With the text from John xxi. 15, "Lovest thou Me more than these?" he said he believed they would agree with him that the words were most appropriate for that occasion.

The ceremony of institution and induction was performed by His Grace the Archbishop, and was marked with all the solemn and formal rites appointed for the occasion.

The archbishop, after a declaration of assent from the new incumbent, sat in his chair at the chancel steps, and the minister, instrument of institution which Dr. Cody, kneeling, held before him.

ONLY THE ACTIVE STOCKS HAVE CLOSE SUPPORT

Trading in Cobalt Issues Has Narrowed Down to a Few Leading Stocks.

World Office, Saturday Evening, May 25.

The market for mining stocks has further narrowed down until only the really active shares in the local market are Trethewey and Foster. Many of the other listed stocks have very little support, and if these have to be sold a sacrifice price has to be made in almost every instance. The market has been concerned recently primarily with rumors of the Foster property. The new directors have decided to give the shareholders a better impression of what this property really is, and have engaged the services of a responsible engineer to that end. Talk of buying for control in this stock is not thought to be either feasible or probable, and the advance from the low price of the week was due to the covering of a part of the short interest which opened.

Under the lead of Nipissing the market prices are lower than at any time since an active campaign started in the mining issues. The outside shareholders have in many instances lost all confidence in the situation, and this has resulted in liquidation. Most of the purchases of Trethewey of late were made on behalf of London investors who were buying this stock on account of its dividend and because of the continuous shipments which are being made from the mine.

Much of the future buying in the market, whether for Canadian or outside account, will be made in the same way as that now in effect in Trethewey. The property will have to show intrinsic value before investors will be willing to buy into the shares. This has been in effect since the mining boom started, but it will at the same time give a greater stability to quotations, and improvements in prices made will be more easily maintained. Good development work is going on now under the Foster conditions, and a few weeks hence will see the output from the camp considerably increased. This in itself will provide a foundation for a recovery in public sentiment.

None of the Powers Seem Anxious to Broach the Subject at Hague Conference.

ROME, May 25.—Inasmuch as no agreement has yet presented a concrete proposition regarding additional subjects to be discussed at The Hague conference, the program of the conference probably will be as set forth in the Russian note of Feb. 21, 1906.

Neither is it believed that Great Britain will bring forward a proposal to discuss the question of the limitation of armaments, and according to the status of the negotiations concerning this matter, it will not be taken up by either the United States or Spain. There is reason to believe the latter country will not broach this subject, in spite of the fact that the Russian note of April 3, 1907, made it clear that Madrid had expressed a desire to discuss the limitation of armaments at The Hague.

It is thought here that Foreign Minister Tittoni was aware of Great Britain's decision not to bring up the matter when, in his speech ten days ago, he said: "Premier Campbell-Bannerman, in his speech at Manchester, pronounced the last word on this question, and it agrees that the limitation of armaments is a problem that must be reserved for further solution."
