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## 4,000 PEOPLE BURIED UNDER ASHES ST. PIERRE'S DESTRUCTION VERIFIED

### Further Details of the Awful Ruin Caused by Volcanic Eruption on the Island of Martinique— Quebec Steamship Company's Steamer Roraima Blew Up— All on Board Lost.

London, May 10.—A despatch to the Reuter Telegram Company from Kingston, Jamaica, after giving the details of the Martinique disaster, already known, says: "Thousands were killed at St. Pierre, where a terrible panic prevailed. The eruption began Saturday, May 8, when St. Pierre was covered with ashes, and appeared to be enveloped in fog. The flow of lava continued until Wednesday, May 7."

The message adds: "In the island of St. Vincent the Soufriere is active, and earthquakes are frequent, but so far no damage has been done."

In response to the request of Governor Liewelien of the Windward Islands the British second-class cruiser indefatigable has been despatched from the island of Trinidad to the island of St. Vincent by way of St. Lucia.

A despatch to The Daily Mail from Pointe a Pitre, Island of Guadeloupe, dated yesterday, says: "The Mont Pelee crater ejected yesterday morning molten rocks and ashes during three minutes, and completely destroyed St. Pierre and the districts within a four-mile radius. All the inhabitants were burned."

"About eight passengers from the Roraima of the Quebec S.S. Line were saved by the French cruiser suchet. The inhabitants of the districts of the island who were dependent on St. Pierre for provisions, are menaced by famine."

A despatch to The Daily Mail from Jamaica says: "The first intimation of a disaster at Martinique was the breaking of the cables on Tuesday. The French cable to Martinique from Puerto Plata, was broken Wednesday. Cable communication with all the northern islands is stopped."

The survivors of the British steamer Roraima describe the scene at St. Pierre as being "ghastly of hell." The Roraima's men were killed chiefly by molten lava.

"The Roraima was wrecked in a terrible upheaval of land and sea. The whole crew perished."

"Two ships were lost with all on board in an attempt to approach Martinique."

## CANADA'S NEW EMPIRE

### The West is Swarming With an Invasion of American Settlers—Opinions on the Importance of the Influx.

From The Minneapolis Commercial West: The Canadian Commissioner of Immigration estimates that 200,000 settlers will come into Manitoba and Northwest Territories this year. This is about one immigrant to every twenty-five present inhabitants of all Canada. This is a rush of immigration such as has not been known in the west on this side of the international boundary since the days following the civil war. It is as if the three millions of immigrants should come to the United States this year, as against about one-half million, or usual annual immigration. Comparing Canada West's fortune with a possible one-third to its population in one year. One can hardly imagine the industrial, commercial and social excitement that must follow such a rapid influx of population and the consequent rapid development of good natural resources. This excitement Canada is beginning to feel, and it is probable that this excitement will reach its height this year.

From the Calgary letter of The Globe's special commissioner in the Northwest: What is bringing this influx of people into the west and causing towns and hamlets to spring up almost in a night? Nothing less than the discovery by the farmers of the United States of a land of marvelous productiveness, and the most remarkable variety of advantages, a land which has hitherto been almost altogether neglected and in which there are millions of acres of good soil, to be got free, or for a nominal price.

At last the Canadian West is being recognized. It is the new land of promise, and speaking of lands of promise it is the most amazing and hopeful of all that were ever opened up on the American continent. Wheat is the staff of life and the greatest wheat fields in the world are in the Canadian west. Of a sudden the eyes of the world are being turned toward what fields, and as a consequence a rush of settlement equal to anything in the past days of the west.

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## 147,000 MEN RESOLVE TO STRIKE TODAY \$200,000 A WEEK'S WAGES WILL BE LOST

### Prices of Coal To Be Raised—Consumers Will Be Supplied From Reserve Stores and When Coal on Hand is All Sold at Increased Prices Peace To Be Made.

Scranton, Pa., May 9.—A vote was taken this afternoon and it was decided to order a general strike of the anthracite mine workers on Monday, President Mitchell issued the order to-night.

The order for a general strike on Monday has this qualification—the matter of making the strike a permanent one is to be decided at Hazleton on Wednesday by a convention composed of representatives of each of the local unions of the miners, who are to be elected at a special meeting Monday afternoon.

This means that on Monday 145,000 men will be idle; \$200,000 a day in wages will be lost. Production of anthracite coal will stop. The prices of coal will be raised. Consumers will be supplied from reserve stores, and the coal barons will save the wages the strikers lose, will pocket greater profit from coal already mined, and when coal on hand is all sold at the increased prices, will make peace with the miners.

The miners demand: Increased wages, eight-hour work day, weighing coal at pits' mouth, recognition of the union.

One word spoken by J. Pierpont Morgan, President Baer of the Reading, President of the local Conservative Association, President Thomas of the Erie, President Olyphant of the D. & H., would have prevented a strike.

