The persistent difficulties put in the way of such an investigation create the strongest presumption of a desire and an intention to conceal the truth on the part of those in Mexico who are responsible for what has happened."

CANADIAN NURSES ARE ORDERED ACROSS BORDER

Detroit, March 3—Charging that they had been guilty of entering this country in violation of the contract labor laws, the United States Immigration Department has served notice of deportation upon Miss Edna Schwalm, matron of the University of Michigan Hospital at Ann Arbor, and her assistant, Miss Elizabeth Wilson. Miss Wilson left the hospital and returned to Canada, but Miss Schwalm remained for negotiations with the head of the United States Immigration Service at Washington.

KING'S ACT CAUSE OF STRIKE

Brussels, Belgium, March 3—Several coal services were stopped today in mines at Brasschaat, because of the bursting of a subterranean stream into one of the galleries. The danger signal was promptly sounded throughout the mine and hundreds of employes escaped.

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Fire Burns Boarding House -- Proprietor Rushes Back to Save Wife; Both Perish

Campbellford, Ont., March 3—A terrible catastrophe occurred early this morning at Healy Falls, six miles north of here, when the Austria Hotel, owned by the proprietor, was burned to death in a fire which destroyed the boarding house. Twenty fellow countrymen employed in power construction, were occupants of the house and escaped in their night clothes. About 1:30 a. m. Bonivent discovered the place to be on fire and hastened to arouse the inmates and give the alarm. He then re-entered the burning building for his wife, but the fire had gained such headway that their escape was cut off and only the charred trunks of their bodies were found in the ruins.

CALGARY FIRE BURNS AUTOS WORTH \$40,000

POTATO RULES IN FORCE NOW IN MAINE

Regulations Adopted For Inspection of Aroostook Shipments to go into Effect

(Bangor Commercial)

Augusta, Feb. 28.—Hon. John A. Roberts, commissioner of agriculture, returned Saturday from Washington where, with Dr. Charles E. Woods, director of the Maine Experiment Station at Orono, and William A. Martin of Houlton, a prominent potato dealer, he conferred with the federal horticultural board in relation to the powdery scab potatoes in Aroostook.

The officials of the agriculture department informed this committee, which was appointed by Governor Haine, that there would be no quarantine for the present and that the state inspection will be aided from Washington.

The horticultural board at Washington will send four plant pathologists into Aroostook county at once to work in conjunction with the state department. Rules adopted by the state department were accepted by the authorities at Washington. These rules are as follows:

RAILROADS

(1) To agree definitely to accept for carriage only potatoes that are certified by the proper authorities of Maine.

(2) To report daily to the commission of agriculture of Maine and the federal horticultural board of Washington the origin, the car number and the destination of the cars, indicating whether the potatoes are for seed or for table purposes.

(3) In case knowledge comes to the railroad later of any diversion as to the destination of these cars both the commissioner of Maine and the federal horticultural board shall be notified as soon as that information comes to their knowledge.

(4) The railroads are to load potatoes only from regular houses and not directly to the vehicles.

The state of Maine will inspect all potatoes under any suspicion of contamination by seed only such as are believed as a result of suspicion to be free from powdery scab or from contamination with powdery scab.

All such potatoes to be shipped in sacks with label showing number of certificate to be attached to each sack. All potatoes under any suspicion of contamination will be certified for table stock only and no potatoes infected with powdery scab will be certified for shipment out of the state.

CERTIFICATION

Reasonable effort will be made by the Maine authorities to secure the disposal of possible contaminated potatoes at such centers of consumption as will eliminate as far as possible the use of such potatoes for seed stock.

WHITE SLAVERY A VAST BUSINESS

Commission Reports to Massachusetts Legislature

RESULTS OF INQUIRY

No Other Law Violation so Widespread and Open—Financial Profit, It is Declared, is the Principal Reason For Traffic

Boston, Mass., March 2.—The financial profit of the business of prostitution is the principal reason for its existence and continuance. No other form of criminal offense or violation of law so flagrant and open and so harmful to the community would be tolerated for a day in this state.

