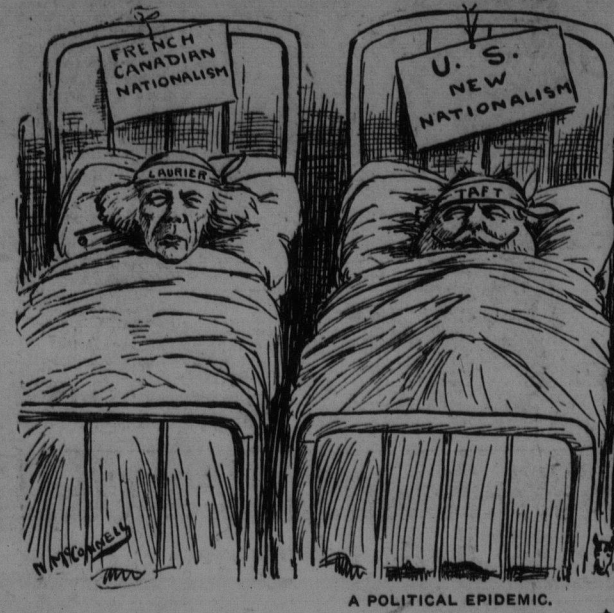


F. D. MONK THROWS LIGHT ON QUEBEC BY-ELECTION



A POLITICAL EPIDEMIC.

Nationalist Denies Racial Appeals and Offers Resolution Demanding Consulting People on Navy.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Nov. 22.—This was a day principally devoted to the Drummond and Arthabaska election with French Canadian comment to the fore and F. D. Monk offered an amendment to the address demanding that the electorate be consulted on the naval policy of the government. He made a powerful speech in defence of his attitude and in repudiation of the assertions made by the Liberal press as to the campaign waged there.

CAMPAIGN IN BRITAIN GROWS IN BITTERNESS

Suffragettes Surpass All Previous Efforts in Attacking Cabinet Ministers—Stirring Manifesto Of Nationalist.

ASQUITH FAILS TO PLACATE LABORITES

London, Nov. 22.—The political campaign is being waged with a fierceness almost unknown in England, both by politicians on the stump and suffragettes on the battlefield. The battle of Downing street which was fought this afternoon, when several hundred suffragettes attempted to storm the premier's residence, assaulted Mr. Asquith, and Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, and broke many windows in the government offices, surpassed all previous spectacles of the sort.

MILITIA INEFFICIENT IS REPORT OF GENERAL FRENCH

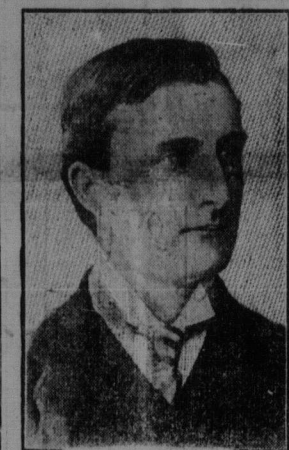
Sharp Fighting at Many Points, but Revolutionary Cause Believed Hopeless—Plot to Kill Government Leaders.

DEWEY DOES NOT FANCY AIR FLIGHT

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 22.—Graham White the aviator, today sent invitations to General James Allen, chief of the signal corps of the U. S. army, and to Admiral Dewey at Washington, asking them to accompany him on a cross country flight of 5 miles in his biplane, visiting Philadelphia navy yard.

The rioting continued into the evening, when squads of women attacked the residences of Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, Winston Spencer Churchill, the home secretary, and Lewis Harcourt, secretary of state for the colonies. Stones crashed through the windows of the houses, Sir Edward Grey's hearing the brunt of the attack. One hand splined Mr. Birrell strolling through St. James Park, to the Athenaeum Club and swooped down upon the aged statesman, knocking his hat over his eyes, and kicking him about the legs. When help came, and the women were driven off, Mr. Birrell limped to his motor car, on the arms of policemen.

TEBO CHARGED WITH MURDER

J. A. D. McCURDY IN AIRSHIP ACCIDENT

Mobile, Ala., Nov. 22.—While descending from a 500 foot flight this afternoon J. A. D. McCurdy dipped too near the earth, one of the wing shields of his aeroplane striking the ground when going at a high rate of speed, and turning the machine over.

ONE KILLED TWO INJURED IN ELEVATOR

Boston, Mass., Nov. 22.—Caught beneath a freight elevator which descended upon them as they were at work in the pit, Charles H. Shattuck supervisor of elevators at the south terminal station was killed and John J. Fitzgerald was seriously injured tonight. The men were repairing the elevator in the outward baggage room. Shattuck was almost instantly killed and his companion horribly crushed and bruised and is feared internally injured. Shattuck was 69 years of age, resided in Dorchester and had been in charge of the elevators at the south station ever since the building was opened. He was a veteran of the civil war.

POLICE BREAK UP MOURNERS

St. Petersburg, Nov. 22.—Bands of singers who gathered in various cities throughout Russia to honor the memory of Tolstol and to sing "Eternal Memory" were dispersed by the police. At Kiev a girl was trampled to death and a score of persons were wounded by the whips of the Cossacks.

GAMBLING HELLS MUST GO

New York, Nov. 22.—Mayor Gaynor made plain this afternoon his attitude toward gambling houses in New York. He says they must go.

ATTORNEY GENERAL OF MANITOBA APPOINTS COMMISSIONER TO INQUIRE INTO STATEMENTS REGARDING WINNIPEG'S MORALS.

