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#### REPORT

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### The Session of Knox Church, Ottawa,

Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, held Jany. 9, 1890.

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DEAR BRETHREN,—Another year has passed away since we last addressed you in this manner. In many respects it has been to you and to us a year of gracious privilege and of manifold tokens of God's goodness and favour. For while trials have entered into the experience of many, and sickness and the infirmities of advanced years have laid their burdens and restraints upon some, and sorrows have shadowed the hearts, and bereavements have darkened the homes of others, yet through all God's goodness has been manifested and His grace revealed, so that, in the experience of not a few, where tribulations and sorrows have abounded, the grace and consolations of Christ have much more abounded. Goodness and mercy have followed us throughout the year, giving comfort in sorrow, strength in weakness, guidance in perplexity, and patience and submission in trial and suffering; and our experience of God's goodness not only awakens and calls for thanksgivings for the past, but inspires us with hope as we look into the future, for He is the same through all the changing years, and He has said, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee."

We have been happily shielded from all the contentions and divisions whose record makes the history of a congregation bulk large. It is the abnormal and not the natural in growth that arrests attention, and calls for remark. In some important respects a congregation, like a nation, is happy when it has little in its life of which history is composed. A brief record is sufficient for years of peace, while a month of war will fill volumes. And the year that is past was a year of peace; not much of an eventful character marked its course, and yet no year is an exact repetition of the preceding one.

In view of the increasing number of families connected with the Congregation, the Session deemed it desirable to ask for an addition of

four to their number, that the work devolving upon them might be more efficiently performed; and in response to their request you elected, in due form, Messrs. J. Winer Wardrope, John Kennedy, John McJanet, and Arthur Chisholm; and these brethren having accepted of your call, were duly inducted into the office of Elder, on Sabbath, June 16th, and

their names added to the roll of the Session.

The year has been marked with a larger measure of sickness than we have ordinarily experienced; and among the number who have been called to endure the chastenings of the Father, are two of the older and much respected members of the Session. For quite a portion of the year they have been laid aside from active duty, while another, through the growing infirmities of an honored old age, has been unable to meet with us. And in many of its varied forms affliction has tried the faith and patience of many other families and individuals, and the following esteemed members in full communion have been removed from among us by the hand of death:—

Mrs. M. McKinnon, January 1st, 1889. Mr. A. McKellar, January 12th, 1889. Mr. George McAllen, January 20th, 1889. Mr. James Hopkirk, May 25th, 1889. Mrs. Mary McAllen, July 20th, 1889. Mr. Thomas O'Neil, August 7th, 1889.

Besides these other families have had experience of the sorrows of bereavement. And to them all the Session extends their tenderest sympathies, and prays that God may grant to every bereaved and afflicted one among you the grace that not only comforts in sorrow, but which also sanctifies the sorrowing hearts, and makes "all things work together for good to them that love God."

The number of Communicants on the roll at the last annual meeting was 409. During the year 39 have been removed—6 by death and 33, chiefly by certificate, to other churches. And there have been added to the roll 32—by certificate 21, and on profession 11, leaving

the number now on the roll 402.

There have been 29 baptisms.

The Report of the Temporal Committee will set before you the financial condition of the Congregation. It is very gratifying to know that your liberality has enabled the Committee to meet all their current liabilities and to place a satisfactory balance to your credit; and also that your Committee have negotiated a loan which reduces the annual expenditure of the Congregation by a considerable amount.

The reports of the Sabbath School and Bible Class, and the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavour to be submitted, will show that in these important departments of the Church's work diligence and faithfuln made. Christian given the other pu

faithfulness have been exercised and an encouraging measure of progress made. The Session would also note, with hearty commendation, the Christian activity and zeal of the members of the Church, who have given their labours to other schools in the city and suburbs, and who in

other public ways have done service for the Master.

The thanks of the Congregation are again due to the lady visitors for the faithful discharge of the duties assigned them, in distributing the *Record*, and collecting your contributions to the Schemes of the Church. And while it is gratifying to note that the amount collected last year is larger than in any previous year, yet the Session regrets that there are still so many on the lists of the lady visitors who have not contributed anything for the promotion of Christ's kingdom at home and abroad.

While the attendance on the Sabbath morning services has increased during the year, the Session regrets to state that they do not find a corresponding increase in the attendance at the Sabbath evening service and on the Wednesday evening prayer-meeting. We humbly pray that your attendance during the year upon which we have entered may indicate a higher appreciation of all the services of God's house

And now, brethren, in closing, we adopt the words of the Apostle John, as our earnest desire and prayer for you all, "And now, little children, abide in Him, that when He shall appear, we may have con-

fidence, and not be ashamed before Him at His Coming."

