





A Recipe for Bread

EFORE attempting to make bread be quite sure you know toward what end you are directing your efforts. Bread must contain air cells to be light or digestible and these are formed by the yeast plant. Put into the flour, the yeast grows rapidly and throws off a quantity of gas which spreads thru the bread dough and lifts the mixture with it as it rises.

This gas must all leave the flour mixture before it is baked, and so bread is kneaded to squeeze it out and to introduce air which symples sistent recall.

When the bread is light the air cells have grown to the right size and the bread is put to bake. The increased heat stops the growing of the yeast and increases the size of the cells.

Here is a tried and satisfactory recipe. It will make four large or six small loaves of bread and requires six hours: One pint milk and one pint of water, one cake of fresh compressed yeast dissolved in a little of the liquid, two tablespoons of sugar, two teaspoons of salt, two tablespoons of shortening, three quarts of sifted flour.

Scald the pint of milk and cool it, add the water to it, then the salt, sugar and yeast. Warm and sift enough of the flour to make a soft batter and add the shortening. Beat this well with a spoon and immediately work in more warm sifted flour until the dough is heavy enough to turn onto a board to knead. It will be sticky and moist at first, but flour the hands and knead and coax it gently and soon it will work smooth under your hands.

When it no longer sticks to your fingers, but looks light and porous and feels elastic, set in a bowl and cover with a heavy cloth and put it in a warm place (about 80 degrees).

committee shared Mr. Morgan's views,
arguing for the establishment of a regional bank in this territory, which would
represent forty per cent. or more of the
capital of the entire national system.

Secretary McAdoo of the treasury department and Secretary Houston of the
department of agriculture, who compose
the committee, intimated that they did
not share this view, althe both said that
they had reached no decision. Many of
their questions bore upon the feasibility
of making the regional districts more
nearly equal, with perhaps three banks
in the northeast, instead of one.

FOREIGN CORN IS TENDERED FREELY

Wheat and Oats Shared Heaviness at Chicago-Free Imports Expected.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—Cheap offers of shipments from the Danube, as well as from Argentina brought about a downward swing today in corn. The market closed heavy, %c to 1c to 1%c under last night. Wheat finished %c to ½c net lower, oats down ½c to %c, and provisions unchanged to 7½c off.

Prices at which both Danubian and Argentine corn were offered in ship loads to be delivered in Atlantic ports of the United States seemed to many speculators here to indicate probable large sales by Argentina to this country, whatever the result might be in regard to the offers from Europe. Bears ignored despatches from Texas that experience there with the Argentine grain had been unsatisfactory and that Texas buyers were now looking to St. Louis for a supply.

were now looking to St. Louis for a supply.

Lack of any adequate demand for cash corn here had considerable to do with the rapidity with which the price of futures gave way. Except that covering by shorts at the outset furnished impetus for a temporary swell the market thruout suffered from unloading by holders and from speculative selling.

Free imports From Canada.

Chances that free imports from Canada would soon be a reality put wheat bulls at a disadvantage. Millers and investors appeared to be more and more reluctant to buy. There was a show of strength carly, based in part on higher cables and parity on the smallness of receipts northwest of here, but the market soon wavered, especially after corn began to sag. Values displayed no sign of any power to rally.

Pressure from Canadian receipts here

to rally.

Pressure from Canadian receipts here was in the main responsible for oats being to the lowest price of the season for May delivery. For a while pit traders attempted to cling to the bull side, but finally were forced to let go.

Grain longs selling out weakened provisions. Declining prices for hogs tended also to drag down the market.

Only five bodies were ever recovered, according to Pugliese. Pugliese had his feet and neck badly injured. He was in a hospital at Edmonton some time. He stated that on inquiry of any kind had ever been made as to the cause of the accident.






