NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—After a fall of eighty feet into the gorge of the Kaaterskill Falls in the Catakill moun-tains yesterday, Miss Caroline Schroed-er, of Brooklyn, was found to be un-hurt, save for a few bruises, according to a special to the World. 



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
