myself.

Last winter we had temperance meetings, and also started a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, with monthly meetings at the Parsonage.

Our school, after being closed for a year through the impossibility of obtaining a Teacher, has at last been

opened again under Miss Turner.

After our Harvest Thanksgiving service. I had the pleasure of receiving a present of a new coat from members of the congregation. In presenting it, Mr. Hugh Hurley, the People's Warden, expressed the hope that I might "long wear it going in and out amongst them." The balance of the money subscribed was given to Mrs. Debbage, with the expression of the hope that it would be larger another time.

We have also received many other kindnesses and presents from the people in West Frampton and Cranbourne.

The Misses Lilla Turner, Helen U. Bartholomew, Elizabeth Henderson and C. Hurley collected \$20.00 for Church Society.

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GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports as follows:-

The services of the Mission have been held regularly, excepting from the 30th September to October 28th, during which time my Churches were closed from the fact that my house was declared infected, my family having unfortunately contracted diphtheria early in October, through the calls made upon me to visit the house of an afflicted neighbour. Fortunately the disease did not become epidemic.

The Congregation of St. Paul's Church have made provision for enclosing the Church with a suitable fence, and have expended over \$150 on necessary repairs to the organ. It was the general opinion that it was better to repair the organ (a pipe organ) than to purchase a reed instrument.

The Sunday-school progressed favorably under the Superintendence of Mr. F. Veit, during the summer, and remains open for the winter under my supervision. The number of scholars shows a falling away during the last few months in spite of some additions. The assessment of the Congregation has so far been met, during the last two years, by the Sunday offertory, and the books are kept in a most satisfactory condition by the People's Warden, P. Vibert, Esq.

The building of the new church at St. James has also made some progress, but has been checked by the unfortunate occurrence above alluded to. A bazaar would have been held in the fall but most of the contributions thereto were kept at the Parsonage, and although the house and contents were disinfected it was thought better to postpone the sale for a season.

A sale of some articles in the month of December, at the house of Mrs. James Patterson, kindly lent for the occasion, resulted in the addition of over \$100 to the new Church Building Fund.

There are five day schools in the mission, the fifth at the Stanley settlement, can only be kept open during a part of the scholastic year for want of funds. A small grant from the Society would be very beneficial in that settlement.

I hope that when the new church is completed the pew renting system will be abolished, as it has been at St. Paul's Church. It is unsatisfactory and the voluntary system will, I trust, take its place; the financial statement of the wardens proves that it is gaining ground. During the past year there have been Baptisms, 18; Marriages, 3; Burials, 10.

I append the financial statements.

HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

Rev. Albert Stevens reports:-

Another year of quiet work has passed, and though we have had in no part of the parish any remarkable progress, yet everywhere I see signs of a steady healthy growth.

At Hatley the services have been rather better attended than last year; and the assessment, which had fallen into

arrears, has been more promptly paid.

At Waterville the congregations have as a rule been good and the singing and responding hearty. During the year we lost our two Church Wardens and their families. Mr. L. N. Emerson having moved to California on account of his health, and Mr. Wm. Lovers to Montreal. been a sad blow to us as both the men and their families were most active and interested in all Church work. The rapid growth of this village has increased the demands upon the clergyman's time and energy, and I am made plainly aware every week of the necessity of more work here. Not being able myself to give it without neglecting other duties equally pressing, I have sent a petition to the Diocesan Board asking that Waterville be made the centre of a new Mission, which will include within its borders North Hatley and the Capleton Copper Mines. I have great hope that this may be granted, and then I can take into the parish of Hatley, Ayer's Flat and give a service there every Sunday.

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I have again begun a fortnightly service in North Hatley with quite encouraging prospects.

The attendance has been good, and a choir trained by Mr. Bryant, a young Englishman at present residing there, has, by their excellent singing of the hymns and canticles, added much to the interest of the services. A number of visitors from Baltimore spent a couple of months here last summer. About twenty of them were members of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and they never failed to cheer us by their presence at the services and to stimulate our devotion by their quiet reverence.

They promise to return next year, and have spoken about assisting in the erection of a small Church. Just before they left for their southern home they sent me a Post Office Order for thirty dollars, with a kind note stipulating that

the money was for my own personal use.

At Massawippi the attendance, though not what it ought to be, has yet been better than last year. For a long time we were without an organist and the singing often consisted of a solo by the officiating minister. During the summer holidays Miss Lina Murray, bravely volunteered to play the organ for me, and the music gave us new life. After she left for school Miss Carter kindly offered to take her place. She is now training a choir to sing the hymns and canticles. Already we can see the benefit of these young ladies' work in the increased attendance.

In connexion with the Rev. Mr. Eames, I have begun a fortnightly week-day service at the Sutton School-house, which is midway between Hatley and Barnston Corner.

The attendance so far has been most encouraging.

I would like to take this opportunity of expressing my gratitude for many acts of personal kindness extended to myself and family by my parishioners; and especially would I like to thank the farmers of the Hatley congregation for drawing up my winter's supply of fire-wood.

There is service every Sunday at St. Stephens, and at the Church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, with Holy Communion once every mouth, and a monthly service at

the St Julie Station.

The Sunday-schools, during the summer months, are well attended, and are doing good work. We have good faithful teachers, who devote themselves heartily to the work of carefully training the young people in the study of the Holy Scriptures and the Church Catechism. Mrs. Roe has a Bible-class for girls during the winter months, every Sunday, at the Parsonage. At St. Stephens' Sunday-school we have an excellent library, refreshed by a box of new books purchased this year, for which we are largely indebted to the liberality of Mr. Robert Hamilton, the generous friend of all the Missions. Although we have lost several children this year, from families leaving the Mission, we have still a goodly number left, 40 at St. Stephen's and 25 at the Church of the Ascension. We held our annual Sunday-school pic-nic in September, at which all the members of the Church were present with the children, and were able to distribute a large number of nice presents to the 75 young persons present.

The Churches were beautifully decorated at Christmas. A handsome present from the "Kilburn Sisters," of mottoes and scrolls, helping much to improve the appearance of

the sacred edifices.

The parochial branch of the Women's Auxiliary to Missions, although few in number, is doing a good work. Although the people are, as a rule, poor, and have little to spare, this small branch sent off to the "Wawanosh Home," money and clothing, made by themselves, to the amount of \$22, and are now busy preparing a box of clothing to be sent in the spring, at the opening of the navigation, to Mrs. Wilson, for the Indian girls at the Home. To

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show the interest taken by the members in this work, I might state that one of the young women, a member of the Guild, who left us to work in Boston, sent from Boston a parcel of clothing for the Indian girls, which she made up herself; and others who have left us, have promised to do likewise. This speaks well for the impression made upon the young people who have been under the influence of this good work.

There has been much sickness in the Mission during the past year, and four of our oldest people have been called to their rest: Mr. John Smyth, father of W. J. Smyth; Mrs. Thompson, formerly housekeeper for the Rev. T. Ball, when missionary here; Mrs. Sophia Wi'ton, an aged member of the well known Wilton family; and widow Dorothy Jackson, an old woman who was sick for the most part of 10 years. She has left something to our Endowment Fund, but how much will not be known until her estate is settled.

IRELAND.

The Rev. R. Hewton reports:—

Our work in this corner of Christ's vineyard during the past year has been quiet and uneventful. I cannot report such strides in the way of advancement as characterized the work of former years, but our progress has been quite as, if not more, healthy. Judging from the general features of our Church work and the individual instances of zeal and devotion which arise from time to time, I think it is not too much to say that there is a gradual growth in holiness and an encouraging increase of faith.

We can, however, judge only by outward signs. God alone can look into the heart and speak accurately of the "shaking" His Spirit produces in the "dry bones" of carelessness and indifference.

