# GEN. WHITE'S FORCES FOUGHT HOT BATTLE ON TATHAM'S FARM

## It is Estimated That 800 Boers Were Killed, Wounded and Captured in the Skirmish of Thursday Last—Mounted Boers Were Captured.

### Shelling of Ladysmith Continues—Will Buller's First Move be Towards the Relief of White?—Why Colenso and Stormberg Were Evacuated—Steyn Issues a Proclamation—Arrival of the Troops en Route May be Delayed.

General White and his forces seem to be holding their own at Ladysmith even if they are beleaguered. A reliable messenger who arrived at Estcourt, Natal, on Saturday soon says that heavy fighting occurred around Ladysmith on Thursday. There was a hot engagement on Tatham's Farm, where the enemy were driven back with great loss. Thirty mounted Boers were captured. It is estimated that the Boers lost 800 killed, wounded and captured in this battle.

There has been unnecessary alarm at Pietermaritzburg owing to the evacuation of Colenso, and the Natal naval corps with guns have returned to that town to reassure the inhabitants.

President Steyn has issued a proclamation calling on the Orange Free State Boers to support the Transvaal.

A Stormberg despatch says 2000 Boers are now near Stormberg awaiting the arrival of 3000 reinforcements from Bloemfontein before moving on Stormberg. This is the Cape Colony town that Buller decided not to defend just at this juncture.

The chief motive for the withdrawal from Colenso by the British was that the long range guns of the Boers made the position untenable. The Durban Light Infantry and the Dublin Fusiliers are now at Estcourt, Natal. They carried their supplies with them.

It is now believed that Gen. Sir Redvers Buller's first move will be made for the relief of the beleaguered British at Ladysmith. The Admiralty has prepared the public for a delay in the arrival of the army corps in South Africa.

### IT WAS A FIERCE BATTLE.

800 Boers Killed and Wounded by Gen. White's Forces on Thursday Last.

Estcourt, Natal, Saturday, Nov. 4.—It is reported that the Boers lost 800 in killed, wounded and captured in Thursday's battle on Tatham's Farm, near Ladysmith.

**A Hot Battle.**  
A reliable messenger has just arrived from Ladysmith, passing the Boer lines during the night, who reports that heavy fighting occurred on Thursday around Ladysmith.

The hottest engagement was at George Tatham's farm on the Orange Free State side of Bester's. The British drove the Boers back to their camp. The enemy suffered great loss and thirty mounted Boers were captured.

**Fighting Resumed on Friday.**  
The fighting was resumed Friday, the Boers firing from Nosdwaishana Hill, near Pempworth's farm. Again they were driven back with loss on their camp.

**Tore Up the Rails.**  
A large Boer force, with artillery, under John Wessels, has taken up a position on the left of Beaton, located on the Woodhouse, Pielcones and Langvachart farms, firing Bester's, and a small commando is now camped on the south side of Pieter's Station, commanding the railway. The Boers have torn up the culverts of the railway near Pieter's Station and have burned the wooden portions.

**No Damage at Colenso.**  
No damage has been yet done at Colenso. The houses, stores, railway and iron bridges remain intact.

The messenger says he heard that the Boers would be in Colenso to-day (Saturday) and that the volunteers were leaving.

**No Need for Alarm.**  
Much regret is felt at the unnecessary alarm created at Pietermaritzburg when there is no need for it.

The Natal naval corps with guns will return to Mariburg to-day to reassure the inhabitants.

### REVIEW OF THE SITUATION.

Buller's First Move is Believed to be the Relief of Gen. White at Ladysmith.

London, Nov. 7.—(4.30 a.m.)—This morning's news carries public knowledge with respect to hostilities in South Africa very little farther than the evacuation of Colenso and Stormberg.

These movements taken together with the Admiralty announcement, that the public must not be disappointed should the transports not reach their destination on the dates indicated in the published lists, may indicate some change of plan suggested by the battle of Ladysmith.

