Mussolini's Story

MR. HOOVER'S RECOMMENDATIONS MODERN economists have generally recognized that the old methods of computing distance must for certain purposes be superseded by others. A place, for instance, is for economic computation farther from another that it takes ten hours, say, to reach than from another, the same linear distance away, that may be reached in five hours. But it has been left to Mr. Hoover to popularize, if not actually to originate, the possibly very American measure of distance by dollars.

In the report advocating the construction of the St. Lawrence waterway, Mr. Hoover takes as his unit the cost in cents of carrying staple goods over the cheapest route, and shows that the opening of the Panama Canal moved New York 224 cents closer to the Pacific coast and Chicago 836 cents away from the same coast. Thence, according to the New York Times, he contends that a "waterway outlet from the Middle West offers the United States farmer relief far more lasting and substantial than the various direct aids for which some of his political spokesmen are still clamoring."

Mr. Hoover's arguments are mainly comparing the St. Lawrence project with the alternative all-United States route. Of the military advantages claimed for the latter he has this to say: "The Chief of Engineers of the American Army brushes them aside as secondary." The key points of both routes are so near the international border that in either case they are open to destruction. Some items of comparison are nine locks against twenty, eight bridges against twenty-four, twenty-five miles restricted navigation against one hundred and twenty-eight, and maintenance and interest charges forty-three cents per ton against \$1.64, all in favor of the St. Lawrence. In addition it is pointed out that power development will be aided and cheapened by undertaking the project. These are the chief grounds on which Mr. Hoover's recommendations are based.

A COMPLACENT GOVERNOR

GOVERNOR AL. SMITH of New York, in his inaugural address on New Year's, said: "I have always felt that Divine Providence was behind this state." The state includes the city of New York. In that city, according to the Herald-Tribune, the staff of that paper have discovered that Dickens' pictures of London's prisons are scarcely more revolting than the life in the prisons of New York. Their findings are summarized as

follows:

"The prisons of New York are unfit for human habitation. This is true of virtually every one of them, and it does not tell the whole truth con-/ cerning most of them.

"Not one of these institutions provides fully the ordinary modern decencies of housing which any human being has a right to expect.

"Not one of these institutions adequately safeguards the public against the criminal element within its walls.

"Not one of these institutions nor the prison system collectively provides a means for rebuilding criminal unfortunates into good citizens, but on the contrary each furnishes every condition for the increase of crime and criminals."

The Herald-Tribune truly observes that this is a grave indictment of the first municipality in the United States, and it adds: "The city is justly chargeable with inhumanity, to say nothing of stupidity and futility in its corrective system, so long as it clings to the prison-dark age without effort to cure shortcomings." We have to add to the prison record the forty-four deaths in the city vince Christmas through drinking poisonous liquor, with all that it implies; and these are not the only counts in the indictment when we come to the consideration of the extent to which Divine Provi-

dence is behind New York.

The Wall Street Journal makes this biting eference to the jingoes in the United States: "In December and January of any year in the United States one thing can be counted upon with absolute certainty. This is an agitation for a larger organization of defense against invasion-in battleships, cruisers, aeroplanes and army personnel and equipment. It cannot be said that the agitation starts in Congress. Much of it originates with the people who manufacture such things, and still more of it with desk admirals and military men whose careers were arrested by the Armistice."
