Mr. S. Summary.

One hundred and twenty Italians arrived at Fredericton last week from the Valley. They go to work on the Miramichi Valley Railway above Cross Creek. C. E. Brown, of Chester, N. S., landed 10 salmon a few days ago, one of which weighed 16 pounds. Another salmon occurred between the Miramichi and Conception Bay, Newfoundland. Some of the salmon were severely wounded. Kites and other deadly weapons were freely used. The British Transatlantic Yarnmouth, N. S., crew more tonnage according to the population than any place in the world. The 18th of June has been fixed as the date of voting on the Scott Act in the counties of Lincoln, Middlesex, and Perth, Ontario. The last of the Canadian Nile voyagers left for home on Saturday 9th inst. The Harbinger, Commodore Monday, 18th, steamer Express will call on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, returning Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, replying to Sir Richard Cartwright, said the total receipts for the present fiscal year up to May 1st were \$5,717,232 and expenditure \$24,687,018. A company has been organized at Windsor to establish telephonic communication between that town and Halifax. Testimonies are being taken in the case of the Rev. Leonard Gasté's house and store at Red Deer, 100 miles from Calgary, were ransacked by the Cree Indians last Friday. The Rev. gentleman and his family had previously moved to Calgary for safety, and thus escaped injury. He is well known in Yarmouth as the eloquent pastor of Providence Church several years ago. Mr. Bell's "Sherman in Canada" delivered in Piquash on Wednesday last, has created quite an excitement in the community. For amusement, utility, and instruction combined probably nothing exceeding it has been offered the public in these parts. There were about twenty illustrations, with candles, and the application of several elicited applause. Mr. Bell's lecture. Hon. J. C. Pope, of P. E. I., ex-Minister of Marine, died at Summerside on Monday. The weather is very hot up the St. John. The snow is melting fast at the head of the river, and a fresh frost is feared. The dead lock on the Franchise Bill in the Dominion Parliament still continues. Sir S. L. Tilley is on his way to England to negotiate a loan for the Dominion Government. Lord Wolsey has laid a letter on the table of the House of Commons expressing his high appreciation of the services of the Canadian voyageurs. The North West—The fight which was in progress at Batouche as we went to press last week, ended in a complete victory over the rebels. After two days of skirmishing, during which the half-breeds were gradually forced back from point to point, their chief position at Batouche was finally attacked and they were driven out of their rifle pits at the point of the bayonet. The survivors are reported to be several hundred, for they behaved like old veterans. Gen. Middleton says: "The conduct of the men was beyond praise, the Midland and St. Lawrence regiments fought with each other, and the mounted police and the mounted rifles, will be entitled to return for. Foreign Notes.

During the month of March the number of immigrants, (including of course) and emigrants, taken weekly, averaged 10,000; in April, 35,000, an increase in each of about 3,000 over the same month last year. It is computed that there are on our shores at this time a minute, 97,750 a day, and 35,839,835 a year, and that the births are 70 a minute, 100,000 a day, and 36,792,000 a year. Yuzma, May 11.—A terrible snow storm is prevailing throughout Austria-Hungary. Numbers of persons are frozen to death and crops generally destroyed. Bismarck, in his place in the house, declared that English civilization was centurians in advance of German. ENGLAND AND RUSSIA.—Unexpected difficulties and delays have occurred during the week in the ratification of the proposed agreement between English and Russian. M. Lasser the special ambassador to the English court came to an understanding with Granville, and all that remained was for his government to ratify it. It appears that the government at St. Petersburg now refuses to do this, and are pressing for further concessions. This time it is a demand to have a new slice of territory stretching westward from Murghab to the Oxus. Much of this may be but sensational newspaper rumor; but it is evident that there is some hitch in the negotiations. EGYPT.—The evacuation of the Sudan has commenced. Gen. Graham and the guards embarked for England on Saturday. Gen. Wolley has been the farwell address to the troops. The Mahdi's power seems to be waning. The latest news from England confirms the report that Russia demands Maruchak and Zuluf Pass, the possession of which points the Amer. considers vital to the integrity of the Afghan frontier. The situation is more warlike. Cunningham and Burton, tried on the charge of attempting to blow up the Parliament buildings with dynamite, have been found guilty, and sentenced to penal servitude for life. UNITED STATES. The Treasury count in the United States is practically ended, and out of the millions of dollars accounted for only two cents are missing. The New York Daily Commercial Bulletin estimates the aggregate loss by fire in the United States and Canada during April at \$7,700,000. Harper's Weekly says that Mrs. Gardfield is worth about \$450,000, which nets her an income of at four per cent, of \$18,000 a year. Her pension from Congress is \$5,000 a year making her entire resources \$23,000 a year. Codfish is a great delicacy in Gustavia, and sells for 40 cents per pound. The report of the statistical bureau for Germany abroad estimates that the number of persons born in Germany, residents in America, at 1,566,742. The annual report of the New York Chamber of Commerce states that the exports and imports of the United States for 1884 as compared with 1883 showed decreases respectively of \$57,812,000 and \$65,920,000. 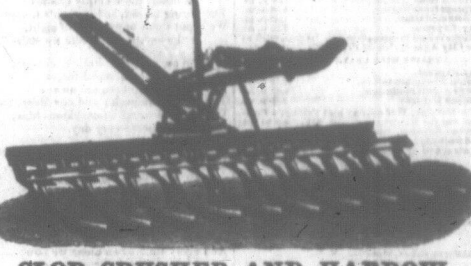
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
