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# JOURNAL OF SYNOD.

#### THIRD SESSION.

OTTAWA, June 20th, 1898.

In accordance with Canon Three, the third session of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa was preceded by Divine Service in Christ Church Cathedral. Evensong was said by the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert, M. A. The First Lesson was read by the Very Reverend the Dean of Ottawa, and the Second Lesson by Rev. Canon Pollard.

The sermon was preached by Rev. W. H. Stiles, Rector of March, from I Timothy, iv, 6: "If thou put the brethren in rememberance of these things, thou shalt be a good minister of Jesus Christ."

#### FIRST DAY.

OTTAWA, June 21st, 1898.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in Christ Church Cathedral at 7 a. m. by the Lord Bishop of Ottawa, assisted by the Very Reverend the Dean Reverend M. G. Poole, R. v. Rural Dean Read and Rev. W. M. Loucks.

The offerings at both services were in aid of the Diocesan Mission Fund and amounted to \$30.32. Mattins were said in St. John's Church at 8.45 a. m.

#### CREDENTIALS OF LAY DELEGATES.

Immediately after service, a committee consisting of the Lay Secretary with Messrs. T. M. Clark and C. Macnab met in St. John's Hall to receive and examine the certificates of Lay Delegates.

#### BUSINESS MEETING.

At 9:30 a. m. His Lordship took the chair in St. John's Hall and called the meeting to order. Venerable Archdeacon Bogert said the Synod prayer.

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#### MEMBERS PRESENT.

The Roll of Clergy and Lay Delegates was called by the Secretaries, and a quorum being present, viz., 33 Clergymen, and 33 Lay Delegates representing 21 parishes, the Bishop declared the Synod open for business.

SUSPENSION OF RULES OF ORDER.—REV. PROVOST WFLCH.

The rules of order were suspended on motion of Ven. Archdeacon Bogert, and the Bishop introduced the Rev. Provost Welch of Trinity University, who, upon the invitation of the Bishop and the Synod, delivered a short address upon the needs of Trinity University and its claims upon the Churchmen of Canada.

#### LETTERS OF REGRET.

The Bishop then read letters of regret from Rev. A. H. Coleman Rev. R. B. Waterman, Rev. W. J. Moody and Mr. J. G. Higginson, who, were unable to be present at the meeting of the Synod.

#### S. P. C K. REPORT.

By request of the Bishop, the rules of order were suspended to enable Rev. R. W. Samwell, who was obliged to leave for home, to present the Report of the S. P. C. K. Committee.

The Report was presented, but the discussion and adoption was allowed to stand until a later stage of the proceedings.

# AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS REPORT.

Rev. Canon Low presented the Report of the Audit and Accounts Committee and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. R. W. Samwell,

The Report was adopted, but the attention of the Synod was called to the non-compliance with the provision of the Canon providing for the printing of the Audit and Accounts Committee Report. The Chairman of the Committee stated that it was an oversight, and that in future he would have the Report printed as required by the Canon. (Appendix B 2).

# ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

#### CLERICAL SECRETARY.

Moved by Rev. W. H. Stiles and seconded by Rev. S. Gower

That Rev. Canon Hanington be elected Clerical Secretary for the ensuing year.—Carried.

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#### LAY SECRETARY.

It was moved by C. Macnab and seconded by J. W. Shore,

That Mr. J. F. Orde be elected Lay Secretary for the ensuing year.

#### TREASURER

It was m ved by the Chancellor and seconded by W. H. Rowley,

That Mr. C. A. Eliot be elected Treasurer for the ensuing year, and that the thanks of the Synod are due to him, and to Mr. J. F. Orde for having performed the duties of the Treasurer during Mr. Eliot's absence in England.—Carried.

# AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

Moved by the Chancellor and seconded by J. F. Orde,

That Rev. A. W. Mackay, W. L. Marler and W. H. Berry be the Audit and Accounts Committee for the ensuing year —Carried.

# MINUTES OF THE LAST DAY OF LAST SESSION.

It was moved by the Clerical Secretary and seconded by the Registrar,

That the minutes of the last day's procedings of the second session of the Synod, as printed in the Journal of that session, be confirmed.—Carried.

#### THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

The Lord Bis op then delivered his address to the Synod. (Appendix A).

It was moved by Rev. R. W. Samwell and seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Scantlebury.

That the address of the Lord Bishop to the Synod be printed with the Mission Board Report, as last year.—Carried.

It was moved by Canon Pollard and seconded by Canon Nesbitt,

That such parts of the Bishop's Address as His Lordship may see fit be referred to the Committees already appointed to deal with them, or a special Committee.—Carried.

#### METROPOLITAN SEE

Rev. R. W. Samwell read a letter from the Archbishop of Ontario referring to the Metropolitan See. (Appendix F.) Whereupon it was moved by J. F. Orde and seconded by the Chancellor,

That the Archbishep's communication respecting the Metropolitan See be referred to the Metropolitan See Committee for consideration and report, such report to be presented if possible to-morrow morning when the order for reports is called.—Carried.

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It was moved by Canon Nerbitt and seconded by Wm. Richey.

That the Canon on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund be taken up and considered this afternoon at 2.30.—Carried.

The Synod then adjourned until 2:30 p.m.

### Afternoon Session

ACT OF PARLIAMENT RESPECTING CANONS.

The Chare llor moved and the Lay Secretary seconded,

That the Act respecting the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, being 61 VictoriaChapter 73, be accepted, and that the thanks of the Synod are due to Col. Matheson, M.P.P., for his kindness in taking charge of the Act before the Legislature.

The Act was read to the Synod by the Lay Secretary and the motion was carried. (Appendix.)

#### PRINTING OF CANONS

Some discussion then arose with respect to the printing of the Canons of the Diocese as they now stand for the information of the members of the Synod when the Chancellor suggested that they should be printed in an appendix to the Journal of the Synod. This proposition was agreed to by the Synod.

# REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The report of the executive committee was presented by the Clerical Secretary and on motion was adopted. (Appendix B).

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

It was moved by Canon Polisrd and seconded by Canon Muck eston.

That the Rules of Order be suspended to allow of the introduction of the Report of the Special Committee appointed at the last meeting of the Synod to consider the state of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—Carried.

The Lay Secretary then read the Report of the said Committee and moved, seconded by Mr. Macnab,

That the Synod do resolve itself into a Committee of the Whole to consider the proposed new Canon on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.-Carried.

The Synod then proceeded in Committee to consider the proposed Canon

At 5.30 the Committee reported progress and asked that the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Canon have precedence to morrow morning

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#### SECOND DAY.

June 22nd, 1898

Mattins were said in St. John's Church at 8:45 a.m.; at nine o'clock the Bishop took the chair in St. John's Hall and opened the meeting for business, the Archdeacon saying prayers.

The minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and con-

firmed.

#### CHANGE OF FINANCIAL YEAR

The Bishop appointed the following Committee on the change of the Financial Year of each Congregation and of this Synod:

#### HAWKESBURY ENDOWMENT

Moved by the Chancellor and seconded by the Dean,

That this Synod having heard read the deed of trust, dated 18th February, 1898, from Robert Hamilton, Esquire, to the Synod, endowing the Parish of Hawkesbury with \$10,000 for the support of the Rector or Incumbent of the Church of the Holy Trinity of that Parish, hereby gratefully accepts such deed of trust, and desires to tender to the munificent donor the cordial thanks of the Synod for his most liberal benefaction.—Carried.

#### METROPOLITAN SEE.

The Very Reverend The Dean then presented the report of the Committee on the Metropolitan See and moved its adoption, seconded by the Chancellor. (Appendix F).

Moved by Canon Pollard and seconded by Rural Dean

Houston,

That the report be received and held over for future consideration.

Moved by Canon Low and seconded by Reverend George Bousfield,

That the communication from the Metropolitan respecting the Metropolitan See be acknowledged, and that this Synod appoint the Clerical and Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod together with the Bishop, as a Committee to confer with the House of Bishops during the coming Provincial Synod.

Canon Pollard requested permission to withdraw his Resolution, which request was granted, whereupon Canon Low's amendment was put and carried. Whole to Orphans

That the report be not received, but be referred back to the Committee, with the request that the amount granted to Mr. Fleming be increased from \$100 to \$150.

The amendment was carried, and the report was referred back to the Committee for amendment.

# DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The report of the Committee on Domestic and Foreign Missions was presented by Rev. C. non Pollard, who moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. C. V. F. Bliss.—Carried. (Appendix B 10).

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That the Very Reverend the Dean of Ottawa, Rev. Canon Pollard, Judge Senkler and M. W. Maynard be nominated to represent the Diocese of Ottawa on the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions, and also on the General Board of Missions.—Carried.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF RURAL DEANS.

That the Report of the Rural Deans be amended by the omission of one clause.

This motion was carried and the Report was referred back to the Committee.

The rules of order being suspended, it was moved by Rev. A. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Mason Mills,

That the Very Rev. the Dean, Ven. Archdeacon Bogert, Rural Deans Bliss and Houston, the Chancellor, Mr. Orde and Mr. Rowley, and the mover and seconder, be a committee to take into consideration the duties of the office of Church Warden, prepare a canon embodying them, and report at the next session of this Synod.—Carried.

#### ANNUAL REPORTS TO COMMITTEES

On motion of C. Macaab, the rules of order were suspended to allow him to introduce the following motion:

That the Chairman of each Committee be instructed to draw up and present an annual report to the Synod of the Diocese, but shall leave the report to the "May Meetings" on file in the Synod office.

This motion was moved by C. Macuab and seconded by Rev. C. V. F. Bliss and carried.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The report of the Finance Committee was, in the absence of the Chairman, presented by the Lay Secretary, who moved its adoption.

Moved by Rev. A Phillips and sconded by R v. C. E. Sills, That the report be amended by reducing the assessment on the Hawkesbury endowment from \$50 to \$25.—Carried.

Moved by W. L. Marler and seconded by Rev. A H. Whalley, That should funds permit, the Clerical Secretary be paid a bonus this year of one hundred dollars.

During the discussion of this motion the Synod adjourned until the afternoon.

### Afternoon Session.

The Synod met again at 2:30 p.m.

#### CANON No. XVI.

#### THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.

#### I. NATURE OF FUND.

1. There shall be a fund for the benefit of the widows and orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese to be known as "The Widows' and Orphans' Fund'(hereinafter called the Fund)which shall comprise the pro rata share of the interest and income derived from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Capital administered by the Synod in the Consolidated Funds Account (as defined by Canon XIV. A.) together with the annual subsriptions and assessments of the Clergy hereinafter mentioned, the annual collections in the following paragraph mentioned, and such other contributions as may be received from time to time for the purposes of said Fund, and the said Fund shall be administered on the conditions and in the manner hereinafter set forth.

2. A sermon shall be preached and a collection shall be made annually by every clergyman holding a cure in this Diocese, on the Fifth Sunday in Lent or one of the two following Sundays, in every Church in which service is celebrated on that day, and in every other Church, Chapel or Mission Station in each Cure in which Sunday services are held, as soon after the said Sunday as the incumbent of such Parish or Mission finds practicable; and the proceeds of such collection shall be sent by the Clergyman to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod immediately after the taking up of the same, and shall be placed by him to the credit of the said fund.

#### II. SUBSCRIBERS.

3. Every Clergyman of the Diocese of Ottawa shall subscribe to this fund as hereinafter provided.

4. All Clergymen who have not heretofore been subscribers to the fund under the provisions of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Canon in force immediately prior to the coming into force of this Canon, or who are in arrears under the said Canon, shall be required to pay their arrears by instalments extending over such period as the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee may decide.

5. Such arrears shall be collected from Clergymen admitted to or ordained in the Diocese of Ontario prior to the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896, from the date of such admission or ordination; and from Clergymen admitted to or ordained in the Diocese of Ottawa since the first day of May, 1896, or if hereafter admitted to or ordained in this Diocese from the date of ordination, provided that in exceptional cases the Committee shall have power to accept a smaller sum than the actual amount due in full discharge of such arrears.

#### III. SUBSCRIPTIONS.

6. The subscription payable by each Clergyman shall be five dollars per year, payable on or before the first day of January in each year, and in order to make the date of payment uniform for all subscribers, the first subscription

in each case shall be apportioned if necessary. If the said subscription is not paid by the 31st day of January in each year, the Clerical Secretary shall notify the delinquent subscriber that he is in default. Provided that in the case of any Clergyman of this Diocese who has commuted under the provisions of any Canon in force prior to the coming into force of this Canon, no subscription shall be required under this Canon, but this exemption shall not apply to the

assessment mentioned in the next paragraph hereof.

7. The Clerical Secretary shall present to the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee at its regular meeting in November of each year, a statement and estimate of the fund for the current year. Should this statement and estimate show that the Fund will not be sufficient to meet the pensions and charges on the Fund, then the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee shall make assessment upon all the Clergy for an amount to make up such estimated deficiency. Such assessment shall be a pro rata percentage not exceeding one per cent upon the net income of each Clergyman derived from the following sources, viz. : the annual stipend actually received from the Parish, less rent and taxes (if any), as shown by the last annual returns to the Synod, the annuities received from the Clergy Trust Fund and from the Rectory Lands Fund and the annual grant received from the Mission Fund.

8. Each Clergyman so assessed shall be thereupon notified by the Clerical Secretary of such assessment and of the amount due by him to the Synod therefor, and such amount shall be due and payable to the Synod on the 1st day of March following, and shall from the date of such notice be deemed to be a subscription due to the Synod under this Canon and if not paid by the said 1st day of March, such Clergyman shall be deemed to be in default under

9. All arrears both of subscriptions and assessments shall hereafter bear interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum from the date when they respectively become due until payment.

10. At each half-yearly meeting of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee, the Clerical Secretary shall submit a list showing the names of all those who are in default under Sections six and eight hereof, and such list

shall be reported to and dealt with by the Synod.

11. In case of any such default, the Clerical Secretary acting under the direction of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee in each case, shall deduct the amount of the arrears both of subscriptions and assessments, with interest at six per cent. per annum from the date of such default, from any grant of money which such Clergyman so in default would otherwise be entitled to receive from the Synod under any Canon, regulation or practice now or hereafter in force whether from the Clergy Trust Fund or from the Rectory Lands Fund or from the Mission Fund or from any other Fund or moneys in the control of or passing through the hands of the Synod, and such deduction shall be made from the first payment to be made to such Clergyman after the receipt by the Clerical Secretary of directions to act under this Section from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee.

12. In any case of such default where there is no grant or sum of money out of which the arrears can be deducted and paid under the preceding section, the Synod shall have power by resolution to that effect to exclude the Clergyman so in default from the meetings and proceedings of the Synod and from his right to vote in the Synod so long as he so remains in default.

13. Every Clergyman whose name is reported to the Synod under section Ten as being in default shall be ineligible to act on any Committee of the Synod during the Synodical year then commencing; unless before the close of such session of the Synod he shall have paid all such arrears and interest, but this section shall not apply to any Clergyman who shall be paying his arrears in instalments under the provisions of section four hereof,

#### IV. WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

14. Upon the death of any Clergyman of this Diocese leaving a widow or children under the age of 18 years, or both, such widow, or the guardian of such children, desiring an annuity from the Fund, shall present to the Committee through the Clerical Secretary, a memorial setting forth the date of the death of such Clergyman, the name of his widow, or of the guardian as the case may be, and the names and ages of such children, and such memorial shall be taken into consideration by the Committee at its next meeting after

the receipt thereof.

15. The Committee shall thereupon place such widow and children upon the list of annuitants entitled to the benefit of the said Fund, (provided always that such widow and children are members of the Church of England) and

shall, if the Fund suffices, make the following grants, namely :

1. For the widow (if any) an annual sum not exceeding two

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hundred dollars during widowhood.

2. For each child, if there be also a widow, an annual sum not exceeding forty dollars, until such child attains the age of eighteen years or marries, whichever shall first happen. Provided that in no such case shall the grants for all the children of one Clergyman exceed the annual sum of \$160.00.

For each child, if there be no widow, an annual sum not exceeding eighty dollars, until such child attains the age of eighteen years or marries, whichever shall first happen. Provided that in no such case shall the grants for all the children of one

Clergyman exceed the annual sum of \$200.00.

Provided also that any widow or orphan withdrawing from the Church of England, shall, from the date of such withdrawal, forfeit the annuities provided under this Canon.

16. Pursuant to the agreement between the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario and the Incorporated Synod of this Diocese, dated the 12th August, 1896, all the Widows and Orphans who were entitled to the annuities from the Widows and Orphans Fund of the former Diocese of Ontario on the 30th day of April, A.D., 1896, under Canon XVI of the said Diocese as then in force, are hereby declared to have been since the said date, and shall be hereafter, entitled to be paid from time to time (either directly or through the Incorporated Synod of the present Diocese of Ontario, as may be arranged between the officers of the respective Synods) from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese, one half the amount of such annuities as shall be payable to them from time to time under the Canons of the Diocese of Ontario and of this Diocese, subject however to such amounts being hereafter reduced at any time and from time to time in the manner hereinafter provided.

17. Save and except as provided by this Canon, no widow or orphan of any Clergyman who might otherwise have been entitled to a claim upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the Diocese of Ontario prior to the division thereof on the 1st day of May, A.D., 1896, shall be entitled to any claim upon

the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese.

18. The widows and children of all Clergymen of this Diocese who became annuitants upon the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese since the 1st day of May, A.D., 1896, shall also become annultants under this Canon in the same manner and to the same extent as the annuitants mentioned in paragraph fifteen hereof.

19. All grants shall be from year to year only and shall be subject to

reduction in the manner provided in the following section hereof.

20. In the event of the assessment on the Clerical income provided for in section seven hereof being insufficient to make up the deficit in the Fund, as shown by the statement and estimate mentioned in said section seven, it shall be the duty of the Committee at its regular November Committee Meeting, to make a proportionate reduction in the grants for the financial year then current. Such reduction shall be of a uniform percentage upon all the annuitants, both widows and children, including also the half share payable by this Diocese of the annuities mentioned in section sixteen hereof Provided however, that if the Fund will permit, the Committee may increase the grants for the year following only, over and above the maximum mentioned in section fifteen, by the amount of such previous reduction.

21. If at the death of a Clergyman he is in arrears or in default within the meaning of sections six or eight, his widow and orphans shall nevertheless be entitled to the same grants as if such Clergyman were not in arrears or in default, but the amount of his arrears and interest thereon shall be retained by the Synod, by instalments, in such manner as the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee shall recommend, out of the payments made to his widow or

22. The several annuities shall be payable in quarterly payments on the first days of January, April, July and October to the Widow or Guardian.

23. Every annuitant on the Widows' and Orphans' Fund shall, before he or she may be paid his or her quarterly annuity, make or cause to be made one of the following declarations in the presence of a neighboring Clergyman, who shall duly attest the same.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS DELIVERED AT THE OPENING OF THE SYNOD.

My Reverend Brethren and My Brethren of the Laity,— The year which we review to-day is bright with many encouraging facts for which we should give our humble thanks to God.

First of all, we are at unity among ourselves. Harmony and good will and mutual confidence prevail throughout the Diocese.

SECOND. One of our Parishes, Trinity Church, Hawkesbury, has received an addition of \$10,000 to its endowment fund. The Synod has been made the trustee of this sum under a deed which will be submitted to you in due course by the Chancellor who will indicate the action which may be requisite and appropriate on your part. The Bishop of Ottawa and the Rector of Trinity Church, Hawkesbury and the Senior Warden of the Parish have for some years been the trustees of some \$5,600, as the endowment of this Parish.

The abuses to which endowments are liable or to which they may give rise are not a valid or sufficient argument against them. It is our duty to provide intelligently against the abuses in whatsoever way they may arise.

More than twenty thousand clergymen in England's Church to-day are by their self-sacrificing devotion to the highest interests of their congregations, the best witnesses you could desire, that endowments do not, as a rule and much less as a necessity, promote indifference and idleness among the Clergy. The endowments of their Parishes render them independent of their people but fail to betray them into indifference or sluggishness. The training which they have received

The members o invitation of their R and the principles which they have adopted and the mighty power of the Grace of God have kept them safe under such temptations, rendering them careless as to their own ease and comfort and unsparing in their efforts for the Church and people committed to their care.

