CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

Province of Quebec Rifle Association.

CONSTITUTION.

RULE 1. That this Association be called the "*Province of Quebec Rifle Association*," and shall have for its object, the encouragement of Rifle shooting in the Province.

2. That the Annual Subscription for Individual Members be two dollars, and a donation of twenty dollars in cash, at any one time for that express purpose, shall entitle the donor to apply to be elected a life member at the next annual meeting of Council.

3. That any regularly constituted Rifle Association or Corps, may become affiliated to this Association, by the payment of an annual subscription of not less than ten dollars, the number of memberships to be in proportion to one for every half dollar so subscribed.

4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Council composed of the office-bearers, and two representatives from each affiliated Association in this Province. Five to form a quorum.

5. The office-bearers of this Association shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected primarily at the first meeting, and afterwards annually at the annual meeting; all office-bearers must be individual members of the Association.

6. A Patron and Vice-Patrons may be elected at the first meeting and afterwards whenever a vacancy occurs.

7. The Deputy Adjutant-Generals and Brigade Majors of the Province, being members of the Association, shall be members, ex-officio, of the Council.

8. The Representatives to the Council must be members of Association, either by affiliation or otherwise; they shall be chosen annually by the Association they represent, and their names sent to the Secretary, at least one month before the annual meeting; and to entitle to vote any changes must be duly notified to the Secretary.

9. The Council may from time to time make such By-Laws for their proper guidance as they may deem necessary, but no by-law to be altered or new one proposed, without at least such notice being given to each member of the Council, as by the by-laws may be determined.

10. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be agreed on at the annual business meeting.

11. The Annual Business Meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be determined on, by the by-laws; and this meeting terminates the previous year's business.

12. An Annual Report shall be made by the Secretary and Treasurer and submitted to the Council, previous to publication.

13. At its annual meeting the Council shall appoint an Executive Committee of eleven of its members, who with the Secretary and Treasurer, shall carry out the Annual Prize Meeting, and give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.

BY-LAWS.

1. That the Annual Meeting of the Association be held at Montreal on the first Thursday in May.

2. Extraordinary Meetings may be called by the Secretary, when required by any six members of the Council; fifteen days notice of such meeting given to each member of the Council, and the requisition must state the object for which the meeting is called; but no change in the constitution, by-laws, or special decisions of Council shall be made without one month's notice of motion prior to the annual meeting, and no change shall take effect without a majority of two-thirds of the members present.

3. Three Auditors shall be appointed annually, whose duties shall be to examine the Treasurer's accounts previous to the Annual Meeting.

4. The Treasurer shall be required to deposit from time to time all sums of money paid over to him, on behalf of the Association—in a safe bank.

5. The payment of sums for current expenses must be authorized by the President, or in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents. Other payments to be made only upon the authority of the Council.

ON THE 1ST MAY, 1879.

Moved by Major Johnson, seconded by Major McLaren, "That Lt.-Col. Bacon be re-elected Secretary." *Carried.*

Moved by Lt.-Col. Rogers, seconded by Lt.-Col. Martin, "That Lt.-Col. Fraser be re-elected Treasurer." *Carried.*

Moved by Lt.-Col. Rogers, seconded by Major Johnson, "That the Executive Committee of last year be re-elected." *Carried.*

Moved by Capt. Balfour, seconded by Major Mudge, "That Lt.-Col. McEachern, C.M.G., Lt.-Col. D'Orsonnens, and Capt. Sully, be elected Auditors." *Carried.*

Lt.-Colonel Bacon then stated to the meeting that owing to the unfortunate state of health of Dr. Coates, late Surgeon of the 51st Battallion, and for many years Surgeon to this Association, he would be unable to fulfil the duties of that office in future. He therefore moved, seconded by Lt.-Col. Rogers, "That W. H. Mayrand, Esq., M.D., Surgeon to the 11th Battalion be elected Surgeon to this Association." *Carried.*

Moved by Major Mudge, seconded by Lt.-Col. Martin, "That Lt.-Col. Bacon, Lt.-Col. D'Orsonnens, Lt.-Col. Fraser, Captain Boyd and Captain Balfour, be elected Representatives to Council of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association." *Carried.*