Natal. It was expected that the army corps would land near Cape Town for an invasion of the Transvaal through the Orange Free State, but the landing may now be diverted to Durban, Natal, whither it is fully expected Gen. Sir Redvers Buller will go

# THE TRANSVAAL

## WOLESELEY ON THE BOERS.

They Are the Most Ignorant People He Ever Met—Their Aim to Rule South Africa.

London, Nov. 7.—General Lord Woleseley, the Commander-in-Chief, who was the guest of the Authors' Club last evening, said that the short-service system in the British army had at last been acknowledged as the right one, even by its most strenuous opponents. Discussing the situation in South Africa, the field marshal remarked: "In my various commands I have learned much of Boer character, and I can say truthfully that the Boers as a people are the most ignorant with which I have ever been brought into contact. Their intention is to rule the whole of South Africa. This is a point the English people must keep before them. There are ups and downs in warfare, and the disappointments we have suffered are having the good effect of bringing the English people closer together."

### TO MOVE ON STORMBERG.

2000 Boers Are Now Waiting for 3000 Reinforcements Before the Move.

London, Nov. 7.—The Daily Mail has received the following despatch from Stormberg, dated last Friday evening: "An Orange Free State force, 2000 strong, is now at Popen's Farm, half way between the Orange River and Burgersdorp. The Boers are waiting there for the arrival of 3000 reinforcements from Bloemfontein and Bloemfontein. The Boers are now in a third Free State force at Coliberg. The signalling in the Boer camp was plainly visible from here last night."

### EVACUATION OF COLENSO.

The Position Was Untenable Owing to the Long Range of the Boer Guns.

Estcourt, Natal, Friday, Nov. 3.—Colenso is now in the hands of the Boers. Before the evacuation was decided upon, the enemy tried to cut our outposts. The Durban Light Infantry, under Lieut. Moxey, and a force of Dublin Fusiliers were sent to the relief of the outposts and a brisk fight ensued. The Boers were repulsed, leaving 12 dead. Twenty Boer horses were killed and the others stampered.

### Motive for the Withdrawal.

The chief motive for the withdrawal of the Boers had made the position untenable. No orders were received for retirement. While retirement was in progress the Natal Volunteers at Fort Wylie had great difficulty in getting away their nine-pounder in the dark. They were advised to spike the gun, but were exceedingly unwilling to do this, resolving to make a dash for it to take it with them. While they were running the gun on its carriage down a hill, the ropes broke and the carriage rushed on, the latter being smashed at the bottom of the incline.

### They Saved the Gun.

Nothing daunted, they follow up a detour to carry the weapon itself, which had not been damaged, and they got her safely. The Boers shelled Colenso camp at dawn to-day, being apparently unaware of the evacuation. They loaded the stores, but did not harm the bridges, saying that they would want the railway themselves. The women and children here are crowding the trains bound for Pietermaritzburg and Durban.

### Watched by a Cruiser.

The morning Post, heard from Maceru, Basutoland, that the Boer attempts to incite the Basutos against the British have failed.

### Natal Has a Claim.

It is understood that when the troops comes to arrange terms of peace Natal will claim an apportionment of territory which, besides recompensing the colony for losses sustained, will place it in a position less open to attack in future.

### Has There Been Another Fight?

There are renewed rumors of another engagement at Blandslangte, with severe Boer losses.

### Lord Charles Beresford

Says If There is an Uprising of the Blacks More Troops Must Be Sent South.

London, Nov. 7.—Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, speaking at Sunderland last evening, confessed that he regarded with great apprehension what might be the attitude of the blacks toward the vanquished when the British had conquered the Empire and calculated to ward off any undue European declaration.

IF LEVYS SAID SO, HE LIED.

Intervention of France, Russia and Germany in the Transvaal Not Assured.