To raise the amount necessary to pay Mrs. Gordon's note, the sum of \$600.00 was borrowed from Mr. George Hay, and a note for that amount was given to him, so that the liability on this account is but

slightly reduced.

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The mortgage of \$15,000.00 on the Church property, which was held by the estate of the late John McLaren, has been transferred to the Ontario Mutual Life Assurance Company, the rate of interest thereon being reduced from six per cent. per annum to five per cent., thus reducing the interest payable on this loan by \$150.00 annually. The in-

terest has been paid up to the second of December last.

The Committee also desire to impress upon the Congregation the fact that, to discharge their duties satisfactorily, the Temporal Committee should, early in the year, have a reasonably definite idea of the income they have to depend on for the work of the Church during the year. And as the only way of obtaining this information is from the slips giving the promises of subscriptions, with one of which in blank each member and adherent will be supplied as usual, the Committee would respectfully urge upon the Congregation the propriety of filling in and returning these slips to the Treasurer with as little delay as possible, so that your Committee may be relieved from the unpleasant embarassments resulting from uncertainty in these matters.

And now, giving thanks to God for his goodness unto us during the past, and praying that He may be with us to help and direct us in the future, let us go forward, each one determining to work for Him according to the best of his ability, and we may confidently expect that the burdens which, to some extent, now hamper us in our work will soon be lightened, and that our future as a Congregation will be characterized by even more abundant evidences of the Divine blessing than

we have enjoyed in the past.

During the year the pupils were requested to return their Sunday School paper, after having read them, in order that they might be sent to Mission Stations where Sunday reading-matter is scarce. Many were returned and distributed. In this way we have endeavored to cultivate the missionary spirit of the pupils, and to benefit and gladden many homes by a gift which cost us little more than the exercise of some energy and thought.

The Teachers' prayer meeting has been continued throughout the

year.

## Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor of Knox Church,

In submitting the Second Annual Report of the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, we think it desirable again to state the

objects which the Society wishes to promote.

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Briefly, the Society aims to bring into active Christian service the young people of the Church, to interest them in its work, to make them better acquainted with one another, and to train them to be strong Christians, to speak and to work for the furtherance of the kingdom of Christ, the cause which is the chief concern of the Church. The young people are the hope of the Church, and to them she must look to carry on her work in the future. Whatever helps them must help her, and the effects of the Christian Endeavor movement in this respect are well stated by one writer, as follows:—" The outcome of the Christian En-"deavor organization, when intelligently conducted and enthusiastic-"ally received, is the immediate and visible uplifting of the young to a "higher plane of living and a wider outlook. It identifies them with "the kingdom of God, giving each a definite work, and a definite place "in the grandest enterprise that ever inspired a human soul." appreciation in which this organization is held is shown by the fact that there are now in the United States and Canada 8,000 societies, having a total membership of 500,000.

To attain the objects mentioned, it is laid down as an essential rule by those who have had experience in the working of societies of this kind, that there must be first a pledged membership. The pledge which our Society has adopted, and which differs slightly from that given in the last report, is as follows:—"Trusting in Christ as my Saviour, and "believing that it is my duty to confess Him before others, and to engage in His service, I hereby promise to attend every meeting of the "Society unless unavoidably detained, and to take some part in the "monthly consecration meeting; and also promise to do what I can, "by word and by life, to extend the kingdom of my Lord and Saviurur." We are thankful to be able to state that we have already a

pledged membership of 59, a number which we hope will soon be further increased.

Our Committees are—a Prayer-meeting Committee, a Musical Committee, a Lookout Committee, and a Visiting Committee, the names of which sufficiently explain their duties; and as only those who have signed the Society's pledge have been elected to act upon the Committees, we have every reason to expect that their work will be done faithfully and well.

Since the beginning of winter we have assisted in conducting the

Sunday evening services at Hull and still help in this work.

We have supplied ourselves with a new set of hymn books, as the

old ones had become inadequate for our requirements.

Although many gratifying signs of progress have made themselves apparent during the year to those who have attended our meetings, we are very sensible of the fact that we have fallen far short of what we might have, and should have, attained. We are looking hopefully towards the future however, and turn to the Congregation for sympathy and help; and, trusting in the Great Head of the Church for guidance and support, we can expect nothing but success.