Moved by Lt.-Col. Fraser, seconded by Major McLaren, "That the Annual Matches for the current year commence on Tuesday 11th August, and that the Executive Committee be authorised to make the necessary arrangements." *Carried.*

Moved by Captain Balfour, seconded by Lt.-Col. Martin, "That the usual grant of \$100 be made to the Secretary." *Carried.*

After some discussion on the subject, it was moved by Lt.-Col. Fraser, seconded by Captain Balfour, that the Executive Committee be authorised to purchase ten Martini-Henry Rifles of the most approved pattern, for "Prizes" at the next Annual Prize Meeting." *Carried.*

The addition to By-law No. 2, notice of which was given by Lt.-Col. Fraser, at the last annual meeting, was then brought up, and after discussion was unanimously adopted. The addition reads as follows: "But no change in the Constitution, By-laws, or special decisions of Council shall be made without one month's notice of motion prior to the Annual Meeting, and no change shall take effect without a majority of two-thirds of the members present."

The questions of the ranges, and changes in the prize lists to encourage young shots were fully considered and left in the hands of the executive for further action.

Lt.-Col. Fletcher proposed, seconded by Lt.-Col. Martin, "a vote of thanks to the Chairman, (Lt.-Col. McEachern, C.M.G.,) for his efficient services." *Carried.*

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Province of Quebec Rifle Association,

The Tenth Annual Report enables the Executive to congratulate the Association on the fact that, at the close of its first decade it is still one of the prosperous institutions of the Province.

In consequence of the Annual matches of the Dominion of Canada and Province of Ontario Rifle Associations at Ottawa and Toronto, occurring so close to the time fixed for the Quebec competition, and on account of the heavy calls for duty on the Militia of the Province in various ways, the number of competitors at the last annual meeting was somewhat reduced from previous years, notwithstanding the inducements of large prizes, and a greater variety in the matches, and it may be necessary to consider well if a more convenient week for the competition cannot be chosen than heretofore.

The average shooting through the Annual Matches compared favourably with previous years.

In the first match, "The Quebec Volunteer Challenge Match," the First Prize, a Martini-Henry Rifle, 1000 rounds of ammunition and \$35 was won by Private Turnbull, 1st, or "Prince of Wales Rifles" Battalion, with a score of 65 out of a possible 75.

The Battalion Prize was won by the Montreal Brigade Garrison Artillery scoring 218. The Three Rivers' Battalion being second, with only one point less.

The Medals competed for in last year's matches were all awarded as aggregate prizes, and were won as follows:

The N.R.A. Medal for the highest aggregate in Snider matches, was won by Sergeant Riddle of the Montreal Garrison Artillery with an aggregate of 224 out of a possible 295.

The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association Medal, awarded as a second aggregate Prize, was won by Private A. Ross, P.W.R., with 209.

His Honour the Lieut.-Governor's Silver Medal, given for the highest aggregate at 600 yards, was won by Captain Thomas, 54th (Richmond) Battalion, and the handsome Gold Medal presented by the staff of a portion of the Press of Montreal for the highest aggregate at 500 yards, was won by Sergeant Riddle, Montreal Garrison Artillery.

Although the Canadian Team, sent to Wimbledon last year, did not win the Kolapore Cup, they made a higher score than any previous winning team, and were only beaten by 11 points in the Match, 622 against 611. Few Prizes, however, were won by the Canadians, and the only winners from the Province of Quebec, were Captain Thomas, Sergeants Edwards, Holtby and Riddle.

In the competition for places on the Wimbledon Team, 1879, the Province has only two representatives: Captain Thomas, and Sergeant Riddle.

At the Annual Meeting of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, held at Ottawa on the 5th of March, four of your representatives attended, viz.: Lt.-Colonels McEachern, Fraser, and Bacon, and Captain Boyd. The meeting was very largely attended, and was honoured by the presence of His Excellency The Governor-General, who, in speaking to the meeting, expressed great interest in the Association, and announced his intention of contributing a handsome prize for competition at the next annual matches. The Hon. L. R. Masson, the Minister of Militia and Defence, who also took part in the proceedings of the Annual Meeting, intimated that he intended to offer a Prize, value \$200, for competition at the next Annual Matches.

was again changed, and hereafter it will be held at Ottawa during the Annual Matches of the Dominion Association.

