A Remarkable Lighthouse.

The most brilliant lighthouse in the world has lately been lit up in the leart of France near Dijon. It is not intended as an aid to marine navigator but is to act as a guide at night t all airplane lines passing across Franc towards the south and southeast. Th air lighthouse has a range of 500 miles it is an immense revolving two-rayed light of 1,000 million candle power. 1 will sweep nightly over a vast area hat will include Lille, Brussels, Frankfurt, Milan and Rouen. Of course the light will not be seen by people on the ground at the other side of the Alps, or at other distant places. But the air pilots will see it on clear nights as they fly at a height of 10,000 feet.

The most powerful marine light The most powerful marine light-houses in the world are feeble compar-ed with the first big air lighthouse. It has thirty times as much luminous power. The aerial lighthouse is situated on a plateau 2,000 feet high, at sort of aerial junction where the main



AMHERST, May 6.—The latest estimates of lumber production in Cumberland county for the 1924-25 season make the total between 40,000,000 and 45,000,000 feet. In spite of the adverse condition of the last winter, comparatively good cuts are reported from all sections of the county. Twenty-five million feet will be shipped from the Parrsboro shore alone, where the return from timber products are expected to amount to close on \$850,000. The lumber will go to the English and American markets.