It is not on the Clergy but on the Laity that endowments in our day have had an unfavourable influence. No one can deny that it is so in England. Our Canadian families contribute far more towards the maintenance of the Church's ministrations in their Parish than families of like position in England, but even in Canada I have seen the disposition in not a few to relieve themselves of the duty of contributing, on the ground that their Parish had an endowment or that their Clergyman was on the Commutation fund or that the Mission fund provided for him. I am persuaded that it is in this direction that the danger of Endowments will show itself first among us and it is here that we should seek to confront their abuse. In my humble opinion this may be successfully done by the adoption of a Canon which will admit of the induction of a clergyman into an endowed Parish only after the execution by the Wardens of the Memorandum of agreement as to the Clergyman's stipend under the Bylaw of our Mission Board as to the stipends of the Clergy. I propose at a later point in my address to treat of this Bylaw, I will accordingly now proceed to refer to the third very bright and encouraging fact in the year that is past,

Mrs. McLennan, whose attractive home is near Lancaster, has generously undertaken to contribute \$300 a year for five years towards the stipend of a Missionary in Glengarry. Mrs. McLennan also promises very liberally to provide \$500 towards the erection of a Church, and ioffers a site for the Church and Parsonage in the future, to be vested in the Church. Mr. Duncan McLennan of Ridgewood, whose home is nearly opposite to his mother's, also generously proposes to put in order for the Clergyman's use, until a Parsonage can be built in the future, a good stone house overlooking the St. Lawrence.

We have yet another encouraging fact in the year's history. An additional Parish has been created in the City of Ottawa. It is to be known as the Parish of St. Matthew, the Apostle and Evangelist.

The members of the several congregations in the city have, on the invitation of their Rectors, undertaken to contribute \$400 per annum

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for two years towards the Clergyman's stipend, while the congregation is being drawn together and consolidated.

The members of the Church in Ottawa have further provided \$2,000 towards the purchase of a suitable site and the erection of a building which will be used as a Sunday School and Parish Room when the congregation of St. Matthews may be strong enough to erect an enduring temple for the worship of Almighty God.

You will all unite with me in bidding the Rector of this Parish and his people "God speed." May they grow in vigorous spiritual Tancock to the Re jife as time advances, and proclaim by their actions that congregations are not formed for their own selfish convenience and advantage, but for the honor and worship of Almighty God and the extension of His kingdom in the world. You will agree with me that we may not look for such bright and encouraging facts every year.

I will now refer to the CHANGES IN THE DIOCESE during the year.

The Reverend W. D. Mercer, who had been obliged by failing health to retire from active work, before I entered upon my office among you, has been taken from us by death.

Mr. Mercer was in the prime of his life and possessed intellectual gifts of a high order. He was a graduate of McGill University. I had known him while he was attending school as a boy in Quebec. I felt a deep interest in him, and spared no effort to be of service to him

Mr. Abraham Code, one of the two Auditors of the Diocese, has also been taken from us by death. Although advanced in life, he was not much older than many of us. His place amongst us must now be filled by another. It may be your place or mine which may be vacant in the next Synod. Are we so doing our duty to God and man as to be ready to surrender the trust now continued to us by

S. Mountain, who has had the ambition to suggest the creation of another Diocese with its See at Cornwall, and has actually succeeded in securing the erection and partial endowment of the Church of the Good Shepherd in that city. With warm welcome and hearty appreciation we all unite in greeting Dr. Mountain, as a Canon of Christ Church Cathedral.

# CONFIRMATIONS.

During the year ending 25th April, the date of all our returns to the Synod, 705 persons have received God's most precious gift in Conthat of the Church firmation. Of these 339 were males and 366 were females; 114 were brought up outside the Church of England.

You will all feel with me deep disappointment with this feature in our year's work. We have in round numbers 30,000 Church people in this Diocese. If the Bishop and Clergy and parents are living up to their duty, 30,000 will be confirmed at least in 30 years, that is in one generation, so that our annual number confirmed ought not to fall below 1,000. I confess to a feeling of great disappointment, and I appeal to my brethren of the Clergy to be untiring and unsparing of themselves in searching out and preparing with the greatest possible carefulness and thoroughness all in their several congregations who are not confirmed.

If, as both Scripture and the Church Catholic teach us, the Holy Ghost who is the Sanctifier, is bestowed by God in answer to prayer and through the laying of hands in Confirmation, then our responsibility can hardly be exaggerated in connection with each and every one who, through any oversight or neglect or carelessness or indifference on our part, is left without that infinite help to a Godly and righteous life.

I make my appeal also to our Laymen in the Diocese, and especially to those who are selected by their brethren to represent them in Synod, to help us in bringing all our people, without exception, old and young, to Confirmation. By your prayers and by your efforts in Sunday School and in private, and by affording to the Clergy such information as you may conclude that they have not in their possession, do all in your power to secure that none shall be overlooked.

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There is, too, a most valuable direction in which our faithful Lay-B. Clark and men and women may do an excellent work in connection with Conaterman for firmation, on which the Church has set her deliberate and distinct In the last sentence of the third rubric at the end of the Catechism, it is laid down by the Church that everyone shall have a J. Southam Godfather or a Godmother as a witness of their Confirmation.

The impression seems to have prevailed widely that this sentence simply required that one of the Godfathers or Godmothers who answered for the child in Baptism should witness his or her Confirma-An examination of the language of the direction and of the authorities on the subject will banish this impression at once and bring home to us all that we have here an institution quite distinct from that of the Church's Go lfathers and Godmothers at Baptism. It is directed that "everyone shall have a Godfather or a Godmother as a witness of their Confirmation."

Does not this institution provide exactly what our own experience has led us to recognize as being necessary, as supplying a felt want. Young people come to Confirmation with every appearance of being in They are in earnest, and they have every determination at the time that they will live up to their vows. They are, however, only They are open to the influences by which they are closely human surrounded in their daily lives.

Moreover, their performance of the new duties and their appreciation of the high privileges to which their Confirmation admits and binds them are not yet settled and hardened into habits. They are not yet fixed in their ways of attention and devotion. They are not strong, but very weak before the unceasing ever-present influences which surround them. What they need is some chosen friend selected by their parents or by their Clergyman, or by themselves under the guidance of both, who will keep closely in touch with them and strive to keep them closely in touch with the Church and their religious duties.

The first few years which follow Confirmation are of vital importance in building up and establishing habits of attention to the claims and duties of our holy religion. Experience indicates that we need, in addition to the watchfulness and influence of parents and Pastors, the

c'ose personal help of some valued friend, chosen for the express purpose of acting as a witness to each of the vow, which are upon him and of the presence and power of the Holy Ghost who is within him.

Friends shrink from interfering with each other lest they do more harm than good, just because they are not authorized to speak or act. This institution of Godfather or Godmother will give them just what they need, the acknowledged duty of speaking and using their personal influence with those at whose side they stood and knelt in the solemn moment of their Confirmation, as their own chosen witness. The restoration of this excellent institution ought not to be difficult, seeing that it recommends itself at once as being necessary and helpful and attractive. Let me express the strong hope that all, both clergy and parents, and communicants and young people, will do what in them lies to bring back and establish amongst us this excellent rule and order of the Church of England.

# THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Synod will do well to suspend its rules of order with a view to securing the earliest and most thorough consideration of the new Canon of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

This Canon has been prepared with much patient study and devotion of valuable time by those to whom you committed the whole subject at the close of last session. It is in my estimation THE subject of this session. The stipends of our Clergy do not admit of their making provision for their families. There is no prospect of any general improvement in the scale of Clerical stipends. It would indeed be far more satisfactory in many respects if our congregations could place their Clergy in a position to meet directly out of their incomes the claims of their children for education and to insure their lives in favor of those who may survive them.

In other Dioceses, such as Montreal and Huron and Quebec, the interest of \$75,000 to \$85,000 is available for the annuities of the widows and orphans. These sums have been in each instance built up by the contributions of the congregations extending over many years. The higher rate of interest which prevailed in past years must have afforded substantial aid. In our new Diocese we have only \$13,479 bearing interest for the fund. It is quite clear that we shall have to use diligent and persistent efforts to add to this capital or endowment of our W. & O. fund. One gentleman has informed me that he will pay \$500 as soon as I can show that we have after this date added \$4,500 to the Endowment. I cannot doubt that you will before you adjourn adopt some well considered plan for inducing all our families and individuals to make up this addition of \$5,000 to our W. & O. capital. It can be done, but not without diligence and persistence.

The principles on which the Canon to be submitted to you rests are as follows:

First. Every widow is to participate in the benefits of the fund, although her annuity may be seriously affected if her husband in his life has failed to contribute the amount looked for from him under the Canon; for this amount will be deducted from the first payments to her extending over such period of time as the Committee may appoint.

Second. Every Clergyman is bound by the terms of this Canon, under his written promise of obedience to all the Canons given prior to his Ordination and renewed prior to his appointment to any Parish, to pay \$5 annually to the fund.

Third. Under the same obligations he is bound to pay annually whatever sum, up to 1 p.c. on his stipend, may be found necessary to supplement the contributions of the congregations and the interest of the capital and the annual subscription of \$5 from each Clergyman, so that the whole amount may be sufficient to meet the claim of each widow and orphan.

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positheir hose Fourth. Should the amount thus made up prove insufficient, then the annuity of each widow and each orphan must be reduced pro rata.

Those who, by reason of their experience and knowledge, are competent to form a reliable opinion, are satisfied that if these principles are lived up to, the fund will be sufficient to meet the claims made upon it. In order to provide for such contingencies as may increase our number of widows and or phans, it will be necessary for us to exert ourselves for many years in order to add to our capital. If other Dioceses find \$75,000 to \$85,000 necessary, we cannot safely relax our efforts until we have added to our small capital of \$13,479.

The pressure on each Clergyman to induce his congregations to contribute as liberally as their circumstances will permit will be direct and close, for the annual percentage on his stipend will be reduced just in proportion as the interest on the capital and the contributions of his congregations suffice to meet the annuities under the Canon.

No doubt the payment of the percentage on his stipend, in addition to the annual subscription of \$5 a year, will press heavily on some and impose a stricter economy even than that which they already have to face. I believe, however, that all will by their plans to meet these payments when they consider with their families that there is absolutely no other way of securing with reasonable certainty in this new Diocese any provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy.

Another point which ought to be felt by all is that the annuity of \$200 for each widow and \$40 for each orphan, though absolutely small, is yet very larger in comparison with the benefit which can be secured through any Insurance Company or Benefit Society on anything like the same terms.

This large advantage will be lost to us in this Diocese if we hesitate, for our present annuities cannot be met out of the present revenue of the fund from all present sources. Any overdraft, should it be allowed, will speedily exhaust our small

capital. Our prudent and right course is to adopt the only plan which our most thoughtful and experienced men have been able to devise for us, and which they have formulated in the Canon presented to you.

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I shall be grievously disappointed if there is not sufficient levely to the Church and to the Synod and to each other to induce all of us, without exception, to live punctually up to this Canon on its being adopted.

The importance, not to say the necessity, of allowing no single exception from the terms of this Canon has suggested that the right of any Clergyman to sit and vote in the Synod should be suspended by his failure to make the required payments. I find it difficult to bring myself to believe that right feeling and true loyalty to each other will not be sufficient. Still I have to admit that when the good of all depends upon the compliance of all, that compliance should not be left to the taste or the right feeling of any individual, but be enforced on all without exception. The annual claim on each Clergyman for his subscription of \$5 and the full amount of 1 p.c. on his stipend cannot exceed \$10 a year on an income of \$500, and \$30 a year on an income of \$2,500.

# THE CLERGY STIPEND BY LAW.

You will remember that in our session last year you considered a p'an for securing the regular and punctual payment of the stipends of the Clergy. This plan was adopted in the form of a By-law by the Mission Roard of our Diocese in the following terms:

XI (1). On the occurrence of a vacancy in any parish or mission, or at the request of the Churchwardens of any congregation, or at the desire of the Lord Bishop; and at the expiration of every three years, it shall be the duty of the Board to confer and arrange with the local authorities as to the amount to be contributed therein towards the maintenance of a resident Clergyman.

A (2). This conference shall be held by the Rural Dean or some other Clergyman selected by the Bishop, and all reasonable efforts shall be made beforehand to secure the presence of as large a number of the members of the congregation as possible, who shall be made parties by their own signatures to the subjoined agreement.

B. When the amount to be contributed has been agreed upon, the following memo of agreement shall be executed, not to be used in any Civil Court, but to be kept on record for the purpose of avoiding any misunderstanding as to the amount and the dates of payment.

The Board shall be ultimately responsible to the Clergyman for the amount stated in the memorandum, but shall pay him on each quarter day only such sums as may have been received from his congregations, with the addition of any grant voted by the Synod and due for the quarter. E. In every instance where a congregation shall be found to have failed in contributing the amount promised, it shall be the duty of the Board to make prompt enquiries of the local authorities as to the cause of the nonpayment, and to take such actions as they shall see fit, under the sanction F. As the Board has no Capital sum of money at their disposal, they must proceed in each case of failure to reach with promptness a decision as to

the date up to which they will be ultimately responsible for the Clergy-

G. No fresh memoraudum of agreement shall be made with any congregation until they have paid to the Clerical Secretary the amount for which the Board has made itself ultimately responsible to the Clergyman; and such amount shall be paid to the Clergyman as soon as it has been received from the Congregation.

H. When the Clerical Secretary is obliged to send the Clergyman less than the full quarter's stipend, he shall enclose the following lettter to the Congregation, to be read to them by the Clergyman, and by him returned to the Secretary, with a duly signed declaration that he has so read it.

"Notice is hereby given that this congregation having failed to pay the amount which they undertook by formal agreement with the Board of Missions, to contribute to the Clergyman's stipend, the services will be suspended by order of the Bishop after Sunday, the ......day

K. There shall be a sub-committee, consisting of the Bishop and the Clerical Secretary, and at least ten members of the Mission Board, appointed by the Board; with power to add to their number others who may not be members of the Board. This sub-committee shall be responsible to the Mission Board for carrying out the provisions of this By-Law. They shall whenever summoned by direction of the Bishop, and on the following stated days, 28th of April, 28th of July, 28th of October, 28th of January, or the following day, should any of these dates prove to be on Sunday. Four shall form a quorum.

L. The Board shall adopt such measures as they shall consider most likely to induce each congregation to live punctually up to its agreement with the Board.

M. Should any Clergyman obtain written permission from the Board to receive any portion of his stipend direct from the Wardens, he may give them for such portion, and the Board will accept such vouchers as representing the amount stated in the voucher.

N. It shall be the aim of the Board to make the stipend of Missionary Priests \$800.00 per annum and of Missionniary Deacons \$600.00, or as near that sum as the revenue at the disposal of the Board will allow.

As the method adopted in this By-law with your approval is provided for the advantage of all our parishes or congregations who may desire to avail themselves of it, I consider it my duty to set clearly before you all the difficulties and the weak points connected with the collection and payment of the stip and of our Clergy, and to show how this By-law meets and provides for them.

The voluntary system, for the support of the Church and her ministrations, has some very valuable practical advantages, but it has also many weak points, which place both the Clergyman and the people in an unfortunate and unfavorable position. These weak points it is the aim and purpose of the Clergy Stipend By-law to modify and improve. The fact that the Clergyman is directly dependent on the people for his stipend renders him weak, not to say helpless, in the following directions:

I. He fears to present unwelcome truths lest he cause some to withdraw their support, or, his anxiety lest he should fail in his duty on such worthy grounds betrays him into undue warmth and possibly some exaggeration, with the effect of setting the

minds of many against the truth.

2. He cannot present their duty to maintain the Ministrations of the Church before his people without exposing himself to the imputation of seeking and promoting his own interests.

3. He stands alone, unable to help himself directly, and wholly dependent upon his Wardens, who from their relationship and business connections with the people may, however willing, be unable to look after and promote hisinterests.

4. When the stipend is not being paid regularly, the people know it and the effect is unfortunate in more directions than would at first sight appear. They pity the Clergyman and his family. This is not favorable. Then they feel that they are withholding that which they owe and have undertaken to contribute. This is sure to vex and irritate them and they transfer the blame from themselves to the Clergyman. He is no longer what he was to them. They don't want to see him, for the sight of him only reminds them of that which is vexing and irritating. The Clergyman's usefulness among them is gone. It only-remains for him to seek another Parish and face the serious outlay of removing his furniture and all that he has, at a time when he can least afford it, for his purse has been left empty through the delay, first of hoping that the people would pay after a little, and then of searching for another sphere of work.

Now let us see how, and how far the Clergy Stipend By-Law provides for these weak points. 1st. It places the whole Church in the Diocese by the Clergyman's side in his Parish. The agreement as to the amount which the people shall contribute for the Ministrations of the Church is made, not with the Clergyman, but with the Church in the Diocese, as represented by the Board of Missions. and settled through a conference between the Rural Dean and the Churchwardens and the people of each congregation. If necessary or desirable, the families are all visited and canvassed by the Rural Dean. The result of this canvass is to increase largely the amount from time to time. Then a formal Memorandum of Agreement is executed in duplicate by the Wardens on one side and by the Officer of the Mission Board on the other. One copy is kept by the Wardens; the other is kept by the Board of Missions. This Memo, of Agreement is not to be used in the Civil Courts, but serves to give definite form and shape to the compact which has been entered into, so that there may be no room for any misunderstanding. When there is any delay or failure of payment, it is not with the Clergyman, but with the Church through her Board of Missions, that the people have to do. Thus the Scheme places the whole Church in the Diocese by the Clergyman's side in his Parish.

2nd. The Clergyman is placed in a strong position to urge upon the people the duty of systematic giving on principle. He can also remind them of their agreement with the Board of Missions and the moral obligation of living up to this agreement. He can even go so far as to impress upon the people the strong obligation resting on the Church above all other associations, to guard against moral duties being disregarded or even depreciated. He can show them in the most forcible way that the Church would be abandoning her duty to her Lord and forfeiting all right or claim to speak or act for Him if she were to allow any congregation lightly to enter into a covenant and then regard it as a matter which might or might not be kept. He can do this fearlessly because he is speaking on behalf of the Church, with whom their compact is. He is not speaking for himself, and this is clear from the circumstances of the case.

3rd. The Clergyman is placed in a very strong position to induce the Wardens to attend faithfully and punctually, either in person or through sidesmen, to the trying duty of collecting the dues of each and of every individual who may fail to pay through numbered envelopes. As the quarter advances, he can without anxiety enquire of the Wardens whether they will be in a position to meet the amount of their compact. He can further offer to assist them in any way open to him. He can remind them of the certainty that the notice from the Board of Missions will have to be read to the congregation on two Sundays; that the Services will be suspended until the arrears are paid, if they

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should be so far behind on the quarter as to exceed the number of days' grace allowed them in order to provide for any unforseen contingencies. He can represent how very painful this notice will be to all concerned, and what a reproach it will bring on

them before all the community in the country round.

4th. The people are not tempted to lay the blame of their failure on the Clergyman. They may be vexed and annoyed with themselves, but there is no room or opportunity for them to transfer their sense of annoyance to the Clergyman. It is not the Clergyman who is acting, but the Church through her Board of Missions, and they know that the Board is acting justly and rightly. They know further that if the Clergyman should be removed, the arrears will have to be met by them before they can obtain the ministrations of another.

The Scheme may thus be fairly claimed to provide for the weak points in the position both of Clergyman and people under the voluntary system. Let us now look closely at some details in the Scheme and meet some of the prominent objections which

may be started.

1st. The Scheme has certainty of action, with protection against any unwise or ill-considered course. A sub-committee of the Board holds stated meetings to study all the circumstances of each congregation in arrears just before the time when the notice of suspension of services is issued. If the Clergyman or Ward ns, or both, have s nt in to the Board information of such a nature as will justify any further delay, the notice may be kept back by the Secretary under the direction of the sub-committee Great care, however, is tak n that the circumstances are such as to warrant the delay without introducing the fatel element of uncertainty into the action of the Board. It is all important that Clergy and Ward ns and people should be convinced that the Board will act firmly up to its rules, and that only unusual circumstances will bring about any departure from the prescribed course. Once the notice of suspension of services reaches the hands of the Clargyman, it must be given to the congregation No discretion is allowed to the Clergyman. He must reed it by a standing dir ction from the Bishop, and he with his Ward-n must certify that it was read, and the certificate must be re turned to the Secretary of the Board. The moral effect on th congregation of this notic , and of the certainty that it wil follow upon any failure to keep their compact with the Board can hardly be exaggerated.

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2nd. The failure in most congregations arises from the absence of system and thoroughness on the part of the Wardens in seeing that the people pay their promis d dues punctuelly, either through envelop s or by b ing personally call d upon and reminded. Arrears are allowed to accumulate until the contributor, finding that it is inconvenient to pay, becomes discouraged, and is vexed, and then absolutely refuses to pay. The Clergy Stipend By-law obliges the Wardens to keep up to their work in some systematic way. They know well how vexed all will be if it should go through the country that they had failed to pay wh t they had promised, and that their services were suspended ustil the matter could be arranged. The Wardens or their assistants, the sidesmen, are armed with a powerful incentive when, at the end of the quarter, they go to those who may be in arrears and urge them to pay their dues in order to protect all from the reproach of the rotice of suspension of their services. Once the scheme is understood and in working order, the notice will suffice, or rather the reminder that the notice will surely be issued and that the Clergyman is allowed no discretion as to publishing it to the congregation, will suffice. The money will be promptly collected, and the payment will be made to the Board in time for the Clergyman's quarterly stipend.

