The other two cases are on charges o Arson, -a crime of enormous magnitud in any country, and of most peculiarly dangerous tendency in this country, where the buildings are almost universally constructed of wood. The Law on the subject of Arson has lately been revised in England. By an act which received the Royal assent on 17th July, 1837, certain former acts were in part repealed, and it was enacted-" that whosoever shall unlawfully and maliciously set fire to any d weiling-house, any person being therein, thall be guilty of felony, and being convicted thereof, shall suffer death." By sec. 3, a severe, but not capital, punishment is assigned for the setting fire to any House, Stable, Coach-house, Outhouse, Warehouse, Barn, and certain other buildings therein described. The fourth section relates to the firing, or in any way destroying, Ships or Vessels, for which crime, if the life of any one be thereby endangered, the life of the Offender is forfeited. The following section imposes capital punishment for hanging out false lights to vessels; and the remaining sections impose less severe punishment of orimes of less magnitude,such as the setting fire to agricultural produce, and to straw, wood, &c. And in all cases this act provides that accessories before the fact shall be liable to the
