

Paris, Nov. 20.—Lieut. Torioff, the fire-eating Bulgarian, who got a special leave of absence from the Minister of War at Sofis, and came to Paris, as he himself announced, to have the ploud of Pierre Lott, the famous-Frederieriter, who accused the Bulgarians of inhuman treatment of the Turks in the course of the war, is in a hiospital here with a severe wound in his breast, as a result of a duel with George Breitimeyer, one of the most expert awordsmen of Paris, who shook up the challenge after Flurra Lott had declined to consider the officer as being entitled to meet him on the field of honor.

When it was announced that Lieut. Torioff was on his way to Paris and the reason for his trip resched the ears of Pierre Lott, the distinguished advocate of the Turks refused to allow it to disturb his customary calm and made no statement regarding the challenge until he learned that a score or more of French journaliste desired to meet the swash-buckling Bulgar in combat. It was the opinion of experts in the code d'honnour that an officer had no right to seek redress for comments on actions in which the army to which he belonged had taken part, and which did not reflect on himself. M. Loti explained his refusal to look on the challenge in any other light than that of an insult, but saying:

"The challenge is couched in such ignorant terms that my fingers retuse to touch it. There is one passage which seems to have been written by a mad man." seems to have been written by a mad man."

In spite of Pierre Loti's appeal to those who announced their willingness to fight the Bulgarian to do nothing of the sort and to teach him a lesson by silence, George Breittmeyer, an author and fending master, decided that he could teach a mora forceful lesson by other means and took up the gauntiet. He made it clear that he was not acting for Pierre Loti and had not been drawn into the quarrel by a third party.

Territory In Sulf of St. Law rence and Fell Foul of Quebec Government by Ejecting Fisher men—He Had a Wonderful Pal ace In the Wilderness. When Henri Menier, the French \$1.75-\$2.25 Corsets

ate king, died in Paris in Sepchocolate king, died in Paris in September, there passed away a man who was more of an absolute sovereign over a large terrifory than eighteen or (wenty of the rulers of Europe. Yet he was never crowned as king nor elected as chief executive. He simply owned outright in the Gulf of St. Lawrence the beautiful island of Anticosti, 140 miles long and 27 miles wide.

wide. The area of Anticosti is 3,780 The area of Anticosti is 3, so square miles. Menler bought it outright in 1896 from the Island of Anticosti Co., Ltd., of London, a bankrupt concern. The company had padd a round million for it and had planned all sorts of money making things that never came to pass. Menler passed over his \$160,000 and for it second the control of the

ed over his \$160,000 and for it se-cured the title to the entire island, carrying with it the right to do there whatever he pleased and how and when he pleased.

Menier planned improvements on a stupendous scale. First it was to be a mammoth game preserve. The is-land wilderness swarmed with red deer carbon brown bear, and red deer, caribou, brown bear, and red fox. He would make it the hunter's paradise. His Parisian friends hailed his decision with delight. But later his enthusiasm waned somewhat, for its found that while a visit to Anti-costi was declared to be just the right thing on the boulevards, when it came to taking the trip most of his companions balked at the eleventh hour.

The industrial possibilities then seemed to dawn upon Menier. The adjacent waters were full of cod, herring, mackerel, sea trout, and salmon.

And the lobsters were the best in the world. And the woods were full of fur-bearing animals that would bring the highest prices. Menier would start in making more money to add to the many millions he had.

To carry on the proposed industries it was necessary to exlouive. tries it was necessary to colonize. Menier induced hundreds of families to emigrate to the island direct from France. Then he added a number of cause the supply of French colonists was not sufficient to carry on the work planned. He could not help showing his French partiality, how-

ver.
This partiality nearly brought on a hot time with the Quebec Govern-ment. Menier issued an order that

ment. Menier issued an order that no workman engaged upon the island would be permitted to use inioxicating beverages except the French. A roar of indignation went up from the English and Scotch. They called on Menier in a body.

He treated them with scorn, curtly informing them, king fashion, that it was his will the French should drink, and no others. To his associates, however, he stated the reason for exempting the French was that they of empting the French was that they of

empting the French was that they of all nations, knew best how to treat alcohol. The English and Scotch workmen finally submitted, although there was a rumble and a grumble for a long time. The penalty of deportation if they drank was the strong check on them.

On the spot where the wreckers mad established their lair, Menier built him a magnificent mansion of an architectural style comporting with the wild scone. It was a wilderness palace. He drew the plans himself down to the smallest detail. One oddity of his in connection with the interior work was that all parts of interior work was that all parts of wood and iron should be screwed down. Not a nail or rivet was used.