3rd. When the notice has been given in the few cases which will arise from time to time, and the services have been suspended, the Board promptly informs the Clergyman of the date up to which they will hold themselves responsible for his stipend, and in the meantime uses every means which the Bishop and they may judge most powerful and likely to bring about a prompt improvement in the situation. The Rural Dean, or some neighboring Clergyman known to possess influence, is asked to visit the families, one by one, at once. They are all remineed that there is no prospect of their obtaining another Clergyman until the stipend of the present Incumbent is paid in full. Wherever there is any prospect of the Incumbent being able to exercise any influence in the future, better counsels will prevail in each family, or in the great majority of them, and the services will be resumed. Where the services cannot be restored, it is unavoidable that the Clergyman should find another sphere of work. The Board pays him his stipend up to the date for which they undertook to be respo-sible, and the Bishop does not appoint another until the congregation have repaid this

amount to the Board.

A great many more objections can be started against this nite time fixed by method of securi g the Clergyman's stiperd at each point as d generally, two qu step than will ever be met in the practical working of it.

4th. It is true that a way, which see is easy, is ope ed, and Clergy an. But the fact is that by simply witholding their nembers of the Church payment under any other plan they can do the san e, and the Clergus is helpless; nor is it open to the Bishop or to any one that in a constitutio al form, for the people to get rid of their gyman is helpless; nor is it open to the Bishop or to any one in the Diocese to help him. The people simply do not pay, and the Clergyman is obliged to remove. The Clergy Stipend By-law does not create this opportunity for the people. It is already and everywhere in existence. But it does provide that if people are going to pursue so us worthy a course it shall be themselves for the Mag known to all, the attention of all shall be drawn to the fact by the notice of the suspension of their services and by the reason being publicly stated, namely, their failure to keep their compact with the Board of Missions. It must be remembered that the majority of people in every congregation even in times of excitement are right-minded. The difficulty is to secure for them freedom and the opportunity to nake their influence felt. The notice that their services are about to be suspended accomplishes this, a d they settle with the Board before the date for suspending services is reached.

## TRINITY UNIVERSITY, TORONTO,

In March last the Bishops in this Civil Province, whose Dioceses are largely dependent on Trinity University for the education of men, not only for the sacred Ministry, but for all the learned professions, issued a Pastoral concerning the University which I deem it right to insert here. The Financial condition of TRINITY UNIVERSITY, TORONTO, is causing us grave anxiety. The depreciation of interest and other losses have reduced its income below its unavoidable expenditure.

We earnestly ask your prompt and generous assistance. The Institution has won for itself the widespread and warm appreciation of the community. The confidence felt in its system and its work is strong, and in our judgment well founded. The Provost and Professors are doing an excellent work in the best spirit. They are affording our young men for their life work in the world generally, and for the learned professions and for the Church's Ministry an education and training of the most thorough kind, under the Church's kindly and blessed influence.

It is not possible for us to present in too strong a light the value of TRINITY UNIVERSITY and its importance to our Dioceses. Nearly 50 years have passed since it was founded and endowed through the efforts of the Right Reverend DR. STRACHAN, first Bishop of Toronto. Many of your fathers contributed liberally to his appeal. The Income of the University has for several years past fallen short of the t interest amount necessary, owing to the following causes:

1. The depression in real estate in Toronto, which has rendered several of her investments unproductive for the present.

2. The necessity of using a portion of her income-bearing capital for the purpose of making additions to the University Buildings which the extension

3. The general fall in the rate of interest, which has seriously reduced the

ncome derived from invested capital.

4. The unfortunate loss some years ago of a portion of her capital, equivalent to a reduction in income of \$1,500.

The University makes this appeal to the members of the Anglican Church

and the general public with confidence, for the following reasons

1. Trinity possesses, in her buildings and grounds, a valuable unencumpered property, forming an equipment sufficient for the carrying on of her work for many years.

2. The University was never more efficient. During the last few years her work has extended in many directions, and the number of her students in Arts and Divinity has been steadily increasing.

3. Trinity is every year increasing her hold on the Province, and the two pecial features in her system—Residence in the College Building and the mion of Religious with Secular Education—are becoming daily more valued.

4. Trinity is the chief Training School in the Province for the education of he Clergy, and is the University of the whole Church of England, under the ontrol of all the Bishops of the Province.

# THE CHURCH'S UNIVERSITY.

### THE ORIGIN OF TRINITY.

In 1827 Bishop Strachan obtained a Royal Charter for a University to be ndowed by the Province of Upper Canada. As a result, King's College was naugurated in 1843. This religious foundation, in connection with the Church

f England, was secularized in 1849 by an Act of the Provincial Legislature.

The Bishop at once began to collect funds, first in Canada and then in England, for another University. His views are best expressed in his own

"We hope to succeed in establishing for ourselves, without pecuniary aid from any public source, a University clearly and avowedly in connection with our Church, a University of which the religious character shall be known and acknowledged, in which the doctrines of the Church of England shall elevate and sanctify the labours of the teacher

The University of Trinity College, Toronto, exists to-day as the proof of he success of this appeal and as the embodiment of Bishop Strachan's ideal.

# TRINITY STANDS FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION.

Those who think that a University education should confine itself to intruction in human science will not sympathize with Trinity's position. But rinity appeals to those who, regarding a merely secular system of instruction s dangerous alike to the individual life and the well-being of the community, vell as of the mind and body. Accordingly, all Arts students attending lecures at Trinity are regularly instructed and examined in such subjects as Scripture history, the Gospels in Greek, Church history, Church doctrine, etc. Moreover, the regular attendance at the College chapel services accustoms Trinity men to the worship of the Church. In this connection the advantages

### TRINITY BELONGS TO THE CHURCH.

This is evident from the following considerations:

(1) Trinity owes her existence to the generous gifts, in land and money of Canadian and English Churchmen. And from time to time, as her growth and expansion called for it, appeals for further assistance have met with most generous response.

(2) Trinity in her theological teaching aims at being true to the spirit of the standards and formularies of the Church of England. In these principle

Trinity trains the future laymen and clergy of the Church in Canada.

(3) All the Bishops of the Province of Ontario are ex officio members of the Governing Body of the University, and in addition each Bishop has th right to nominate four members from his diocese to sit with him on the Colleg Council, which regulates everything connected with the University. This provision of the Constitution insures, for all time, the control of Trinity by th heads of the Church. Trinity is thus no private venture and represents n party school, but is a thoroughly representative Church Institution, founded supported and controlled by the Church to which she belongs.

### TRINITY AND HER WORK.

The University is at present well equipped. The buildings, to which recent important additions have been made, provide accommodation for nines resident students, and the necessary lecture rooms, etc. The extensiv grounds and the new gymnasium provide for the physical well-being of th There are fully equipped honour courses in Theology, Classic Mathematics, Modern Languages, History, Philosophy and Science. is a staff of thirteen Professors and Lecturers; and the number of Students Arts and Divinity has been nearly one hundred for the last few years. is a residence for women known as S. Hilda's College, under the care of Lady Principal, within a few minutes' walk of the University Building. The women students attend the same lectures as the men.

#### TRINITY'S NEEDS.

Trinity needs the support and interest of every member of our Churc She belongs to all and should have the interest of all.

The income of the College last year, from all sources, was \$31,105. expenditure, kept within the narrowest limits, was \$37,057. The income derived, (1) from endowment, (2) from fees, (3) from voluntary contribution to income. The income from endowment is, owing to the fall of interest an depreciation in the value of real estate, diminishing year by year; and it has become necessary to increase the endowment. The income from fees may be increased by increasing the number of students. In view of the importance the work which Trinity is doing for the Church, the income from volunta contributions is certain to grow as the importance of religious education realized, and Trinity becomes better known. It is now generally recognize that no University can be self-supporting.

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THE PRISONERS' AID ASSOCIATION OF CANADA. The fellowing letter has reached me : THE PRISONERS' AID ASSOCIATION OF CANADA.

THE SECRETARY.

REV. AND DEAR SIR,

I write again on behalf of the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada to olicit co-operation in the cause of Prison Reform.

The reforms we are more especially pressing for at the present time are he following:

1. We are asking the Dominion Government to introduce the indeterminate ystem of sentencing prisoners as a substitute for the present arbitrary system of definite sentences. Prisoners should have an opportunity of earning their disharge from prison or penitentiary by reformation and good conduct. This vould be a stimulus to reformation.

2. We are asking the Ontario Government to effect a thorough re-organiation of the Reformatory for Boys at Penetanguishene, and the Reformatory or Women at Toronto. The members of the Government admit the great eed of this thorough re-organization, but they appear to be waiting to be imelled by the force of public opinion. In the Mercer Reformatory for Women here are no facilities for making a separation of the different classes of prisoners. The old and hardened in vice and crime can associate freely with the roung and comparatively innocent. This lack of classification, we fear, in too nany cases, completely frustrates all reformatory effort.

For several years we have been asking the Ontario Government to make ome provision for the scientific treatment and reformation of inebriates. There will still be a necessity for such provision even in case of the granting of prohibitory liquor law. In the State of Maine there is an hospital for the cientific treatment of habitual drunkards. We desire your co-operation in

his important matter also.

In addition to these much needed reforms, we desire the hearty sympathy

and co-operation of the Church in the following, viz. :

(a) Efficient classification of prisoners in the County gaols. (b) Giving ssistance to the families of prisoners where necessary and advisable. (c) Giving a helping hand to, and finding employment for, discharged prisoners. d) Favouring the establishment in every County of a County House of Inustry or Industrial Home for the destitute and dependent poor of the County.

# SCHOOLS FOR EACH DENOMINATION.

As I stated to you in my last address, there is no other way of securing definite religious instruction for our children that through schools for each denomination. This mind and energy distinguish our Roman Catholic neighbors in the community.

It is not that the law affords them a privilege which it denie to others. The law will give to the Church of England her shar of the school moneys in proportion to results as shewn by exam inations wherever we have sufficient population and the will and owards schools for the energy to promote and maintain day schools.

Day schools are not in sight for us, simply because the nust be slow. #### LETTER.

TO THE FAITHFUL IN CHRIST JESUS, GREETING-

We, Archbishops, Bishops Metropolitan and other Bishops of the Holy Catholic Church in full communion with the Church of England, one hundred and ninety-four in number, all having superintendence over dioceses or lawfully commissioned to exercise Episcopal functions therein, assembled from divers parts of the earth at Lambeth Palace, in the year of our Lord 1897 under the presidency of the Most Reverend Frederick, by Divine Providence Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of All England, and Metropolitan, after receiving in Westminster Abbey the Blessed Sacrament of the Lord's Body and Blood, and uniting in prayer for the guidance of the Holy Spirit, have taken into consideration various questions which have been submitted to us affecting the welfare of God's people and the condition of the Church in divers parts of

We have made these matters the subject of careful and serious deliberation during the month past, both in General Conference and in Committees specially appointed to consider the several questions, and we now commend to

the faithful the conclusions at which we have arrived.

We have appended to this letter two sets of documents, the one containing the formal Resolutions of the Conference, and the other the Reports of the several Committees. We desire you to bear in mind that the Conference is responsible for the first alone. The Reports of Committees can be taken to represent the mind of the Conference in so far only as they are re-affirmed or directly adopted in the Resolutions. But we have thought good to print these Reports, believing that they will offer fruitful matter for consideration.

We begin with the questions which affect moral conduct, inasmuch as moral conduct is made by our Lord the test of the reality of religious life.

Intemperance still continues to be one of the chief hindrances to religion in the great mass of our people. There are many excellent socie ties engaged in the conflict with it, but they need steady and resolute perserverance to effect any serious improvement. It is important to lay stress on the essential condition of permanent success in this work, namely, that it should be taken up in a religious spirit as part of Christian devotion to the Lord.

Purity. We desire to repeat with the most earnest emphasis what was said on the subject of Purity by the last Conference, and we reprint herewith the Report which that Conference unanimously adopted.\* We know the deadly nature of the sin of impurity, the fearful hold it has on those who have once yielded, and the fearful strength of the temptation. Industrial Problems. The industrial problems of the present day present nemselves under the double aspect of justice between man and man, and symtorking of our industries is unjust to the employed and unduly favourable to the employer. It is obviously not possible for us to enter upon the consideration of such a question in detail. But we think it our duty to press the great rinciple of the Brotherhood of Man, and to urge the importance of bringing that principle to bear on all the relations between those who are connected by rould ultimately, in all probability, prevent many of the mischiefs which attend ur present system. Upon this aspect of the industrial problems wise and eleful counsels will be found in the Report

The other aspect of these problems concerns those classes of the comnunity who are, above all others, commended by Our Lord to the loving care f His disciples, the Poor. It is undeniable that poverty is so far from being egarded in the New Testament as a hindrance to the acceptance of the ospel, that it is on the contrary the rich as such that are warned that they ill find serious difficulty in entering the Kingdom of Heaven. Still the poor ave temptations and troubles from which the rich are comparatively free.
o give help in such temptations and to lessen these troubles is one of the pecial duties of the Christian. Of all the duties that Our Lord has imposed n us, none can be said to stand higher than this, but while it is one of the nost imperative, it is also one of the most difficult. It is certain that no pernament good can be done to those who find the daily struggle for ubsistance very severe, unless they themselves will join in the work. But the perpetual temptation of their lives is to throw off their lives in the control of the co urdens and expect to obtain aid without any exertion on their own part. lany, perhaps the great majority, rise above this temptation and live brave ves of dependence on their own persevering labour. But many sink in the fort and give up all true manly hope. It is character that they need hey need inspiration. They need to have hope brought to them; they eed to be roused to a belief in their power by the help of God to live on igher principles. It is when men of this class are fighting their own battle ympathy and friendly help. But besides these there are not a few who are aught as it were in some overpowering current of trouble which they cannot

deal with. Such are those who cannot find employment though often longing to find it. The difficulty of helping these is well known and requires most careful study. And lastly there are the many who are physically unable to maintain themselves; sometimes from congenital weakness, some times from accident or disease, sometimes, and indeed most often, from old age. To instil Christian principle into the great body of Churchmen; to press on them the duty of not only being ready to give and glad to communicate, but of giving their time, their trouble, their careful thought to the discovery of the best mode of helping individual cases of need is the task which our Master gives us. We warmly commend to all Christian people the Report of our Committee on this subject.

International Arbitration. There is nothing which more tends to promote general employment and consequently genuine comfort among the people than the maintenance of peace among the nations of mankind. But besides and above all considerations of material comfort stands the value of Peace itself as the great characteristic of the Kingdom of Our Lord, the word which heralded His entrance into the world, the title which specially distinguishes Him from all earthly princes. There can be no question that the influence of the Christian Church can do more for this than any other influence that can be named. Without denying that there are just wars and that we cannot prevent their recurrence entirely, yet we are convinced that there are other and better ways of settling the quarrels of nations than by War is a horrible evil, followed usually by consequences worse than itself. Arbitration in place of war saves the honor of the nations con-cerned, and yet determines the questions at issue with completeness. War brutalises even while it gives opportunity for the finest heroism. Arbitration leaves behind it a generous sense of passions restrained and justice sought for. The Church of Christ can never have any doubt for which of the two modes of determining national quarrels it ought to strive.

We pass from moral questions to Ecclesiastical, and first to those which may be called Internal.

The Organization of the Anglican Communion. Every meeting of the Lambeth Conference deepens the feeling of the unity which originally made the Confe rence possible, and now gives increasing value to its deliberations. There are differences of opinion amongst us, but the sense of belonging to one Body, subject to one Master, striving towards one great aim. grows stronger as the meetings are repeated. In order to maintain and still further develop this unity of feeling we desire first to secure steady and rapid intercourse between all the branches of the Anglican Communion, for it is certain that though mutual knowledge is the only sure basis of all real unity of life. As one step towards this we propose to form a central consultative body for supplying information and advice. This body must win its way to general recognition by the services which it may be able to render to the working of the Church. It can have no other than a moral authority, which will be developed out of its action. We have left the formation of it to the Archbishop of Canterbury. who already finds himself called on to do very much of what is proposed to be done by this Council. Beyond this point we have not thought it wise to Provinces, so that no Bishop may be left to act absolutely alone, and we think it desirable that, in accordance with the ancient custom of the Western of these Provinces should be known as Archive Church, the Metropolitans of these Provinces should be known as Archbishops, recommending, however, that such titles should not be assumed without previous communication to the other Bishops of the Communion with Bible itself, is the author

Religious Communities. On the subject of Religious Communities we do not onsider it to be yet possible to give advice which can be treated as final. e believe that such Communities are capable of rendering great services to e Church and have indeed already done so. But we think more regulation needed if they are to be worked in thorough harmony with the general ork of the Church as a whole. What form such regulation should take quires much further consideration. Meanwhile we express our strong nse of the care that ought to be taken in making sure that no one underkes the obligations of Community life without having, as far as human judg-ent can ascertain it, a real vocation from God. Whether God means a parcular person to live in this particular way is the preliminary question to be termined by the person who asks to be admitted into a Community and by e authority of the Community that admits that person. We have requested e Committee to continue its labours, and we commend the Report to the tention of the Church.

The Critical Study of the Bible. We pass on to the consideration of the stanards of all our teaching, the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer. The itical study of the Bible by competent scholars is essential to the mainnance in the Church of a healthy faith. That faith is already in serious daner which refuses to face questions that may be raised either on the authority the genuineness of any part of the Scriptures that have come down to us. uch refusal creates painful suspicion in the minds of many whom we have to ach, and will weaken the strength of our own conviction of the truth that God as revealed to us. A faith which is always or often attended by a secret fear at we dare not inquire lest inquiry should lead us to results inconsistent with the Confe what we believe, is already infected with a disease which may soon destroy it. ut all inquiry is attended with a danger on the other side unless it be protected y the guard of Reverence, Confidence, and Patience. It is quite true that ere have been instances where inquiry has led to doubt and ultimately to fidelity. But the best safeguard against such a peril lies in that deep everence which never fails to accompany real faith. The central object of hiristian faith must always be the Lord Jesus Christ Himself. The test hich St. Paul gives of the possession of the Holy Spirit is the being able to the total state of the Lord. If a man can say with his whole heart and soul at Lague is the Lord, he stands on a rock which nothing can shake. at Jesus is the Lord, he stands on a rock which nothing can shake. ead in the light of this conviction, the Bible, beginning with man made in e image of God, and rising with ever-increasing clearness of revelation to od taking on Him the form of man, and throughout it all, showing in every age the sense of the Divine Presence inspiring what is said, will not fail to tert its power over the souls of men till the Lord comes again. This power ill never really be effected by any critical study whatever. The Report of e Committee deals in our judgment temperately and wisely, with the bject, and we think all Christian people will find it worthy of careful conderation.

The Book of Common Prayer. The Book of Common Prayer, next to the ble itself, is the authoritative standard of the doctrine of the Anglican Com-

munion. The great doctrines of the Faith are there clearly set forth in their true relative proportion. And we hold that it would be most dangerous to tamper with its teaching either by narrowing the breadth of its comprehension, or by disturbing the balance of its doctrine. We do not speak of any omission or modification which might have the effect of practically denying an article in one of the creeds, for that would be not only dangerous but a direct betrayal of the Faith. Nevertheless it is true that no Book can supply every possible need of worshippers in every variation of local circumstances, We therefore think it our duty to affirm the right of every Bishop, within the jurisdiction assigned to him by the Church, to set forth or to sanction additional services and prayers when he believes that God's work may be thereby furthered, or the spiritual needs of the worshippers more fully metand to adapt the Prayers already in the Book to the special requirements of his own people. But we hold that this power must always be subject to any limitations imposed by the provincial or other lawful authority, and the utmost care must be taken that all such additions or adaptations be in thorough har mony with the spirit and tenor of the whole Book.

We find that many of the clergy, especially in the large towns of England, are troubled by doubts whether, in the present circumstances of life. especially where population is perpetually moving, infants ought to be baptized when there seems so little security for their due instruction. desire to impress upom the clergy the need of taking all possible care to see that provision is made for the Christian training of the child, but that, unless in cases of grave and exceptional difficulty, the baptism should not be deferred. We consider, further, that the baptismal promises of repentance faith, and obedience should be made either privately or publicly by those who, having been baptized without those promises, are brought by ou

Clergy to Confirmation by the Bishop.

Difficulties having arisen in some quarters with regard to the administration of Holy Communion to the sick, we recommend that such difficulties should be left to be dealt with by the Bishop of each Diocese in accordance with th direction contained in the preface to the Book of Common Prayer "Concern ing the Service of the Church."

"Readers" used in Schools. We think it necessary to call attention to the misleading character of many of the statements to be found in those School "Readers" which touch on the history of the Church, and we recommend those on whom responsibility rests to take such steps as they can to secure truer handling of this important subject.