Services have been kept up regularly at all the Churches, with monthly Sunday evening services at Keough's Range School-house and Black Lake. In all places the attendance has been good and the services hearty. This is especially true in Upper Ireland, where the regular communicants have increased. Last Sunday there were nearly fifty. Mr. F. H. Wood, lay reader, generally assists me by taking some part in the services here. After a long drive in the hot summer weather and having taken two other services, I find his assistance of great value. The Ladies' Association is still doing good work. They purpose holding a Christmas tree this year. We have most of the lumber sawed for a coach-house and stable for the use of Incumbent, but have not got the building up yet. We expect to have it finished next summer. Mrs. Henry Wood and Miss Maggie Cross still continue their services at the organ.

In Upper Ireland the hand of the Lord has been laid heavily on us in the way of sickness and death. Last winter scarlet fever and diphtheria broke out and carried off several victims. At one time it seemed as though we were threatened with a veritable epidemic. Every member of my own family was attacked by one or the other and some of them by both diseases. One case in the neighbourhood was especially sad. A promising young man, of great zeal and love for the Church, was laid in his grave after a very short but severe illness. Scarlet fever has only just died out. Other cases of death cast a gloom over the neighbourhood. There were three cases of consumption and one of apoplexy. We have had months of sorrow and sadness, but we have had the promise that "our light afflictions which endure but for a moment shall work for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

I was enabled, during the mid summer vacation, to open the Adderley Church weekly instead of fortnightly, through the assistance of Mr. J. N. Kerr, undergraduate of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, who worked with acceptance to the people and with credit to himself. His assistance in Lower Ireland also permitted me to devote some extra work to the th in holi-

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to open hrough Bishop's to the Lower k to the young mission at Black Lake. Mr. T. R. Johnston's work in this locality has been invaluable to me. I cannot speak too highly of his loyalty and zeal for the cause of our Master. Besides holding services every Sunday he conducted a Bible-class, ably assisted by his wife in the Sundayschool. We intended building a church here this winter, but I am afraid we will be obliged to put it off for a time until we can be satisfied that the circumstances of the mines will justify us in erecting a house for the worship of God. The Congregations here have been good and the singing and responding excellent. I am sorry to say that recently Mr. Johnston's health has prevented him from taking that active part in Church work which is his wont. It is my prayer that his health may be restored so that the work he has so well begun may be carried on.

In Lower Ireland the work is encouraging. Early in the year a Christmas tree was held, at which Mr. A. S. Johnson. M.P.P., on behalf of the congregation presented me with a purse containing nearly seventy dollars. I was completely taken by surprise, but it was an acceptable one. One advance worthy of mention here is the acquisition of an organist, in the person of Miss May Marshall. Our principal wants in this Church are a new organ and a font. They will be supplied in good time. We have almost enough money for a good organ. The collectors for the Church Society are Miss Sarah Kerr, Miss Orlena Little and Miss Bessie Porter. Their solicitations were successful and result in a nice respectable sum for the work of the Church So-

I feel encouraged by the manner in which the Keough's Range School-house services are attended. Let the weather be what it may, when the missionary goes there he finds an enthusiastic congregation awaiting him to join in the beautiful form of worship set forth in the Church Prayer Book. Many of those people began with a complete ignorance of the Church service. In fact one woman declared that she never heard the Church service until about three months ago, when she attended one of our services. She had no idea it was so beautiful. Those who have never seen anything but a well appointed City Church service will not have much idea of the manner in which we are sometimes obliged to conduct our missionary services. In a place like Keough's Range, the first thing to be done is to uproot prejudices against the Prayer Book. This can be done only

by judicious explanation of its admirable arrangements and by setting it before them through careful and devout reading of the prayers and lessons.

May God fill us all with the spirit of love, zeal and energy, so that the services of His Church may be set before His wandering sheep in an interesting, devout and ennobling manner.

Before closing I must testify to the kindness and devotion of the congregations. Out of many I single a couple of acts, that of Upper and Lower Ireland, in "hauling" my hay and of Mr. Henry Cross in presenting my wife with a nice milch cow. These are only isolated instances out of many acts which gladden the heart of the missionary.

KINGSEY.

The Rev. James S. Sykes reports :-

I am happy to be able to begin another report with a good item, viz: the securing in May last another generous gift of \$100 towards our Endowment Fund from Robert Hamilton, Esq, an additional \$50 being subcribed by the Mission—St. Paul's contributing, \$17; Holy Trinity, \$15; Spooner Pond, \$18. To thank the generous donor in a report seems very common place but we do so as the readiest means of expressing our appreciation and keeping in remembrance our great obligation.

With regard to the services I can only repeat the state.

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ment of previous years, fairly well attended, a slight increase in the number of communicants, and a more regular attendance at the Holy Communion. Outward signs which I trust are only an indication of "inward and spiritual grace."

There is a very marked in provement in the chanting

and singing at Spooner Pond.

I leave the Financial Statistics to tell the story and measure the liberality of each congregation. Our increased assessment has greatly increased the difficulty of collect-

ing it.

Mr. John Wadleigh, the largest contributor to our assessment, having removed with his family from Kingsey to Danville, cannot be expected after the present agreement expires, to pay to our assessment, but Kingsey's loss will be Danville's gain, and as this Mission is already taxed beyond its capabilities, it will be altogether impossible for the rest to make up the sum of \$80, which Mr. Wadleigh's removal will take from us. However we wish them prosperity in their new home and hope that for the sake of old times they will help us when we ask them to do so.

Death too has been busy amongst us this year. Mr. John Trenholm, of Trenholmville, after a long and trying sickness, borne with exemplary patience, died full of a hope of immortality in Christ Jesus. At the funeral, which was very largely attended, I was kindly assisted by the Rev. A.

H. Robertson, the new Rector of Durham.

Another prominent figure, in the person of Mr. George Wadleigh, has been removed from our midst. Cut down suddenly full of life and vigour in the morning, and, shortly after noon—dead—from a stroke of apoplexy, the widow's grief increased by having to nurse one after the other, two daughters through typhoid fever. Truly "in the midst of life we are in death."

The farmers in Kingsey, in common with those of other districts, have suffered much from the exceedingly wet season we have just passed through, and notwithstanding every effort having been used to save the crops, much hav and grain was spoilt, and only about one-third of the potato crop saved. And yet in the face of all these drawbacks our people have done remarkably well in giving, in spite of the difficulty (hardly understood by the independent and well-to-do) of getting.

I have to thank Messrs. Henry Wadleigh, Joseph Lodge,

and Henry McMannis, each for a load of hay. Also Mrs. John Nunns for the kindly gift of a cover for my waggon, making travelling in the hot sun or driving rain compara-

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Various other gifts I have received from other members of my congregations, to enumerate them all would make this report too long. But I must not omit \$5 and a supply of dessicated soup as a special Chrismas gift from Captain White.

The Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell still gives me occasional and very acceptable help in the services at Spooner Pond.

It is with no small amount of pleasure that I record a gift of \$23 to our most deserving organist, Miss Lizzie Evans, from the congregation of St. Paul's.

LABRADOR.

St. Clement's Mission, Mutton Bay.

The Rev. J. Ball reports:—

On 27th June, by the kindness of Commander Wakeham, Government S.S. La Canadienne, I was accommodated with a passage from Mutton Bay to Musquarro River, where the Mission boat was being put in order for sea. She had been recently purchased for the Mission by W. D. B. Scott, Esq., II. B. Co., agent, Musquarro, whose knowledge of a boat was amply verified, during the cruise, by the splendid sailing qualities of North Star No. 2. She is not exactly new, having been in use two years, and was laid up in the summer of

1887, which makes her now four years old. Her length is 23 feet 10 inches keel, width, 9 feet; fore and aft rigged, with a jib. When under full sail, she spreads about 70 vards of cany 3; will do seven knots an hour, and is as stiff in a bree, ' as a ten ton yacht. She has a "Cuddy" in her bows, with sleeping accommodation for two persons. This, with our box of provisions, we found very convenient when becalmed, or enveloped in fog. and unable to make our destination. In such cases, we made some safe harbor, east anchor, and remained for the night. Price, first cost, \$80, painting, &c., \$16.69. She will require a canoe, new fore sail and hatches, which will make her total cost about \$120. Then, if no mishap occurs, the Mission will have a staunch boat, calculated to be serviceable for twenty years, as she is built of cedar plank, and fastened with galvanized nails.

