WHAT MR. MARKS EXPECTS

McKenzie and Mann Will, He Believes, Run Their Railroad to the Pacific.

DRUMMERS TO BE SENT OUT

The Object Being to Fill Up the Fertile Valleys Around Port Arthur With Settlers.

Montreal, March 5.—(Special.)—We people of Port Arthur believe it to be the ultimate intention of McKenzie and Mann to extend their railway system to the Pacific Ocean. The above statement was made to-day by Mayor George T. Marks of Port Arthur, who is now in Montreal, and who is most enthusiastic over the possibilities of the Canadian lake port. He has also a scheme for filling up the fertile valleys of the State, the White Fish, the Kamistiquia and the Black Sturgeon Rivers with settlers from Ontario and other parts of the continent. In the near future speakers will be sent all over the Premier Province, enlightening the population upon what the Mayor calls a farmers' paradise. Besides this, the Rev. H. A. Harris, of this sect called Disciples, has already started in upon a campaign amongst his co-religionists of the Southern and Western States. "Campbellites" have decided to take up land in Western Algoma. Mr. Marks states, and he adds that potatoes, which are to-day a dollar a bushel in Port Arthur, are never less than fifty cents. He then proceeded to give some details touching the progress and ultimate destiny of the vast undertaking which McKenzie and Mann are so vigorously carrying forward. From Port Arthur to Winnipeg, by the Ontario and Rainy River Railway, the distance will be 1425 miles, or two miles less than by the Canadian Pacific, and it goes through a country, the Mayor says, that will provide a paying traffic from the start. He told The World that about 305 miles were as good as finished, and that, while 400 men are now at work, this number will be increased to a little army when spring opens. Mr. Marks says that the first spring consignment of Doukhobors has been promised to that section, and the promoters expect to have the road completed from Port Arthur to the capital of Manitoba in order to secure their share of the carriage of the wheat crop of 1907. "And where will all this end?" he was asked, and it was here that His Lordship gave utterance to the words quoted at the head of this despatch. They will, he thinks, gradually extend the Dominion Railway in a northwesterly direction, and in a few years reach the Pacific by one of the easy northern passes.

OLD ENGLISH TOWNS MENACED.

Historic Buildings of Dunwich Are Being Swallowed Up by the Old Ocean.

London, March 6.—Reports from Dunwich, Aldenburgh and Southwold, three towns on the east coast of England, state that during and since the recent hurricanes the sea has made alarming inroads upon the shore. Dunwich has suffered more than any town on the coast. This was at one time one of the largest commercial cities of England, though it is now but a small village. In the last century it had a great number of chapels and monastic institutions, all of which, except the ruins of All Saints' Church, have been washed away by the sea. And now a number of private residences have been swept into the deep, and the remainder of the village is threatened with destruction by the waves. An old chronicle records that a wood called East Wood of the King's Forest extended several miles southeast of the town, but many years ago it was destroyed by the sea. In an eruption of the sea in 1730 the roots of a great number of trees were exposed. The sea has made menacing encroachments on the small town of Aldenburgh. This place was also considerably larger in the last century. At Southwold, since a recent survey, the sea has gained upon the coast more than a mile. Many thousands of pounds are being spent on defence works.

BURGLARS IN DRESS SUITS.

They Drive in a Carriage to Their Work and Are Giving Chicago Police Lots of Trouble.

Chicago, March 4.—Four burglars in dress suits, fully armed, driving to the houses of their victims in a carriage, are the latest novelty in Chicago criminal circles. The thieves have worked on the West Side, and especially in the Maxwell-street district, and have caused the police no end of annoyance. Early this morning they entered a flat building at 325 LaSalle-street, choked a woman into insensibility and chiselled a family. They were pursued by police and citizens, but made their escape by leaping into a carriage which was waiting on a corner a short distance away. A dozen shots were fired at the thieves and they returned the fire, but, as far as is known, no one was injured.

LIBERAL RALLY AT REGINA.

Richardson and Oliver Will Be There—Government Ownership of Railways All the Talk.

Winnipeg, March 5.—(Special.)—The Liberals of Regina will hold a grand rally on March 11. Messrs. Richardson and Oliver, members of Parliament, will attend. Government ownership of railways is in everybody's mouth now, and the day of bonanzas at least seems to be approaching an end as far as the West is concerned.

BACK FROM BUFFALO.

The Three Men Charged With Daylight Robbery in Victoria-Street Are Now in Toronto.

Inspector Stark and Detective Cuddy returned from Buffalo on Saturday evening, where they went to bring back the three prisoners who are supposed to be the assailants of Henry Aspdon and his daughter. Little time was lost there, for the officers made a flying trip. They left the Union Station at 9 o'clock on Saturday morning and arrived in Buffalo at 12.20 p.m. Little time was lost there for the officers drove to the police station, took charge of the prisoners and were back on the train for Toronto in 25 minutes. Toronto was reached about 6 o'clock and the suspects were driven to No. 1 Station. One of the prisoners when asked his name jocularly asked if their heads were made of wood. He is named George Black, Fred Chambers and William Tinsley. There was also a warrant waiting for Tinsley charging him with assaulting a woman with whom he lived recently on West Adelaide-street. The two will also be charged with burglary at the home of Thomas McCully at 648 East Gerrard, a few hours after the Victoria-street outrage. The prisoners agreed to come back without extradition proceedings.

MISS ASPDON RECOVERING.

Miss Lizzie Aspdon, who, with her father, Henry Aspdon, of Victoria-street, was attacked and brutally assaulted a week ago by two men, was able yesterday to be up for the first time since the assault. Dr. Hodggets, who is in attendance, says that she will recover.

THAT CHAIN FERRY.

Ald. Hanlan Propounds a New Scheme, Using the Brock-Street Wharf on the North Side.

A new, and to a lay mind, a plausible scheme for overcoming the chain ferry deadlock, occasioned by the C.P.R., is evolved by Ald. Hanlan. It is to run the ferry from Brock-street wharf extending, instead of to Queen's wharf, to the west end of Brock-street wharf, or at least a pier from it, out to say two-thirds of the way to the wharf in order that the essential straight course for the ferry might be possible past the Northern pier to the immediate west of Brock-street.

KING SOLOMON'S TENT.

A meeting of King Solomon's Tent of the Knights of the Macabees was held Saturday evening in Shaftesbury Hall. Party members of the "Commanders" and Past Commanders' association were present. H. E. Trent and Louis Gurofsky were elected delegates to the provincial camp meeting in London on March 23. The tent then adjourned and the committee held a session in which they decided to ask the city tents to send delegates to form a hospital fund. A committee was appointed to devise a scheme to raise money to carry on the work of the association. It was decided to get out a directory of all the tents and members belonging to the order and upon motion of Louis Gurofsky, seconded by H. E. Trent, it was further decided that a directory should be the Printers' Union label. Willoughby was recommended for the position of deputy supreme commander.