Encouragement of Theological Study. There is a general complaint that th facilities provided for theological study in many of the Colonies and Deper dencies of Great Britain are not sufficient, and that there is very little recog nition of proficiency in theological knowledge. It is a serious defect in the working of the Church if it fails to produce men who can deal rightly with theological questions. The wrong handling of such questions may easily lea and has often led to serious errors both in doctrine and practice, an ignorance of the subject leaves the Church defenceless against man attacks. The Church cannot fulfil all her duties without having men learning among her divines, and this especially applies to such a Church a ours which founds all her teaching on Scripture and antiquity. The great means provided by God for instructing the conscience of the human race the Bible, and for interpreting the Bible, next after the Bible itself, the stud of the writings and practices of the Primitive Church is of paramount importance. We cannot use these instruments with effect unless we have a thorough knowledge of both. We therefore, earnestly commend to a

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Christian people, and especially to tose who are connected by commercial other relations with the Colonies, the duty of aiding and establishing colleges and scholarships for the instruction of Colonial students in theology, and we commend to the careful consideration of the Church the question how est to encourage men to give themselves to that study by arranging that commercially consideration of the church the question how estimated authority shall grant degrees to those who have attained a ghistandard of proficiency.

The duty of the Church to the Colonies. We have just spoken of one of the uties of which the Church owes to the Colonies, But there are others of no nall importance. It is a duty to the Colonies to encourage the freest and illest communion of spiritual life between the Churchmen at home and the hurchmen abroad, and especially between the Clergy. Clergymen well ted for colonial service are not always well fitted for home service, and lergymen well fitted for home service are not always well fitted for blonial. And this must, to a certain extent, put a restraint on free exchange Clergy between the two services. But subject to this necessary caution, it good for the Church that men should go from the one service to the other, and under proper regulations this ought not to be difficult.

To this claim of the Colonies must be added the claim on behalf of some them for continued and, if possible, increased pecuniary aid. Many of the clonial Churches cannot yet stand alone. The provision of colleges and thools and of endowments for Bishoprics and the like, though we are bound contemplate its withdrawal in course of time, yet must be maintained for e present, if we do not wish the work already done to be undone for want funds. The colonists are our own kin, and we cannot leave them to drift way from the Church of their fathers. And the demands on us will evitably increase. God is opening to us every day new gates of access to e heathen world, and we must enter those gates, and yet what we are ready doing will still need to be done if we are to be true to the call which

Again, it is our duty, and must continue for some time to be our duty, to o what we can for the Christian care of emigrants on their way, as well as supply them with letters of commendation addressed to those who will ke an interest in their spiritual welfare. And finally, it is an imperative ity to give all possible assistance to the Bishops and Clergy of the Colonies their endeavors to protect the native races from the introduction among tem of demoralizing influences, especially the mischief of the trade in invicating liquors and noxious drugs.

Our duties to the Colonies in all spiritual matters are undeniably heavy, ut the great task of evangelizing the human race is largely put upon us, and e cannot shrink from bearing the burden.

We pass from what is internal concerning the Anglican Communion to hat is external.

The Unity of the Church. On the Unity of the Church our Committee has at been able to propose any resolutions which would bind us to immediate rther action. A Committee has been appointed to open correspondence ith a view to establish a clearer understanding and closer relations with the hurches of the East. The Archbishop of Canterbury has been requested to opinit Committees to look into the position of the *Unitas Fratrum* and the candinavian Church, with both of which we desire to cultivate the most itendly possible relations. We recommend also that every opportunity be ken to emphasize the Divine purpose of visible unity amongst Christians as fact of revelation. We recommend that Committees of Bishops be pointed everywhere to watch for and originate opportunities of united

prayer and mutual conference between representatives of different Christian Bodies, and to give counsel where counsel may be asked: these Committees to report to the next Lambeth Conference what has been accomplished in this matter.

Above all, we urge the duty of special intercession for the Unity of the Church in accordance with the Lord's Own Prayer, as recorded in the Gospe of St. John.

Reformation Movements outside our Communion. We recognize with warn sympathy the endeavours that are being made to escape from the usurped authority of the See of Rome as we ourselves regained our freedom three centuries ago. We are well aware that such movements may sometimes end in quitting not merely the Roman obedience, but the Catholic Church itself and surrendering the doctrine of the sacraments, or even some of the great verities of the Creeds. But we must not anticipate that men will go wrong until they have begun to do so, and we feel some confidence in expressing our warm desire for friendly relations with the Old Catholic Community in Ger many, with the Christian Catholic Church in Switzerland and with the Old Catholics in Austria; our attitude of hopeful interest in the endeavour to form an autonomous Church in Mexico and in the work now being done in Brazil and our sympathy with the brave and earnest men (if we may use the word of the Conference of 1888) of France, Italy, Spain and Portugal, who have been driven to free themselves from the burden of unlawful terms of Com munion imposed by the Church of Rome.

Foreign Missions. Lastly, we come to the subject of Foreign Missions, the work that at the present time stands in the first rank of all the tasks we have We have especial reasons to be thankful to God for the awakene and increasing zeal of our whole Communion for this primary work of th Church, the work for which the Church was commissioned by our Lord. some centuries it may be said we have slumbered. The duty has not been quite forgotten, but it has been remembered only by individuals and societies; the body as a whole has taken no part. The Book of Commo Prayer contains very few prayers for missionary work. It hardly seems to have been present to the minds of our great authorities and leaders in com piling that Book that the matter should be in the thoughts of everyone who calls himself a Christian, and that no ordinary service should be considered complete which did not plead amongst other things for the spread of the Gospel. We are beginning, though only beginning to see what the Lor would have us do. He is opening the whole world to our easy access, an as He opens the way he is opening our eyes to see it, and to see Hi beckoning hand.

In preaching his Gospel to the world we have to deal with one grea religious body, which holds the truth in part but not in its fulness, the Jews with another which holds fragments of the truth embedded in a mass of false hood, the Mahommedans; and with various races which hold inherite beliefs ranging down to the merest fetichism. In dealing with all these it certainly right to recognize whatsoever good they may contain. necessary to be cautious lest that good, such as it is, be so exaggerated as t lead us to allow that any purified form of any one of them can ever be in an sense a substitute for the Gospel. The Gospel is not merely the revelation of the highest morality; it reveals also the wonderful love of God in Christ, an contains the promise of that grace given by Him by which alone the highes moral life is possible to man. And without the promise of that grace it would not be the Gospel at all,

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The Jews seem to deserve from us more attention than they have hitherreceived. The difficulties of the work of converting the Jews are very reat, but the greatest of all difficulties springs from the indifference of hristians to the duty of bringing them to Christ. They are the Lord's own n, and He commanded that the Gospel should first be preached to them. ut Christians generally are much more interested in the conversion of entiles. The conversion of the Jews is also much hindeed by the severe ersecutions to which Jewish converts are often exposed from their own eople, and it is sometimes necessary to see to their protection if they are rsuaded to join us. It seems probable that the English-speaking people in do more than any others in winning them, and, although Jewish converts we one advantage in their knowledge of their own people, yet they are put a great disadvantage by the extremely strong prejudice which the Jews stertain against those who have left them for Christ. It seems best that

oth Jews and Gentiles should be employed in the work.

For preaching to the Mohammedans very careful preparation is needed. he men who are to do the work must study their character, their history, nd their creed. The Mohammedans must be approached with the greatest ire to do them justice. What is good in their belief must be acknowledged the full, and used as a foundation on which to build the structure of hristian truth. They have been most obstinate in opposing the Christian ith, but there seem now to be openings for reaching their consciences. It easier for them to join us than it was. In some lands the intolerance, hich was their great bulwark, is showing indications of giving way. In dia the Christian and the Mohammedans meet on equal terms, and a ohammedan can become a Christian without danger to his life. It seems as the time for approaching them had come, and that the call to approach em was made especially on ourselves. To this end it is necessary that we tould have the services of men specially trained for the purpose. Such men ill, as it seems, be most effective if working from strong centres, such as re to be found in Delhi, Lucknow, and Hyderabad (Deccan). To find such en and urge them to the work; to provide for their thorough training in roper colleges, and to send them forth, never singly, but, if possible, in large roups, appears to be the best means of dealing with the whole Mohammedan

ody.

The remaining religions of the world require a varied treatment in e considere that we ought to aim at developing. Native Churches as specnat we ought to aim at developing Native Churches as speedily as possible. It is necessary to move with caution in this matter. It is of real importance to impress the converts from the first with a sense that the Church is eir own and not a foreign Church, and for that purpose to give them some hare in the local management and the financial support of the body which are have in the converted to the converted t ley have joined. But before it is justifiable to give them independent action is necessary to wait until they have acquired that sense of duty which is eeded to keep them in the right way. They must have learned to realise the high moral standard of the Gospel in their ordinary lives, and they must ave learned to fulfil the universal duty of maintaining their own ministry. othing ought to be laid on them but what is of the essence of the Faith or elongs to the due order of the Catholic Church, but they should be peretually impressed with the necessity of holding the Catholic Faith in its tegrity, and maintaining their unity with the Catholic Body. That unity hould be sought first in the unity of the Diocese, and when members of the hurch move from Diocese to Diocese they should be supplied with letters of ommendation to persons who will interest themselves in the spiritual welfare

The work of Foreign Missions may occasionally bring about apparent collision between different Churches within our Communion. In all succases pains should be taken to prevent as far as possible the unseemliness of two Bishops exercising their jurisdiction in the same place, and the synod concerned ought in our judgment to make canons or pass resolutions to secur this object. Where there has been already an infringement of the rule the Bishops must make all the endeavors they can to adjust the matter for the time.

In all cases we are of opinion that if any new foreign missionary Jurisdic tion be contemplated, notification should be sent to all Metropolitans an Presiding Bishops before any practical steps are taken.

We think it our duty to declare that in the Foreign Mission field, when signal spiritual blessings have attended the labours of missionaries not connected with our Communion, a special obligation has arisen to avoid, as fa as possible without compromise of principle, whatever tends to prevent the due growth and manifestation of that "unity of the Spirit" which shoul ever mark the Church of Christ.

In conclusion we commend to the consideration of all our Churches th suggestions contained in the Report of the Committee on Foreign Missions a to the relation of Missionary Bishops and Clergy to Missionary Societies.

We have now said what we have to say. We have throughout of deliberations endeavoured to bear in mind the great work that we are engaged in doing, and the presence with us of the Lord and Master who ha given us this work to do. The effort to counsel one another and to couns the members of our Church throughout the world, has drawn us conscious nearer to Him whom we have been desiring to serve. We pray earnestly the as He has been with us in our deliberations, so also He may be with us in a our attempts to live and to labour in the same spirit of devotion. We knot that we can do nothing without Him, and we pray that that knowledge ma perpetually lift our thoughts to His very self and inspire our work with the zeal and the perseverance, with the humility and the self-surrender which ever characterise His true disciples; so that we all may be able to abide thim and to obtain His loving promise to abide in us.

This appears to be a great increase from last year's returns of \$1,947.66, but whilst the improvement is marked, it is not so great as it seems, because the effort to get all sums to pass through our treasurer's books has been more successful, and he is able to present a more complete report of the sums contributed to missions from the Diocese than was before. It is hoped that the Clergy and W. A. treasurers will be careful to send to him all moneys or vouchers which are contributed for missions in the Domestic or Foreign field.

The Womans Auxiliary, through the secretary, Miss C. Humphreys, has supplied the Committee with the following state-

ment of their work during the past year.

In the Diocese there are now 37 branches, an increase of 7 during the year, with a membership of about 1000, and 10 Junior Branches. Assistance has been given to 21 missions which were assigned to them, and to 6 others. Forty-five (45) bales have been sent out containing about 1,385 articles of new clothing, 1,150 secondhand, 120 quilts, 115½ yards carpet, 464½ yards of unmade material, besides large quantities of groceries, medicines, toys, books, canned food, fruits and Christmas cheer for children. They have also supplied 2 surplices, 2 stoles, 1 altar cloth, 6 pieces of altar linen and 2 frontals.

Of these bales Algoma has received 9, Saskatchewan 12, Calgary 5, Ruperts Land 8, New Westminster 1, Moosomin 3,

Qu'Appelle 4 and Ottawa 3.

There are 565 leaflets taken and in Ottawa City nearly 400 copies of the Canada Church Mission Magazine localised, are sold under the auspices of the W. A.

The Board of management of the D. and F. Miss. Soc. has met twice in Montreal since the last synod; at both meetings the Diocese of Ottawa was represented. As the reports of such meetings have been published in the C. Ch. Miss. Mag. it is only necessary to mention a few of the leading subjects which have

It was felt that there is a great apathy about missions still existing throughout the Church in Canada and two proposals were made and acted upon to excite greater interest in the work. First, select preachers were requested to visit the principal cities and towns on the occasion of the usual collections and by earnest appeals to rouse the minds of Church people to a sense of their belonging by their baptism to the Missionary Society which is co-extensive with the Church in Canada. The second proposal aimed at reaching the young people in our Sunday Schools, by suggesting that offerings should be asked three times a year for their schools, when information on missionary subjects n.ight be given. It will take some time before this suggestion is generally accepted, but it is certainly a step in he right direction for educating the young as missionaries.

The existence of apathy is apparently shewn by the scant support given to the Missionary Magazines, which are really the only means of conveying to Church people in Canada, what is peing done by the Church in her missionary character. vere more widely circulated and read, there would surely be reater interest taken in every branch of this work.

A committee has been appointed to revise and enlarge the Book of Prayers and Hymns now issued by the Society and to meet he requirements of the Junior Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary nd Children Ch. Miss. fields which are increasing in number and nergy, and now occupy a very important place in woman's work

A good move has been made in requiring from each bishop in he Domestic Mission Field a yearly report of the position, proress and wants of his diocese. This information was received rom several of the bishops and must prove useful in apportioning he grants from the funds placed at the disposal of the Board.

Special appeals were made for two fields of work which are rowing in importance greatly: (1) Work among the Chinese in ritish Columbia and (2) Among the gold-seekers in the Klondyke. or the first object, \$500 was granted to diocese of New Westinster for Chinese work, and \$200 to Columbia diocese.

For the second, the S. P. G. having voted £200 towards the upport of Rev. W. G. Lyon as a missionary in the Klondyke under Bishop Bompas, the Board added a grant of \$400, which it is estimated will just meet the expenses of Mr. Lyon in getting to his field of labour and supply him with the necessaries, of life for one year. Whether any further grant will be needed for next year it is impossible as yet to say.

As to Algoma, the bishop received a grant of \$2,000, which he hoped with other contributions expected, would carry the

diocese over the year, with economy.

An application from Rev. S. H. Morgan, for work as a missionary of the board was received and a grant was made of \$600 with expenses to his field of labour, subject to his acceptance by the S. P. G.

The Board was notified by the Secretary of the C. C. M. A. that the following missionaries had been sent out during the last

For the salaries and expenses of these, the C. C. M. G. is responsible. It may be mentioned, that in Nagano, Japan, a Guild of Church women has been formed to help by their teaching, influence and work the cause of Christianity amongst the non Christian women. The Doctor of this mission would like to write to the Board in Japanese, to which proposal no objection was raised. They need \$300 in order to purchase a site for Church.

A feeling has long been growing that for the practical work of the Board, two meetings a year were not sufficient, and ye more frequent meetings would entail too great an expense upon the members; it was therefore resolved to suggest to the Society at its annual meeting, that an Executive Committee should be appointed to meet each month in some central place to consider applications for work and other matters which may require in vestigation, and report at the next meeting of the Board, so that the decision of the Board may be based on more perfect information. It was understood that whilst certain persons were nominated, all members of the Board would be at liberty to attention the take part in the proceedings.

As this is the last meeting of the Synod before the Province Synod is called together next September, it will be necessary nominate two clerical and two lay delegates to represent the dicese on the Board of Missions, so that they may be elected at the missionary meeting of the Church which takes place on the fir

### B-11. REPORT OF THE MISSION BOARD.

The Mission Board of the Diocese of Ottawa beg leave to present to the Synod a report of its proceedings for the year ending April 30th, 1898.

The meetings of the Board were held on the 17th of November and 25th of May, and were attended by a large representation of members.

The Board desires to express, with deep thankfulness to God, its gratification that there has been no falling off in contributions to the Mission Fund, but rather a substantial increase. In the Financial statement which is appended it will be seen that the receipts, for the year, from all sources amount to \$7,051.83, made up as follows: Balance from last year, \$165.27; collections, \$6,122.96; advertisements, \$35.00; interest on capital, \$728.10. These sums, exclusive of the balance, give an increase over last year of \$784.35.

The expenditure was \$5,669.11, leaving a balance of \$1,383.73; of this balance, after a full discussion, \$1,000 was added to the capital of the Sustentation Fund.

The Board desires to state that the movement for the more satisfactory payment of clerical stipends, known as the "Quebec Scheme" which was recommended by the Synod of last year. has been adopted by the Board, and becomes number XI of the By-laws of the Mission Board. In order to avoid any confusion that might arise by using the word "Quebec" it was considered advisable to change the name to the "Clergy Stipend By-law of the Diocese of Ottawa." In the Missions of Franktown, Lanark and Petewawa, the new scheme has been tried with success, and it is hoped that before very long every mission in the Diocese will fall in with its requirements.

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The Board is glad to report that the new Mission of Glengarry has been formed. It will be remembered that this mission is the result of a most liberal offer made by the McLennan family of that place. Mrs. John McLennan offered \$300 a year for five years, and \$500 towards a church building; and Mr. Duncan McLennan, her son, offered 13 acres of land and a house free of rent.

This offer induced the Board to make a grant of \$400 per annum to the mission which is now fairly started, and the Rev. A.

H. Whalley has been appointed thereto.

A special grant of \$50 was made to Janeville for one year, on condition that Services and Sunday School be resumed at the Quarries.

The Board will notify all missions whose grants are to be withdrawn next year. It also decided to print the names of sub-

scribers to the fund as in previous years.

The capital of the fund has been increased by \$50, a gift from Mrs. Mooney of East Hawkesbury, and also by \$50, the gift of Miss. E. Ridley, of S. Mountain. The Board would earnestly recommend others to imitate the example of these good women

and to go and do likewise."

The Board desires to emphasize the fact that there are now 25 missions, more or less, dependent for their existence upon the Mission Fund, and would respectfully urge upon all the members of the Church the great importance of this fund which is so largely instrumental in maintaining and extending the work of the Church in the Diocese and therefore ask for a liberal support.

# B-12. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RURAL DEANS.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa:-

The Board of Rural Deans held two meetings during the year, all the members being present. At the November meeting a scheme for increasing the endowment of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund was submitted by the Rural Dean of Lanark and referred by the Board to the several Deaneries for consideration and report.

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At the annual May meeting the Board received the reports of the several Rural Deans on the work of the Church during the past year. These reports I have summarized and, in presenting them to the Synod, beg to direct attention to the vigorous condition of Church life throughout the Diocese, as indicated—with one or two exceptions—by the reports of those who are in daily and intimate touch with parochial life as existing throughout their respective deaneries.

# I.—CARLETON DEANERY, REV. GEO. SCANTLEBURY, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean's report is brief. He would have been able to report more fully if only the clergy had all complied with the requirements of the Synod, and sent him their returns in proper He had to prepare his report without returns from one country and four city parishes, (Janeville, St. George's, St. Luke's, St. Matthew's and St. Bartholomew's, Ottawa), and states that, with a few exceptions, the parishes and missions throughout the Deanery present a healthy and progressive state of Church life. This is specially noticeable in one important particular, the increase in contributions to Church work outside the parish without in any way decreasing the amount contributed for parochial purposes. Church life in Ottawa has been strengthened by the opening of another parish, and the consequent increase in the staff of clergy now labouring in the city. Very commendable progress has already been made in the organization and work of this newparish under the energetic management of the Rev. J. A. Tancock. The Rural Dean further reports that he has canvassed the Mission of Gloucester, part of the Mission of Nepean, and one congregation in Parish of Richmond in connection with Clergyman's Stipend. At the request of the Bishop, the Rural Dean visited the congregation of St. Paul's Church, 9th Line of Fitzroy, to act as a mediator between the people and their Clergyman, but without effect. A conference of the Clergy and Laity, with the Bishop presiding, was held at St. Luke's Church, Ottawa, in November, and a meeting of the Ruri-Decanal Chapter, in the Parish of Richmond in May. At this latter meeting the proposition to canvass the Deanery for subscriptions to increase the endowment of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund was held over for a future meeting.

# II.-LANARK DEANERY, REV. A. ELLIOTT, RURAL DEAN.

A novel, yet most encouraging feature of the Rural Dean's report this year is that his Deanery has, during the past year, given three young men to the Ministry of the Church, viz: J. D.