Winnipeg, Man., Nov. 22.—Justice Robson has been commissioned by the Attorney General of Manitoba at the request of the Police Commissioners of Winnipeg, to investigate the charges recently made by Rev. Dr. Shearer, secretary of the social and moral reform department of the Presbyterian church, regarding conditions in what he claimed to be the segregated district of Winnipeg.

FIGHT FOR CANAL EXPO.

San Antonio, Nov. 22.—The struggle to obtain the Panama canal exposition was transferred this afternoon to the convention of the trans-Mississippi commercial congress, which is in session in this city. The reception each speaker received indicated that the congress is divided on the question of lending its endorsement.

LENEVE SAILS ON DAY OF EXECUTION

London, Nov. 22.—Ethel LeNeve has booked passage on the steamship Majestic which sails from Southampton for New York tomorrow. The execution of Crippen will take place between 8 o'clock and nine o'clock, Public executioner Ellis, of Rochdale, who hanged a wife murderer at Liverpool this morning, arrived in London on the evening train. The scaffold was erected today. A few tenor overlook the prison yard, and to banter the tenants from a glimpse of the tragedy, a big canvas screen has been put up before the gallows.

Learning to Walk**

**Youngest Child of Queen Victoria Just Learning
to Walk—Has English Nurses.**

Madrid, Nov. 16.—Madrid is much
interested in the daily view it gets of
the little Princess Beatrice of Spain
taking her first lessons in walking.
Every morning, aided by the mar-
quesa of Salamanca, the royal gover-
ness, and an English nurse, her royal
highness totters along unsteadily,
crowing with delight at the excite-
ment and pleasure of using her two
tiny feet.

The walking lesson takes place at
about 10.30 o'clock on pleasant days
in the Casa de Campo, a vast park
just behind the palace. In one cor-
ner of the beautiful gardens is a spot
where the three royal children have
their outdoor nursery, a regular play-
ground with a great pile of sand to
dig in, little flower beds of their own
wood and plant, swings, seesaws,
and everything else which would
please children's fancies.

Occasionally King Alfonso and
Queen Victoria come out here also to
watch their small family and now-
days particularly to note the progress
made by Princess Beatrice. The king
is usually seated at a table by his
sons for he is a famous playfellow, and
in his speech, his eldest son, the
infante, is very rarely that he
lapses into English with his brother
and addresses him as Jimmie.

In all his speech, his eldest son
of King Alfonso is most grave and
studied. Only recently when el Sr. de
Torres, the king's secretary, met him
in one of the rooms of the palace play-
ing with a sword which belonged to
an aide de camp and said hastily, as
one would to a child, "What is your
royal highness doing with that sword?"
the prince replied, "No, not afraid, no
harm shall come to you."

**U. N. B. SENATE ENDS
YEAR WITH DEFICIT**

**Reappoint Committee to Press
for Increase in Grant from
Provincial Government—
Summer Science School.**

Frederton, Nov. 22.—The annual
meeting of the Senate of the Univer-
sity of New Brunswick was held this
evening at the Board of Education of-
fices. Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Super-
intendent of Education, presided, and
the members present were: Judge Mc-
Leod, Dr. W. W. White, Dr. The-
Walker, Dr. H. S. Bridges, W. S.
Myles, St. John; and Chancellor Jones,
B. C. Foster, J. D. Phinney and Re-
gistrar Coy, Fredericton.

The principal business taken up was
the consideration of the accounts of
Registrar Coy for the past year. They
show an expenditure of \$24,955.18,
with \$24,389.12 in receipts, making a de-
ficit on the running expenses for the
year of \$566.06 of the receipts \$8-
37.93 were fees from students. The
grant from the Provincial Govern-
ment was \$13,844.83, and the bal-
ance of income was from interest on
investments and rentals of Univer-
sity property. The committee to wait
upon the Provincial Government and
urge increased assistance to the Univer-
sity was continued.

Chancellor Jones was authorized to
tender a reception to the summer
school of science which will meet here
next summer. A communication sug-
gesting that the University place a
tablet to his motto in the proposed

The offer of \$6,000 for Gregg was made by Joseph P. Cohen, owner of the Spokane club of the Pacific northwest league, who found Gregg pitching for an amateur team at Lewiston and sold him to Cleveland for \$400.

Unfortunately there were evidences that the visitors to the castle were of the 20th century variety and that the sounds of revelry were not caused by the revels of a ghost but by humans of convivial spirits.

Today Mr. Sharkey and his family will vacate, and the old castle will again be given over to the mercies of its traditions and the associations of the past.

VISITS HOME AFTER GLOBE-CIRCUING TOUR

Sidney MacMichael Speaks on Conditions in the Philippines—Germany and England Do Most of Trade.

Sidney MacMichael, who has been in the employ of the Pacific Commercial Cable Co. for some time, is home on a short visit to his father, E. E. MacMichael, 210 Queen street.

"Everything was quiet about Manila when I left the Philippines," said Mr. MacMichael. "The United States have 15,000 troops scattered about the islands and they manage to keep the peace in all the northern islands, although there is still occasional fighting in the south among the Morros, who are Mohammedans and never came under the influence of Spain."

Speaking of commercial conditions in the islands Mr. MacMichael said that England and Germany were the nations which carried on the greatest amount of trade with the Philippines.

"Since I left," he added, "the United States has entered into a free trade arrangement with the Philippines and I suppose American trade with the islands will develop rapidly. The Philippines at present import practically all their meat and other foodstuffs from Australia."

Mr. MacMichael will leave for Manila tomorrow, going by way of Seattle.