Berlin, Nov. 7.—Commenting upon a rumor from Amsterdam, that Dr. Leyds's diplomatic representative of the Transvaal in Europe, had declared that the intervention of France, Russia and Germany in

the Transvaal was understood to be the Kolnische Zeitung says: "We do not know what Dr. Leyds may have said, but the matter of his supposed statement is false in every respect. Neither France nor Russia has shown the slightest inclination, either with or without Germany, to set the South African question on the order of the day."

### THE WAR PARTY TRIUMPHED.

A Bye-Election in Exeter Resulted in an Increased Unionist Majority.

London, Nov. 6.—A Parliamentary bye-election was held in Exeter to-day to fill the vacancy created by the recent appointment of Sir Henry Stafford Northcote as steward and bailiff of the Chiltern Hundreds, as a preliminary to his appointment as Governor of Bombay. The result was the return of the Conservative and Unionist candidate, Sir Edgar Vincent, by a majority of 659 votes over his Liberal and Radical opponent, Allan Bright of Liverpool. The polling was as follows: Sir Edgar Vincent, 4699; Allan Bright, 3371; Conservative majority 659. The Conservative majority at the last general election, when Sir Henry Stafford Northcote was returned, was 54, so that Sir Edgar Vincent's victory means a substantial increase in the Unionist majority at Exeter.

Sir Edgar Vincent, the newly-elected member of Parliament for Exeter, was previously president of the Council of the Ottawa Public School, and finance adviser to the Egyptian Government. He is now in his 43rd year.

### MINERS APPEAL TO LAURIER

To Enforce the Alien Labor Law and Keep Foreigners Out of the Slovan.

"WE ARE BRITISH SUBJECTS," SAYS A CABLE CORRESPONDENT.

They Say, and They Ask Protection for Themselves and Their Families.

Vancouver, Nov. 6.—The following is a copy of a telegram sent by the Sandominians' Union to Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "One thousand Canadian miners and their families, are being driven out of Canada by the importation of foreign labor from the United States. The mine owners of the Slovan are importing men to take our place, and are dependent on our labor, as well as we ourselves, appeal to you to assist us in securing the enforcement of the alien labor law. As British subjects, we naturally desire to see from our native land. Will you, as First Minister of the Crown, secure for us the protection which the alien labor law provides? Please assure us by an immediate reply that we will have your co-operation."

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### THE WAR KILLED HOME RULE.

This is One of the Effects of the Irishmen's Talk in the House of Commons.

SAYS A CABLE CORRESPONDENT.

Liberal Members Say Their Self-Respect Will Suffer if They Ally With the "Traitors."

New York, Nov. 6.—A special cable despatch from London says: The principal effect of the Transvaal war on the internal politics of England thus far has been to alienate most of the Liberals from the Irish Home Rule movement. The Irish members of Parliament who have so strenuously objected to the war, and who have stopped at no charges against Great Britain, have disgusted Liberals as much as Conservatives. The Liberals, before anything else, are openly censured by the Irish members, and they feel that their self-respect will suffer if they ally themselves with the "traitors" who have shown by their recent conduct that the British Empire is hateful to them.

The speeches delivered by Mr. Dillon, Patrick O'Brien, William Redmond, J. J. Sullivan and other Irish Nationalist leaders are openly censured by the Liberals as the utterances of traitors. The Irish policy which has been generally speaking to abstain from attacking measures endorsed by the Liberals. Their anti-English feeling has, however, got the better of them in this instance, and by their withdrawal from their own viewpoint is impossible. Farther than this, they have put the Opposition in a fair way to rejuvenate itself.

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### THEY TALKED AND RAN AWAY.

Sifton, Greenway and Fraser Determined to Live to Talk Another Day.

AFRAID TO FACE MR. PERCIVAL.

The Political Situation in Manitoba is Getting Very Warm Just About Now.

Morden, Man., Nov. 6.—(Special.)—This evening Mr. Sifton and D. C. Fraser addressed a large meeting in Morden. The greater portions of both speeches were apparently addressed to dissatisfied Liberals. Mr. Sifton's remarks were received with occasional applause, which was not particularly hearty; but Mr. Fraser's humorous and roasting oratory awakened laughter and applause frequently.