McCallum, George A. Field and — Johnston. The Clergy Stipend By-Law (formerly called the Quebec Scheme) is in operation in the missions of Franktown and Balderson. In the mission of Tennyson a Parsonage has been purchased and in part paid for, and a new Church is in course of erection at Canterbury. In one mission no Sunday School work is undertaken. The Bishop held the Annual Conference of Clergy and Laity in October, all the Clergymen present, and several laymen. The annual Chapter meeting was held in May. Other portions of the Rural Dean's report bear upon the Statistics of the Deanery and will be reported on by the Committee on Statistics.

# III.—PEMBROKE DEANERY, REV. W. A. READ, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean reports that in all the parishes and missions the work of the Church has been steadily prosecuted, the Clergy and people generally working well and harmoniously together. The almost total collapse of the lumber trade has prevented any very notable advance, with the town of Pembroke and the village of Mattawa having suffered by the removal of families driven away by want of work. A handsome tower has been added to the Church at Cobden, a new Church is being built at Haley's, and another at Westmeath in Beachburg mission. Trinity Church, Pembroke, has undergone a much needed renovation which has completely transformed the interior. At Mattawa the burden of debt which has paralyzed the energies of the few families now remaining there has been rendered possible of removal by the noble and generous act of the creditor, Mr. J. L. Coverhill, who has accepted \$1,000 in settlement of his claim. This sum has been borrowed from a Loan Company and paid to Mr. Coverhill, and the missionary, Rev. Mr. Anderson, has been commended to the Diocese at large by the Lord Bishop in the canvass he is now actively prosecuting to collect the \$1,000 with which to repay the Loan Company and thus entirely free the property from debt. At Cobden the Congregation is manfully facing a debt of \$970, and while thus engaged can do no more than they are at present doing for the support of the missionary. At Beachburg there reigns a distressing and dangerous apathy which the untiring zeal and energy of the missionary has failed to overcome. It is prestionable whether a married priest can exist at Beachburg on the present inadequate Stipend. At Petawawa the missionary is untiring in his energy, and expects this year to make the last payment due on the parsonage. The Clergy Stipend By-Law (Quebec Scheme) is in operation in this mission.

The Rural Dean reports this past year to have been one of of general improvement, and indicates the condition of the Church in each parish as follows: -Metcalfe: The erection of the beautiful new stone Church at Metcalfe occupies first places in the Rural Dean's report, and it is gratifying to know that this handsome church edifice, has by the untiring energy of the incumbent (Rev. C. B. Clarke) and the hearty co operation of the people been completed with so little debt, the small amount of \$300 being all that is unpaid to enable it to be declared free of debt. The Church is fitted and furnished throughout with stained glass windows, oak seats and bell weighing 740 lbs. At Russell Mrs. Keays has presented to the Church a handsome brass lectern as a memorial of her husband. The good example of Metcalfe has been followed by the ten Church families of Vernon who have entered npon arrangements for the building of a stone church, \$800 being already subscribed and much work promised. Navan: Under the energy of the incumbent (Rev. R. Orr) the parishioners of Navan have been led to proceed with the building of a fine stone church with massive tower, the whole cost being about \$5,000. It will stand for many years a fitting monument to the liberality of the parishioners. It is expected that the opening services will be held in July. The Rural Dean canvassed the mission in August last for Clergyman's Stipend and increased the list \$150, but the latest returns do not indicate that the mission has been paid. The parsonage is in good order and insured. The Cumberland church is in good condition but uninsured. At Blackburn the church shows many signs of neglect and decay. The interior is ill kept, and the wall of the vestry bears evidence of having served the purpose of an account book, as a former incumbent appears to have made thereon his entries of Sunday collections. Bearbrook: The Rural Dean on his inspection of this parish found the church at Vars to be uninsured, and in need of many improvements, such as new steps, fence, repairs to foundation, new altar, prayer-desk and lectern. For some of these improvements money is in hand. The Parsonage is about to be insured, but the chnrch at Bearbrook needs replacing. Funds are being accumulated for this purpose, as the Congregation is impressed with the necessity of building a new church. The incumbent (Rev. Jas. Empringham) deserves hearty encouragement in his difficult work. The church at Canaan is not insured. Plantagenet: The self-denying labours of the missionary are meeting with much encouragement. At Plantagenet various

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improvements to the church have been begun through the united efforts of the few zealous church people. The railway construction and the mineral springs are likely to make it an important centre. At Fenaghvale, improvements have been made in parsonage, and paid for. The Incumbent has done much at his own expense. Other needed repairs to church are in contemplation. The Rural Dean's attention was called to defacing marks on the pews which the missionery had endeavoured to remedy and prevent, but in vain. The attention of the wardens should be called by authorily to these acts of irreverence with view to prevent recurrence. At Maxville, Mr. Ritchie has been holding services in the old Salvation Army barracks. The work here is full of promise. At the first vestry meeting of the Congregation (at which the R. D. presided) a subscription list of \$62 was signed! There has therefore been a slight increase in the clerical Stipend, though it is yet sadly deficient. The parsonage is insured, but not the churches, and the registers are well kept. At Alfred the Rural Dean reports the use of covered trestles in place of analtar, and the interior of St. Peter's church needs much improvement to make it at all attractive. Vankleek Hill: Throughout this Parish the Rural Dean in his inspection found everything in good order, and the properties well kept and the parsonage insured but not the two churches. The Stipend of the missionary has increased some, and the contributions to mission fund considerably. Rev. Mr. Hunter has not confined his attention to his mission proper but has stretched out and opened services at Alexandria, reviving the work there. At East Hawkesbury are also to be seen many signs of Church activity. A new organ has been purchased, and S. S. work in vigorous condition, under management of the Congregation. The property is to be further ornamented by planting trees

Hawkesburi:—The last year reports indicate that the favourable report of previous year has been well sustained, but with largely increased support to outside objects. Two branches of Woman's Auxiliary in vigorous operation. Sunday School well maintained and property fairly kept. The parish has been enriched by a munificent gift of \$10,000 from Robert Hamilton Esq, so that now, it is hoped, the front of the church may be extended. With this in view efforts are being made to constitute L'Original. Caledonia Springs and Alfred a separate mission. A site has been secured at the Springs and an appeal is being made in aid of Church Building Fund. As result of a thorough canvass, and a grant for the mission Fund the first missiony will have Stipend of not less than \$650. The Rural Dean finds that in many instance

The Rural Dean lso regrets that in many parishes he finds charges on the collecons which he deems improper, as were they met in other ways, he surplus collection could be made to supplement the meagre ncomes of the Clergy. Finally the Rural Dean reports that hroughout the Deanery the indications are that the future has in tore for the Church more marked progress. Many points will open long the new Railway which the Church must be on the alert to ccupy, in advance, and thus reverse the past policy. luri-Decanal conferences were held during the year at Hawkesury, the Bishop presiding at the one held in October last. At he Chapter meeting in May it was agreed that the missionary eetings had better be held in the autumn.

# .—RENFREW DEANERY, REV. C. V. FORSTER BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean reports that on going over with the Clergy Chapter the returns of the several parishes of the Deanery it as plainly evident that the past year showed a marked improvement over former years in every branch of Church work. All the hurch property has been returned as insured, but the Rural Dean is unable to report that a sufficient maintenance is contributed to the Clergy in the missions of Combermere, Douglas and Renfrew. At Calabogie occasional services are maintained by the missionary going out from Renfrew. It is not a very satisfactory transpement, yet the Rural Dean is not prepared to suggest a setter. Mr. Quartermaine with commendable willingness is ving what ministrations he can, but it entails great lost of time. The report then deals with the condition of the Church in each arish, as follows:

Arnprior: The past year the most successful of the six years the present incumbency. The work of the Woman's Auxiliary is been most beneficial. A Junior Branch has lately been formed the a large and enthusiastic membership. Nearly three hundred plars have been banked to the credit of a Parish Hall Fund, in a building being felt to be a necessity to the growing needs the parish. The Lenten Services were never so largely attended last year, an indication of growth in the spiritual life of the

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ass, and a Stipend of instance parish. There is a large Sunday School, well officered, and the childrens' offerings for the Indian Homes exceeded twenty dollars. In all respects the rector believes the parish has entered on a period of marked advancement. Regular services are held at Galetta with average congregation of forty. A church should be built at this station, and some arrangement should be made by which services would be extended to Braeside when a congregation could be established.

Douglas: The missionary is greatly hampered in his work by having to make periodical visits a distance of some seventy mile along the line of the Parry Sound Railway. The longer such arrangement continues the greater will be the disadvantage under which he will labour, as the Congregations of Douglas, Clontan Grattan, and parts adjacent should receive the undivided attention of the missionary. The two townships of Griffith and Mattawat chan have necessarily been without any church ministrations from the Douglas missionary since his appointment, though forming part of his mission and served by his predecessors prior to the re organization and appointment of the present missionary. the Rev. Mr. Garrett is relieved from duty on the line of railway it will be possible for him to resume services in these two town ships where there are a few scattered families. The Grattan Congregation was, some years ago, comparatively strong but it recent years has become weakened through internal dissension They have no church. One should have been built years ago The missionary has energy in abundance and will no doubt turn in the direction of church building once relieved of opportunit and necessity of expending its forceful power on the work alon the railway. The Clergy Stipend By-Law (Quebec Scheme) about to be put in operation in the mission.

Eganville: The past year the most successful, in man respects, of the four years of the present incumbency. A brand of the Woman's Auxiliary is in successful operation the member taking great interest in the work and meetings. The spaciou and valuable site on which St. John's Church and Rectory as built was last year enclosed with a suitable fence in place of the old one which had done service for twenty years, and the ground are now being laid out and set with hedges, shrubberry an ornamental trees. The parish, while having in it very man earnest, devoted and loyal churchmen and churchwomen, is streaping the consequences of strife and bitterness of former year but there are beginning to show here and there signs which it

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dicate very clearly that the future is brighter and more promising. In its church population, communicants, Sunday School scholars and contribution to diocesan funds the parish has of late made much progress and this year is not excelled, in these respects, by any other parish in the deanery. But when all is said it yet falls far short of what it is capable of doing as a parish. It is numerically and financially a Church stronghold and strong hopes are entertained that its condition will steadily improve as years go on.

Renfrew:—With a comparatively small church population this mission manages to accomplish a great deal. Last year a handsome brick parsonage was erected, costing, with the land on which it stands, about \$5,000. A debt of \$150 for roofing church and putting in furnace was also paid. The cost of parsonage is being met by annual payments spread over several years. The sunday School is large and well managed. A Missionary Union connected with the Sunday School is doing good work and insures the sowing this seed of Missionary zeal in young hearts. Last year gave special and considerable offerings to the Bishop of Algoma and to the Diocesan Mission Fund.

Rockingham:—Before his removal last fall the Rev. Mr. Butler had completed and paid for the parsonage, and accomplished nuch other good work. His successor, Rev. J. D. McCallum, took harge in November and his report for his first six months' work very encouraging. He is evidently prepared to face hard work, and such disappointment as must inevitably occur, with cheerfuless and good courage. He believes he has a fine field for work, hich is undeniably true as no field in the Diocese presents a arder sphere of work. At Barry's Bay there is a prospect of rowth, if it is made a divisional point in the Railway. At Bark ake the erection of Church has for the present been deferred, and he funds some years ago contributed for that purpose have been aced in the keeping of the Synod until events prove what is the isest course to follow. At present there is much uncertainty as whether the Church families now residing there will remain.

Whitney:—Services have been held here and at Madawaska and Killaloe for upwards of a year by Rev. Mr. Garrett, of Douglas. A resident Missionary is urgently needed, to reside at Killaloe and open Services at Tramore and Golden Lake as well as at Whitney, Gillmour and Madawaska. There is a thickly populated section of country to be reached from Killaloe, and at present the Church is holding no services in the neighbourhood. Her services would be

welcomed by not a few. The Rural Dean reports having visited some of these people and from personal knowledge of the neighbourhood strongly urges that the duty of the Church is clear to go in and make every effort to possess the land.

# VI.—STORMONT DEANERY, REV. R. L. M. HOUSTON, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean states that the New Missionary Jurisdiction of Glengarry has at last been set apart, the Mission Board having made a grant of \$400 for the carrying on of the Church's work in this long neglected field, and that the McLennan family have shown great interest and liberality, promising \$300 a year to the Missionary's Stipend, and \$500 towards erection of a Church. They also provide a comfortable house for the Missionary free of Such magnificent liberality is worthy of all commendation. A Priest of some ten years' experience has been appointed by the Bishop and enters upon his duties immediately. May the prayers and good wishes of the whole Diocese go with him in his pioneer At Crysler an Alms Basin has been given to the Church. At Iroquois Church buildings have been repaired and painted. Morrisburg another memorial window has been placed in the Church. At Moulinette a memorial Oak Altar, Reredos, Sedilia and Fald-Stool have been given to the Church. At Williamsburg the Church is being improved.

### MISSIONARY DEPUTATIONS.

The preparation of the list of Deputations for the holding of the Annual missionary meetings engages, each year, the serious attention of the Board, and their arrangement, under the approval of the Bishop, should not lightly be interferred with. In no captious or hap-hazard way does the Board draft their list for this most important work, and, while willing each year to meet the wishes of any who may desire to go on some particular deputation, they express the hope that if in any instance such arrangement be found impracticable, the alternative they adopt will be acquiesced in and heartily carried out. Only in this way can the Board hope to be enabled to make provision for the due and proper presentation, in all parts of the Diocese, of the important claim of the mission Fund.

Another feature of the Board's Action this year may be referred to as establishing a precedent, viz, the appointment opriests labouring in our large and outlying missionary districts to

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those Deputations which are to visit the City Congregations. The reason is not far to seek. These young missionaries from the backwoods are the very men to be drafted out to the front year after year, not only to tell the story of the Church's work in the fields entrusted to their case, but primarily as a token of the Church's desire to honour them as her trusted pioneers by calling them to come forward and represent her in the great centres of trade and commerce in the important occasion of her there presenting the urgent claims of her mission fields. The Board would have the missionary Clergy feel that the Church holds them in high honour as her advance guard, occupying the outposts against all odds, and that she recognizes the trials and discouragements under which they must constantly be called upon to work.

RESIGNATIONS:—The confusion heretofore caused by Clergy sending word, oftentimes at the last moment, that they could not go on Deputation work, will be avoided in the future by the Clergy observing the following notice, viz:—That the Bishop directs that on any Clergyman finding that it is impossible for him to go on Deputation work he shall, withou delay, communicate in writing with the Chairman of the Board of Rural Deans, who from his list of available men will appoint a substitute and notify all concerned.

### B- 15. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF DECEASED MEMBERS.

The Committee on Deceased Members begs leave to report that during the past year, three members of the Synod Fave died; the Rev. W. Mercer, Priest, and James E. Baker and Abraham Code, lay-delegates.

Walter Douglas Mercer, Priest, after receiving his early training in Germany was educated at McGill University and the Montreal Diocesan College, taking his degree as Bachelor of Arts from the former.

He was ordained in 1881, and successively served in the parishes of South Mountain, Franktown and Arnprior. A few years ago he retired on account of ill health and resided in Ottawa until shortly before his death at the end of June. 1897.

James E. Baker, one of the most earnest members of the Congregation of Christ Church, Moulinette, and a lay-delegate, died after a short but painful illness in June of last year.

He represented the Congregation of Moulinette in the Synod, for an uninterrupted period of about 30 years, and ever took the keenest interest in all that concerned the welfare and growth of the Church, both in his own parish and in the Diocese at large.

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Abraham Code who represented the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Ottawa, was well known to all members of the Synod, both here and in Kingston by his regular attendance for many years. As a member of the Synod he took a deep interest in all he work of the Church, but especially in the Mission Fund, having been an active member of the Classification Committee. Since the formation of the Diocese of Ottawa, he acted as Auditor Endowment Fund.

After a long illness, Mr. Code died last April.

C.—1. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Committee on Religious Education in Public Schools

Your Committee met at the time of the November Committee eetings and again at the time of the May Committee meetings at has very little to report. So far the Committee in this Diocese as been following the lead of Mr. L. H. Baldwin whose Volunty School Scheme was approved of and adopted by the Synod of is Diocese at its last Session.

In the Diocese of Toronto two Committees were originally pointed, one to consider the question of Religious Education in isting Public Schools, and the other to consider Mr. Baldwin's pluntary School Scheme, but at the Session of the Toronto mod held last year these two Committees were combined.

We are informed that the combined Committee of the pronto Synod has been unable to report a combined scheme and r. Baldwin has withdrawn for the time being his scheme for cluntary Schools, in order not to stand in the way of the Synod's reeing upon some scheme for further religious instruction in the hools, but at some future time when the opportunity appears re favourable he will bring forward again his scheme for luntary Schools.

The Synod of this Diocese having given its support to the luntary School Scheme, it seems a matter for regret that the

Toronto Committee has reported in favour of what to Your Com

mittee seems the less preferable scheme.

As however, every effort to secure a larger measure of relief in the way of religious instruction for the Children of Ontario should receive our support, it is recommended that a Committee be re-appointed to continue the work of co-operating and corresponding with other Committees on the subject.

### C-3. REPORT OF THE S. P. C. K. COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report that:

Acting upon the Resolution passed at the last Session of the Synod, the Lord Bishop appointed your Committee to take sud

Synod, the Lord Bishop appointed your Committee to take sud steps as might lead to the carrying into effect of the proposal for the employment of a Travelling Agent to promote the circulation of Bibles, Prayer Books, and General Church Literature in the Dioceses of Ottawa, Quebec, Montreal, Ontario and Toronto During the summer, the Lord Bishop of Quebec, being in England had communication with the Society for promoting Christia Knowledge on the matter, and that the Society offered to provide a sum of \$300 a year for three years for stipend and expenses an agent to promote an interest in their work throughout the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, on condition that all subscriptions and donations raised by him should be sent to the Society This offer was accepted, and the appointment of the Agent, and

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the arrangement of his work, being left by the Society in the hands of the House of Bishops, Their Lordship's appointed the Rev. Henry Gomery, of the Diocese of Montreal, (lately acting as Agent for the British and Foreign Bible Society), and made certain regulations provided that the Agent should devote at least one month a year to each Diocese of the Province; and that he should, with the consent of the Incumbent hold a meeting in every parish he visited for the purpose of stimulating interest in the S. P. C. K., and the reading of Church Literature; and should deliver, when desired, Lectures on Church History; promote the sale of Bibles, Prayer Books, Publications of the S. P. C. K.; and the formation and extension of Parish Libraries. He should also endeavour, with the consent of the Incumbent, to form a Parochial S. P. C. K. Association, the officers of which should act in the parish as the representatives of the Diocesan Committee to further the interests of the work, particularly by the collection of subscriptions, and by making known the value of S. P. C. K. Literature. He should also endeavour, in due course, to establish in each Diocese a Depository in connection with the Central S. P. C. K. Depot, in Toronto, for the sale of Bibles, Prayer Books, Religious Manuals, and General Church Literature.

Mr. Gomery entered upon his duties on the 1st of January, He visited this diocese in the month of February, and addressed 30 meetings, viz. : 11 in the Deanery of Carleton ; 7 in the Deanery of Russell: 7 in the Deanery of Stormont; and 5 in the Deanery of Lanark. Collections for the S. P. C. K. were made at 23 of the meetings, amounting in the aggregate to \$68.37, contributed as follows: Deanery of Carleton (10 collections), \$26.81; Deanery of Russell (6 collections), \$22.33; Deanery of Stormont (4 collections), \$8.28; Deanery of Lanark 4 collections) \$10.95. Local associations were formed in 2 parishes in the Deanery of Stormont, while the incumbents of 16 other parishes (7 in Carleton, 3 in Russell, 5 in Stormont, and 1 n Lanark) undertook to appoint collectors in the course of the ear to secure contributions for the work of the S. P. C. K. In only two instances did the incumbent decline to receive the agent. The unfavourable weather of February prevented meetings being eld at Moulinette, Mountain, and Avonmore, and affected the ttendance at many of those that were held.

At the conclusion of his month's work, Mr. Gomery reported most kindly reception of himself and the cause he represented by ll the clergy whose parishes he visited, a cordial invitation to eturn, and on all hands promises to sustain the S. P. C. K.

our Committee desire to acknowledge the courtesy and promptess of the clergy in co-operating with the Chairman in the

arrangements of the meetings, the work being thus made a

pleasant and comparatively easy task.

The 200th anniversary of the S. P. C. K.. which occurred on March 25th, 1898, was generally observed in the Diocese, in common with the rest of the Anglican Communion throught the world. In Eucharists and special sermons the gratitude of the Church was manifested for the rich blessing bestowed upon the Society's noble work by Almighty God since the remote date of its humble beginning. Offerings for the Society were made in a number of the churches of the Diocese, amounting altogether to \$116.74.

Your Committee feel that one of the greatest needs of the Church in the present day is a wider circulation of the abundant stores of Church Literature published by the S. P. C. K. To accomplish this they would recommend that depositories be opened wherever practicable, and that colporteurs for the sale of books be

sent through all the parishes and missions.

