CANNES, Nov. 14 .- Mrs. Charles A. Strong, daughter of John D. Rocke-feller, died at three o'clock this morning in the Hotel Du Parie. Mrs. Strong had been ill for some time and suffered a paralytic stroke on Nov. 12, after which she sank slowly until the end. The body will be sent to America the end of this week.



## TO THE LIMIT. LONDON HOUSE.

**Cannot Pay Higher Wages and** Operate at Profit.

**RAILWAYS FORCED** 

So the Officials of Western Lines Will Ask That all Such Questions be Settled by Arbitration by Commission.

CHICAGO, Nov. 15. — Fearing that the present agitation for increasing wages has reached a point where it threatens the successful operation of railroads, the executive officials of all lines west of Chicago have decided to ask the inter-state commerce commis-sion to become a board of arbitration for the settlement of all disputes be-tween employees and the railway. The subject has been discussed for several days at the noonday gather-ings of the presidents and vice-presi-dents in charge and prominent eastern railroad men have been con-sulted on the subject.

The deliberations have not yet reach-ed a point of naming a committee to make such a request of the commis-sion, but the plan has received general

approval. The question which led to the arbitration scheme is the concerted de-mand which has been made by the engineers of 27 railroads for an increase in wages averaging from 12 to 15 per cent. Their demand has been coupled with the condition that the roads involved cannot deal with their men separately, but that an answer must be made in a wholesale fashion. That is to say, if the men on one road are successful all must be. If one road denies all must take the same stand. Although no specific conference has been held between the railway people and the heads of the labor organizations regarding the subject, it is said