At the Crystal City meeting, the chairman promised to hear Spencer Percival at the close of the speeches by Messrs. Sifton and Greenway, but instead, hurriedly closed the meeting. Mr. Percival, then, was surprised at the cowardice of the speakers and at the conduct of the chairman in breaking his promise. He said Mr. Sifton had made some statements that were utterly devoid of truth, and then ignominiously fled to avoid criticism. He intimated that there would be another meeting in the town, and that the friends of Mr. Sifton would be treated fairly and courteously, and allowed a hearing.

Many of the audience were surprised and disgusted at the cowardice displayed by Messrs. Greenway, Sifton and Fraser, and marvelled that any man calling themselves Liberals should be afraid of full discussion. Mr. Percival is opposing Premier Greenway in the local contest.

## NOT A BRIGHT DAY FOR YOUNG DAVIS.

### Bank Robbery Case in Winnipeg Developed More Sensations Yesterday.

### SOME CHICAGO WITNESSES

### Swore They Would Not Believe Him on Oath—Very Strong Insinuations Made.

### ANDERSON WENT INTO THE BOX.

### Swore He Knew Nothing About the Robbery and That Davis Lied.

Winnipeg, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—At the Mohr sons Bank robbery trial to-day Harry Carr, bank clerk, Pembina, North Dakota, was called. He said that in a man who came into his bank on Dec. 31, 1898, resembled Detective Davis. The only difference was that the man present had a heavier mustache than the young man who came into the bank on Dec. 31, 1898, and stood at the customer's counter on the opposite side of the room from the teller's window. Later this young man came up to the window and said he wanted to get a draft. Going into details, the young man said he wanted a draft for \$1700 on Kansas City for Perry Cook. His own name, the customer said, was Fred W. Baker. He got the draft made out and the young man threw down some currency, and among other things, a \$1000 Dominion of Canada bill. This staggered the witness and he demurred to take the money. He asked the man where he lived and he said in New York, and that he was going to Chicago. He examined the bill closely and finally decided to give the money. To Mr. Howell: If Davis was in Mitchell, Ont., on Dec. 31, 1898, of course he could not have been in the bank. Would Not Believe Davis. Several Chicago witnesses who knew Davis swore they would not believe him under oath. Two were women who called themselves "sisters," but swore their husbands were alive. Francis W. Scott, foreman of a gang on C. P. R., was positive that Davis fit the valise by the handle, and it was not correct when Davis stated that he pulled out the valise by the end from the place where it was buried. Whittle was not there when Davis pulled up the valise from the other side of the railway crossing, some distance away, and came running up when Davis showed it. The valise was here produced, and witness said that it had been considerably changed since he saw it. The handle, he said, was not since he saw it.

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SHALL THE CURFEW RING?

Christian Temperance Women Urged the Markets Committee to Introduce the System.

THE COMMITTEE PASSED IT ON

And Recommend the Council to Make it Law—Other Civic Business—General News.

Ald. Stewart moved, seconded by Ald. Reid, that the Council be recommended to pass a curfew by-law, and with the assistance of Ald. Board, who, however, reserved the right to oppose the by-law in council, the motion carried. Ald. Findlay and Ald. Smith opposing.

The sub-committee on lighting the Civic Buildings recommended that a five-year contract for electric lighting at the present rates, with 40 per cent. off, be accepted.

Rules as to Scavengers. The Board of Health this evening received a report from the sub-committee appointed to revise the rules regulating scavengers. The whole matter was gone over at length, and the report was adopted. The chief change is that the scavengers shall not collect garbage and rubbish from large manufacturers or printing establishments, nor will they remove such refuse as is piled up and ends left behind by builders.