# APPENDIX F.—Report of Committee on Metropolitan Sec.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY THE SYNOD AT ITS SECOND SESSION TO TAKE ACTION RESPECTING THE PER-MANENT FIXING OF THE METROPOLITAN SEE.

Your Committee have considered the resolutions passed by the House of Bishops of this Ecclesiastical Province on the 16th April, 1896, which are as follows :-

The Bishop of Fredericton moved that a Committee be apn pointed to consider the principle and feasibility of having a fixed Metropolitan See. This was seconded by the Bishop of Huron, and carried.

Moved by the Bishop of Nova Scotia, seconded by the

Bishop of Quebec, and carried.

The House of Bishops are of opinion that it would serve the interests of the Church, and be advantageous, in various ways, if the Metropolitan dignity could be conferred, in perpetuity, upon the Diocese of Ottawa; and they would be glad to do anything in their power to secure this benefft to the See of the Metropolis of the Dominion of Canada. Should the voidance of the office of Metropolitan take place during the occupancy of the See of Ottawa by the present Diocesan, the House of Bishops would have it in their power to elect him as President of the House, and he would thereupon become Metropolitan and Arch-For the future, when the Archbishopric of Ottawa bea came vacant, it would be necessary that the appointment should be in the hands of the Bishops, who would, according to the Canons, elect one of their own number to fill the office of President of the House. The Bishops of the Province request the Metropolitan to enquire of the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawawhether or no they would-upon sanction being given to such a course by the Provincial Synod-be willing to forego election by themselves of their Diocesan, in the consideration of the im-" portance and benefit conferred upon the Diocese of Ottawa hy its being made permanently the See of the Metropolitan and an " Archbishopric."

Your Committee have also considered the communication of the Most Reverend the Metropolitan to the Synod of this Diocese dated 10th February, 1898, which is in the following terms :-

The Metropolitan of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, acting on behalf of the House of Bishops, has to request the " Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa to inform him whether they would, upon canonical sanction being given to such a course by " the Pro " selves

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the Provincial Synod, be willing to forego the election by themselves of their Bishop, and adopt such canonical tegislation as would bind them to accept one chosen by the House of Bishops, in consideration of the dignity and importance which could, on this condition, be conferred upon the Diocese of Ottawa by its being made in perpetuity the See of the Metropolitan, and an Archbishopric, and in further view of the large benefits which would accrue to the whole Church of England in this Ecclesiastical Province, by having the See of the Metropolitan settled in perpetuity in one Diocese.

### APPENDIX L.

61 V4CT., CHAPT. 73.

An Act respecting the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

Assented to 17th January, 1898.

HEREAS by the Act passed in the 59th year Preamble. of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 117, entitled An Act to Incorporate the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa in connection with the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada, the then subsisting canons of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario were, by section 3 of said Act, constituted the canons of the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa (subject to the exceptions mentioned in said section) until the same were altered or repealed by the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa; and whereas by section 4 of the said Act the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa had conferred upon it, within the limits of said Diocese, all powers, rights and privileges which by any statute had been conferred upon the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario; and whereas the said Incorporated Synosof the Diocese of Ontario then had and now has, by virtue of its Act of Incorporation, 25 Victoria, chapter 86, and of the Act passed in the 7th year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 68, section 4, the power to make and also to abrogate, repeal, change or alter its constitution, by-laws, rules and regulations, as may be found expedient, and was also, by the Act passed in the 39th year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 109, invested with full power and authority to make, and from time to

time to amend, such canons, rules, regulations and by-laws as by the said Synod mitht be considered necessary in the exercise of the powers conferred upon it by its Act of Incorporation; and whereas the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, at its last session duly held on and about the 1st day of June, 1897, repealed, amended and enacted certain canons, or purported so to do, and doubts have arisen in respect of the effect thereof until the ratification of the same at the next session of the said Synod; and whereas the said Synod has prayed that such repeal, amendments and enactments be confirmed; and it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition;

Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

Certain amendments

1. Subject to the authority of the said Synod to Canons of hereafter to add to, repeal, amend or vary its the Diocese canons, the repeal of Canon II, Section 7, and of Canons XV and XVI, and the amendments to Canons VIII, IX and XXIII, and the enactment of New Canons numbered XIV A, XV and XVI by the said Synod at its last session, are hereby declared to be and to have been valid from the dates thereof respectively, and the canons of the said Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, as thus altered and amended, are hereby confirmed and declared to be the canons of the said Synod.

Rights, acfirmed.

2. All rights which may have accrued, and quired under all acts done and proceedings heretofore taken under said Canons, or any of them, are hereby declared to be and to have been valid and effectual to all intents and purposes.

# NOTE.

By Section 3 of the Act incorporating the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa, all the Canons of the Diocese of Ontario as then in force, with certain enumerated exceptions, became the Canons of this Diocese (the word "Ottawa" being substituted for the word "Ontario" throughout) until the same should be altered or repealed by the Synod of this Diocese.

Since the incorporation of the Diocese several important changes have been made in the Canons, and in accordance with the resolution of the Synod at its last Session, the Canons of the Diocese as now in force, are now printed in full for the use of members of the Synod.

The dates of all amendments and additions to the Canons since their consolidation by the Synod of Ontario in 1891, whether passed by the Synod of Ontario before the division of that Diocese, or by the Synod of this Diocese, are noted at the heading of each Canon. These notes will be of assistance in tracing the Synodical legislation wherever necessary.

## CANON I.—MEMBERSHIP.

#### CANON II.—ORGANIZATION.

- 1. The Synod shall meet annually, or oftener Meetings of at the discretion of the Bishop, who shall appoint Synod. the time and place of meeting, and shall adjourn or prorogue the Synod as appears to him expedient.
- 2. To constitute a quorum of the Synod for Quorum. the transaction of business one-fourth of the whole number of the Clergy on the Synod list must be present, and one-fourth of the Parishes on the said list must be represented. Each Parish may be represented by one Lay representative.
- . No act or resolution of the Synod shall be concurrence valid without the concurrence of the Bishop and of orders. of a majority of the Clergy and of the Lay representatives present. This section, so far as it

requires the concurrence of the Bishop, shall not apply to the election of a Bishop.

Appointment of committees.

4. All Committees of Synod shall be named by the Bishop unless their nomination be otherwise provided for.

Term of office of officials.

5. Members of Standing Committees and the elective officers of Synod shall hold office until the appointment or election of their successors. The Bishop may fill up until the next meeting of Synod any vacancies among the officials of the Synod or in the Committees occurring from any cause whatsoever.

The Treasurer shall be elected by a majority of both orders present.

Members to sit. 1. When the Bishop or other person presiding has taken the Chair, no member shall continue standing.

Motions to be in writing.

3. No motion or amendment shall be considered as before the Synod (excepting such as is proposed by the Bishop, or by a committee), unless seconded and reduced to writing. To prevent surprise, no motion, except a motion in course, shall be considered until the succeeding day of meeting, notice thereof having been first given.

Divisions and voting.

When a division takes place the votes of the Clergy and Laity shall be taken separately, if required by the Bishop or four members of each of the respective orders; and the Lay representatives shall in all such cases vote by Parishes, and when so voting, the vote of the majority present shall be considered as the vote of the Parish.

Order of voting. 15. In voting, those who vote in the affirmative shall first rise, and then those who vote in the negative.

No re-consideration.

16. A question once determined shall not again be brought under discussion in the same Session without the special sanction of the Bishop or other person presiding.

Recording votes.

17. No protest or dissent shall be entered on the minutes of the proceedings; but, when required by any one member, the number of affirmative and negative votes shall be recorded, and when required by three of either the Clergy or Lay representatives, the names of the Clergy and Parishes voting on either side of the question shall be also recorded.

Reports of committees.

18. Every report of a Committee shall be in writing, shall be signed by the Chairman, and shall be received in course, unless a motion be made for its re-committal.

Explanation of Teports.

19. The Chairman of the Committee, or some member deputed by him, shall explain to the Synod the bearing of any portion of the report, if requested by any member of the Synod.

Suspension of rules,

20. A motion to suspend the order of proceedings or the rules of order shall take precedence of all other motions, and shall be decided without debate; and no order of proceedings or rule of order shall be suspended, except upon the unanimous consent of the members present.

The Treasurer shall, with the Clerical Secretary and the bank in which the deposit of the Synod moneys is made, have joint custody of all the securities other than mortgages, and shall see to the collection of the interest thereon, and shall report to the Synod at its annual Session and to the Executive Committee, if required, on the state of the Securities; and he shall sign all proper cheques issued by the Clerical Secretary.

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and of the several Archdeaconries, Rural Deaneries and Parishes therein; also, a list of Clergy of the Diocese from time to time, showing such changes as are made therein and giving a statement of the respective dates of the admission of the said Clergy into their different Orders, and a list of the different Parishes, Missions, or Stations in which they have served.

(d) The Registrar shall enter in the books so Grants, conprovided the date of every such grant, con-veyances, veyance, or will, as is hereinafter mentioned, and the names of the grantors or testators, and of the grantee or devisee; also, a short description of the property, and a memorandum of the trust or object of the grant or devise.

(e) The Registrar is and shall be the proper Custody of custodian of all grants, conveyances, probates or certain docucertified copies of wills or parts thereof, in any way relating to land or property granted, conveyed, or devised for the benefit or use of the Church of England in the Diocese. He is also, and shall continue to be, the proper custodian of all completed or filled up Parish Registers. He is and, so far as may be, shall be the historiographer of the Diocese, and the proper custodian of the archives of the Diocese and of the several Archives. Parishes therein.

(f) The Registrar shall keep a correct record Record of of the Letters of Orders, the Licenses, Induction ecclesiastical Mandates, and other legal instruments, issued instruments. by the Bishop to the Clergy of the Diocese from time to time; and on request the Registrar shall furnish certified copies of any such records; and for each such copy he shall be entitled to charge Fees for cothe following fees, viz:-

Certified copy of record of Priest's or Deacon's Letters of Orders, or of Induction Mandate ..... 50 cents.

Extracts from registers. (g) The Registrar, from time to time, on application being made therefor, shall give a certificate of any entry of Birth, Death, or Marriage entered in any Parish Register in his custody, and for every certificate he shall be entitled to charge and receive a fee of fifty cents.

Term of office.

8. No Auditor shall be eligible for more than two years in succession.

Payment and attendance of auditors.

# CANON XII.-DIOCESAN MISSION FUND.

(As amended by Synod of Ontario June 23rd, 1892, confirmed June 22nd, 1893.)

1. The Diocesan Mission Fund shall consist of what the of all collections for Diocesan Missionary pur- Mission Fundamental Consist. poses made in Churches, Chapels, and Mission Stations throughout the Diocese, of othe interest of the Sustentation Fund, and of all subscriptions, donations, and legacies for such purpose, regard being had to the direction of the donor or testator.

2. Four collections for the Diocesan Mission Collections Fund as hereinafter provided, shall be made for the Fund, annually in every Church, Chapel, and Mission Station in which a regular Sunday service is held; on Trinity Sunday or one of the two following Sundays, and on the first Sunday in Advent or on one of the two following Sundays, a sermon on behalf of the Mission Fund shall be preached and a collection taken up, which collection shall within one month thereafter be remitted to the Clerical Secretary by the Clergyman; an annual missionary meeting shall be held in every Church, Chapel and Mission Station as aforesaid during the autumn or winter, and at such meeting a collection shall be taken up for the said Fund, and shall be remitted to the Clerical Secretary by the Convener of the deputation holding such meeting within one month thereafter; and a parochial collection shall be made annually in every Parish and Mission under the supervision of the Clergyman, who shall remit the proceeds of such collection to the Clerical Secretary on or before the twentyfifth day of April.

3. The Board of Diocesan Missions shall Constitution the Archdeacons eight Clarguman alested by Board. the Archdeacons, eight Clergymen elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the Synod by the

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Clergy, and eight Lay representatives elected at the same meeting by ballot by the Lay representatives, and four Clergymen and four Lay representatives appointed by the Bishop at the same meeting.

Classification Committee.

It shall be duty of such Sub-committee to classify the Missions for the ensuing year and report thereon at the May meeting.

Classes of Missions. 5. The Missions shall be divided into eight classes: Those in Class I shall each receive a grant not exceeding \$100; those in Class II a grant not exceeding \$150; those in Class III a grant not exceeding \$200; those in Class IV a grant not exceeding \$250; those in Class V a grant not exceeding \$300; those in Class VI a grant not exceeding \$350; those in Class VII a grant not exceeding \$400; and those in Class VIII a grant not exceeding \$400.

Special grants.

6. The Board may in its discretion, on the recommendation of the Bishop, make a special grant not exceeding \$100 to any Parish or Mission, provided that two-thirds of the members present concur in voting for the grant.

Incapacitated Clergymen. 7. When a Clergyman is incapacitated by illness or age from performing duty, the Board may in its discretion make a suitable provision for him out of the funds at its disposal.

1. The income of the Clergy Trust Fund shall committee. be managed by a committee consisting of six Clergymen and six Lay representatives.

2. Subject to the provisions respecting the stipends of Fund contained in the agreement made between Commutants the Incorporated Synods of the Dioceses of first charges. Ontario and Ottawa, dated the 12th August, 1896, the first charges on the income of the said Fund shall be the quarterly payment of the stipends of the Clergymen mentioned in the

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schedule hereto, who commuted with the government, according to the convenants formerly entered into with the said Clergymen.

Seniority of Clergy.

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Diocese of Ottawa under a bene decessit or without leave of absence, and is again admitted into the Diocese, his name shall be placed at the foot of the list. Any question of seniority which may arise under this Canon shall be decided by the Bishop of this Diocese.

5. When the income of the Fund shall be Clerical \$400 more than the annual sum required to Secretary to meet the charges and payments mentioned in plus, income, Sections 2 and 3 of this Canon, it shall be the &c. duty of the Clerical Secretary to report the existence of such surplus to the Committee at its next meeting, and the committee may then or thereafter direct that the Clergyman next entitled under this Canon be added to the list of annuitants in the schedule hereto, which list shall be continued from time to time by the Clerical Secretary under the direction of the committee, and shall be in force as finally approved by the Bishop. Should the income of the Deficiency in Fund, however, be found by the committee in Income. sufficient at any time to meet the charges thereon, and the subsisting annuities, the payment or payments to the annuitant or annuitants last in order on the list shall be discontinued, or diminished by such sum or sums and for such a period as may, in the opinion of the committee, be requisite.

6. Subject to the other provisions of this Annuity for-Canon, each of the several annuitants mentioned feited. in the schedule hereto or who may hereafter be added to the list, shall continue to receive his annuity so long only as he continues to do duty in the Diocese, or, after having completed ten years' service, is on the Superannuation list thereof, or has leave of absence from the Diocese, or holds office in the Synod; and he shall forfeit all claim to such annuity for any time during which he may be under ecclesiastical censure. Provided that the word "Diocese" in this sub-

Diocese de-

section shall, in the case only of the present annuitants mentioned in the schedule hereto, be deemed to include the Diocese of Ontario as well as the Diocese of Ottawa.

Clergy having enyielding \$1,200.

7. No Clergyman while in the possession of dowed living an endowed living, yielding a clear income of twelve hundred dollars per annum, shall be placed upon or remain on the list of annuitants. His right to such annuity shall be suspended during the time he may be in possession of such living, but shall revive on his ceasing to be in such possession; and such suspension shall not affect his seniority.

Clergy to make statement of

8. The committee shall have power from time to time to require any annuitant, or Clergyman income if re- claiming to be an annuitant, to submit a statement to the committee as to the amount of income derived from his parochial endowment. In case of non-compliance with such requirement within three months after being notified in the case of an annuitant, he shall forfeit all right to his annuity until he makes such statement, and the arrears during the time he makes default shall not in any event be paid him; and in the case of an applicant, his name shall not, while he is so in default, be placed on the list of annuitants under this Canon in the event of his becoming eligible meanwhile, but he shall be passed over in favor of the next in seniority until he makes such statement.

Death of Annuitant.

9. Upon the death of any annuitant, the amount of his annuity shall continue to be paid to his legal representatives for the quarter current at the time of his death, and also for the two quarters thereafter ensuing.

## CANON XVI.—THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

## I. NATURE OF FUND.

1. There shall be a fund for the benefit of the Nature of widows and orphans of the Clergy of this Diocese, Fund. to be known as "The Widows' and Orphans' Fund" (hereinafter called the Fund) which shall comprise the pro rata share of the interest and income derived from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Capital, administered by the Synod in the Consolidated Funds Account (as defined by Canon XIV A) together with the annual subscriptions and assessments of the Clergy hereinafter mentioned, the annual collections in the

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following paragraph mentioned, and such other contributions as may be received from time to time for the purposes of said Fund, and the said Fund shall be administered on the conditions and in the manner hereinafter set forth.

Annual Sermon and Collection.

2. A sermon shall be preached and a collection shall be made annually by every clergyman holding a cure in this Diocese, on the Fifth Sunday in Lent or one of the two following Sundays, in every Church in which service is celebrated on that day, and in every other Church, Chapel or Mission Station in each Cure in which Sunday services are held, as soon after the said Sunday as the incumbent of such Parish or Mission finds practicable; and the proceeds of such collection shall be sent by the Clergyman to the Clerical Secretary of the Synod immediately after the taking up of the same, and shall be placed by him to the credit of the said Fund.

## II. SØBSCRIBERS.

Every Clergyman to subscribe.

3. Every Clergyman of the Diocese of Ottawa shall subscribe to this Fund as hereinafter provided.

Clergy now in arrears.

4. All Clergymen who have not heretofore been subscribers to the Fund under the provisions of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Canon in force immediately prior to the coming into force of this Canon, or who are in arrears under the said Canon, shall be required to pay their arrears by instalments extending over such period as the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee may decide.

From what date arrears to be paid.

5. Such arrears shall be collected from Clergymen admitted to or ordained in the Diocese of Ontario, prior to the 1st day of May, A.D. 1896, from the date of such admission or ordination; and from Clergymen admitted to or ordained in the Diocese of Ottawa since the 1st day of May, A.D., 1896, or if hereafter admitted to or ordained

## III. SUBSCRIPTIONS.

6. The subscription payable by each Clergy- Annual Subsman shall be five dollars per year, payable on or cription. before the first day of January in each year, and in order to make the date of payment uniform for all subscribers, the first subscription in each case shall be apportioned if necessary. If the said subscription is not paid by the 31st day of January in each year, the Clerical Secretary shall notify the delinquent subscriber that he is in default. Provided, that in the case of any Clergy-Commuted man of this Diocese, who has commuted under Clergy. the provisions of any Canon in force prior to the coming into force of this Canon, no subscription shall be required under this Canon, but this exemption shall not apply to the assessment mentioned in the next paragraph hereof.

7. The Clerical Secretary shall present to the Annual state-Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee, at its ment and regular meeting in November of each year, a statement and estimate of the fund for the current year. Should this statement and estimate show that the Fund will not be sufficient to meet the pensions and charges on the Fund, then the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee shall make an assessment upon all the Clergy for an amount to make up such estimated deficiency. Such assessment shall be a pro rata percentage Clerical Innot exceeding one per cent upon the net income comes to be of each Clergyman derived from the following assessed for sources, viz: the annual stipend actually received deficiency. from the Parish, less rent and taxes (if any), as shown by the last annual return to the Synod, the annuities received from the Clergy Trust Fund and from the Rectory Lands Fund and the annual grant received from the Mission Fund.

Notice of Assessment to Clergy.

8. Each Clergyman so assessed shall be thereupon notified by the Clerical Secretary of such assessment and of the amount due by him to the Synod therefor, and such amount shall be due and payable to the Synod on the 1st day of March following, and shall from the date of such notice be deemed to be a subscription due to the Synod under this Canon and if not paid by the said 1st day of March, such Clergyman shall be deemed to be in default under this Canon.

Arrears to

 All arrears both of subscriptions and assessbear interest. ments shall hereafter bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date when they respectively become due until payment.

List of Clergy in default.

10. At each half-yearly meeting of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee, the Clerical Secretary shall submit a list showing the names of all those who are in default under Sections six and eight hereof, and such list shall be reported to and dealt with by the Synod.

Deduction of arrears from Synod Grants, &c.

11. In case of any such default, the Clerical Secretary acting under the direction of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee in each case, shall deduct the amount of the arrears both of subscriptions and assessments, with interest at six per cent. per annum from the date of such default, from any grant of money which such Clergyman so in default would otherwise be entitled to receive from the Synod under any Canon, regulation or practice now or hereafter in force whether from the Clergy Trust Fund or from the Rectory Lands Fund or from the Mission Fund or from any other Fund or moneys in the control of or passing through the hands of the Synod, and such deduction shall be made from the first payment to be made to such Clergyman after the receipt by the Clerical Secretary of directions to act under this Section from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee.