These declarations are made in a report submitted to the legislature by a commission appointed by the government and council under a resolve passed by the last legislature, to investigate the white slave traffic, so called in this state.

The members of the commission are Walter E. Fernald, Chas. W. Birtwell, Lucia L. Jacquith and Edwin Mulready. The commission has conducted a thorough investigation in seventy-nine cities and towns including all the large cities and the more important towns. Groups of women under arrest or serving sentences in penal institutions and reformatories have been examined and these in their own words.

"While the officials in no city in the state have openly adopted the policy of segregation and toleration," says the report, "yet it is a fact that in certain cities there are streets where there are many small houses of ill fame, in these cities the business is conducted in much the same way as in cities in other states where segregation and toleration is the accepted policy.

"In the larger cities the most flagrant and open expression of the commercialized aspect of prostitution is in connection with certain cafes and saloons. These places are known to be enormously profitable from a commercial point of view. The police take the position that they have no right to interfere if the letter of the law is observed, but it is difficult to understand why these immoral cafes and saloons are tolerated as the licensing authorities have full power to cancel the licenses. There is an intimate connection between certain phases of the liquor traffic and prostitution in the most profitable and engaged in legitimate liquor business would cooperate to disassociate this alliance.

The commission has received no evidence which would show that any offense is committed in this state in the trading of women for commercial purposes. Nevertheless the report says millions of dollars are invested in establishments utilized for such purposes and that "prostitution in all its ramifications constitutes a vast business in this state over the state."

"The commission has no knowledge," the report continues, "of the exact connection of the police with the larger cities in marked contrast with conditions revealed in recent vice investigations in the smaller towns.

The report emphasizes the danger in unregulated lodging houses, public dance halls and recreation parks, and extending to the commission has found "wide spread evidence of a strong public sentiment against the white slave traffic in conditions it has found to exist," and expresses the conviction that "this evil is susceptible of successful attack and treatment."

The fact that one-half the women examined in a vast business in this state, the report says, "clears the way for successful treatment of this portion of this class. The means of detection of prostitutes under arrest should be determined and such of them as are found to be feeble-minded or defective delinquents should be placed under custodial treatment. The recognition of feeble-minded girls at an early age in the public schools and proper provision for their protection in the community or custodial care in an institution would prevent much of the observed immorality among young girls and the resulting temptations to boys."

The commission recommends the appointment of "well qualified women with the proper authority as adjuncts to the police systems of the larger cities to reach and influence the reckless and unprotected young girls."

Diseases resulting from immorality, the report says, are a serious problem included in the list of contagious diseases of which boards of health take cognizance.

The commission submits acts embodying its recommendations for the suppression of houses of ill fame, for better supervision of hotels, lodging houses and dance halls, for control of cafes and saloons and for the facilitation of law enforcement.

THE SERVANT GIRL PROBLEM

Here's a Proposal to Have Working Hours Regulated

Philadelphia, Mar. 2.—The passage of a law regulating the hours and working conditions of cooks, nursemaids and other home servants, in addition to the women workers now protected by legislation, was advocated at a meeting of the State Industrial Commission here. Manufacturers, labor leaders and representatives of various societies interested in child and woman labor legislation were present, and many suggestions were made.

William P. Long of Pittsburg, president of the State Laundresses' Association, declared that "it is inconsistent for the law to protect the girl in the factory and permit the domestic to be 'worked to death.'"

James Murray, president of the State Federation of Labor, said it would be better for a girl to work twenty hours a day in a factory than ten hours in some households "with a nagging mistress and children getting on her nerves."

Mrs. R. P. Bradford, a social worker, denied that girls are "worked to death" in homes, and contended that the house servant has more money at the end of the year than the factory worker who receives twice as much money.

An Amazing Experiment

The possibility of withdrawing all the blood from the body of a living creature, purifying it, and returning it to the still living body is stated to have been conclusively demonstrated in Philadelphia by Professor John Jacob Abel, an eminent physiologist of the Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, assisted by collaborators attached to the staff of the

university. The object of the demonstration was to show that every drop of blood can be withdrawn from the body into tubes through which it will be propelled by the force of the heart beats as though it were still in circulation in the arteries and veins. During the passage of the blood through the tubes, the length of which is varied according to the subject experimented upon, it is possible, according to Professor Abel, to rid it of all the bacilli which may have been threatening the body with disease or death. In this purified state the blood is returned to its proper channels, the heart beating throughout without cessation. For the purpose of the demonstration, it is said, a dog was employed, and the blood was drawn through fifty feet of coiled tubes.

