Ottawa, May 4-Men of nineteen years of age are called pon to register for military service. A proclamation to this effect will be issued soon and, it is understood, will provide


that the men must register before June 1. None of them will, however, be actually called to the colors before July. The proclamation will apply to unmarried men and widowers without children.







War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS EN-LISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

Make every seed count this year. The amateur gardener has a weakness for using more seed than is absolutely necessary. Three poor overcrowded plants will not produce as much as one good strong one which has had room to develop perfectly. Through the medium of the War Garden Bulletin specific directions will be given from time to time as to the quantity of seed to be used in planting the various kinds of vegetables, how deep you should go and the distance that should be allowed between the different rows.

Seed is scarce—that is the chief reason why you should not be prodigal in your use of it. Every plant in its place is as gold—but every surplus plant is a weed. Make sure before you start putting in your seeds next week that the soil is in the right condition to receive them. It should be loose and friable. Young seedlings do not require very rich soil in the first instance but it is absolutely essential that it be well "worked."

Remember conditions in a country as large as Canada vary. Some portions are weeks ahead of others. These bulletins aim to strike about the average for Canada as a whole.

That garden crops will not give good results unless the soil is kept well cultivated is pointed out by the specialists of the U. S. department of agriculture. Cultivation is not intended primarily to kill weeds, although this is important, but to loosen the surface and let air into the soil so as to provide a more congenial environment for the roots of the plants. Plants in soil which is too wet turn yellow and if not relieved by proper cultivation and drainage, languish and die. Too much water in the soil dilutes the soil solution, impedes the formation of nitrate, destroys desirable soil organisms and permits the development of undesirable ones.

Soil which has been too wet, if allowed to dry and bake, offers an environment as uncongenial for plants as when too wet. Either extreme, therefore, should be guarded against.

If the soil is naturally wet, provide surface or tile drains. If inclined to make after rains, cultivate as soon as it is dry enough. As a rule, stirring the surface two inches will give better results than deep cultivation.

If the home garden is located near the kitchen door, the hoe and rake can be kept conveniently near so that odd moments can be spent in cultivating.





About half a dozen of us entered by the narrow door and were cramped up on the little platform which runs on each side of the machinery. We held on like grim death with our hands. For a few moments everything went well. Then there was an upward movement of the fore part of the tank and in a trice we found ourselves without a foothold and were suspended by our hands from the 'holdfasts' which are fixed for the purpose to the roof of the car. We knew we were mounting the steep gradient and we not sorry when we reached the top.

"The vessel jerked violently as she started on her downward course. In the twinkling of an eye were were thrown into the same position as before—only more so—with our legs dangling and our hands gripped in the effort to hold on and prevent being thrown all of a heap. We eventually emerged none the worse for the trip, but with a vivid impression of what must be the life of the gallant crews to whom our experience was a trifle as compared with theirs in the midst of shot and shell and with their own guns blazing away.

ST. JOHN SOLDIER WRITES TO TIMES OF RED TRIANGLE

What He Saw One Night in Y. M. C. A. Dugout Close To The Front Line in France-Good For The Weary Fighting Men.

The following letter relative to the work of the Y. M. C. A. in France was received this week from a St. John soldier who is in France, who has himself been in the front line and wounded, and knows from personal experience since 1913 all about the Red Triangle and its work. He writes:—

"Having read has be tells of the criticism of a few returned boys, and being in a position to observe closely the work of this institution, I feel that some few people may be interested to read a short account of their activitie is in one line, namely the forward cantens.

The chief business of the meeting was the presentation of reports from the various committees, on the general workings of the institution and the progress made during the past year. The general tone of the written reports submitted on behalf of the committee by their respective secretaries showed a progressive disposition in all the branches. The reports of the committees also held out timely suggestions which were favorably received.

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John Keefe, the president, submitted an exhaustive report on the general work carried on during the last year. The report was well prepared, showed careful attention to details and was admirably presented. It dealt with all phases of the institute work and he reported that the general progress was good and that success had been met with both financially and otherwise.

The election of new directors to replace four who are retiring, their terms being expired, resulted in the election of Thomas Nagle, John Keeffe, John T. Power, Martin Dolan and Martin O'-Leary. There were fourteen nominations.

Ernest Sterling read a lengthy report on behalf of the athletic committee. The report showed that a keen interest had been taken in all lines of sport. The report contained several suggestions all of which were favorably received.

The social committee submitted a report showing successful concerts and musical programmes held during the year. He paid him a high tribute for his work. Father Duke expressed the hope that Mr. McNamara would be here again next year. Special attention was directed by the spiritual director to more activity in lectures, debating, etc. He urged a debating union next year among the Catholic societies of the city.