Wet weather delayed her painting, and it was not until 15th July that I was enabled to proceed. As the incidents of the cruise are very similar (you have ever to be on the look out for squalls), I shall not narrate in full, but briefly state that my cruise occupied thirteen weeks and two days, during which time every Church family in the Mission was visited, both going and returning, with the exception of Bay des Roches, at which place most of our people, on my return, had left for their winter houses, which are difficult of a cess by boat. At Stick Point I met Rev. H. E. H. Johnson, of Newfoundland Drocese, who accompanied me to Blanc Sablon, where I remained for Sunday service, Mr. Johnson proceeding to Forteau by mail steamer. We arranged to meet again at Lance-au-Loup, but easterly winds. and thick fog prevented me keeping my appointment. Our intention was to go to Flower's Cove, on the opposite side of the Straits of Befle-Isle, Mr. Johnson having no Mission

I would remark that, owing to the failure of the fisheries for several years past, and many of the lishermen being in arrears, they cannot be expected to contribute much towards the support of the Mission. They all express gratitude for the clothing annually supplied them by the O. M. S. of Onebec.

Statistics:—Baptisms, since January, 18; Marriages, 4; Burial. 1.

Total receipts, from June 19th, 1887, to date, \$37.75; Expenditure, \$29-99, leaving a balance of \$7.76. But as the

Mission house at Mutton Bay, badly needs painting and a house is required for the Mission boat, also boat gearing, the balance on hand will be none too large to defray expenses. The Mission House at Schooner Bay is no use where it is, the people having left there owing to scarcity of wood, and the Chapel accommodation at Mutton Bay being very inferior, I purpose bringing it here next spring, and converting it into a Church, keeping the present building for a Mission and School-house.

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LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Kemp reports:-

This, my last report, will not be what I had fondly

hoped when I entered upon the year's work.

It has been less satisfactory to myself and I am afraid of less advantage to the Mission than any previous year. God has seen fit to cause me to be laid aside for part of the year by sickness, and I have only been able to do a portion of the work—which I had laid out and should have accomplished had my health been the same as before.

As far as I could, I have kept up the ordinary services, the details of which I gave in my report of 1887. St. James Church, Leeds, has been served with less break in the service than in any of the other Churches and Stations. And by that Congregation the assessment has been paid up to the end of the year. But the other Congregations (of St. Mark's, Kinnear's Mills, and Broughton) have not been served much over half the year and the Board has remitted half of their assessment for the year. I preached my last official sermon Sunday, 30th, at St. James Church, Leeds.

I part with my work and with the people with some regret, but thankful that I can now take the rest I feel I need. I have tried to do my best. My relations with the people have been, on the whole, harmonious. I shall, as long as the Mission is vacant, be willing to give St. James Congregation one service each Sunday, with the understanding that should a clergyman be appointed shortly, they will be expected to pay the whole year's assessment for the coming year. Mr. Smith rendered me good help, while I was ill last winter, in taking service at St. James Church, and also did something for Kinnear's Mills and Broughton, or the break in all these places would have been much greater.

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I send in this report regretting that I have not been able to do more for Christ and the Church. And hoping that a younger man may take my place and work up the Mission with more energy than I have had strength to do, to the glory of God and to the advantage of the people.

I do not think there is any thing to add to the foregoing detailed statement. It fully shows the quiet work of the

Parish for the past year. It will be seen from it that the "Woman's Auxiliary" and "St. George's Guild" are both doing good work. To the former a Junior Branch has been added under the able management of Miss Roe—the proceeds of their work during the year amount to \$30.35.

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The year that is passed has been an uneventful one in our parish he. The ordinary routine of work has been quietly followed—unbroken, except by illness on my own part and by a brief visit to my native land, after an absence of some forty years. I cannot omit referring here to the warm and affectionate welcome with which I was greeted on my return.

The members of the Guild presented the Church with a handsome new carpet at Easter, at an expense of \$103.40. They have also had the Church Hall clapboarded and paint-

ed, which they will pay for during the winter.

We had our usual "harvest home" service in the end of September, and the beauty of the decorations, the brightness of the service, and the numbers present exceeded all former years. An eloquent and striking sermon was preached by the Rector of Sherbrooke.

There have been 29 celebrations of the Holy Communion,

with an average attendance of 40.

There have been 14 deaths within the limits of the parish; two of them with awful suddenness, warning the community to be ready "for in an hour that ye think not the Son of Man cometh." I have baptized 23 persons, one of whom was an adult. Of the others, four died almost immediately after their reception into the fold of Him who said "Suffer the little children to come unto me."

LEVIS AND SOUTH QUEBEC.

The Rev. M. George Thompson reports:-

During the portion of the year—nine months—in which I have had charge of this Parish, the services have been regularly kept up. Numerically, the Parish has not changed much, but I am very glad to be able to report a considerable increase in the regular attendance at all the services. The members of the Ladies' Guild have continued to carry on their good work, and deserve great credit for their earnest and persevering efforts. Besides giving \$100 to the Local Endowment Fund, thereby securing Mr. Robert Hamilton's

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generous offer, they have given more than \$40 for the improvement of the Rectory grounds, &c. Miss N. Piton, who has presided at the organ, deserves special mention for her efficient work.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited this Parish in May and confirmed eleven persons. I would call the attention of my successor to the fact, that the new Cemetery still remains unconsecrated. All arrangements were made to have it done in May-on the occasion of the Bishop's visit for Confirmation-but owing to the cold and the amount of snow still on the ground, it had to be postponed. The Sunday-school has been faithfully carried on, and our numbers have slightly increased. I leave the Sunday-school in charge of Mr. Addie, and have appointed teachers for the classes, and I know that the work will be well done. I regret to say that the services at Hadlow are not as much appreciated as they ought to be, and consequently they have been but indifferently attended, though the Congregation at times has been good. It is with much regret that I leave this Parish, for I have got attached to the Church and people, but my state of health demands a change trust that a few months spent in a milder climate, with God's blessing, will enable me to return and labor in the Diocese again. For many kindnesses received I return my sincere thanks. In conclusion, I would also thank all who have labored with me in my work here, and my prayer is, that the work of Christ's Church may continue to prosper and increase amongst them more and more.

The Rev. Fred. A. Smith reports:-

Since the departure of the Rev. M. G. Thompson for the United States great efforts have been made to have at least one service on Sunday in this Church. For some months the Rev. Mr. Rexford did duty, and a clergyman was provided for the celebration of Holy Communion once a month. The Sunday-school has been regularly kept up under the direction of Mr. George Addie, the Superintendent.

Many thanks are due to Mrs. Simmons, Miss Bella Thompson, Miss Piton and Miss Nuttie Piton for the sum of \$93.75, the proceeds of two concerts, one a parlor concert, held at Mrs. Piton's residence, which realized \$39.25. The proceeds of both furnished fuel and helped to pay debts and elergy-

man's salary.

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MAGOG

The Rev. J. Hepburn writes: -

The principal work to report this year in this parish is the building of a new Church in Fitch Bay, a village ten miles distant from Magog and four miles from Georgeville.