Reopening of Central Organ. A concert to mark the reopening of the greatly improved organ in Central Church was held this evening. The organ was played by G. Geiger, and Mrs. Palmer, Mrs. Mackelcan, Harold Jarvis of Detroit, Charles Spalding and J. E. P. Aldous took part.

Orangemen and Guy Fawkes. The Orangemen's banquet to-night to mark the destruction of the Gunpowder Plot was held in Thompson's Hall, and the members and their wives were present. James A. Hutton presided. There was a large crowd.

Death of Young Stipe. This evening the coroner's jury in the case of the death of Walter N. Stipe was concluded and the jury returned a verdict that the death was due to a fall from a height of about 200 feet. WHEAT PRICES ARE BETTER

Liverpool Cables Gave Encouragement to Market.

Trade Was Not Large and Fluctuations Were Narrow—Market Had a Firm Undertone—Foreign Markets Generally Firm—Latest Commercial News.

Monday Evening, Nov. 6. The Chicago wheat market had a better tone today, and though trading was light there was a tendency toward buying. Cables were more encouraging. Closing quotations were: December 86c and May 72 1/2c to 73c.

Liverpool December wheat today closed 1/2 higher than on Saturday, March 54 1/2 higher and May 74 1/2 higher.

Receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth last week 154,243 cars, as against 153,343 cars last Monday and 178,000 cars a year ago. Car receipts at Chicago were: Wheat 311, car 600, oats 358.

Stocks of wheat to-day: New York 6,128,000 bushels, Minneapolis 10,200,000 bushels, St. Louis 2,423,000 bushels, Toledo 2,148,000 bushels, Duluth 7,714,000 bushels, Milwaukee 15,277 bushels, Detroit 705,457 bushels, Montreal 18,872 bushels.

**A HITCH HAS OCCURRED.**  
France and China Have a Little Trouble on Hand Over a Boundary Question.

Paris, Nov. 6.—A despatch has been received here from Vice-Admiral Courtes, the French commander in Chinese waters, announcing that the negotiations for the demarcation of the Kwangchow territory, which had been proceeding satisfactorily for some time, have been abruptly interrupted by the Chinese Admiral, who has been ordered by the Viceroy of the Canton. The French Minister of Marine, M. de Lamoignon, announces that he has taken measures to strengthen the French force in occupation.

**PRODIGAL SON FORGIVEN.**  
Well-Educated Finlander Who Went Down Through Drink.

Houghton, Mich., Nov. 6.—Victor Matson, a University graduate and son of one of the oldest and wealthiest families in Michigan, took to drink and was drowned. He came to America as a student, and held good positions, obtained by superior education and ability, but lost them successively through drink. Finally he sank to a day laborer's stand, and the family became dependent on charity. Friday a letter from Finland announced the death of his father, and the forgiveness of the prodigal, who inherits the entire estate, valued at half a million marks. When Matson finally realized the facts he burst into tears, hunted up the destitute wife and children, and after taking the pledge before Judge Curtis, formally assigned his entire interest in the estate to his wife and family, who will return to Finland.

Lieut. Col. W. H. Cotton, assistant adjutant-general for artillery, will act as chief staff officer until further orders.  
It is understood Col. Foster is going to England.

**YOUNG SCHOOL TEACHER SHOT.**  
An Accidental Discharge Was Followed by Death.

Comber, Ont., Nov. 6.—F. Charwin of 791 Burgoyne Road, a young man of about 20 years of age, and school teacher by profession, met with a fatal accident Saturday afternoon. He, with two other young men, were in the woods for a day's sport. One of them was in the act of loading his gun, when the hammer slipped and the reason of the accident. The bullet entered the leg of Charwin above the knee. On Sunday the leg was amputated, but the young man died while under the operation. The bone of the leg was badly shattered.

**MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR, THIS.**  
George Gouin Was Shot and His Partner is Under Arrest.

