DRAW THE LINE AT TARTE

Mr. Beauséjour Declines to Act With Mr. Laurier's Cabinet

FOUR ACCLAMATIONS PROBABLE

A Saw-Off Rumored as Regards Bagot and St. Hyacinthe

Montreal, June 15.—(Special.)—It now looks as if Berthier, Dorchester, Bagot and St. Hyacinthe would return members to-morrow by acclamation, and that is Mr. Beauséjour's one consolation. The members of the Government decided to offer him no opposition, in view of the fact that he has determined to break with Hon. Mr. Laurier on the tariff and other less important questions. It is also known that Mr. Beauséjour has notified Mr. Laurier that while Tarde is in the Liberal party the Tarde is in the Liberal party the Tarde is in the Liberal party.

Mr. Tallon's Hard Fight

There will be no acclamations in the Eastern Townships, and Hon. W. B. Ives will be at Sherbrooke for the nomination, while Mr. Angers will be in Quebec and Hon. Mr. Desjardins in Richelieu. The Grtis have been warring far and wide that the Hon. O. Tallon would retire from the field in Chamby-Verchères, and stand for the Conservatives, but this is absolutely untrue.

The Postmaster-General will stick to his county, win or lose, and he is making a gallant fight in the Liberal ranks. He has spoken so frequently that he has almost lost his voice, and will be obliged to have Mr. Dupont in his place to-day at Longueuil.

The school question has had no effect whatever on the minds of the French electors in the cities, yet there are strong indications that the Liberal case in the rural parts of the province. In quite a number of counties the Liberal majority are already increasing certain defeat by making all sorts of charges against the clergy and the Government, and are already in possession of the rural parts of the province.

There is certainly a lack of enthusiasm about Hon. Mr. Laurier since his return from Ontario. The Diagraphical which appeared in The Toronto World of October last, had been translated into French, and a great many copies were in a printing office in this city some 3000 were appropriated and carried to Mr. Laurier's private office on Notre-Dame-street. A new issue, however, was only a question of a very short time, and to-day the interesting career of the ex-member for L'Islet is being read by every woman and child in the constituency. Even the Liberals now admit that Mr. Laurier's record is a very good one, and say it is only a question as to how large Mr. Bergeron's majority will be on the 22nd of June.

Has This Vessel Been Lost?

GREAT RECEPTION AT BERLIN.

Sir Charles Tupper Pays a Visit to the German City.

Forecast of the Revolution Regarding the Cooperation of Manitoba to be Submitted to the Executive Session of the Special Committee Appointed to Deal With the Subject—Next Year's Conference-Delegates Visit Government House To-day.

Feeling is evidently running high in the Methodist Conference over Remedial Legislation. Yesterday two separate but vain attempts were made to precipitate the discussion of a question which has been standing for some days, on the conference program.

At the morning session, Mr. J. J. MacLaren, Q.C., moved that the order of business be suspended for the purpose of immediately considering the matter.

This attempt was balked, however, when Rev. Dr. Pearson stated that the special committee which had been appointed to draft a resolution, for submission to the Conference was not ready with its report.

After some discussion, it was decided to place the committee's report first on the order of business for 9 o'clock this morning.

Again, late in the afternoon, just before the adjournment, but when the attendance had become pretty well thinned out, Rev. Dr. Pearson moved for a suspension of the order program, and immediate consideration of the subject.

This motion, it is said, was sprung with a view to disposing of the question in the absence of Rev. Dr. Poole and Mr. W. R. Howell, the men who are looked upon as taking the strongest position among the two factions—Remedial and Non-Remedial.

The proposition, however, was defeated as a number of those absent members who were expected to debate to take place this morning.

The special committee has completed its work and the report which it will bring in this morning will be the result of the committee's deliberations.

It is understood that the committee will maintain strict silence as regards their decision, but that the nature of the report will be made known to the members of the Conference, either by the committee or by the Government's Remedial Bill, or by any other means.

In the last meeting, it was intended to indicate that the Conference objects to the proposed suspension of the order of sending a commission to Manitoba.