In any case of such default where there is Exclusion no grant or sum of money out of which the arrears can be deducted and paid under the preceding section, the Synod shall have power by resolution to that effect to exclude the Clergyman so in default from the meetings and proceedings of the Synod and from his right to vote in the Synod so long as he so remains in default.

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13. Every Clergyman whose name is reported Clergy in to the Synod under section Ten as being in default inelidefault shall be ineligible to act on any Commit-Committees. tee of the Synod during the Synodical year then commencing; unless before the close of such session of the Synod he shall have paid all such arrears and interest; but this section shall not Proviso. apply to any Clergyman who shall be paying his arrears in instalments under the provisions of section four hereof.

## IV. WIDOWS AND ORPHANS.

14. Upon the death of any Clergyman of this Memorial by Diocese leaving a widow, or children under the Widow or age of 18 years, or both, such widow, or the guardian of such children, desiring an annuity from the Fund, shall present to the Committee through the Clerical Secretary, a memorial setting forth the date of the death of such Clergyman, the name of his widow, or of the guardian as the case may be, and the names and ages of such children, and such memorial shall be taken into consideration by the Committee at its next meeting after the receipt thereof.

15. The Committee shall thereupon place such Annuities. widow and children upon the list of annuitants entitled to the benefit of the said Fund, (provided always that such widow and children are members of the Church of England) and shall, if the Fund suffices, make the following grants, namely ;

- 1. For the widow (if any) an annual sum not exceeding two hundred dollars during widowhood.
- 2. For each child, if there be also a widow, an annual sum not exceeding forty dollars, until such child attains the age of eighteen years or marries, whichever shall first happen. Provided that in no such case shall the grants for all the children of one Clergyman exceed the annual sum of \$160.
- 3. For each child, if there be no widow. an annual sum not exceeding eighty dollars, until such child attains the age of eighteen years or marries, whichever shall first happen. Provided that in no such case shall the grants for all the children of one Clergyman exceed the annual sum of \$200.

.Provided also that any widow or orphan withdrawing from the Church of England, shall, from the date of such withdrawal, forfeit the annuities provided under this Canon.

Annuities under agreement with

16. Pursuant to the agreement between the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario Synod of On- and the Incorporated Synod of this Diocese, dated the 12th August, 1896, all the Widows and Orphans who were entitled to the annuities from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of the former Diocese of Ontario, on the 30th day of April, A.D. 1896, under Canon XVI of the said Diocese as then in force, are hereby declared to have been since the said date, and shall be hereafter, entitled to be paid from time to time (either directly or through the Incorporated Synod of the present Diocese of Ontario, as may be arranged between the officers of the respective Synods) from the Widows' and Orphans' Fund

18. The widows and children of all Clergymen Annuitants of this Diocese, who became annuitants upon since 1st the Widows' and Orphans' Fund of this Diocese, since the 1st day of May, A D. 1896, shall a'so become annuitants under this Canon, in the same manner and to the same extent as the annuitants mentioned in paragraph fifteen hereof.

19. All grants shall be from year to year only, Grants and shall be subject to reduction in the manner Annual. provided in the following section hereof.

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20. In the event of the assessment on the Reduction in clerical income provided for in section seven annuities it hereof being insufficient to make use the differencessary. hereof being insufficient to make up the deficit in the fund, as shown by the statement and estimate mentioned in said section seven, it shall be the duty of the Committee, at its regular November Committee Meeting, to make a proportionate reduction in the grants for the financial year then current. Such reduction shall be of a uniform percentage upon all the annuitants, both widows and children, including also the half share payable by this Diocese of the annuities mentioned in section sixteen hereof. Provided, how- Provisor

ever that if the Fund will permit, the Committee may increase the grants, for the year following only, over and above the maximum mentioned in section fifteen, by the amount of such previous reduction.

21. If at the death of a Clergyman he is in Arrears to be arrears or in default within the meaning of sec-deducted tions six or eight, his widow and orphans shall, from annuinevertheless, be entitled to the same grants as if such Clergyman were not in arrears or in default. but the amount of his arrears and interest thereon shall be retained by the Synod, by instalments, in such manner as the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee shall recommend, out of the payments made to his widow or orphans.

- 22. The several annuities shall be payable in Annuities quarterly payments on the first days of January, quarterly. April, July and October, to the Widow or Guardian.
- 23. Every annuitant on the Widows' and Or- Declaration phans' Fund shall, before he or she may be paid to be made. his or her quarterly annuity, make or cause to be made, one of the following declarations, in the presence of a neighboring Clergyman, who shall duly attest the same.

24. If, after paying the maximum of all the annuities payable under this Canon in any year there shall be found at the end of such year to be a surplus on hand, the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Committee may in its discretion (subject to the approval of the Executive Committee and of the Synod) at its May committee meeting, carry such surplus to the credit of the capital of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, and the same shall thereafter be treated as capital and not as income.

#### V. COMMITTEE.

Committee.

25. The Fund shall be superintended and managed (subject to the control of the Executive Committee and of the Synod) by a Committee consisting of the Bishop and Five Clerical and Five Lay Members of the Synod, in addition to the ex-officio members of the Standing Committees.

#### CANON XVII.—THE CLERGY SUPERANNUA-TION FUND.

4. The amount of such allowance shall be in Amount. the discretion of the Committee, but shall not exceed the sum of \$200 per annum for a Clergyman in receipt of an annuity from the Clergy Trust Fund, or \$400 per annum for a Clergyman not in receipt of such annuity.

5. No Clergyman who receives an allowance No comfrom the Superannuation Fund shall, while re-pensation ceiving such allowance, be entitled to receive for duty in compensation as a Clergyman; except that any Clergyman receiving a superannuation allow-exception. ance under this Canon may, with the consent of the Bishop granted at the request of the Incumbent of the Parish in which the duty is to be performed, undertake occasional duty and accept remuneration.

6. The Committee may in its discretion dis-Allowance continue any superaunuation allowance, or vary may be the same from time to time within the limits prescribed by section four.

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#### CANON XVIII.—THE DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND.

(As Amended by Synod of Ontario, June 22nd, 1893, Confirmed June 20th, 1895).

#### Committee constituted.

1. The Divinity Students' Fund shall be managed by a Committee consisting of four Clergymen and four Lay representatives.

## Of what fund

2. The said Fund shall consist of the existing shall consist. Divinity Students' Fund and of all eollections, subscriptions, donations and legacies given for assisting students in Divinity.

#### Conditions of grants.

3. The Committee shall, in its discretion, when provided with the necessary funds, make a grant not exceeding the annual sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, to any student in Divinity on the following conditions:

#### Necessity.

(a) That the applicant shall declare in writing that he is actually in need of assistance, and shall produce a certificate from a physician in good standing in the Province of Ontario, that he is in good health, and free from organic disease.

#### Security to be given.

(b) That he shall furnish a bond with proper security, approved by the Chancellor, that he will offer himself for duty as a Lay reader during the long vacation each year of his Divinity course, and that he will serve as a Clergyman for five years in the Diocese of Ontario, and that in case of failure to offer himself for ordination or to procure the necessary testimonials within three years from the date of the bond, unless delayed from illness or other cause satisfactory to the Bishop, he will refund with interest the full amount which he has received from the Fund, and that in case of his removal from the Diocese before the expiration of five years of

service there amount prop unfulfilled.

## CANON XIX.-THE RECTORY LANDS FUND.

I. Whenever any Rector or Parish desires the Memorial if sale of all or any of the Rectory lands appertaining to the Rectory or Parish, he or they shall memorialize the Executive Committee for the sale of the said lands, setting forth the reasons for such sale. And if the Executive Committee deems it advisable that the prayer of the memorial should be complied with, the Clerical Secretary shall forthwith notify the Rector or Parish to proceed to appoint a valuator or valuators, as hereinafter mentioned.

Appointment

2. A valuator or valuators on behalf of the of valuators. Synod, each to be known as the Synod valuator, shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, who shall receive their travelling expenses and \$5 for each day he or they are occupied in such valuation; and the Synod valuator, with a second and local valuator to be appointed and named in writing by the Rector, and with a third and local valuator to be appointed and named in like manner by the Vestry of the Mother or Parish Church at the Easter Vestry meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose, shall, on receiving the notice of their appointment, as soon as possible examine and value the lands sought to be sold; and the said valuators shall report their joint or several valuations in writing to the Executive Committee.

Report to be made.

Provision in case of failure to appoint.

3. Should the Rector or Vestry refuse or neglect to appoint their respective valuators within one month from receiving notice from the Executive Committee of the intention to sell the land, which notice shall be sent by the Clerical Secretary by post to the Rector and Churchwardens, then the valuator appointed by the Executive Committee, together with the valuator appointed by the Rector or Vestry, as the case may be, shall select a third person as valuator. In the event of both the Rector and Vestry failing to appoint within the time before limited, then the valuator appointed by the Executive Committee shall act alone and report.

Valuation to be made and reported.

4. The Clerical Secretary, on receiving such notification as aforesaid, shall forthwith communicate the same to the Synod valuator, who shall thereupon write to the local valuator or valuators appointing a time when he will, in conjunction with him or them, proceed to and value the lands proposed to be sold; and in case one only of the local valuators shall attend at the place and time appointed, the Synod valuator shall

with such local valuator proceed to value the lands and report thereon; or in case both such local valuators fail to attend at the time and place appointed then the Synod valuator may, if he thinks it advisable, proceed to value alone and report. All the reports of the said valuator Proceedings or valuators shall be made, as soon as possible on report. after the value is ascertained, to the Executive Committee, who may approve or disapprove thereof, refer the same back, or adopt the valuation of either one or more of the said valuators.

5. The lands so valued shall, in the first place, Offerforsale. be offered to the tenant or tenants, if any, at the valuation approved of by the Executive Committee, but if there be no tenant, or if the tenant within fourteen days after being notified in writing by the Clerical Secretary of the valuation, refuses or neglects to purchase at such valuation, then the land may be sold by private contract to any intending purchaser at such price as the Executive Committee deems expedient, or after being advertised in the local papers once a week for four weeks next preceding the sale, and placards of the advertisement having been posted and circulated in the neighbourhood, the land shall be sold by public auction to the highest bidder at or above the valuation, there being Reserve a reserve bid to the amount of such valuation, price. And in case there shall be no bidder at or above the reserve bid when offered at such auction, the land shall be withdrawn, and it shall be left to the Executive Committee to dispose thereafter of the said land at such price as it deems most conducive to the interest of the parish.

6. The purchaser shall pay down not less than Terms of one-seventh of the purchase money at the time payment. of the sale, and the remainder shall be secured by a mortgage on the premises payable in six

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yearly instalments, or as may be agreed on, with interest at seven per cent per annum.

Payment of expenses.

7. All expenses attending the valuation and sale of the land shall be borne in the first place by the person or persons applying for the sale, who shall with the memorial deposit the sum of twenty dollars with the Clerical Secretary. The expenses shall be refunded from the proceeds of the sale, and the expenses of the sale, surveys and management shall be a first charge on the proceeds.

Execution of deeds.

8. The Chancellor of the Diocese shall prepare the necessary deeds and mortgages. The expenses of conveyances, registration and Sheriff's certificates shall be paid to him by the purchaser; or, with the consent of the Rector interested, the expenses of the deed shall be defrayed from the proceeds of the land sold at the tariff to be settled by the Executive Committee. All deeds and mortgages shall be executed on behalf of the Synod by the Bishop under the seal of the Synod.

Application of proceeds.

9. The proceeds of the sale shall be remitted to the Clerical Secretary, who shall give receipts for the same, and pay all necessary charges and disbursements. The Clerical Secretary shall credit the amount so received to the capital of the Rectory interested, and the income of the investment, subject to the provisions of the statute, shall be paid at such time and in such manner as the Executive Committee appoints.

Investment.

10. The proceeds of such sales, after deducting the necessary expenses, shall be invested by the Investment committee as provided for by the Act "To provide for the sale of the Rectory Lands in this Province."

# CANON XXI.—THE GENERAL PURPOSE FUND.

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I. There shall be a Fund to be known as the Fund to be General Purpose Fund for the granting of aid established. towards the erection and maintenance of Churches, Parsonages and Parochial Schools in

this Diocese, for the purchasing of burial grounds, for defraying expenses connected with the management of the Synod and its trusts, and for aiding such general purposes and objects of the Church in this Diocese as are not under the special control of any committee of the Synod.

Of what to consist.

2. Such Fund shall be formed from such donations and grants as are from time to time hereafter made for such General Purposes.

Management. 3. Such Fund shall be administered and managed by the Executive Committee of Synod, which shall have power to administer, sell, lease, and dispose of all lands pertaining to such Fund; to administer and dispose of any sum or sums of money, or any security or securities for money hereafter given, paid, assigned, or devised to the said Fund, and further, from the same resources to grant such aid and to make such payments to any of the objects above recited as the Committee in its discretion sees fit; and the Committee shall report at the annual meeting of Synod.

Rules may be made.

4. The said Executive Committee may make such rules and regulations as are requisite for the carrying out of the provisions of this Canon.

#### CANON XXII.—THE CHURCH BOOK DEPOSI-TORY.

Committee constituted; its duties.

1. A committee shall be appointed annually consisting of three Clergymen and three Lay representatives for the management of the Church Book Depository; the committee shall appoint a manager who shall make a full report to the committee at its regular meetings and present his account books for inspection. The committee shall make an annual report of the operations of the past year.

# CANON XXIV.—THE ELECTION OF A BISHOP AND THE SUBDIVISION OF THE DIOCESE.

1. In the event of a vacancy in the See, the proceedings Secretaries of the Synod shall within one week in case of a from the occurrence of such vacancy, or its an-the See. nouncement to this Diocese, memorialize the Metropolitan, or in the event of his absence, or refusal or neglect for 20 days to act, or of that office being vacant, then the senior Bishop of this Ecclesiastical Province who is willing to act, praying him to summon a meeting of the Clergy and Lay representatives of the Synod, at the Cathedral City of this Diocese, to elect a successor, such meeting to be held within thirty days of the receipt of the memorial, and to be presided over by the Bishop calling the meeting, or in case of his death, illness, or inability from other cause to preside, then by some other Canadian Bishop; and the said Metropolitan or other Bishop shall give at least fifteen days' notice of the time and place of such meeting.

2. In the event of a subdivision of this And of a sub-Diocese, the Bishop shall summon the Clergy division of and Lay representatives, to be included within the Diocese. the new Diocese, to meet at such time and place as he appoints for the purpose of electing a Bishop, at which meeting the Bishop, or the Bishop appointed by him under the Canon respecting the presiding Bishop, shall preside.

Ballot.

Number of votes required to elect.

3. In the election to a vacant See, or to a new See, the Clergy and Lay representatives entitled to vote at meetings of Synod, shall vote separately by ballot; the Clergy as individuals, and the Lay representatives by Parishes. A majority of votes in each order shall determine the choice. provided that two-thirds of the Clergy entitled to vote be present and two thirds of all the Parishes entitled to vote be represented; otherwise twothirds of the votes of each order present shall be necessary to determine the choice.

Vacation of benefice.

4. Any Clergyman elected a Bishop, and holding at the time of such election any preferment or benefice, shall resign such preferment or benefice, prior to his consecration. And in case the Bishop of this Diocese is elected bishop of another Diocese, and accepts, or in case of his resignation and the acceptance thereof by the Metropolitan, this See shall be ipso facto vacant.

## CANON XXVI.—ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

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I. In the election of Delegates to the Provin-Scrutineers cial Synod two Clergymen and one Lay representative shall act as scrutineers of the votes of the Clergy, and two Lay representatives and one Clergyman as scrutineers of the votes of the Laity; the scrutineers for each order shall be previously appointed on motion by the members of each order respectively.

2. Two ballot boxes shall be provided to re-Mode of ceive the votes of the Clergy and Laity respectively. Upon each member of the Synod depositing his vote, a mark shall be placed opposite his name on the roll by one of the scrutineers of the order to which he belongs; and upon the requisition of any three members of the Synod, the number of votes deposited shall be compared with the number of those who have voted. The Disposal of scrutineers shall hand over the votes to the Section of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to preserve them until the election of Delegates shall be completed, and to destroy them at the end of the Session.

3. There shall be twenty-four Delegates Delegates. elected at each annual meeting of the Synod, viz.: twelve Clergymen elected by the Clergy, and twelve Laymen by the Lay representatives, and the first twelve names in each order having the highest number of recorded votes shall be declared duly elected.

4. When the election of Delegates to the Substitutes. Provincial Synod takes place, the six Clergymen and the six Laymen whose names stand next highest in number in the counting of the ballots after those of the Delegates elected, shall be substitutes, to attend such Provincial Synod, whenever, from sickness or other cause, the Delegates are unable to be present.

Equality of votes.

5. In the event of the scrutineers reporting that two or more persons have an equality of votes either as Delegates or substitutes, the Bishop shall detern ine his or their priority.

Attendance of substitutes.

6. Whenever any Delegate is unable to attend as aforesaid, he shall be excused from such attendance upon notifying the Clerical Secretary of the Synod of the fact, at least a fortnight previous to the meeting of the Provincial Synod, and the Clerical Secretary shall then notify one of the substitutes in the order in which he stands on the list, that he is required to attend the said meeting instead of the Delegate excused.

#### CANON XXVIII.—THE PRESIDING BISHOP.

Appointment of Bishop to preside,

1. The Bishop of this Diocese may if occasion requires, appoint, with full or limited powers, another Bishop to preside at any meeting of the Synod during its session.

His powers.

2. Such Bishop so appointed shall be by virtue of his appointment a member of the Synod during its Session, subject to the powers granted him by the Bishop; and all business transacted and Canons passed or confirmed at such Session shall have the same effect and validity as if the Bishop of this Diocese had presided.

Temporary Chairman. 3. The Bishop of this Diocese, during the Session of the Synod, may, when he desires to leave the chair temporarily, appoint one of the members of the Synod to preside during his absence.

Interpreta-

4. Wherever the words "the Bishop" occur in the "Order of Proceedings," or in "The Rules of Order," they shall be taken and read as meaning and including any Coadjutor or Assistant Bishop of this Didcese, or the Bishop appointed under this Canon.

### CANON XXIX.—DISCIPLINE.

Court of the Diocese constituted. I. There shall be a Court of this Diocese, called "The Court of the Diocese of Ottawa," for the prosecution, hearing and trial of all ecclesiastical causes within this Diocese, and of all offences of the Laity, as well as the Clergy, against the laws ecclesiastical, against the provisions of the statutes constituting and affecting the Synod, and the Canons, rules and regulations of the Synod.

Every Priest or Deacon holding the license Cognizance of the Bishop of this Diocese or any office or may be taken charge under his jurisdiction who is charged with specified. any of the offences hereinafter mentioned or concerning whom there exists scandal or evil report as having been guilty of any such offences, shall be liable to trial and punishment as hereinafter provided; the offences referred to are as follows: Any crime or immorality; drunkenness, profane swearing or any other scandalous, licentious or disorderly conduct; any wrong doing or wilful neglect in the discharge of the duties of any office or position of trust to which he has been appointed by the Bishop or the Synod; discontinuing the exercise of his Ministerial office without lawful cause or leave of the Bishop; ceasing, without permission of the Bishop, to perform Service in or at the Church or Churches within the Parish, Mission, or Charge to which he has been appointed; exercising any lay profession or occupation unconnected with his sacred calling, without the sanction of the Bishop; the disuse, after notice from the Bishop, of Public Worship or of the Holy Eucharist according to the offices of the Church; the infringement, after notice from the Bishop, of the rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer; schism, or separating himself from the Communion of the Church; heresy, or teaching or maintaining heretical doctrines, or teaching or maintaining doctrines contrary to those of the Church, such teaching or maintaining being by way of writing or printing, preaching or public teaching, or circulating books containing such doctrines; holding Service in other Clergyman's Church or Parish, Mission or Charge, without such Clergyman's consent; permitting unauthorized persons to officiate in the Church; non-residence without leave of the Bishop; officiating at the services of religious bodies not in communion with the Church of England: any act which involves a breach of his Ordina-

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tion Vows; any violation of the provisions of the Statutes constituting the Synod, or of the Constitution of the Synod, or of any of the Canons, Rules, Regulations or Resolutions of the Synod; incapacity or neglect in the discharge of his parochial duties whereby his usefulness in his Parish or Mission appears to be gone.

Complainant and respondent defined.

In the following sections of this Canon the person complaining is called "the complainant." and the person against whom a complaint is made is called "the respondent."

Commissionners may be appointed to make inquiry.