In this section I had been holding services for two years with very encouraging success. The way was opened up in a memorable manner. A man, who had declared himself an infidel from his early manhood, and by his relations and by his prominence in the village, had done much to retard this religious work, sent for me on his death-bed. I shall never forget the impression made when on meeting him he raised himself from his bed and said: "I sent for you, Sir, " for I could not die until I had told some one what my life " has been, and how false I have been to my own convic-"tions. I have gloried in infidelity; I have laughed at all "religion; and yet I always believed in God, and could " not shake myself free from this belief." He was spared one month, and during that time I saw him frequently. 1 baptized him to his great joy, and to the comfort of many friends. His funeral was very large; and the impression made upon the public was deep. I was fairly besieged to open up services in the Union Church. I could not decline, although I had seven other places to fill,

Much encouragement has come to me ever since. The services are very well attended; they are bright and hearty, the people learning to respond readily and with ardent

satisfaction.

Early this year a certain number in the village, who seemed to feel that our success meant their decline, threw

obstacles in the way of our services in the Church.

The way in which the opposition was conducted made it unpleasant to such an extent that the people at once began to agitate for a Church of their own. We were all ready to proceed with the necessary business when my wife was struck down with a very serious illness, which continued throughout the summer. This made it impossible for me to take charge, so that matters remained quiet until the middle of October, when the Venerable Archdeacon Roe

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visited the parish to arrange for the establishment of a new Mission in Fitch Bay, under the charge of the Rev. W. A. Adcock. This gave the necessary impetus to the work; and at once a site was purchased, plans adopted and a foreman chosen. The Venerable Archdeacon undertook, with the help of myself, to raise \$400 if the people would raise \$600. It is expected that this sum will be sufficient to complete the work. We indulge in the firm hope of having the

Church opened for service about the New Year.

The arrival of Mr. Adcock means less work for the clergyman in Magog, i.e., in the extreme southern section of the parish. I have felt myself attempting to cover too much ground hitherto and the effect is not good. There will be more lasting good accomplished now that the field is divided; and there will be much more satisfaction in the work. I am especially glad for the section around Fitch Bay, where the outlook is excellent. I have had many pleasant surprises in finding the readiness of whole familes to embrace the offices of the Church where I looked for opposition or indifference. When the Bishop visits the field next summer there will be a goodly number ready to join in the Holy rite of Confirmation.

I have also to record with much satisfaction the help given us towards the liquidation of the debt of the Parsonage. Through the kind interest of Archdeacon Roe, Mr. R. Hamilton was induced to make an offer to us of \$100 annually, for two years, if the people would raise \$200 each year. It is a noble offer, and especially after so many gifts to this parish. He had already given \$100 to the building, besides starting and increasing our Endowment Fund, helping also in Georgeville. Our ladies at once rose to the occasion, promising the amount; and now after seven months' work have given \$188. At the opening of the new year we shall have the \$200 necessary to obtain Mr. Hamilton's gift of \$100. The balance is now so reasonable that no one feels burdened.

The Parish had a great surprise at Christmas, in a complete set of handsome furnishings for the Chancel furniture, from a lady in England, Miss A. M. Knox. This came to us through the kind offices of Mrs. Williams, who is remembered throughout the Diocese for many similar manifestations of loving interest and good-will. In her present state of feeble health many, many are the prayers offered up for her-prayers that are quickened by the vivid remembrance

of the many good things she has done

Miss Kuox surprised us more with a second bale of good gifts for the Christmas Tree, for the poor, and also for the Sunday-school. She also informed me lately of her intention to do the same for the Church in Georgeville as she has done for Magog. May she be blessed in her loving labours.

I must record my deep sense of gratitude for the help given me in the Parish by office-bearers in the Church and Sunday-school, and for the steady faithful work done by the

organists and the choirs.

The summer tourists in Georgeville were a great addition to our numbers in worship, and they aided us very generously in our liabilities. We have to thank them largely for the balance of \$150 in the Ladies' Treasury, reserved for use in some work of importance to the Parish.

The Congregation in Magog has very sensibly improved during the past year, and members are more hopeful of the

future than they have been.

And now a word must be said about my departure from the Mission. After eleven years of service I have been called to the large and important parish of Richmond, and have felt it right to accept the post. I came to Magog when prospects were gloomy; I expected difficulties and discouragements; and I have had them. Yet in looking back I can recall more encouragements; I can see very large room for thankfulness. The Mission has now many advantages and attractions; the cotton industry utilizing our great water privilege promises to make Magog a place of some importance; and then the Church must be strong and prosperous.

It is far from easy to remove myself from this place of so many tender memories. Friends abound in all sections with whom I would gladly stay. My manner of life is quite to my mind. I know I have the good-will of the people at large as well as the members of the Church. I have always been shown kindness more than I deserved; and now, since my departure has been spoken of, it is so abundant as to

cause me shame.

The responsibility of leaving really falls on others. After the election by the Richmond Vestry, the expression of opinion in favour of my going was so spontaneous and hearty from all my brethren, the Clergy around, that the course seemed marked out for me. Knowing the man who is taking up the work I have great hopes of peace and progress.

MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. Radley Walters reports:—

I am happy to report that during the past year I have kept all my appointments for the conducting of Divine Service at Malbaie, Corner Beach and Barachois. These services have been well attended, with fairly good singing and responding, though there is much room for improvement in this latter respect, although many of my people are unable to read or sing much; yet they could in many instances join more heartily and audibly, in the responses when attending Church.

I have worked steadily in this Mission for the past ten years, and I think this has been the most eventful in many

I am pleased to report that at the Corner of the Beach we at last see our way to begin the building of a Church,

to take the place of the small and uncomfortable School Chapel. This present room will then give us a good Schoolroom or Public Hall for this Station. Archdeacon Roe kindly furnished us with plans for a Church, which, with a little alteration, we accepted. I can now say that the good people of the Corner have set to work with a will, and have the frame all cut, and hauled to the site chosen for building, a pretty rising knoll, close under a high wooded hill, part of the famed "Perce Hills." This land, which includes sufficient for a Grave Yard, has been deeded to us by the sons of the late Mr. Edward Mate, men who have come to us from another faith. We hope in the spring to begin to build. The ten families living there have subscribed \$460, payable in two years; Mr. George Vibert and Mr. Philip Vibert each subscribing \$100, and Mr. Daniel Mate, whilst coasting with his schooner, succeeded this past summer in collecting for us something over \$140, in addition to a keg or so of white lead and nails. Each family has further promised boards and shingles. Thus, I am sure, having shewn a willingness to help themselves, your Board will encourage them, when they apply for it, with a grant towards the Building Fund.

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I record with much regret the death of Mr. Edward Mate, in his 85th year, a good Christian Churchman, whose venerable grey head is missed in the congregation, of which he was a regular communicant and attendant up to the time

of his death.

I am pleased to say that nearly all living at this Station

are communicants.

At Barachois, during the past summer months, I have endeavored to give an afternoon Service every second Sunday. These Services seem appreciated; the School-room is generally full, and, since the introduction of a small organ, there seems more heartiness in the singing and responding. I have to thank Messrs. Willis & Co., of Montreal, to whom I appealed, for kindry giving me a capital second-hand organ for the small cost of \$45 for this work. I have to play this myself, as I also do at the Corner of the Beach.

Acting upon a resolution of the Easter Vestry, nine members of St. Peter's Church congregation at Malbaie were appointed with the Church Wardens to hold a thorough survey on the Church edifice this summer. They did so, and condemned it. As I reported last year, it was necessary to put extensive repairs upon the Church building,

le School viz., new sills, new roof and clapboarding on one side, and d School. repainting. It was decided instead that an effort be made by the congregation to build a new Church, as the ground acon Roe ch, with occupied by the present building would soon be required to extend the Grave Yard, and to build the new Church outside the Grave Yard. I at once opened a subscription list among the members of the congregation, payments to extend over three years. The merchants at Point St. Peter kindly headed it at once. Mr. James Collas subscribing \$110, Mr. Arthur Collas \$110, Messrs. John Fauvel & Co. \$75, and Messrs. Alexander & Co. \$60. I am sure we shall get even more than this from the above named gentlemen when they see the building fairly under way, and the inhabitants doing their full share. Mr. James Collas, who seems interested in the movement, has promised to try and secure me help in Jersey during his winter's residence there. Most of the other members of the congregation are subscribing as they can afford, one to three or five dollars, payable in cash or fish.

