### PRESENTATIONS TO STAND.

A Decision by King Edward Which Sets at Rest an Important Social Question.

London, Feb. 11.—The Court Circular announces King Edward's decision that court presentations during the reign of Queen Victoria will hold good for the present reign. This will remove the doubt which has been thrown upon the subject by the late Queen's desire that the visit should mark both the greatness of the occasion and her appreciation of the loyalty, devotion and generous aid of the colonists in South Africa and of the splendid gallantry of the colonial troops.

"This appreciation is fully shared by the King, who desires also to signify his heartfelt gratitude to the colonists for their warm sympathy with himself and the royal family in their bereavement."

ENGLAND TOO INSULAR.  
The plant of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company will soon be producing pig iron at the rate of 500,000 tons a year. The production of pig iron in the United Kingdom is less than nine million tons a year. In 1894 the total production of United States furnaces was 6,600,000 tons. In Canada, by the end of this year, ought to be producing pig iron at the rate of a million tons per annum. These figures surely furnish food for reflection. Lord Rosebery complains that Britain is too insular. He says it will be necessary for them to go to hold their grip on the trade of the world. His Lordship gives excellent advice to his fellow-countrymen. One country they should make up their minds to visit is the United States. Instead of wasting their time in regretting the wonderful advances that are being made by Germany and the United States, they ought to be up and doing. A study of the possibilities of Canada and the production of iron, steel, nickel, copper, aluminum and other metals might open their eyes. Englishmen are too insular. They have not yet grasped the significance of the Imperial idea. If the conditions for the manufacture of any particular article are not favorable in one part of the Empire, why don't the Englishmen engaged in that manufacture investigate the possibilities of other parts of the Empire where the conditions are more favorable? Why don't the iron manufacturers of Great Britain interest themselves in Canada as well as in Lancashire? The industrial capitalists of the United States cover the whole of the continent of North America. The British manufacturers are, indeed, too insular. United States capitalists are establishing great iron plants at Sydney, Cape Breton, and at Saint St. Marys, Ontario. Why don't the British iron manufacturers, who are despising of the iron industry in Great Britain, come to this country and take advantage of our unexplored natural resources? If Canada is able, after a couple of years' preparation, to turn out pig iron at the rate of a million tons a year, it surely would not take long for her to overtake Britain's production of nine million tons. We agree with Lord Rosebery. His fellow-countrymen are too insular. They ought to extend the sphere of their operations by taking their iron-making to Canada. It is only seven days' journey from London. Why should their journey take as much interest in Canada as do the capitalists of the United States? There is room for both British and United States capital in this country. There is room for dozens of iron furnaces, for nickel refineries, for aluminum and carbide works, for chemical plants and scores of other industries. The people of Great Britain need not enviously gaze at the larger geographical ideas. Let them interest themselves in Greater Britain and particularly the Dominion of Canada, which possesses the same natural resources that have contributed to the success of the United States.

COAL TRADE BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES.  
The expedition with which the United States Government publishes the statistics of its various departments contrasts very favorably with the statistics of the Dominion Government in this respect. From the returns of the United States Treasury Department, published a couple of weeks ago, we ascertain the amount of coal that passed between the two countries in the year 1900. We imported from the United States 5,422,468 tons of bituminous coal in 1900, as against 4,376,287 tons in 1899, being an increase of 1,046,181 tons. Against that we exported to the United States 1,417,778 tons, compared with 1,010,700 in 1899.

As will be seen by the above figures the increase in our export of coal to the United States last year was considerable, being at the rate of 40 per cent. This year the increase promises to be still larger, and before long it is just possible that we will export to the United States as much bituminous coal as we import from it. 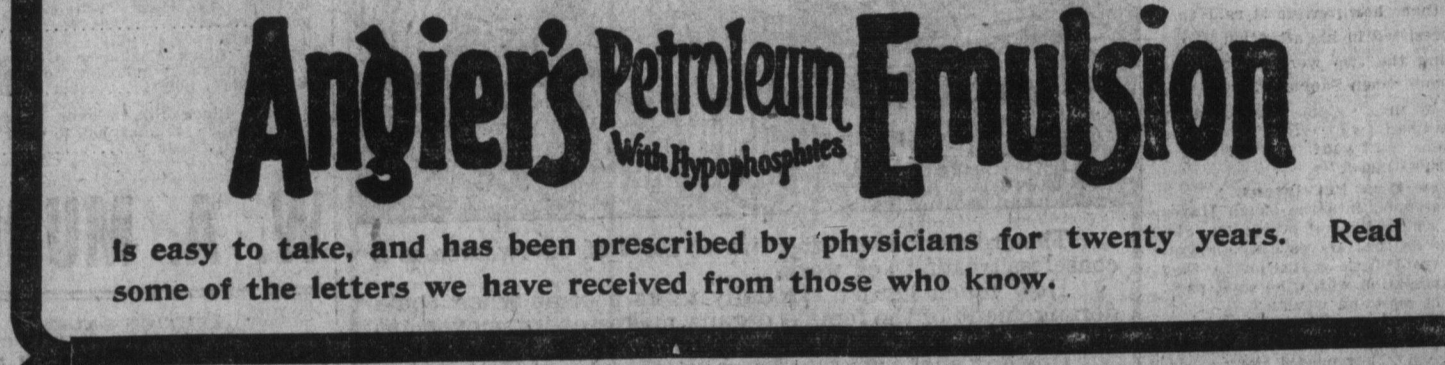