## ONTARIO MINISTERS UNDER SUSPICION GROSS PUBLIC CRIME AT THEIR DOORS CORRUPT ORGANIZATION STILL WORKS

In its issue of April 22, 1902, it says, editorially:

No public crime can be laid at the door of the government... no no serious neglect of duty... The day before that it said:

Mr. Whitney could have done a great service to the province if he had acknowledged... that the government were no more responsible for the fraud than he himself was for North Ontario.

Yesterday, speaking also of election frauds, it said:

What will it profit them [honest Liberals] to tug and tug at the door of suspicion rests... etc.

And to these paragraphs I invite your attention, in order that we may see whether the statements therein contained are true.

When one begins to enquire whether "any public crime can be laid at the door of the government," we naturally pause a moment to see what should be included in the category of public crimes. As relates to elections, I presume that the Hon. J. T. Garrow (Minister without portfolio) in West Huron, the Hon. J. T. Garrow (Minister without portfolio) in North Waterloo, Mr. L. J. Brett Haupt.

Proceedings were promptly taken to unseat these gentlemen on account of bribery, and other corrupt practices, and every man of them, as a consequence, lost his seat. Two of them appealed their cases, and their appeals were both dismissed with costs. For the purpose of seeing how far the present government should be held responsible for this I will draw your attention to the fact that the Hon. A. S. Hardy resigned the Premiership, and his seat in the House, on the 18th of October, 1899 (the same day that judgment was delivered in the North Waterloo case), and was succeeded by Hon. G. W. Ross, the present Premier, who recognized the government with precisely the same members of the cabinet as had been in Mr. Hardy's government, with the exception of Mr. Hardy himself and the Hon. William Hartly (Minister of Public Works), who retired from office. The vacancies were filled by the appointment of Hon. Mr. Stratton and Hon. Mr. Latchford, and what had been known as the Hardy government, was now known as the Ross-Gibson government. For all practical purposes the two are one and the same, and in the view I shall invite you to take of matters I think you will conclude that it is quite immaterial whether they are one and the same in fact to separate entities.

There was much airy perfidage indulged in at the meeting to advance the interests of Mr. Marter, held in Douglas Hall last night, which, if it did not altogether appeal to those on the platform or the front benches, was at least relished by those who had preferred to sit down "way back by the door.  Rentals.  
**LET THE PROPERTY OWNERS PAY**  
 Turn the General Rate, Says Trades  
 Council—Amalgamation of  
 Labor Bodies.

The amalgamation of the six cen-tral  
 labor councils will likely be con-  
 summated on June 12. This matter

**CATTLE ARE INFECTED**  
**BY THE HUMAN BACILLI**  
 Experiments By Agricultural Society  
 Tend to Disprove Dr.  
 Koch's Theory.

New York, May 9.—The London cor-  
 respondent of The Herald says: As a  
 result of Dr. Koch's startling state-  
 ments respecting consumption, at the  
 International Congress on Tuberculosis  
 in July last, the Royal Agricultural  
 Society of England appointed a spe-  
 cial committee to supervise some im-  
 portant experiments, conducted at the  
 Royal Veterinary College, as to the  
 possibility of infecting bovine animals  
 with tuberculous material from human  
 subjects.  
 These experiments were car-  
 ried out on a cow, two calves and  
 two yearlings.  
 I now learn the results, which are  
 of great importance. In the case of  
 the cow, the tuberculous material was  
 given by the mouth, and, in the case  
 of the calves, it was injected into the  
 veins.

In a strict sense of the word, it can-  
 not be said that the experiments proved  
 the impossibility of infecting cattle  
 with human tubercle bacilli, for, in the  
 case of the cow, the human bacilli had  
 multiplied in her body and she had in-  
 dicated a manifestly diseased condition.  
 In the other cases, also, reactions to  
 tuberculin, after the attempt to infect  
 with human bacilli, would appear to  
 indicate that infection had actually  
 taken place. In the case of the cow,  
 the recovery was not complete six  
 months after the infection.  
 Taking all the facts into account,  
 the experiments indicated that the

In the securities of that country meant an omen of great prosperity for the country.

J. F. Ellis, vice-president of the Board of Trade, thinks the more immigrants coming to this country, the better, and there was no more acceptable class than those coming from the other side of the line. They would assimilate with our people and make first-class citizens. They would doubtless bring a lot of wealth into the country, as they were buying their farms outright, and not taking up government lands, as was the general rule with other immigrants. This showed an industry and a desire to start farming in a proper way and on modern methods, all for the general good of the country. In fact, we should welcome them with open arms. They would perhaps display a preference for American manufactures, but we in Ontario had that to contend with once, and we overcame it in time by proving that we could manufacture as well as our neighbors to the south. In his opinion it would only result in the waking up of Canadian manufacturers.

**Will Make Things Boom.**  
W. D. Matthews: These people coming in from the south are people of spirit and experience, and Canadians should be delighted to receive them. By their industry, trade and commerce is bound to thrive in all directions. What we in Canada want most is population. The American immigrants, I understand, are purchasing C.P.R. lands, which means that they will speedily cultivate the land and make use of the railway facilities to ship their produce to the best market. I look to the Northwest as a land with a great future, its resources are becoming known to the world, and it will not be long before things will boom in every part of the country.