Sir Donald Smith, of Montreal, very kindly sent us, through Mr. James Collas, \$50 towards the building fund of this Church. We have nice plans to build this Church The Wardens have just given to the congregation what seems to me a tremendous lot of wood to cut for the frame, mostly cedar. We have much for the new building when erected. I think I may say the nicest pulpit, prayer desks and altar chairs on the Coast, which I had made by Drum & Co. some few years ago. I am having another set of three windows of stained glass made by Spence, of Montreal, which will complete the present Church windows, and are intended for the new building, when built.

But all this to an outsider seems, I dare say, very encouraging. Could I show you the real picture; could you see two-thirds of my congregation who are to help in this laudable work. I am afraid you would require a brave heart to refrain from despairing of ever seeing our object accom-

plished. Many of the cedar logs with which this Church, if ever it is built, will be cut, and, with the aid of an ox, will have to be hauled 12 or 15 miles by some of these poor people. repeat, as I have before done, that whilst one-third of my people are fairly successful, the remainder are of the poorest class, and live further scattered than perhaps in any other Mission on this coast.

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Last week we were visited by Revd. Rural Dean Lyster, of Cape Cove, sent by your Board to see could we not increase our assessment. The meeting was characterized with the utmost good feeling, though I think our Rural Dean went away impressed with the idea that if a few could do more, most are doing as much as they really are able. However, I am very glad that the result was an increase of \$30, which also means, owing to the deaths of various members of the congregation this past year, the Church Wardens will have to find \$60 more than heretofore, and this I know will require quite an effort, especially as nearly all are pledged to subscribe for the next three years to the building fund of these new Churches. However, "where there is a will, there is a way," though I fail to see the way to draw money out of empty purses.

This past year has seen quite a lot of sickness among my people. I am extremely sorry to chronicle nineteen deaths, mostly adults and heads of families; one an old Church member and supporter, Mrs. Alexander, of Point St. Peter,

in her 87th year.

My thanks are due to all who helped us with our last year's tea party. Also, I wish, on behalf of the Sundayschool children, to thank Messrs. Collas and LeMarquand for sending 30 lbs. of sweets for the young sters to race and

scramble for on the day of their pic-nic.

I beg also to thank Mrs. John Hamilton and Mrs. Colin Sewell, of Quebec. for kindly sending six barrels of east-off clothing for distribution. I need hardly say how gratefully these were accepted. I can see they are a means of bring many of their present owners to Church, who before gave me an excuse for non-appearance. Mrs. Williams also, though far away, did not forget us, and also sent a small bale for the same purpose. Our old friend, George Sears, Esq., of New York, seemingly thinks of pleasant days spent here by the sea. At Christmas he put us under the obligation of thanking him for a small cheque to our Church fund.

I am glad our assessment has been paid in full, though

it was late before all could be gathered in.

NEW LIVERPOOL.

The Rev. Fredk. A. Smith reports:-

In this quiet parish the principal event of the year was a Confirmation on the first Sunday in Lent by the Lord Bishop, when eight candidates presented themselves for the laying on of hands. The services have been held with the usual regularity and on the whole fairly attended, but I have to lament that families residing at some distance from the Church in the country places, do not seem to be as zealous as they might be in coming to the services. Our Sunday-school was fairly attended during the summer months, but many of the children go into the City of Quebec for the winter. Our Day-school is still maintained under the same excellent teacher (Mrs. Andrew Brown,) who has had charge of it for some years past. All the exterior woodwork of the parsonage has been thoroughly painted during the autumn.

NEWPORT.

The Rev. Thomas Rudd reports:-

I came to the Mission of Newport, (Rendboro' a 1'sland Brook.) at the beginning of June of this year, and was formally inducted by Mr. Robertson, my predecessor, who also stayed with me for a few days. I took up my residence at Randboro', as it is more in the centre of the Mission than Island Brook. When I commenced visiting, I found my task made easy by the extreme kindness I received, and I have still continued to experience the same kindness. I found a little dissatisfaction amongst some of the people, because they had experienced so many changes of elergymen, but they are all now taking hold, and seem anxious

to assist in any work of the Church. We have a Ladies' Guild at Randboro' which meets once a month, and has increased in numbers chiefly through the activity and energy of two or three of its leading members. The congregation at Randboro' have at last made up their minds that a good choir would be a great improvement, and they are doing their best to get a choir together and train it and have succeeded very well. The Church is very well attended if the weather is at all favourable. And what I have said of Randboro' I should like to say of Island Brook, but I am sorry to say that a great many of the Church people do not attend very regularly. The average congregation this summer has been about twenty-live, which is very small, when we take into consideration the number of Church families. There are, however, some very regular Church people, whose example I am sure will have an influence for good on those who are not so faithful to their Church. There is a Sunday-school, which has increased in numbers and is doing well, under the management of Miss Wilford and Miss Dawson. I hold a service once a fortnight on Sunday evenings, at Learned Plain, which is attended not only by Church people, but by persons of other denominations, who all join in the services very heartily, and when I visit that part of my Mission, I call at every house and find a hearty welcome amongst Roman Catholics. Methodists and Presbyterians. The other Sunday evenings I have held services at Clifton, but I have had to discontinue them for a month for want of a convenient building: however the new school-house is nearly completed, so ! hope to have them as usual very soon. The services were very well attended and the people were beginning to take quiet an interest in them.

Mr. Faulconer, of Cookshire, has attended one Sunday in six to celebrate the Holy Communion, but I am sorry to say we have but few communicants.

I have baptised four children, and taken two funerals since I came to this Mission.

I have handed in to Mr. Perry, of Sherbrooke, the collections for the Pension Fund and the Mission Fund.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports:—

The same routine of Church work has been followed during the past as during the years immediately preceding, viz: on Sundays, at St. Anne's, Riehmond, Matins and Evensong, a Sunday-School at 9.30 and Children's Service at 4.00; and at St. John's, Melbourne, Divine Service at 2 o'clock, preceded during the summer, by a Sunday-school, kindly managed by Mrs. May. The usual special services in Lent and on Saints' Day have also been held, and, in addition thereto, many week-night services, including Cottage Lectures in districts remote from the Church. These latter were much appreciated, and I have every reason to think were helpful to many. The celebrations of the Holy Communion, early and late, have been as in former years.

The special service for the children of the Church, the wisdom of which seems to be questioned by some of my brother elergymen, so far from interfering with the children's attendance upon the ordinary services, has had the effect rather of improving such, by rendering the latter services more intelligible and attractive through the greater familiarity with the Prayer Book acquired at their own. I believe moreover that such a service, when it can be had, offers just the opportunity wanted, of inculeating and training the children of the Church in the principles and truths necessary to make them loyal and devout members of the Church.

The Women's Guild has continued its good work with

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zeal unabated, the pecuniary result being \$480 for the year. The Women's Auxiliary, also, has striven to further its special work (the missionary). Through its agency clothing, books, &c., to the estimated value of \$90, have been sent to the Manitoulin Islands, \$24.57 in cash to other fields, and various articles to the Quebec Fancy Sale in behalf of the like object. Algoma's devoted collectors, Mr. Journeaux and Miss Cleeve, have sent \$75.05, the aggregate of small weekly offerings to that missionary diocese. This swells the amount by them thus gathered and forwarded to \$1,000, or its very close proximity.

