PHILADELPHIA, April 5.—The schooner Romish, from San Andrea, arrived during the night with cargo Penna, one of several barges in tow of the Monitor. The tow was bound south. The schooner sustained damage to her hull, part of her rigging, cables, masts, and rigging. The tug and barge proceeded.

VINEYARD HAVEN, April 6.—The ship Forest Brook, Captain Burke, from New Orleans for Odessa, etc., arrived at 10 o'clock with her boilers defective. (No mention is made of the reported fire in the main hold.) It is reported that the ship Emma L. Cunningham was drifting detached off Havana. The Emma L. Cunningham left Mobile March 30 for Matanzas.

PHILADELPHIA, April 6.—The British schooner Roland and Vinita arrived in port this week with honors even, after an exciting ocean race of 2000 miles from San Andrea. Each vessel, laden with 500,000 coconuts, set sail on March 12. Capt. Wagner of the Roland, and Capt. Himmelman of the Vinita, and challenged each other to a race. The challenge was accepted and both crews set to with a will. For two days each captain kept the other in sight, but on the morning of the third day the Vinita was seen to be ahead from each other again. Frequent storms followed, but each master kept all sail on and pushed his boat to the limit. Late on Tuesday night the Roland sighted Cape Henlopen of the low port. At dusk the Vinita was seen several miles off, crowding on sail and making for the Cape.

Need and neck the vessels passed in Delaware Breakwater, and almost reached Reedy Island. In this position they came up the river, neither boat having gained any advantage. When the captain of the ship took a look at the clock and found it 10 o'clock and declared all bets off.

Deep-water sailors continue in good demand for lumber cargoes to the River Plate rates being now on an 81 basis from the Gulf to Buenos Ayres and \$8 to be had from Boston and Providence ports. A vessel of 1200 tons net register has been taken at this base from the Gulf for September loading.

Grain shipments are expected to improve as soon as lake navigation is in full swing. It appears that the Canadian lake steamship companies have fixed the rate from Port William to Georgian Bay ports at 20 cents per bushel. The American steamship companies are carrying grain from Port William to Buffalo at 2 cents, and in some cases at 1 1/4 cents per bushel, though the bulk of the latter rate is longer and the rate should naturally be higher. Contracts are being made to ship grain for export via Buffalo and the American route, as against the Canadian route—N. Y. Journal of Commerce.

NEW INDUSTRIES

The importance of such action as may lead to an increase in the number of industries is very widely recognized, and towns and cities all over the continent are giving attention to the subject.

The Times recently referred to a proposition made in Halifax that a certain number of citizens should agree to invest a certain sum, say \$100 each, every year, in a new industry.

The citizens of Nashville, Tenn., have taken up this subject in a very practical manner. A despatch from that city says: "At a recent meeting of the board of trade a plan was introduced providing for the formation of a \$200,000 corporation to attract industries to this city."

The industries committee of the St. John board of trade will no doubt have some valuable suggestions to make, and perhaps an appeal to the citizens, when they have a little further prosecuted the work they have undertaken.

They were established in 1902 by a friend of the late George William Curtis. The judges are required to base their award on excellence in substance, literary form and manner of delivery. Semé is a senior in Columbia University. After he has graduated he will go to Oxford to take a three years' course in law. He will take a place among the Zulus as a native attorney general, representing the interests of his people before the British government."



CANADA'S NEW IMMIGRATION ACT MORE STRINGENT

An Arrangement Has Been Reached With United States to Enforce the Law Strictly.

Ottawa, April 8.—(Special)—The new immigration act, of which the minister of the interior has given notice for a number of important changes, is designed to render it more difficult for undesirable immigrants to locate in Canada. An arrangement has been reached with the United States by which citizens of either country who cross the boundary line, for instance, on the ground of his not being a citizen or subject of that country, he can be detained in a jail named by the minister or in some hospital or institution at the expense of the municipality of which he was last a regular resident, in case of no such municipality, at the expense of the department of interior until finally disposed of.

Railway and transportation companies are brought under the provisions of the act. Penalty clauses are made more severe. The period of delay on board a vessel is reduced from 48 to 24 hours.

Despite the fact that even his family, which is one of the most illustrious and influential in the country, turned against him, he has built three Baptist churches from his private income, and the people have elected him their pastor. In 1894, or since Russia has had a so-called religious liberty, his congregation has not been molested very much, but before this freedom of religious speech was granted the baron says the police drove his followers from place to place and called their meetings, no matter how quietly they were conducted.

The baron has a story to tell of religious persecution which seems almost impossible to a person who lives in a land of liberty.