A bomb was exploded in the Conference yesterday morning—a resolution brought in by the Committee on the subject of the Government's Remedial Bill, and the consequences of the explosion were not without effect.

The report, after reciting that the over-throw of the pending elections by the Government, and that all legislators who shirked their duty in regard to it should be rebuked, both in the House of Commons and in the Senate, and that the Government should send a commission to Manitoba.

GREENWAY SHOWS HIS HAND

Manitoba Premier Says He's Working the School Issue

For All it is Worth With the Electors of His Province, and He Cannot See Where the Opposition Can Lose—His Agents Claim That They Will Sweep the Province.

Winnipeg, June 15.—(Special.)—Premier Greenway, who is kept very busy on the stump these days, came rest on the city on Sunday for a brief rest. Speaking of the many meetings he has held in the honor roll of national celebrities, there was immense disappointment when the Ontario Premier began to speak English and could only be heard by about 200 and understood by half that number. "Mr. Francis," he said, "I never fail to bring prominently before the electors. I tell them, as Premier of this province, if they send down Government candidates, they are voting for Separate schools, and if the electors show their votes that they want such a change in their educational system, why I shall not oppose it if a Remedial Bill is passed next session. But I can reliably inform me that the province will be swept by the Opposition candidates. Our forces are well organized, we have the popular vote, and we are victorious, and I cannot see where we can lose."

SIR OLIVER HANDICAPPED.

Mr. Laurier Led to Appeal to French Politicians to Get Him a Hearing in English.

Montreal, June 15.—(Special.)—The demonstration in honor of Hon. Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Oliver Mowat, held in the Duluth-street rink, was attended by about 6000 people. The Liberal leader had lost his voice, and only spoke about 15 minutes, when Sir Oliver was introduced. The meeting was exclusively French-Canadian, and as the Little Premier had been presented to the masses as the saviour of their race and only second to St. Jean Baptiste himself in the honor roll of national celebrities, there was immense disappointment when the Ontario Premier began to speak English and could only be heard by about 200 and understood by half that number. "Mr. Francis," he said, "I never fail to bring prominently before the electors. I tell them, as Premier of this province, if they send down Government candidates, they are voting for Separate schools, and if the electors show their votes that they want such a change in their educational system, why I shall not oppose it if a Remedial Bill is passed next session. GOLD CARRIES THE DAY.

The Proceedings of the Republicans at St. Louis Yesterday Assisted the Financial Panic.

St. Louis, June 15.—Gold has carried the day. The assertion made through the United Press by Senator Henry Woodruff, at an early hour this afternoon, put a new phase on the financial panic, and overruled several plans which had been formed by the Republicans. There is a rumor that the late Senator Woodruff, who was a member of the committee on resolutions favoring the gold standard, and that two or three days ago he had written to follow suit, thus assuring a cash majority.

The Ohio men somewhat reluctantly recognized that Mr. Lodge was speaking by the card. George A. Robertson, editor of The Cleveland Record, who has made a specialty of attacking the views of the Ohio leaders in this matter, saw ex-Secretary Foster, and asked him if he did not know that the people all through northern Ohio were for silver. He replied: "The Ohio men are Republicans, and they will stand by silver. Free silver is a heresy, and they do not want it."

To-day's proceedings seem not only to have settled the financial panic, but the tariff plank also of the platform. A sketch of the proposed tariff propositions, which is said, was either drawn up by Major McKinley approval, proposes an increase of duties all along the line sufficient for the needs of the Treasury and the requirements of protective duties on wool and sugar.

The first paragraphs of the platform are devoted to a denunciation of the Democratic policy of protection, which has prevailed during the past few years, and a laudation of the Republican policy of reciprocity. There is a strong recommendation for the renewal of the McKinley tariff, and also a recommendation for the imposition of 10 per cent duty on imports from foreign countries, as foreshadowed in Governor Foraker's statements, published this morning. The language of the platform is described as forceful, alliterative and full of catchy phrases such as "Bring down the tariff."