AGREEMENT IS MISSING AGAIN

Premier Took Copy of I. C. R.-C. P. R. Contract?

HAZEN CAUGHT AGAIN

Corrected by Mr. Sinclair, M.P.— Fisheries Treaty — Hon. Wm. Pugsley to Return to Ottawa — C. P. R. After C. N. R.?

Ottawa, March 2.—It has been said before that the Guelius trade agreement with the C. P. R. was an elusive document. It was produced in the house today but mysteriously disappeared after a few moments. Hon. Mr. Jamieson who had asked for it was absent when it was brought forth. On his return he asked as to its whereabouts but could learn nothing. Rumor has it that it is now in the possession of Premier Borden.

The order to Mr. Guelius to produce the agreement does not appear on the file and the agreement was never produced to the railway commission. The file contains the heads of the agreement. The nearest thing to it is a draft of formal agreement drawn in the C. P. R. office at Montreal and forwarded on Oct. 1 by Mr. Bosworth to Mr. Guelius for approval and signature. Mr. Guelius replied approving and asking if the C. P. R. wanted his signature or that of the minister. Mr. Bosworth replied that the C. P. R. would be satisfied to have any authorized person sign it.

So far as the return shows the agreement was never signed, however, the fact that an agreement was reached for the handling of freight and passenger trains of the C. P. R. between St. John and Halifax at not more than \$200 a train and instructing them to forward C. P. R. cars and trains with the same expedition that intercolonial trains are dispatched.

This order was dated Nov. 7. Whether signed or not the agreement became effective as an interesting exchange of telegrams shows. Commissioner McLellan moved that the letter from Premier Borden be laid on the table at the last session of the council, be taken from the table and that the following charge be sent to the provincial government: Mr. Bosworth wired Mr. Guelius that the intercolonial employees were not handling C. P. R. freight as agreed upon, and Mr. Guelius replied that he was running the intercolonial.

The next day Mr. Bosworth complained that proper provisions were not made at Halifax for landing passengers from the steamers and that they had to walk a long distance to the train. He asked that the next boat be differently berthed in short order. Mr. Guelius replied that the next boat would go to the same berth. His reply aroused Mr. Bosworth, who wired that better arrangements would have to be made at Halifax for the steamers if the intercolonial wished to avoid serious consequences. Mr. Guelius climbed down by wire, and said that he was worth not to bring on the serious consequences, saying that the C. P. R. wishes would be met.

It is hoped that the prime minister may return the papers soon. If they do the agreement will be discussed in the house fully. Hon. Mr. Hasen was caught napping again today. He made another "mistake" He had said a few days ago that an increased trade had been going on in fish and other goods between the United States and the shippers than under the old government. Mr. Sinclair took the matter up with him and told Mr. Hasen today that the rates were the same as under the old government despite the fact that Mr. Hasen had said the charges were lower.

In response to a query by Sir Wilfrid, Hon. Mr. Hasen said today that the necessary United States legislation to ratify the international fisheries treaty would probably be passed in a few days. Ottawa had passed the ratifying legislation in 1910.

Canada, March 2.—Word received here today from Hon. Dr. Pugsley, who is now in New York, states that the minister of public works has almost completely recovered from his recent illness and expects to leave the capital for the concluding part of the session. Dr. Pugsley will take a short holiday trip to the south before returning. The armistist reports as to his illness have been very greatly exaggerated.

A letter was received from the secretary-treasurer of the St. John River Hydro Electric Co., stating that the company had completed arrangements for the development of power at Meductic Falls for transmission of power to St. John. Mayor Frink said that R. Max McCarty, the secretary-treasurer, had given him the impression that the council's approval was asked only to show its approval of a cheaper power for St. John.