It is much to be hoped that they may long carry on their good work, and that those appealed to may more and more realize that a great privilege is offered them of helping Christ's poor, annexed to which duty is a rich blessing promised. During the past year the Church's debt has been

reduced by \$400.

\$176.50 was contributed towards the memorial commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of our beloved Bishop's consecration. No individual subscription was large, but the object was very generally supported, and a very gratifying spirit manifested. Mr. Lloyd had the

matter in hand and to him is no little credit due.

The Mission of St. John's, Melbourne, has suffered greatly during the past year by removal, to the West, of many families; their places in all instances being supplied by the This Mission, now for five years vacant, and which during that time I have vainly striven to minister to, forming, in conjunction with my own Parish, so extensive a field, I have from sheer necessity been obliged to omit much house to house ministrations, so essential to the spiritual prosperity of a Parish. We are indebted to the Rev. Dr. Adams, Principal of Bishop's College, for a most interesting address on the occasion of our Harvest Home; to the Rev. Mr. Vine, Chaplain of Red Hill School, Surrey, England; to Archdeacon Roe and others of my brother clergy, for help most kindly given. I am very happy to say that our offerings in behalf of Foreign and Domestic Missions, and the various funds of the Church Society, have, this year, been in excess of those of last.

This report I write with mingled feelings of joy and sadness. Of joy, in being able, as I turn and survey the seven short years of my ministry in this Parish, to recall many incidents, and see much, for which I can devoutly thank

God. Of sadness, at the thought that, however well it may be, and I doubt not it is well, it is to be my last report: that henceforth I am to labour in other fields, whilst my dear friends here, from whom I have received so many tokens of indulgence and sympathy, are to be ministered to in holy things by other hands than mine. Only a clergyman, who has experienced the severance of like sacred ties and hallowed associations, can know anything of its pain.

On the 28th of October I was inducted into the Rectory of St Peter's, Quebec. On the eve of my departure, I received, from my good friends in the Mission of St. John, a purse of \$15; from my dear Sunday-school children of St. Anne's, a very beautiful stole; from the Women's Guild and Women's Auxiliary, a purse of \$35; from St. Anne's congregation, a purse of \$105; and many private gifts—all accompanied with kind, affectionate words.

That under the ministry of my successor, God may grant to His Church here an increase of spiritual life and vigour, and richly bless her members in all things pertaining to their everlasting peace, permitting us all to meet at length at His right hand for Christ's sake, will be the constant prayer of their grateful and loving friend and late Pastor.

I desire, in conclusion, warmly to thank the Hon. Henry Aylmer and Mr. Harkom, our faithful Church-wardens; our choir-master and members, our Sunday-school teachers and office-bearers, all for the kind consideration and ready help ever extended to me by them all.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. Geo. T. Harding reports:-

Sunday services have been continued through the year in the same order as that stated in my last report. That is, morning service at Sandy Beach twice, and evening service three times each month; at Peninsula. morning and two afternoon services; and at Little Gange, morning and evening service on the same day once a month.

I missed a few services on the other side of the Bay, owing to bad weather and the difficulty of crossing; but have managed to make up for them by extra services at

other times.

Holy Communion has been celebrated in each Church once a month.

Attendance everywhere has been good; that of the evening service at Sandy Beach quite as good, generally, as that of the morning. The number of communicants in all the Churches is large for the congregations; but at Peninsula the average is larger than at the other places. Nearly all the adults there seem to be regular communicants (at Easter there were sixty), and it is a refreshing sight to see them

so constant in this respect.

A good many week-day services have also been held. From the beginning of my incumbency (October a year ago) until Easter, I kept up a weekly service, with lecture, at Sandy Beach, either on Wednesday, or on a Saint's Day, if one happened to fall within the week, with occasional cottage services in different parts of the district. I had services, also, on Christmas eve, Nativity, Holy Innocents (for children), Epiphany, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and Holy Week. All of these were well attended, nearly as well, indeed, on many occasions, as the Sunday services; and I made a point of always giving a lecture, or an address, at each. During the Summer and Autumn, too, I have observed the Saints' Days-excepting only two or three—and in addition to these, during the former, have had a weekly cottage service, for aged persons and those unable to attend Church, alternating between Sandy Beach and Barachois, with a monthly private celebration in the latter district. These services, also, seemed to be duly appreciated, and in many respects were very enjoyable. 1 shall long remember with pleasure one aged couple to whom I ministered in this way at the Barachois—the old

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
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




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man, especially, who seemed to know and love his prayer book so well, and whose responding was so loud, hearty and reverent. I am sorry to say that he died since I began this report, but glad to record my belief that he was firmly settled in the Christian faith—being anchored to "that within the veil."

At Peninsula, too. I have had week-day services. Besides those in Church on the chief Holy-days, one as a preparation for Holy Communion, and a Harvest Thanksgiving, I had regular cottage services once a month during the Summer season, for the benefit of some who could not attend Church, and am thankful to say met with much encouragement in the work. I had to give them up a good while ago, but hope to begin them again in a better season.

There is an interesting item connected with the work there which ought not to be omitted. On the Sundays when I give them morning service for Holy Communion, I remain till the afternoon and have a second—a Litany—service with catechising, at 3 o'clock. The congregation are all invited to attend and take part, and I am very much pleased with the hearty way in which they have responded to the invitation. All who come, adults and children, seem willing to help me in the work, and the free and hearty manner in which they speak ont, together with the remarkable intelligence displayed in answering the questions, has helped to make this one of the most cheering services I have. We have been going regularly through the Church catechism in this way; and as the interest does not seem to flag, but rather to increase, I have hopes that God will so protect and help us, that this small beginning will become a permanent part of our work.

My third Church is at Little Gaspé. The distance to this station is considerable, and the difficulty of reaching it great, even in Summer, owing to the Bay that has to be crossed before the drive begins, thus necessitating two different modes of conveyance. In the beginning of Winter, too, before the ice-bridge is formed, the drive is extremely hard: for, although the Church can be seen from the Parsonage, I am obliged to drive thirty-four miles round the north-west arm of the Bay to get to it, and over a road that is very much exposed to the coldest wind we have. This, of course, happens generally only once a year, as I go to Little Gaspé but one Sunday in the month. As, however, before this comes, owing to the storms and drifting ice in

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This, go to wever, ice in the Bay, the crossing is dangerous—sometimes impossible —there is more than one turn that has to be missed or met with great difficulty. The arrangement of the Mission on this account seems to me to be awkward; and in my humble judgment it would be better for both sides of the Bay, if the two excellent congregations of Peninsula and Little Gaspé were creeted into a separate Mission.

Notwithstanding the difficulties, however, I am always glad to go to Little Caspé, and am happy in my work when I get there. For there and at Peninsula, no less than at Sandy Beach, there are some Churchmen of the very best stamp-earnest, steadfast and godly-to whom it is always a pleasure to minister, and I never leave either

place without some feelings of regret.

They have never had an organ at Little Gaspé; but the people are naturally musical, and conduct the singing themselves with great credit. I am glad to say that we are now raising money to buy an organ, and that two young girls of the congregation are learning to play, in order to take charge of it. There is no doubt, therefore, that by next Summer, if all is well, we shall be thoroughly provided in a musical way.

Some special services of a "Mission" character were held at this station last Spring, which seemed to please and impress the people very much—But as they were incomplete, and it is my intention, God willing, to try a regular "Mission" there during next Lent, I shall omit further mention

of them for the present.

It is incumbent upon me, however, to give some account of a similar, but more complete, effort in connection with the congregation of St. John's Church, Sandy Beach.

I had long felt that a "Mission" might be productive of some good, and after earnest consideration, and a good deal of hesitation, not being able to get the services of a regular "Missioner" in a suitable time of the year, I decided to undertake the work myself, and accordingly opened a ten

days' "Mission" on the first Sunday in Advent.