3. The Bishop, on the application of any complainant, or, if he thinks fit, of his mere motion, may issue a Commission under his hand and seal to five Priests, of whom one shall be an Archdeacon or Rural Dean within this Diocese, or in case of the absence or sickness of the Archdeacon, should there be only one Archdeacon of this Diocese, then to any five Priests whom the Bishop appoints, for the purpose of making inquiry as to the grounds of such charge or scandal or evil report; provided always that notice of the intention to issue such Commission under the hand of the Bishop, containing an intimation of the nature of the offence together with the names, addition and residence of the complainant (if any) shall be sent by the Bishop to the respondent fourteen days at least before such Commission shall issue; provided also, that no Commission shall issue on the application of any complainant, until he has first given to the Bishop and his successors in office, a bond, to be approved of by the Bishop, in the penal sum of \$200, to pay all costs and expenses that the respondent may have incurred, in case he is acquitted of the complaint, or the complaint is dismissed for want of due prosecution.

Whenever a complaint has been made under this Canon against any Priest or Deacon, and the consent of such Priest or Deacon and of the complainant, has been first obtained in writing; or whenever a confession in writing by such Priest or Deacon has anticipated any proceeding for the issuing of a Commission under this Canon, the Bishop of the Diocese may, without any further proceedings, pronounce such sentence as the said Bishop thinks fit, not exceeding the sentence which might be pronounced in due course of law; and all such sentences shall be as good and effectual in law as if pronounced after a hearing according to the provisions of this Canon, and may be enforced by the like means.

Articles to be drawn up if there is cause.

10. If the Commissioners report that there is sufficient prima facie ground for instituting proceedings, and if the Bishop of the Diocese or the complainant thereupon thinks fit to proceed against the respondent, articles shall be drawn up by the direction of the Bishop or at the instance of the complainant, which, when approved and signed by a barrister-at-law, shall, together with a copy of the depositions taken by the Commissioners, be filed with the Registrar of this Diocese; and the complainant or respondent or any person acting for either of them, shall be entitled to inspect, without fee, such copies, and to require and have, on demand from the Registrar (who is hereby required to deliver the same) copies of such depositions, on payment of a reasonable sum for the same, not exceeding three cents for each folio of ninety words,

At any time after the expiration of the said Summons to fourteen days, the Bishop, by writing under his accused. hand, may require the respondent to appear before him, either in person or by his agent duly appointed, at any convenient place within this Diocese, and to make answer to the said articles within such time, as to the Bishop, seems reasonable; and if the respondent appears, and by his if culpability answer admits the truth of the articles, the Bis, is admitted. hop or his Commissary specially appointed for that purpose, shall forthwith proceed to pronounce sentence thereupon, according to the ecclesiastical law and the statute of the Province of Canada enabling the members of the United Church of England and Ireland to meet in Synod.
- 13. Every notice or requisition to be given or service of made in pursuance of this Canon shall be served process. on the person to whom the same respectively relates, in the same manner as is hereby directed with respect to the service of a copy of the articles on the respondent.
- 14. If the respondent refuses or neglects to ap- Hearing pear and make answer to the said articles, or cause if there appears and makes any answer other than an unqualified admission of the truth thereof, the Bishop shall proceed to hear the cause, with the assistance of Assessors nominated by him, one of whom shall be his Chancellor, or a barrister of not less than seven years standing, and another the Dean of his Cathedral Church, or one of his Archdeacons; and upon the hearing

of such cause the Bishop shall determine the same, and pronounce sentence thereupon, according to the ecclesiastical law and the statute of the Province of Canada enabling the members of the United Church of England and Ireland to meet in Synod.

Sentences valid, and to what they may extend.

15. All sentences pronounced by the Bishop or his Commissary in pursuance of this Canon, shall be good and effectual, and binding on all persons concerned therein; and such sentences may extend to admonition, suspension, or to deposition or deprivation, as provided by the said statute of the Province of Canada in the preceding section mentioned. Should the sentence be admonition, it may be public or private, as the Bishop determines. When the penalty of suspension is inflicted, such sentence shall specify the terms thereof and the period of duration. Removal of a Clerk in Holy Orders from office in the Church shall be considered to include deposition and deprivation. Upon such sentence being pronounced, the connection between the respondent and his Parish or Congregation shall be ipso facto severed, and all other offices, rents, issues, profits and emoluments which he may have held by virtue of the office or ministry from which he has been removed shall wholly cease and determine. A copy of the sentence shall be sent to the respondent, and another to the Vestry or Vestries of the Parish or Parishes, Congregation or Congregations, with which he may be canonically connected, and such other publicity may be given to it as the Bishop or his Commissary may deem expedient.

In every case in which from the nature of When person the offence charged, it appears to the Bishop accused may that great scandal is likely to arise from the respondent continuing to perform the Services of the Church while such charge is under investigation, or that his ministration will be useless while such charge is pending, the Bishop may cause a notice to be served on him, or at any time pending any proceedings under this Canon, inhibiting him from performing any Services of the Church within this Diocese, from and after the expiration of fourteen days from the service of such notice, and until sentence has been given in the said cause; provided, that the respondent, Provision for being the Incumbent of a benefice, may within services of fourteen days after the service of said notice, the church. nominate to the Bishop any fit person or persons to perform all such Services of the Church during the period for which he is so inhibited; and if the Bishop deems the person or persons so nominated fit for the performance of such Services, he shall grant his license to him or them accordingly; or in case a fit person is not nominated, the Bishop shall make such provision for the Service of the Church, and for such remuneration to the person performing the same, as to him seems necessary; and he shall provide for the payment of such remuneration, if necessary, by sequestration of the living; provided also, Revocation. that the Bishop may at any time revoke such inhibition and license respectively.

18. Any person who thinks himself aggrieved Appeal. by any judgment pronounced by the Bishop, may appeal from such judgment, and such appeal shall be to the Court of Appeal of the Metropolitan.

Witnesses may be summoned.

19. At any such enquiry, any three or more of the Commissioners, or in any such proceeding, the Bishop, or any Assessor of the Bishop, may require the attendance of such witnesses, and the production of such deeds, evidences, or writings, as are necessary.

Evidence upon declaration.

20. Every witness examined in pursuance of this Canon, shall give his or her evidence upon solemn declaration, as provided for by " An Act respecting Extra-judicial oaths."

Time for proceedings limited.

21. Every suit or proceeding against any Priest or Deacon for any offence specified in this Canon, or against the provisions of the statute constituting the Synod, or against the Canons, Rules or Regulations of the Synod, shall be commenced within two years from the time that the commission of the offence, in respect of which the suit or proceeding is instituted, shall have become publicly known, and not afterwards; provided always, that whenever any such suit or proceeding is brought in respect of an offence, court of law, for which a conviction has been obtained in any court of law, such suit or proceeding may be brought against the person convicted at any time within six calendar months after such conviction, although more than two years may have elapsed since the time that the commission of the offence, in respect of which such suit or proceeding is so brought, shall have become publicly known.

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2. Vestry of newly formed Congregation.

4. If a Congregation newly formed desires to organize a Vestry without delay, a meeting of the said Congregation shall be held for such purpose after notice thereof has been given during Divine Service on the previous Sunday; and the members of such Vestry shall consist of those who make the declaration required in the next preceding section as to age and Church membership, and also declare their intention to worship habitually in such Congregation. The Vestry so constituted shall be a lawful Vestry for all the purposes mentioned in this Canon for not longer than one year from the date of its formation.

Duration.

5. At all Vestry meetings the Priest or Deacon in charge shall preside, and in his absence the Curate-Assistant, or in the absence of both, such member of the Vestry as the majority, duly qualified to vote and present at such Vestry meeting, name; and the Vestry Clerk, or in case there be no Vestry Clerk, then such person as the Chairman names, shall be Secretary of such Vestry meeting; and the proceedings of such Vestry meeting shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose, and preserved in the custody of the Churchwardens.

The Clergyman in charge may call a special Special Vestry meeting whenever he thinks proper to do Vestry meetso, giving notice thereof during Divine Service called. on the two Sundays next preceding on which Service is held in the Church; and also specifying the business for which such Vestry meeting is called. And he shall call such meeting upon application made to him in writing by at least six members of such Vestry aforesaid; and in case, upon such written application being made as aforesaid, such Clergyman refuses or neglects to call such meeting or to give such notice, then one week after such demand is made, the said six members may call the same by notice affixed to the main entrance Church doors at least one week previous to such intended meeting.

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8. The members of Vestry, at such Vestry Business meetings as aforesaid, may pass resolutions or which may make by-laws for the regulation of their proceed-ed. ings and for the management of the temporalities of the Church, Parish or Mission to which they belong, and may alter and repeal the same; provided that at special Vestry meetings no business shall be transacted other than that specified in the notice calling the same.

9. The fees for certificates from the Parish Fees for cerregister shall be fifty cents for each such certifi-tain Services. cate; and the charges payable for burial plots and on breaking the ground in cemeteries and churchyards for the purpose of burying the dead, and all matters of like nature therewith connected, shall be regulated by the Vestry of the Church to which the cemetery or churchyard belongs.

10. At the annual Easter Vestry meeting, or Nomination any adjournment thereof, after the accounts of and election the past year have been audited and reported of churchupon, one Churchwarden shall be nominated by the Clergyman in charge of the Rectory, Parish or Mission to which the said Church belongs,

and one other shall be elected by a majority of those present and entitled to vote at such Vestry meeting as aforesaid. If the Clergyman being present at such Vestry meeting declines or neglects to nominate a Churchwarden, or if the said Clergyman being absent from such meeting neglects by writing under his hand to appoint a Churchwarden, then both the Churchwardens for the current year shall be elected by the members of the Vestry present; and if the members of such Vestry neglect at such Vestry meeting to elect a Churchwarden, both such Churchwardens for the current year shall be nominated by the Clergyman.

Qualification of church wardens.

11. No person shall be eligible for the office of Churchwarden except a member of such Vestry and a duly qualified voter; and the Churchwardens shall hold their office for one year from the time of their appointment, or until the nomination or election of their successors.

Vacancies, how filled.

12. If any Churchwarden declines to accept office, or to act when called on by the Clergyman or Vestry, or is deprived of his office, or tenders his resignation in writing to the Clergyman, or changes his residence to ten or more miles from the Church of which he was chosen Churchwarden, or becomes incapable to act or is convicted of any indictable offence, or ceases to be a member of the Church of England, or of the Church or Congregation for which he has been elected, or ceased to attend public worship in such Church or Congregation for the space of six months, or dies, his office shall become vacant, and a Vestry meeting shall be called within one month in the manner provided for in this Canon for the nomination by the Clergyman or for the election by the said Vestry, as the case may be, of a new Churchwarden in place of the one whose office was vacated from any of the causes aforesaid; provided always,

No unauthorized use of church.

16. No Churchwarden or Churchwardens shall permit the Church or Churches in any Parish or Mission to be used for Divine Service or any other public purpose, or the churchyard or burial ground to be used for the purposes of interment, without the consent of the Bishop or of the Clergyman appointed by him.

No sale of pews.

17. No sales of pews by the Churchwardens shall take place in any Church in this Diocese.

Appointment of subordinates.

18. The organist shall be appointed by the Churchwardens with the concurrence of the Clergyman; the vestry clerk, the sexton, and other subordinate servants of the Church, shall be nominated and appointed by the Churchwardens for the time being; and their salary and wages as determined on by the Churchwardens, shall be brought into the general account to be rendered as aforesaid by such Churchwardens.

Certain provisions repealed, 19. The provisions of the Church Temporalities Act, and of all other Acts passed subsequently thereto, are hereby repealed, so far as the same are inconsistent with the provisions of this Canon.

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### CANON XXXI.—CUSTODY OF DEEDS AND PARISH REGISTERS.

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1. All Rectors, Incumbents, Churchwardens, Deeds to be Trustees, or other persons having legal custody delivered to of any grants, conveyances, or probates or cert the Retified copies of wills or parts thereof in any way relating to land or property granted, conveyed, or devised for the benefit or use of the Church of England in this Diocese, shall transmit the same to the Registrar, to be by him taken in charge as the proper custodian thereof, and placed in the Synod vault, for proper and safe keeping.

2. All Rectors, Incumbents and Churchward- And parish ens shall from time to time transmit to the registers when filled. Registrar all Parish Registers which have been completed or filled up, and the Registrar on receiving the same shall deposit the same in the Synod vault, and shall duly acknowledge the receipt of such Registers.

### CANON XXXII.—PARSONAGES.

- 1. It shall be the duty of every Parish or Parsonage to Mision, where no Parsonage at present exists, to be erected. erect, as soon as possible, a suitable Parsonage, with outhouses, for the accommadion of the Clergyman; and until such buildings are erected it shall be the duty of the Parish or Mission to rent a suitable residence; and the Clergyman shall enjoy the same free of charge, and independent of any sum assigned for his salary.

change of incumbency, they are put in the possession of the Clergyman in a state of good repair, the Clergyman shall keep and maintain the same in as good repair and condition, ordinary wear and tear of the same excepted; but if the Incumbent by wilful negligence, by any act of commission or omission, suffers the said buildings to go out of repair, he shall be held responsible for the same, and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Churchwardens to point out such dilapidations to the Incumbent and request him to provide a remedy for the same; and should he decline or neglect to repair the same, the Churchwardens may, after a reasonable space, employ a suitable mechanic or mechanics to execute the necessary repairs, and they may deduct the expense thereof, certified by the bills of the contractors or workmen, from the Clergyman's annual salary paid by the Parish. But if the Clergyman feels himself aggrieved by such contemplated action of the Churchwardens, he may appeal to the Archdeacon having jurisdiction, who shall decide the matter, or (if he sees fit) may appoint a committee to examine into the merits of the case, and report thereon to him; and in either case his decision shall be binding, pending which decision the Churchwardens shall suspend the contemplated action.

## CANON XXXIII.—PARISHES AND THEIR BOUNDARIES.

Definition of boundaries by agreement.

I. The Incumbent and Churchwardens of any cure may, when necessary, hold a conference or conferences with the Incumbent and Churchwardens of an adjacent Parish or cure, and by mutual agreement arrange and define the boundary common to both, and shall make a report to the Archdeacon having jurisdiction, for his consideration, who shall submit the same to the Bishop, with his remarks thereon; and if the Bishop approves of the same, the boundaries so arranged and approved shall be the boundaries of the Parishes or cures aforesaid.

Commission if there is no agreement.

2. In cases where the boundary cannot be arranged by such mutual agreement, the Archdeacon shall issue a Commission to two Clergymon and one Lay representative, none of whom are connected with such Parishes or cures, authorizing them to investigate the matter and report their decision to the Archdeacon for his consideration, who shall submit the same to the Bishop, with his remarks thereon; and if the Bishop approves of the same, the boundary so arranged and approved, shall be the boundary common to the Parishes or cures aforesaid.

Duration.

### CANON XXXIV.—ENDOWMENT OF PARISHES.

Formation of endowment fund.

I. The Incumbent of every Parish where no adequate endowment already exists, may commence "A Parochial Endowment Fund," by taking up in each year a collection for the purpose in each Church and Station within the same, and soliciting, moreover, subscriptions, donations, and bequests of land or money for the promotion of the Fund, until a sufficient Endowment Fund shall have been secured.

Property to be held in trust.

2. All gifts or bequests of real estate, and all lands otherwise acquired by any Parish for the purposes contemplated by this Canon, shall be held by the Bishop or the Synod, in trust for the benefit of the Incumbent of the Parish for the time being; and the said real estate shall be managed by the Incumbent of the Parish, as in the case of the present Rectors and their glebes.

All such subscriptions, donations, collections, and bequests of personal property shall be vested in the Bishop or the Synod, in trust as aforesaid and, with the interest, shall be allowed to accumulate until the sum of \$1,000 be thus secured, after which all new collections, subscriptions, donations and bequests of personalty shall be invested, and the interest shall be annually appropriated towards the Incumbent's support, and to that purpose only, and the management of such Fund shall be in the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

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### CANON XXXV.—ERECTION OF CHURCH BUILDINGS.

1. No Church, Parsonage, Parochial School or Plans of other Church building shall be erected, altered or buildings purchased, unless the plans thereof are first subject to submitted by the Incumbent and Churchwordens approval. submitted by the Incumbent and Churchwardens, or in case of a vacancy in the cure by the Churchwardens, to the Archdeacon having jurisdiction and are approved by him.

### CANON XXXVI.—CHRISTMAS OFFERTORY.

Christmas offertory.

I. The offertory of the respective Congregations throughout this Diocese on Christmas day of every year, shall be devoted to the sole use of the Incumbent of the Church in which the offertory is made.

### CANON XXXVII.—UNAUTHORIZED COLLEC-TIONS.

No unauthorized collection by a person residing in the Diocese.

I. No Clergyman or Layman shall collect money for any Church purpose-beyond the bounds of his own Parish or Mission, or proceed to any other Diocese for the same purpose without the sanction and approval of the Bishop, and such collector shall obtain the sanction of each Incumbent before he makes a collection in his Parish or cure, and he shall report to the Incumbent the result of such collection.

On coming from another Diocese.

2. No person from any other Diocese shall make collections within this Diocese without first obtaining the sanction of the Bishop.

# CANON XXXVIII.—INTERPRETATION—AND REPEAL OF EXISTING CANONS.

"Shall" and "may."

I. In all Canons passed by the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa the expression "shall" shall be construed as imperative, and the expression "may" as permissive.

NOTE -- Sections 2 and 3 of this Canon, while forming part of the Canon Law of this Diocese by virtue of the Incorporating Act, have in reality no effect, the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa not having theretofore passed any Canons.

CANON XXXIX.—EXERCISE OF POWERS UN-DER THE ACT INTITULED, "AN ACT RESPECTING THE PROPERTY OF RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS."

(Passed by Synod of Ontario, June 4th, 1891).

Consent according to Canons.

2. The consent or assent of the Vestry given in accordance with the rules and Canons shall be deemed to be the consent or assent of the congregation within the meaning of the said Act.

Consent of Executive Committee.

3. The execution of the deed by the Bishop and by the Secretary or Secretaries of the Synod, or a memorandum of consent endorsed thereon, and signed by them, shall, in favor of the grantee and his assigns, be conclusive evidence of the consent or assent of the Bishop and Executive Committee.

Notice to Congregation; requirements of.

4. Where it is intended to apply for the consent of the Vestry or Congregation to sell or mortgage land, and whether at the annual or a special Vestry meetin, notice of such intended application, specifying the land and the amount of the proposed purchase money or loan, shall be given by the Clergyman during Divine Service on the two Sundays next preceding on which Service is held in the church, and a notice in writing specifying the like matters shall be affixed to the main entrance church doors at least one week previous to the meeting at which it is intended to apply for such consent.

Proof of Notices. 5. Upon application for the consent of the Bishop and the Executive Committee, it shall be made to appear that the notices required by Section 4 of this Canon were duly given.

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CANON XL.—ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO THE GENERAL SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA HEREIN-AFTER CALLED THE GENERAL SYNOD.

(Passed by the Synod of Ontario. June 20th 1895.)

1. An Election of Delegates to the General Election Synod shall be held at the annual session of the prior to Ses-Synod preceding each session of the General synod. Synod at the time of the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod.

2. In the election of Delegates to the General Scrutineers. Synod, two Clergyman and one Lay representative shall act as scrutineers of the votes of the Clergy, and two Lay representatives and one Clergyman as scrutineers of the votes of the Laity; the scrutineers for each order shall be previously appointed on motion by the members of each order respectively.

3. The election shall be by ballot on nomina- Mode of tion, in such manner as may be determined from voting. time to time by resolution of Synod. Two ballot boxes shall be provided to receive the votes of the Clergy and Laity respectively. Upon each member of the Synod depositing his vote, a mark shall be placed opposite his name on the roll by one of the scrutineers of the order to which he

Scrutineer's

belongs, and upon the requisition of any three members of the Synod the number of votes deposited shall be compared with the number of those who have voted. The scrutineers shall prepare and hand into the secretaries lists of the persons voted for in the order of the number of votes received by each, beginning with the person having the highest number of votes, and bracketing those who receive an equal number of votes, and they shall hand over the ballots to the secretaries of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to preserve them until the election of Delegates shall be completed, and to destroy them at the end of the session.

Delegates and substitutes, 4. The number of Delegates of each order to be elected shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the General Synod. Those having the highest number of votes shall be the Delegates, and an equal number of those having the next highest number of votes shall be Substitutes to attend the General Synod when from sickness or other cause the Delegates are unable to be present. In the event of the scrutineers reporting that two or more persons have an equal number of votes, either as Delegates or Substitutes, the Bishop shall determine his or their priority. Delegates and Substitutes shall continue in office until the election of their successors.

Equality of votes.

Attendance of substitutes

5. Whenever any Delegate is unable to attend the General Synod, it shall be his duty to give the Clerical Secretary of the Diocesan Synod immediate notice of his inability, and the Clerical Secretary shall notify one of the Substitutes in the order in which he stands on the list, and he is required to attend the said meeting instead of such Delegate.

D. is authorized by vote of the Synod to fill his place as Delegate," shall be sent to the Secretaries of the Lower. House of the General Synod.

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
