KING'S BIRTHDAY

The King of England, His Most Excellent Majesty—and the title is not too strong—today enters upon his sixty-ninth year. Long live the King!

The question of providing material for a permanent road bed for Water Street is, we understand, being seriously considered by our civic authorities some of whom favor hauling Sugar Loaf stone during the early part of the winter and having it in readiness for the coming spring when it could be prepared and utilized to good advantage. Certainly something should be done along that line, even if it should be tried as an experiment on some of the worst places.

A few months ago the I. C. R. authorities ordered that the three large lights which were in the railway yard here, as well as quite a number of incandescent lamps which had been in service in the station and other railway buildings for several years past, in order we presume, to still further curtail expenditure. The electric current for both air and incandescent lamps has been supplied to the I. C. R. by our town electric plant, ever since its installation at a flat rate. By the recent cutting out of so many lights the town's monthly revenue from the I. C. R. for light was reduced about \$30.00. The town council then placed the I. C. R. on a meter, and notwithstanding that every effort was then made by the railway department to 'hold her down' even to the turning out of the station platform lights, yet their account for the past month (thirty meters) was \$16 higher than for the previous month on a flat rate. By metering the railway current, the cost to the town for production has been very materially reduced.

the railway is just getting what it is paying for—and the large quantity of current heretofore supplied to the railway and which they now claim they do not require, will be available for the supplying of the new buildings which are being erected as well as for more street lights, which are indeed very much needed.

A scheme which prevails in the west and which could with advantage be adopted here, would be to sell hospital tickets at a fixed rate per year, which would entitle the holder to free treatment in the hospital at any time in case he should become sick or receive an accident or injury. A large number of the men working in the mills and lumber woods do not save a dollar to provide against emergencies and in case they meet with an accident or become ill they simply have to depend on public or private charity, which may some day cease to be available, whereas it should be no hardship for any man getting the prevailing wages to purchase a hospital ticket at say six dollars or eight dollars per year, and be independent in case of accident or sickness. It should not be difficult to sell at least 500 such tickets per year.

The Dominion Government which has for some years past been appropriating out of the public funds of Canada, the sum of \$60,000 per year for civic improvements in the City of Ottawa, now proposes to raise the appropriation to \$100,000 per year, on condition that the City of Ottawa will exempt the Government civil servants there from city taxes. This certainly does not seem to be a justifiable diversion of money which is collected of, and properly belongs to, the whole people of Canada. The citizens of Ottawa, government employees as well

as other people, should be taxed to keep up the streets, parks and squares in that city just as is done in any other city, and surely the day is past now when the burdens of civic taxation should be entirely borne by one portion of His Majesty's subjects, while another portion who in most cases receive good living salaries and enjoy the same privileges and advantages should get off scot-free. Such a system is certainly becoming universally unpopular and cannot be defended in any unqualified country any longer.

At the range on Saturday last Campbellton defeated Bathurst by forty-two points. The score was:—Campbellton, 44; Bathurst, 46. The ranges used were 200, 300 and 400 yards. Wm. Gammon of the Bathurst team carried off the trophy donated by F. P. Matheson for the highest individual score of the day.

TOWN WATER

At the present time the water from the town water works has a disagreeable taste, and many are at a loss to account for same. Two gentlemen visited the reservoir and Smith Lake and expressed the opinion that it was caused by the decaying wood in the lake. The water in all brooks emptying into the lake is unusually high owing to the recent rains. While the taste is not agreeable, yet the water is not injurious to the health, and is much safer to use than water taken from wells or pumps.

IN A SERIOUS CONDITION

Frank Mullen, the Bathurst young man who attempted suicide at Great Works, Me. on Tuesday last, remains in about the same condition at the Old Town hospital. His condition is serious because of his extremely nervous system which has developed into acute neuritis and unless checked, may result in his ultimate death in spite of the precautions that have been taken to ease him from his suicidal mania.

FEVER ABATING

With a few exceptions the cases in the hospital are all doing well.

Send a Full Report.

OXFORD, Nov. 6.—Although the Danes continue to profess confidence in Dr. Frederik A. Cook, it is evident that they are growing uneasy, particularly since Dr. Cook's unimpeachable report to Prof. Torpe. A query as to when his observations would be ready for inspection has been received here. It is impossible to obtain an authoritative statement to-night regarding the action of the University of Copenhagen in respect to the proposal of the National Geographic Society in Washington, that a committee from that society be permitted to be present at the official examination of Dr. Cook's records. A leading scientist, however, said: If Dr. Cook's records are unable to control his records he is quite mistaken. A Greenland missionary, the Rev. Hans Olsen, started north last September in search of the two Eskimos who accompanied Dr. Cook. Mr. Olsen has been instructed by the Government to examine carefully those men and to send a full report. If we find anything suspicious about Dr. Cook's records he will have reason to regret that he ever came to Copenhagen. It is significant that these remarks were made by a man who was to be one of Cook's most fervent supporters.