It is still to be regretted that no progress has been made in procuring permanent Ranges for the Association; the longer it is delayed the more difficult will the task be, as the city is extending its limits in all directions, and property in consequence becoming more valuable. The ranges, as they are, are found to be too small, both for ordinary practice, and for the Annual Matches, and your Executive Committee considered it in the interest of the Association to build a new butt, which was done, and four canvass targets added. During the season, and at the Annual matches, the increased accommodation was much appreciated, giving, as it did, the opportunity of carrying on a pool target and an extra series match during the whole time of the meeting without interfering with the ordinary matches.

The Association now own seven sets of second and third-class canvass targets, and two first-class, besides which, there are six of the old-fashioned iron targets, belonging to the Militia Department.

In view of the greater use now made of the Martini-Henry Rifle at the N. R. A. Matches, at Wimbledon, it may be well to consider if it would not be advisable to increase the number of First-class targets so as to admit of more practice with that arm, to enable our shots when they go to Wimbledon to compete on more equal terms with their old-country competitors. The Queen's Prize and other very important matches at Wimbledon are now fired exclusively with the Martini-Henry, with which our marksmen, as a rule, are but slightly acquainted. For last year's matches twenty of these Rifles were loaned to the Association by the Militia Department, and competition to a small extent was carried on with them, but it now becomes a question whether the Association should not take means to make this rifle better known among marksmen, either by giving them as prizes or by asking for the loan of a larger number for a longer period from the Department.

It has also been suggested that a match should be opened for young shots; there is much difference of opinion as to whether such a match would be appropriate at the Provincial Meeting, as many think that such competition should be at the Annual matches of the smaller local, and battalion Associations; the question, however, is open to discussion.

Last year the Annual Matches were very much cramped by the competition for places on the Wimbledon Team having to be carried on during the same week, and, in consequence, many were prevented competing in the optional and small-bore matches, very much to the detriment of the funds of the Association. This, however, will not occur again, as the Wimbledon competition takes place at Ottawa.

A suggestion has been made with reference to the selection of representative marksmen to be sent to Ottawa, to compete at the Dominion matches, to the effect that the eight or ten highest aggregates at our Provincial Matches should form that representation. The choice hitherto has been one of some difficulty, where several men have been so nearly equal; this suggestion might be acted on for the ensuing season to try its working; it will certainly have one great advantage, that is, that no individual can complain of partiality being shown, as each will depend for a place on his own individual aggregate shooting.

An unusually large representation from this Province attended the Dominion Matches at Ottawa last year, and amongst them many of the best shots, but our men were very unsuccessful and obtained but few Prizes.

The Association has to thank the Dominion Government for its continued support in the shape of the usual grant of \$1700.

The Provincial Government has also shown its interest in our affairs, by continuing the grant of \$500, for which the thanks of the Association are due.

To His Honour the Lieut.-Governor of the Province, our thanks are also due, for the handsome medal presented by him for competition.

REGULATIONS.

- 1.—There shall be "1878" Wimbledon Targets and Scoring.
- 2.—Firing shall commence each day at 9 o'clock precisely.
- 3.—All firing shall be conducted under officers or persons appointed for the duty by the Executive Officers, and all competitors shall be under their authority. When a competitor has joined a squad he shall not leave it until he has retired, or completed his firing, without leave from the register keeper; competitors losing their turn, or absent without leave, may forfeit their place at the discretion of the Executive Officers.
- 4.—In Snider matches, competitors will fire the whole number of rounds alternately in files (at each distance) as far as practicable.
- 5.—No competitor to cap, or with Breach Loader to load, before he steps to the front to fire.
- 6.—Any position, not involving artificial rests, allowed at all ranges, except in the Military Match; slings may be used. Government pattern.
- 7.—Competitors must provide their own ammunition, which may be purchased on the ground at 20 cents for 10 rounds Snider.
- 8.—In competition open to any rifle, all sights will be allowed, except telescopic and those disallowed at Wimbledon [*Vide* N. R. Rules, 1878.] Maximum weight, 10 lbs., exclusive of ramrod; minimum pull of trigger, 3 lbs.
- 9.—In matches for Snider or Martini Rifles, none but Government pattern will be allowed. Minimum pull of trigger, 6 lbs.
- 10.—Competitors shall, if required, submit their Rifles for inspection, by the armorer or other officers, before, during, and after a match, and any one found guilty of plugging, or other unfair behavior will be disqualified from further shooting, and forfeit Entrance Fees and Prizes, and will be liable to be debarred from competing in any future match of the Association.
- 11.—In the Battalion Match, Volunteers to be in uniform, full or undress, of their respective corps.
- 12.—Two sighting shots at each distance shall be allowed each competitor, on payment of 10 cents per shot, before the commencement of the competition of each squad. These shots may be fired in any position.

