MATHEMATICS.

Juniors.—Euclid, first six Books; Plane Trigonometry and Logarithms; Hind's Algebra; Daily and Weekly Exercises in Geometry, Algebra, and Trigonometry, with the use of instruments of observation.

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Seniors .- Euclid, Eleventh and Twelfth Books; Mensuration of Planes and Solids; Analytical Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, with the application to Geodetical and Astronomical Problems; Elements of Differential and Integral Calculus, and numerous exercises.

NATURAL PHILOSOPHY.

Lectures on the properties of Matter, Statics, Dynamics, Pneumatics, and Hydrostatics, with numerous Exercises; Lectures on the Chemistry of the Metallic Elements, and their compounds. Earnshaw's Dynamics.

MENTAL AND MORAL PHILOSOPHY, AND LOGIC.

On each of these subjects, a full course of Lectures was given. During the afternoon hour the Students were regularly examined on the Lecture in the morning. They were also required to give a weekly Essay of considerable length on some subject unfolded in the Lectures.

FACULTY OF THEOLOGY.

ORIENTAL LANGUAGES.

Junior Class.—Exercises in Hebrew Grammar at every meeting. Read from the Books of Genesis, II. Kings, the Psalms, and the Song of Solomon.

Senior Class.—Read from the Books of Genesis, Exodus, Judges, Ruth, II. Kings, the Psalms, the Song of Solomon, and Isaiah. Exercises both in Hebrew and in Chaldee Grammar. Read in Chaldee from the Book of Daniel.

Progressive Exercises in both Classes in rendering English into Hebrew. Also, Dissertations from the Students in both Classes on subjects connected with the Criticism of the Old Testament.

CHURCH HISTORY.

A full series of Lectures on the History of the Church during the three first centuries. In addition to the hour for Lecture, there was a suitable portion of time devoted to examination. The Students were required to write a weekly Essay on some important vent or topic brought out in the Lectures.

SYSTEMATIC THEOLOGY. The Theological Course embraces three great divisions.

etry and Exercises ne use of It was the first of these divisions that was gone over this year, commencing with the subject "Of the being and moral perfection of God," and ending with "Justification." The Students were examined in the afternoon on the subject of the morning's Lecture. They were also required to give a weekly Essay on some one of the topics discussed in the Lecture. Each Student, according to his status, delivered his regular discourses.

THE Fifteenth Session of Queen's College will begin on the first Wednesday of October [1st October] 1856, at which date all Intrants and regular Students in the Faculty of Arts are required to be present.

The Divinity Classes will be opened on the first Wednesday in November.

Candidates for matriculation as regular Students of the first year will undergo an examination before the College Senate in the first three books of the Æneid of Virgil; the first three Books of Cæsar's Commentaries; Mair's Introduction; the Greek Grammar; the first Book of Euclid; and Arithmetic, as far as Vulgar and Decimal Fractions, inclusive.

The only charges are £1 for Matriculation Fee; £2 for each class per Session, to be paid on admission to the Classes; and £1 additional in the Natural Philosophy Class, for expenses of apparatus.

The Boarding arrangements will be announced in a subsequent advertisement. Each Student on entering must produce a certificate of Moral and Religious Character from the Minister of the Congregation to which he belongs.

A certain number of Scholarships or Bursaries will be awarded at the commencement of the Session. The Bursaries for Students of the first year will be conferred on those who display the greatest proficiency in the subjects of examination for Matriculation. For Students of previous years, the subjects of examination for Scholarships will be the studies of former Sessions.

THE PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT, or College School, will be conducted as usual, under the charge of competent Masters.