Befor his death the ruler of Anticosti constructed magnificent roads through the forests, that, because of their adaptation to the many scenic beauties, have been declared highway marvels. He built many houses and erected plants for the various industries he fostered that have no equal elsewhere. The lobster packing industry became one of the greatest in the world.

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MILITANT SUFFRAGISM. Stands For Something Which Has Nothing to Do With the Vote. Amidst the weiter of sestiment and violence that the suffrage movement has evolved of late in England one clear, plain and vital problem has presented itself for the consideration of the most thoughtful of the country's men and women. It is to be done with the unmarried women?"

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unmarried women?"
In England, no matter how man women are married off, it always seems that more and more are left over. You find them working by the dosen in every office in London. You see them swarming all over the omit nibuses and crowding the suburban trains. You hear them singing and practicing the plane in the sources. practicing the piano in the squares of Bayswater and villas of Hampof sayswater and villas of Hamp-stead and Streatham. You see them—these crowds of marriageable but unmarried young women—dis-porting themselves in the sea, listen-ing to the band on the pier or being shown off by the matchmaking

mothers.

It seems that there is scarcely anything that can be done for this restthing that can be done for this rest-less and exacting young woman. She seizes upon a pleasure, but the end of it leaves her bored and miser-able. She would like to be perman-ently active and interested, but there is no permanent activity of which she is capable. She has been spoiled for work; she has been spoiled for pleasure; she has scarrely even been pleasure; she has scarcely even been fitted for matrimony, should chance and her own charms throw a hus-band in her path. She will perhaps develop hysteria; she will probably become conscious of "nervee"; in become conscious of "nerves"; it any case she will be a trouble to everyone until she gets tired of be-ing a trouble to herself, and becomes a gossip instead.

Romance has taught them to expect much from life, whilst their educators have taught them nothing; and when life cheats them they turn to the intoxication of militant suffraction. gism.

There is certainly no doubt that

There is certainly no doubt that militant suffragism ought to have been examined more seriously from this point of view, which is largely pathological. After all, as it has been so frequently pointed out, menhave had certain definite grievances, which they thought the vote would remove. On the other hand, these English suffragettes are demanding the abstraction of the franchise. the abstraction of the franchise more vehemently than they complain of the grievance which the vote is to abolish. And one of the wisest physicians in England explains the phenomenon on these lines:

"The unmarried thoman wants something though she does not al-

something, though she does not al-ways know what. She is dissatisfied, though she carriet always tell what it is that makes her dissatisfied. If It is that mares her dissatisfied. If she is doing work which it is not really her function to do, her heart cries out against the unnatural con-dition of things. If, on the other hand, she is doing nothing, and does not know what she wants, she still cries out for that intangible some-thing which the vote all else feiling. thing which the vote, an ease may perhaps—perhaps—give.
"In either case we can see the unsatisfied

"In either case we can see the thwarted impulse, the unsatisfied desire, the divine discontent which make men and women alike fanatics on behalf of the first cause that comes to hand. In militancy is a cause to serve, an ideal, and an activity on behalf of an ideal. Surely what all these women have been suffering from has generally been either a monotonous activity without an ideal, or a romantic ideal without an activity. Militant suffragism gives both."

What should by this time be perfectly clear to every onlooker is that

feetly clear to every onlooker is that the violent suffrage agitation stands the violent suffrage agitation stands for something very real and that that something has nothing what-ever to do with the vote. Any excuse for idealism would have done just as well. It stands, surely, for a desire for some more vital activity than is at present offered to hundreds of thousands of women; it springs from the knowledge. springs from the knowledge of some function that is not fulfilled; some need for an inspired or sacrificial life that is satisfied neither by modern business nor by modern idleness.

May Admit Women To Bar. It having been decided recently in the British Law Courts that women the British Law Courts that women were not eligible to practice at the Bar on account of their sex, a serious attempt is to be made within the ranks of the Bar to open the legal profession to women. A committee, of which Lord Robert Cecil is president, has been formed, and it is hoped to get a bill through admitting women to the legal profession next session. It is pointed out that the law is the only profession which closes its doors to women, and there are probably many readers who will agree with the statement that if women can pass the same qualifying examinations as men, and if they are fitted for advocacy, they should be allowed to practice.

Little Known Statue.

Which is the least-known royal statue in London? Probably that of King Alfred, which stands in the centre of a small open space in Trinity Square, just off the Old Kent Road. It was placed there, it is said, when the square was laid out, at the beginning of the nineteenth century, to commemorate the connection of King Alfred, as founder of the British navy, with the Trinity House Corporation, who owned the estate. The poration, who owned the estate. The tatue was renovated twelve years ago in recognition of the millenary.