In matches where the firing is alternate, the sighting shots will be before each man's commencement, not before that of squads. No "blowing-off" shall be allowed, except at the "blowing-off" pits, where competitors may "blow-off" on presentation of a "blow-off" ticket, price 5 cents.

13.—Ties will be decided: *In individual competitions*, 1st, if at more than one distance, by the range totals, in inverse order; 2nd, by the fewest outers; 3rd, by fewest magpies; 4th, by fewest inners; 5th, by value of each shot in inverse order; 6th, by firing single shots at the longest distance in the competition until decided. *In team competitions*, 1st, if at more than one distance, by aggregate range totals, in inverse order; 2nd, by fewest outers; 3rd, by fewest magpies; 4th, by fewest inners; 6th, by highest scorer in each team firing single shots at longest distance. *For the aggregates*, 1st, by score at each match, in inverse order; 2nd, by following the rules for *individual* ties.

14.—After delivering each shot the competitor must pay attention to the score called out by the register keeper. Any objection to the scoring of a hit must be made before another shot is fired; otherwise the shot must stand as signalled. When only one competitor is present at a firing point, a witness to the score must be provided by the Executive.

15.—Misses cannot be signalled, even in sighting shots.

16.—No person will be allowed to practice on the range during the week of the meeting, unless it be necessary to drill the markers previous to commencement of the meeting.

17.—Entries must be made at the Secretary's Office, at least one match a-head, or will be charged 25 cents extra as Post Entries. Every competitor shall enter and shoot not oftener than once for any prize; except in the optional Matches, where two entries are allowed, one score only to count.

18.—Any competitor firing at the wrong target, or during the time the danger flag is up, or the disc is shown on the target, will be debarred from all further competition, at discretion of the Executive Officers.

19.—The Executive Officers will decide all disputes on the ground. Appeal from their decision may be made in writing to the Executive Committee, whose decision will be final and without recourse. Their decision to be given in writing to the Secretary.

20.—Any competitor refusing to obey the instructions of the Executive Officers, or their deputies, will be immediately ruled out of all further competitions.

21.—The ranges being, for the period of the Matches of the Association, handed over to the charge of the Executive Committee, any person, not a competitor, interfering with any of the firing squads, and annoying them in any way, will be at once expelled from the ground.

23.—Any competitor infringing any of the preceding regulations, being guilty of unruly or disorderly conduct, or being intoxicated, shall be ruled out, and forfeit any Entrance Fee he may have paid.

24.—PENALTIES.—DISQUALIFICATION.

Any competitor.—

1st, who shall offer money, or a bribe of any kind, to a register-keeper, or any other employee of the Association, under any pretence whatever; or,

2nd, who shall intentionally discharge his rifle at the wrong target; or,

3rd, who shall be guilty of any conduct which the Executive Committee may consider to be discreditable—or,

4th, who shall be reported to the Executive Committee, as having elsewhere been guilty of any of the aforesaid offences—shall, upon the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, forfeit all his Entrance Fees and be for ever disqualified from competing at any Prize Meeting of the Association.

DISALLOWANCE OF SCORE.

Any competitor—

1st, who shall fail to comply with the conditions laid down for any particular Match; or,

2nd, who shall infringe any of the Instructions or Regulations of the Meeting—shall, on the occurrence being proved to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, have his score disallowed.

25.—Competitors must make themselves acquainted with the Regulations, as the plea of Ignorance cannot, under any circumstances, be entertained.
