**A CATHOLIC REFORMATORY FOR HALIFAX.**  
—Hon. Mr. Power has introduced for the Senate a Bill to provide for the establishment of a Reformatory for Catholic boys in the City or County of Halifax. The preamble says that there is at present a Reformatory for Protestant boys in the City of Halifax, and that it is desirable that a similar institution for Catholic boys should be established. Local provision for the confinement of prisoners, any Catholic boy, apparently under the age of 16 years, who has been convicted of an offence punishable by imprisonment, may be sent to such Reformatory for any term not exceeding five years. It was thought the missile was directed at the house of the Jesuits near by, or against the Pantheon on the other side. In the evening we assisted at a *Soiree* of the Senate of France, which is already too long to give you my impressions on this subject.