Calgary, N.W.T., Nov. 6.—Late on Saturday afternoon George Gouin was probably fatally wounded with a revolver, besides receiving a severe blow on the temple. It is not known who fired the shot, but a warrant was issued for the arrest of Mr. Harris, Mr. Gouin's partner. Mrs. Harris was bound to appear before a magistrate. The letter came here a bride a few months ago. All concerned are well known and highly respected. Harris returned yesterday and gave himself up to the police.

### SCHOOL BOARD ASKS \$45,000

Board of Control Listen to Trustees' Arguments, Make Inquiries and Do Nothing.

**ENGINEER ASKED TO GET A MOVE ON**

**Poultry Association Given \$200 for Their Approaching Show—Other City Hall Notes.**

A deputation from the Public School Board made a strong appeal to the Board of Control yesterday afternoon for \$45,000, which is the amount that Council in its wisdom has seen fit to take from its estimates, with the result that it now has a short that much of a deficit. The board listened politely to all that the trustees had to say, questioned them upon many points that they did not quite understand and apparently were very suspicious about the verities of the schools. When the deputation retired the matter dropped, the controllers did not discuss it, and just simply ignored the school board's request altogether.

**Have a Legal Right.**  
Trustees Jones pointed out that the School Board were asking for nothing but what they were entitled to by law. The money, as such, belonged to them, and they were asked for it because it was necessary. The board had no right to refuse to grant it, such as closing the schools; but, apart from the legal right, they had, every penny of the money must be given to them to carry on the work and properly maintain the schools.

**Chairman Douglas:** All we ask for is sufficient money to carry on the schools in an efficient way. The board must estimate down to the lowest possible figure, and the money must be granted or else it will be impossible to keep the schools running. The estimates we have sent in have been carefully looked into, and it will only be by careful economy that we will be able to make both ends meet on the amount now asked for.

**The Lowest Possible Figure.**  
Chairman Hodgson of the Property Committee averred that the board had carefully gone over the estimates of the heads of each department, and had cut and slashed them down to the lowest possible figure, and instead of being extravagantly managed, the schools were economically run. In conclusion, Mr. Hodgson stated that he was satisfied that the Board of Control would see the matter in the proper light, and would understand how necessary it was to grant what had been taken from their appropriation.

**Large Salary Account.**  
Dr. Buck pointed out that the salary account was by far the largest expense in connection with running the schools. The question then arises, "Are the salaries a high rate, or are they necessary?" If Council thinks we are extravagant along this line, we should like to be informed of it.

**Given \$200 for Show.**  
Dr. Bell, representing the Poultry Association, asked for financial assistance to help defray the expenses incurred in connection with their annual show, which takes place next month.

**Outside Labor Used.**  
A letter was read complaining that stone which is used in the construction of the abutments of the bridges now being built over the Humber, was cut outside of the city, which was contrary to an existing by-law.

**Engineer Rust explained that very little stone was being used, but he would look into the matter.**

**Controllers' Report.**  
The joint report of Aids, Woods and Burns upon the various public works in course of construction was next taken up. It was stated that the Engineer should make a point of keeping ahead sufficient stock of cement and broken stone to provide against the delays that at present exist owing to their scarcity, and also that the hand-to-mouth system pursued in the past should be abandoned, and a little more forethought displayed by the department. It was also said that there are many methods, and the Engineer should urge upon the contractors to place as many men upon the various works as it is possible to employ, and thus close up the season's business satisfactorily alike to the ratepayer and worker.

**Progress is Unsatisfactory.**  
Referring to the state of affairs existing at the work of bridge building at the Don, the report says that the stone abutments at the Eastern-avenue work were finished, and the Queen-street one almost. The western one, however, was far from so far advanced, and the Engineer should urge immediate completion of it before the advent of frost, as the ironwork could then be proceeded with during the winter months, when spring comes, and the temporary wooden structures are washed away, there will be finished the permanent structures, and the public will be protected against inconvenience.

**At Aid, Lynd's suggestion, a copy of the report was given to Mr. Rust, with instructions to submit at the next meeting of the board any remarks he has to make on the subject.**

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