**It is Only the Start.**  
J. Lorne Campbell: I have always had a great idea of the future of this country, and I think it is only at the starting point of real prosperity. I always felt that, in the past many years, the Canadians went to the United States to find out the relative merits of both countries. They will not continue to do this, but will bring with them a big wave of immigration. I think we have just started on an era of great prosperity. We have a great agricultural and mineral country in the west—so great that it is only the start.

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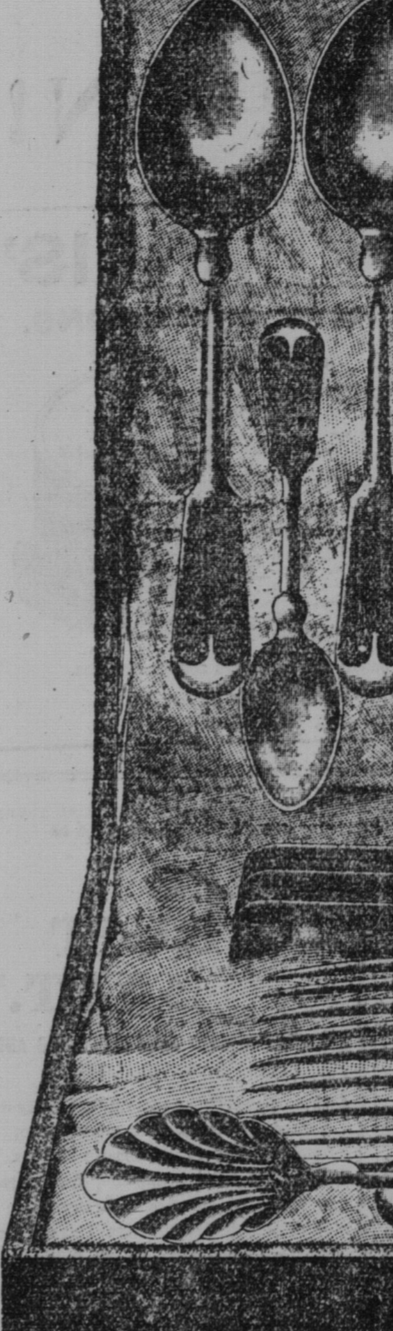

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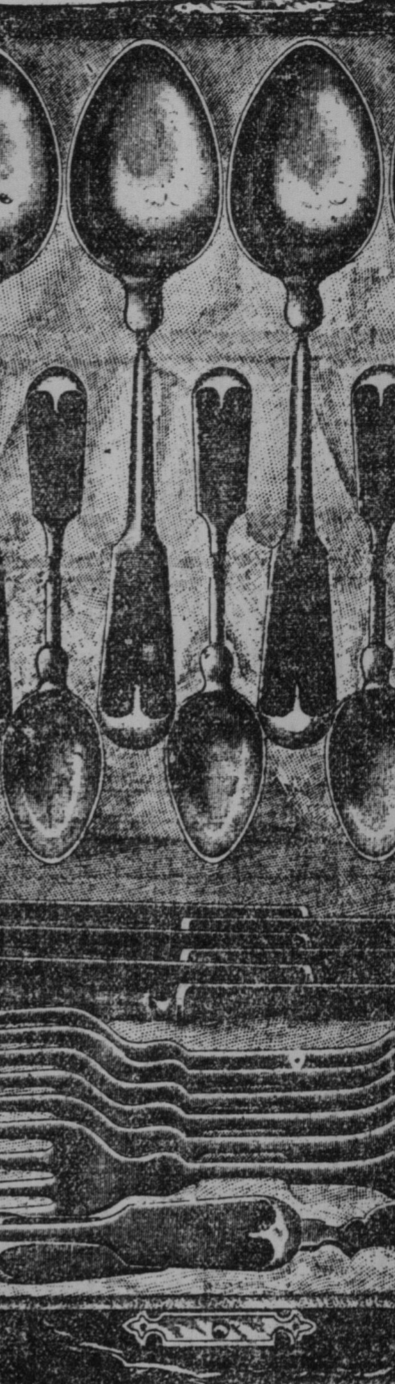

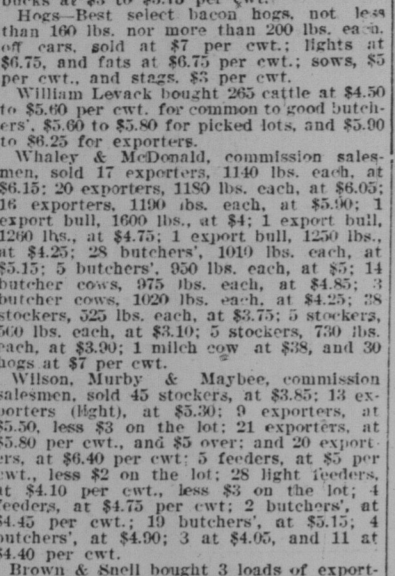