All the talk among the advanced silver men to-night is in favor of bolting the platform. The Committees on Resolutions voted down, as, of course, it will be.

TRADE WITHIN THE EMPIRE.

Mr. E. B. Oiler's Motion Again Endorsed in London.

BY THE EMPIRE TRADE LEAGUE

After an Interesting Speech by Sir Joseph G. Colmer.

Secretary of the Canadian High Commissioner in London—The League Advised to Keep the Zollverein in View and a Reduction in Duties on Certain Commodities From the Colonies is Suggested.

London, June 15.—A conference of the United Empire Trade League was held in this city to-day for the purpose of discussing the question of a commercial federation of the Empire. The Right Hon. James Lowther, M.P., formerly Under Secretary for the Colonies and Chief Secretary of Ireland, presided.

Sir Joseph G. Colmer, Secretary to the Canadian High Commissioner in London, made a speech, which he lengthily referred to the motion made by Mr. E. B. Oiler of Toronto, Ont., at the recent Congress of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, declaring that it was a step which should be taken to keep the Zollverein from a closer union of the Empire would justify an arrangement as early as possible in the nature of a preliminary conference of the Empire. The freest exchange of commodities within the Empire consistent with the tariff requirements incident to the maintenance of the local government of each part of the Empire. Sir Joseph advised the League to keep the Zollverein in view, but declared it was not practical now owing to the fact that some of the colonies were unable to place the duties in the revenue that would follow from such a union. He stated that the conference should urge upon the Government to abrogate as soon as possible the tariff on goods from the Zollverein, Belgium and Germany which prevented the colonies from giving preferential treatment to British goods. The conference should be summoned. The motions were adopted.

What The Times Says.

The Times will say to-morrow it is believed that the Government will favorably receive a request from Canada, and other of the great colonies, to call a conference to consider a Zollverein, or other trade arrangement. The anniversary of the Queen's accession to the throne, it is added, would be a suitable occasion for such a gathering. It is obvious that the request must originate from a colonial government.

WANT B.B.E. INSTRUCTION.

NO SEPARATE SCHOOLS.

DELIVERANCE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY.

Wrong to Apply Public Funds for Separation - Favors Adjustments Which May Satisfy the Minority 1. Manitoba - Report showing Work in All Schemes of the Churches.

The decided stand taken by the Presbyterian Church on the question of separate schools was shown by the enthusiastic cheers with which the General Assembly yesterday greeted the resolution submitted by Principal Cayven and Principal King. The text of the deliverance is as follows: "This General Assembly, while in common with former Assemblies, attaching great importance to the religious character of public education, is strongly opposed to the restoration of separate schools in Manitoba, as involving the application of public funds to what is in its nature a purely private and unchristian purpose."

The Assembly expresses disapproval of any legislative or governmental action in the matter of education which is intended to confer privileges upon one section of the community that are denied to the other. It disapproves of any attempt to remove alleged grievances connected with the establishment of National schools in Manitoba by remedial action of the Dominion, and especially of any legislation, such as has been proposed, "legislation of this character, which is intended to lift up its voice against the Constitution, is not required by it, in its variance with its spirit and its letter, and is followed by very hurtful consequences. The Assembly cannot, indeed, regard the establishment of separate schools, in any case, as a satisfactory solution of the educational problem occasioned by diversity in religious belief."

In the interest of civil and religious liberty the General Assembly deems it its duty to stand up for its authority against all procedure which is intended to impair the authority, and thereby the fullness of the faith, and especially by the imposition of other questions which involve moral elements is always competent to churches, and may become their distinct duty. The General Assembly would earnestly deprecate any attempt on the part of any church to place itself above the state in the civil sphere, or to dictate to its adherents (members) in the exercise of their civic rights. The Assembly still hopes that the province of Manitoba may remove existing difficulties on the subject of public education, by such adjustments as, while preserving the principle of National schools, may satisfy any reasonable claims of the minority."

It was ordered that the resolution be printed and sent to the Committee on Bills and Ordinances. The Day's Business. The annual reports of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund were presented.