All the services were well attended, at night the congregations were particularly good, the interest increasing, and the impression deepening towards the end Quite a number of persons asked for the prayers of the Church, although I simply gave notice that they might do so, without using any pressure in the matter; and a larger number communicated than at any previous occasion during my incumbency. My judgment, therefore, is that, as a "Mission," the effort was a decided success, and the immediate effects remarkable. God grant that more and better fruit may still

come in the future.

I should like to say a word before closing about our Sunday-schools. A good one is kept up at Sandy Beach during the Summer under the superintendence of Capt. Pye—myself having a confirmation class in it twice a month—but owing to bad roads and the extent of the district, it has to be given up in winter. I am happy to say, however, that in place of it we are now starting three separate Sunday-schools—at Sandy Beach, and Barachois, the extremes, and at the Parsonage in the centre of the district, and my hope is that these will be successful.

At Peninsula, also, a good Sunday-school is kept up throughout the year, the district being smaller and more compact. The congregation there is deeply indebted, and feel very grateful to Miss Laura Ascot for her successful and self-denying labours in the Sunday-school during a long period. But she is now married, and has left Gaspé, and her place is occupied by Mr. Wm. Miller, Jr., who, I believe, is thoroughly conscientious, and will likewise be suc-

cessful.

Another good Sunday-school has been kept up at Little Gaspé by Mr. C. Bartlett, assisted by Mrs. Gavie and others. But, as he has gone home to Jersey for the Winter, I fear there will be great difficulty in keeping the work going until his return. In all three Sunday-schools we have adopted the Bishop Doane series of graded catechisms, from which I anticipate good results.

Five missionary cards were issued this year, and the following sums collected by means of them:—Mrs. Abraham Gavie, \$8.60; Miss Emily Ascot, \$6.25; Miss Suddard, \$5.55; Miss Clara Ascot, \$3.55; Miss Thompson, \$2.00.—

Total, \$25.95.

My thanks are due to many kind friends throughout the Mission for things given to myself and family during the year, especially to the people of Sandy Beach and Peninsula for a supply of wood for the Parsonage, and to the people of Peninsula for a box of useful things at Christmas.

SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:-

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ptisms,

We have now two Churches in this Parish, and the services in both have been maintained throughout the year without interruption.

At St. Peter's, the Parish Church, in addition to the services reported last year, Morning and Evening Prayer have been said daily since July with encouraging results. An early celebration of Holy Communion has also been added on the fourth Sunday in the month.

At the Church of the Advent in East Sherbrooke, P.Q, services have been held every Sunday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, and every Thursday evening at 7.30. There has also been a celebration of the Holy Communion at 8.30 on the second Sunday in every month.

The Brompton Line Mission and the Magog River Mission have been served once a fortnight on Sunday afternoon.

The following institutions of the Parish have been in healthy operation throughout the year and have done excellent work: The Church Temperance Society, The Women's Auxiliary, The Ladies' Guild, The Children's Guild,—now converted into a branch of the Women's Auxiliary, The Parochial Visiting Society, The Communicant's Union, The Instruction Classes for men and for communicants, and The Sunday-schools.

The interest in the work of the Sunday-schools has been quickened by the Sunday-school conference held in this

parish in September last, as a direct result of which a

Teachers' Meeting has been began

Especial mention should be made of the interest maintained in the Women's Auxiliary, which this year has had the advantage of addresses from Rev. Dr. Allnat, of Bishop's College, and Mrs. Bompas, wife of the devoted Bishop of Mackinzie River. The latter bore fruit in the form of a resolution pledging the Auxiliary to maintain an Indian boy under Christian training in the Mackenzie River Diocese.

In connection with the Communicants' Union, has been established a Union for Intercessory Prayer, which it is

hoped will be fruitful in spiritual good.

In January last a meeting of laymen was held to consider the subject of laywork in the Church, with special reference to a report adopted by the Deanery Board at its last meeting in December, 1887. The result was the passing of the following resolution, which it is to be presumed will lead to the establishment in due course of an organized system of layhelp in the parish:—

"Resolved, that the laymen assembled at this preeting, "do hereby declare their earnest and unalterable attach-

"ment to the Church.

"They feel deeply the call now made upon them to share "in the spiritual work of the Church, and are ready to do "what in them lies to forward the objects so clearly set "forth in the report of the committee of the Deanery Board "for the District of St. Francis, with regard to the place of laymen in the spiritual work of the Church, they are prepared to enrol their names as members of the Association of Lay Helpers of the District of St. Francis, and trust that in the fulfilment of any duties which may devolve on them as such members they may in manner and conduct justify the solemn trust placed in them, and become the humble means of glorifying Almighty God by extending the blessings of His kingdom."

The names of ten laymen were enrolled upon a provision-

al register appended to the resolution.

The Benyon Home for boys and the Gibbs Home for girls, in connection with the Wail's and Strays Society of London, continue in operation and have claimed much of the Rectors time and attention. The work is however a true work of charity. The children rescued from adverse surroundings in England are brought here and placed in good homes, where they have every opportunity of growing up

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girls, ndon, Recwork oundgood ng up into good and useful men and women. Although some few have given trouble, the majority of those placed out have done very well indeed. It should be regarded as a true work of the Church. The children are placed only with Church people who are required to afford them every facility possible for worship and religious training in the Church.

The work in East Sherbrooke, in connection with the Church of the Advent, seems to be taking deep and permanent root. The Church, which was only opened on the second Sunday in Advent, 1887. has already become a centre of interest and affection to those attending it. The interest in the services has never flagged. There has been an average attendance of about 85 at the Sunday service and 35 at the week-day service. The Sunday-school, which is still ably conducted by Mr. H. A. Elkins, assisted by a zealous band of teachers, all from East Sherbrooke, has an average of 45 pupils. A Women's Guild has just been established, which promises to do good work in drawing people together and affording material aid to the Church. It speaks well for the resources of the Mission that two most successful entertainments in aid of the Church's funds were managed entirely by the East Sherbrooke parishioners themselves.

There is certainly good reason to believe that the Mission of the Church of the Advent will grow rapidly in importance and will prove not a hindrance but a stimulus to the parish at large.

Excellent work has been done by Mr. George Bottom in the Hospital, which he has visited systematically on Sunday afternoons for years; as also in the Reformatory by several ladies of the parish.

Both these institutions have been visited regularly by the clergy and services have been held in them at stated intervals.

The day is not far distant when the old Church of St. Peter's, comfortable and churchly as it is and greatly as it is endeared to the hearts of those who have worshipped in it for so many years, must give place to a new and more commodious building. In view of this a friend of the Church has given \$1,000 to form the nucleus of a Church building fund and to stimulate those who are able to give to similar acts of liberality.

Two matters of deep concern remain to be referred to. The first is the great loss which the parish has sustained in the death of the late lamented Dr. Reid. For thirty-four years Dr. Reid has been associated with the life of our people. As their pastor for thirty years he was associated with their joys and sorrows. But over and above all this is to be added the fact that there was in Dr. Reid's exemplary life and holy character a power of influence that attracted towards him all with whom he came in contact. To lose such a man from our head is to meet with a loss which it is hard to describe in words. But to none outside his own domestic circle can the loss be deeper than to him who is called amid much frailty to follow in his footsteps in the Rectorship of this important parish, and whose heart and mind now miss the untailing sympathy and the fatherly counsel which were never witheld in time of need.

The second matter is the engagement of a Curate, for which provision was made at the Easter Vestry Meeting. In the month of July last the Rev. R. J. Fothergill entered upon his duties, and has been zealously and usefully employed without interruption ever since to the great comfort

and relief of the Rector of the parish.

