HOULTON NEWS.

Houlton, Me., Aug. 5.—Robert L. Dustin, pastor of the Free Baptist church here, handed in his resignation yesterday, to take effect the last Sunday in October.

The farmers of the county are nearly through haying. They report a light crop, while reports from the western part of the state say that the crop is up to the average.

Some have already commenced harvesting grain and potatoes are looking well and a bountiful harvest is anticipated.

The annual Methodist camp meeting will commence on the new camp ground in Litchton on Saturday, Aug. 10.

The ground was bought this spring and was fitted up during the past two months. It is reported to be the best camp meeting ground in the state.

All the leading ministers of the East Maine conference are expected to be in attendance, as well as several from the Maine conference.

The camp ground lies about seven miles from Houlton. Accommodation trains will carry passengers from here to the grounds and return daily. It also lies on the line of the Bangor and Aroostook railroad, which will have a temporary depot at the camp grounds during the ten days meetings.