Mr. Borden is worried over the Mackenzie & Mann loan and the visit of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy to assert the C. P. R. influence yesterday did not leave him any more assured. The C. P. R. are opposing the loan. Following the visit of Sir Thomas, Hon. Mr. Rogers gave a private dinner last night at which he was present as well as Hon. W. T. White who is styled the special guardian of the Mackenzie & Mann interests, but who broke bread with a strong C. P. R. combination.



made that the four men, including Mayor Mitchell, do not together pay taxes in excess of \$2,000 a year.

Almost all of New York's mayors from 1876 to the present were either men of large wealth or in possession of comfortable fortunes. Two or three of these millionaires were mayors of New York.

After Abram S. Hewitt had finished his term as mayor and had demonstrated the manner in which he would run the city, the people of New York found themselves in a quandary. They had never before had a mayor who was not a millionaire.

A mayor of New York often learns to his grief how excessive are some of the disbursements and how little is the return received by the city for them. Several times Mr. Hewitt attempted to effect economies and to prevent waste, only to find himself blocked, not maliciously or corruptly, but by the very inertia which is characteristic of the administration of any very great city.

The new mayor of New York has gained a reputation for great ability in discovering and correcting leaks, waste and useless appropriations, but he has gained his reputation in a minor capacity.

It is his intention to make every dollar of the billion whose disbursement he and his associates will control count, and the fact that he is himself without property, while his associates have very little, will, it is believed, aid him in carrying out this purpose, rather than impair the ability to do so.

Fears Nine Lives Are Lost. Providence, R. I., March 2.—Fears that nine lives were lost on the coal laden barge Frank Pendleton and Joseph, which were torn loose from the tug Edgar P. Luckenbach of Fire Island Lightship in last night's gale, were expressed here tonight. The tow was bound to this city from Norfolk.

COLONEL LYNCH WHO FOUGHT WITH BOERS AGAINST ENGLAND NOW SAYS HE IS GOOD BRITISHER

A new supporter of the British Empire announced himself in the House of Commons in London recently in the person of Colonel Arthur Lynch, Nationalist M. P. for West Clare.

Born in Australia in 1841, Mr. Lynch practiced for a short time as an engineer in Melbourne before moving to Europe, where he lived in London and Paris as a newspaper man. On the outbreak of the Boer War he organized the 2nd Irish Brigade, which operated under General Buller, and fought in Natal against the British troops. After the war he went to Paris, and while there in 1903 he was elected by a large majority as Nationalist M. P. for Galway. On going to England to take his seat, however, he was arrested, convicted of high treason, on January 23, 1903, and sentenced to death. The sentence was commuted to penal servitude for life. On January 24, 1904, he was released on licence, and he received a free pardon on June 1, 1907. He is now a qualified doctor.

In the House of Commons Lord Hugh Cecil referred to Mr. Lynch's career as a foreign country, and then Mr. Lynch made a personal explanation of his conduct in the Boer war. He admitted that when he fought with the Boers, he had not much respect for the British constitution. He was born of Irish parents and fought for liberty. He was tried and condemned to death, and that they were in such a position that they could not do otherwise. It was a moment (he added), when he was in a sense face to face with his own soul. Never for a moment did he regret his actions or regret his opinions. Since that time, however, the very men with whom he fought, including the British, have become his friends. Also, since then, England and the United States have become his friends, and now if Britain was attacked he would fight for her. He would go further and say that he believed what some of the people of Ulster said they believed, he would even fight for them.

The statement was received with good-humored cheers and laughter.



VALUE OF ENGLISH COINS HERE.
A correspondent has written to the Times asking for Canadian valuations of English currency as he says that there are times when British money is presented here and the equivalent in Canadian currency is not always certain. A local bank manager said today that most of the old country coinage which came to St. John found an entrance at the West side and the bank branches there frequently had large quantities of it on hand.
The halfpennies he said generally passed for a copper, while for six pennies ten cents was usually given. Three-pence would bring about four cents; six-pence 10 cents; a shilling 20 cents; a half-crown, fifty cents; ten shillings, \$2.40, and £1 \$4.82. These were the most common pieces of English coinage which were presented here and this was the average schedule of exchange.