I have again to acknowledge the kindness and heartiness with which I have been supported in every good work by our noble band of lay-workers, both men and women; and especially to the Wardens of the parish are due my most grateful thanks.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:-

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Christ Church, Stanstead Plain.—The past year has been one of trial and affliction to this parish. Sickness and death have saddened the households of several of our most energetic Church-workers, and cast a gloom over the whole community. During the past few years the Church membership has been thuned by death and removals so much as to materially affect the size of the congregations at the several services. We have had to struggle hard during the past year to make up the various Church expenses, hence our small contributions to outside objects. The services at Christ Church have been the same substantially as in former years:—Matins and Evensong every Sunday, with celebrations of the Holy Communion on the first and third Sundays of each month, on all the festivals for which a proper preface is appointed in the Communion office, and weekly in Lent. Our congregations have been the same in numbers as in the past, although affected by the causes mentioned above, and also by the continuous inclemency of the weather during the latter part of the Summer and During Lent there was daily Matins, and Evensong, with address on Wednesday and Friday, and daily in Holy Week. The evening services were very well attended; of the morning ones I cannot speak as well.

The Church school still continues its useful work under the same teacher, Miss Hepburn. The School-room has

been newly seated.

By the generous aid of a kind friend of the parish we have been enabled to add \$50 to an Endowment Fund, and thus secure Mr. R. Hamilton's generous offer of \$100.

The members of the Ladies' Guild still continue their labours, and have helped to secure necessary funds for

Church purposes.

Our choir, long in a state of disorganization, owing to removals and sickness, has lately been reorganized, and in connection with this I must mention the name of Mr. A. Veasey, who has been of invaluable help in Church work.

I have held fortnightly evening services at Judd's Mills,

one mile and a half from the village, and have always had good congregations. Although as yet I can see no immediate fruit of my labours, still there is certainly a breaking down of prejudice against the Church. This locality has been for years the home of "Adventism" and other fanatical "isms," so even this softening of feeling is encouraging.

During last Winter I held fortnightly services at Caswell-boro, about four miles from the village, and have recommenced them this Winter. This has been the most discouraging part of my mission. The people are on the whole of a poorer and more uneducated class than elsewhere in the township, and though many claim the Church ministrations at such times as funerals, &c., they are mostly indifferent to religion altogether. Yet to those must the Church go. I am hoping to be able to hold a Sunday afternoon service here during the Winter at intervals.

All Saints, Beebe Plain.—There is not much to chronicle concerning Church work here. The congregations have not been so large perhaps as they used to be occasionally, but the Church has lost her novelty, and there has been formed a very fair body of regular Church attendants and worshippers. Service has been held every Sunday afternoon with an early celebration of Holy Communion once a mouth, and week-day services in Lent and other holy-days. The congregation last Easter agreed to pay \$25 per annum more towards the clergyman's salary, thus bringing up their share to \$125 per annum.

The former Ladies' Guild has been reorganized under the name of "Willing Workers," and is doing useful work.

Commencing with this Advent season we hope to have a morning service here once a month, on which Sunday there will also be an evening service; the members of the congregation agreeing to pay the expenses of a student on this Sunday to enable the elergyman to carry out this plan without omitting any service at Christ Church.

The work of the Church is hindered here by the lack of a resident clergyman. There is a floating population in the village and also a farming community around it, amongst whom a resident clergyman could do a good work. With Stanstead Plain and the surrounding country a clergyman cannot give the time he could desire to this part of the parish, and pastoral visiting in a new field is more effective than even preaching.

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At the beginning of June I commenced a fortnightly service on Sunday afternoons at the Nannis school, about six miles north of Beebe Plain. This I held between my Beebe Plain service and the Stanstead Evensong. I continued until the middle of October with very fair congregations, considering the newness of the field, this being the first time a Church of England service was held here. This district is now comprised within the newly formed Mission of Fitch Bay, from which place it is distant only three miles.

Although the work of the parish during the past year has been somewhat discouraging and trying, we trust that it is the dark hour before the dawn, and must go on faithfully working in the Church's way, knowing that it is God who giveth the increase, and that in due time "we shall reap if we faint not." The great enemy to be encountered in this section is not hostility so much as passive indifference and the lack of a sense of spiritual need which is much harder to encounter.

At St. Giles, two services are held per month. The congregation is small and scattered, and owing to the bad

roads many have been unable to attend this fall.

We are in great need of an Altar cloth. Our present one is completely worn out. Could some kind friends help us in this matter? I would willingly communicate with any so disposed.

At St. Patrick's, one service is held per month, and to Mr. Ross many thanks are due for providing for and keep-

ing the Church in repair

At Scott. I generally hold a service here whenever I pass through to exchange duties with Mr. Debbage, of West Frampton, or on my way to St. George. At present only Mrs. George Pozer resides here, and to her I am greatly indebted for much kindness.

At the distant stations of Cumberland Mills and St.

George's one service a month is held.

At St. George's, I am glad to say, the new Church is near completion and will be soon ready for service. Great credit is due to this small congregation for raising the sum of \$930 for their new Church, and I can only hope that when completed, our friends on the Kennebec Road will be induced to attend our services.

At Cumberland Mills, the services have been well attended. But the great want there is a School-house, and unless outside aid can be procured, I am afraid little will be done

towards the education of this poor congregation.

To one and all I acknowledge the great kindness I have received, and I trust and pray that the Church's work in this Mission may bring forth lasting fruit.

Though the lateness of last Spring caused considerable outlay to the farmers of this district for the purchase of fodder, and the debts contracted thereby will be felt for many years; yet renewed efforts have been made for improving the Church property. On observing that the roof of the Church was failing, the necessary funds were at once collected in the parish, and the Church reshingled. Provision has also been made for completing early in the Spring the other repairs needed for putting the exterior of the building in a thoroughly sound condition.

At a bazaar, held last August, under the superintendence of Mrs. M. G. Mountain and Misses Ross, a sufficient sum

was raised to procure a fine set of Church lamps.

Mrs. M. G. Mountain has, moreover, kindly undertaken to collect, among the generous friends of Quebec, the amount necessary to complete the painting of the inside of the Church. When this shall have been done, this place of worship will vie with any other Church of the country of equal cost.

The services apparently continue to be well appreciated. The attendance is as good as could be expected from the long distances to be travelled, the frequent impracticability

of the roads and the general want of outfit.

We take this opportunity of thanking specially Mrs. M. G. Mountain, for her generous assistance in collecting money, procuring books for the Sunday-school, and providing furniture for the Church; Miss Ross, for attending

at the organ; Mis. Montizambert and Judge Andrews, for their usual donations; and Miss Macadams, for presents to the Sunday-school children.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING COMMITTEE OF THE DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 31ST JULY, 1888.

The total amounts contributed during the year are: Domestic, \$1,436.73; and Foreign, \$1,668.14; making a total of \$3,104.87. Compared with the preceding year's statement this shows an increase of \$278.82 for Foreign Missions, and an apparent decrease of \$444.98 for Domestic Missions. This falling off is, however, in a great measure accounted for by the circumstance mentioned in the Report submitted to the Synod in June last, viz.: that during the previous year there had been an exceptional contribution of \$334.50 for a Memorial Church at Medicine Hat; but after allowing for this, there still remains the fact that the contributions for Domestic Missions for the present year fell short of those for the previous year by the sum of \$110.48. If this exceptional contribution to Medicine Hat is left out of view, the amount contributed this year to both funds is greater by \$168.34 than that contributed during the previous year.

The Committee cannot but express their regret that the contributions for Domestic Missions should have fallen below those of the previous year, and desire to urge on Church people in this Diocese the great needs of the following North Western Dioceses—Rupert's Land, Qu'Appelle and Saskatchewan, and the importance of giving them liberal and timely assistance. If the present opportunity is not taken advantage of, our Church may never be able to obtain a firm position in these distant settlements now so rapidly

rising into prominence.

I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday-Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or.—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of Churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.