SUBURBAN TRAIN IN OPERATION AGAIN

This Morning People Along I. C. R. Reached The City on Time

There was joy in the hearts of suburbanites this morning—they reached the city on time and were not required to ride in passenger cars behind a string of freight cars. The changes promised yesterday in the suburban schedule went into effect today so far as the morning train was concerned, but it is thought that it will be at least a week before the change in the 6.15 express is made operative. It will be necessary to make the announcement of the change of time in the running of the Quebec express twenty minutes earlier.

McAVITY NEGOTIATIONS ARE DELAYED PENDING SPUR LINE ARRANGEMENT

The agreement between the city commissioners and T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., regarding the concessions asked for in consideration of their erecting a large modern plant, has not yet been completed. The negotiations between the city and the company are at a standstill until the company can complete their arrangements with the I. C. R. for a spur railway line from the main tracks across the Marsh creek and Robney way. Mr. Gustellus has promised to send an engineer to St. John to report upon the matter and until his report has been submitted and acted upon the negotiations with the city will be held up.

COMPLAIN OF UNWELCOME CALLERS AT HOMES OF WRIGHT STREET PEOPLE

Several people living in Wright street and vicinity have been visited frequently of late by men begging from door to door and they complain of the absence of policemen.

About ten o'clock on Sunday morning an able bodied young man knocked at the back door of a house in this locality and asked for a lunch. The housewife took pity on him and put him up an extra good dinner for which he thanked her and walked away. Happening to look out of the window a few moments later, however, she saw him enter a house on the opposite side of the street. Later on in the day this lady was speaking of the occurrence to another neighbor who told her that a man answering to the description of the first mentioned had gone to her house on the same morning and asked for a cup of tea. She said she was willing to do what she could for the man who might be in want, but finding that she had no tea on the stove she offered him a hot drink of coffee. The uninvited guest became quite indignant at this and said that it was his business to be asked for a hot drink of coffee and that he would have to go elsewhere for it. He left in a rage, insisting that he would-be wait for his tea.

About six o'clock that Sunday evening another man called at the house of the lady who had given out the lunch in the morning and he was given a good meal. He was nicely washed and shaved, was seen to cross the street and knock at the door of the same house as his presence had done in the morning. Yesterday one of the residents of this street said that a policeman had been seen in that district one afternoon last week but only for a few minutes.

ANOTHER PLAN TO SIDETRACK ST. JOHN?

It has been reported for some time past that application will be made to the legislature for a subsidy of \$20,000 or \$25,000 a mile for a railroad from Fredericton to L'Etang, and that the C. P. R. is back of the project. The promoters profess to have assurances that the C. P. R. would utilize the road. It is thought the government will hesitate about spending public money on a road that would divert traffic from the Valley railway and the N. E. C., both of which are built by public money. There is already a charter for a Fredericton-L'Etang line, but there never has been any sign of money to build it.

HOSPITAL COMPLAINT AND ANSWER

The Times has received a letter from Max L. Levine, complaining that his mother was not well treated in the General Public Hospital. He says she went there on Tuesday of last week and remained some days, at the end of which time he took her away worse than when she went there, on account of treatment she received. He says that things taken there for her would either be kept two or three days or not given to her at all, and that when she asked one of the nurses for a cup of milk, the latter said, "Oh you people are too fussy." Mr. Levine appears to think that race prejudice had something to do with the alleged lack of care, and makes some comparison between St. John and Russia in the matter of civilization.
Dr. D. C. Malcolm, superintendent of the hospital, when asked about this case, said that this was a nervous case. The patient, he said, had told him that she had gone to nearly every doctor in town without getting any relief, and she was admitted to the hospital, and was discharged on her own request. Doctor Malcolm said he had questioned the nurses about the case and they had said that the patient had received every attention. On one occasion only was the food that was brought up for her not given to her immediately, and at that time it was left in without a name, and the patient did not get it until the following morning.
This case was in a ward, the superintendent said, with three other patients. One of these said to him yesterday that she thought Mrs. Levine received good treatment at her hands of the nurses.
