



Farm Horses.

The Skin Scalds and the Hair Falls Out -- Abscesses or Tumors May Form — Treatment Suggested — Planting Field Beans.

HEN a horse has been pro perly fitted for hard work, the collar fits properly and the driver obavoid trouble, it is seldom that shoulder trouble occurs, but where the horse has not been prepared for perly, or the driver is careless, troule is very liable to occur. When the horse has a long coat of hair in the spring it is good practice to clip the parts with which the collar comes in contact, as a preventive measure.

the parts with which the collar comes in contact, as a preventive measure. In fact, in many cases it is wise to clip the whole horse.

Shoulder troubles are usually caused by ill-fitting collars, but in horsely not accustomed to work, may occur even when the collar fits properly.

The most common shoulder trouble is practically a form of scalding. The skin becomes inflamed and tender, the hair drops out, and if work be continued the parts become raw. This is often due to neglect in cleaning the face of the collar regularly, also thoroughly cleaning the shoulders regularly, and failure to remove the collar at meal times to allow the shoulders and collar face to become dry, and then clean them before putting the collar on again. For treatment, a lotion made of one ounce each of acetate of lead and sulphate of zinc in a pint of cold water, is probably the best application. This should be applied three or four times daily, and, if possible, the animal should be given rest or worked in a breast collar.

Abscesses or tumors may form on the shoulder as a result of pressure of the collar. One form of this trouble appears suddenly. A swelling of considerable size is noticed. It is not very tender or sore to pressure, and is found to be soft and fluctuating

The Cause of Sore Shoulders in It Loes Not Pay to Raise and Sell Thin Chickens.

> Wyandottes, Reds and Rocks Best for Fattening-Feed a Mixture of Ground Barley, Corn Meal, Ground Buckwhen and Shorts, Mixed With Sour Mik—Winter Rhubarb Growing.

The marketing of thin chickens is not conserving our meat supply, nor is it the most profitable method to the producers. Present prices of market poultry admits of the liberal

use of feeds and the marketing of well-fleshed birds.

In most localities there is con-siderable variation in the prices paid for thin and finished chickens. The for thin and finished chickens. The spread in prices varies from two to five cents per pound; in some instances much more. It can readily be seen that the producers' gain in price on the original weight of the bird should make a profit, above the cost of finishing, on the gain in weight.

Fatten the Heavier Breeds.

Fatten the Heavier Breeds.

The best birds to flesh or fatten are those of the heavier breeds, such as Wyandottes, Reds and Rocks. The light breeds, such as Leghorus, seldom pay to fatten unless they are very thin in flesh.

The birds intended for fattening should be confined to a small pen or slatted coop. The process is not difficult if you will but pay attention to a few points that are essential.

Do not feed the birds for the first

Do not feed the birds for the first Do not feed the birds for the first day they are shut up. You should give them something to drink, but it is best to give no feed. Then feed yery lightly for two or three days, and gradually increase the ration, being very careful not to overfeed. We usually start chickens on very finely ground grains at the rate of three-quarters of an ounce of-grain per feed to each bird, feeding; twice three-quarters of an ounce, of-grain per feed to each bird, feeding twice daily. This can be increased gradually to two or three times this amount. Generally the most profitable gains are made during the first fourteen to sixteen days' feeding. Such birds will not be excessively fat, but should be fat enough to cook and eat well. Some markets demand a fatter bird.

The most profitable gains are made on birds weighing from three and one-half to four and one-half pounds when put up to fatten.

Feed the Grain Finely Ground.

Feed the Grain Finely Ground. The grains fed should be finely ground, and, if at all possible, should be mixed with sour milk. Mix the feed to a consistency of a pancake batter. The more milk the chicken will take the better bird you will have in the end. Milk appears to have no good substitute for fattening chickens. If you cannot get milk then add ten to fifteen per cent. of meat meal to the ration and mix with water. The addition of a little green food daily will help matters. Many people get better results by feeding a little salt. About one-half pound to one hundred pounds of dry grain is sufficient. This mixes best by being dissolved in water and adding a little at each feed. Be careful not to use too much. The grains fed should be finely

ing a little at each feed. Be careful not to use too much.

The best grains available now are a mixture of ground barley, cornmeal, finely ground buckwheat, and shorts. Oats are good if part of the hull is sifted out, as are also ground brewers' grains. We have used with good results a mixture of two parts of ground barley, two parts cornmeal, and two parts shorts, mixed with twice the amount of sour milk. How Winter Rhubarb Is Produced.

How Winter Rhubarb Is Produced.

In making a permanent business of rhubarb forcing, it is necessary, each year, to set out a new bed, as plants once forced are of no further value. In the spring large roots should be dug, split in one bud sections and replaced in rich moist ground. During the growing season they are kept cultivated and free from weeds. In the fall they are covered with manure. Next spring a second bed is planted as before. That fall a large part of the first bed is taken up, leaving sufficient to replant another bed the next spring. The roots are taken up the last thing in the fall before the hard freezing weather comes and are placed in piles in a shed where they can easily be got at during the winter but will remain frozen. About December 1st take in a sufficient number of roots, place these bud side up on the floor of a warm cellar—about 68° or 70°—and cover with an inch of sand. Be sure to fill in all interspaces. Keep this sand moist. About a week later the buds will begin to swell and in from four to six weeks, depending upon the heat of the room—the cooler the place the slower growth starts—you should have rhubarb ready for market. After these roots are exhausted throw them away and put in more. If a constant supply is required make a new bed every two or three weeks during the winter. Be sure to keep all light dimmed. Some Benefits of a Well Devised Drainage Plan.

Guesswork Is the Poorest Method to Adopt—Get the Land Levels and Then Arrange for Tiling — How

(Contributed by Ontario Department of

HEN a man is about to erect a building be it ever so small, the first thing he does is to make a plan That plan may be on paper or it may exist only in the mind of the builder, yet it is a plan. .Without a plan to follow, a builder cannot do work. The same is true of tile drainor "line" of tile in a watercourse, which traverses his fields, should not do so without asking himself such questions as: "Am I putting this tile in the lowest part?" "Will I be able to get a satisfactory outlet? How

to get a satisfactory outlet? How many acres will this tile drain, and is it large enough to drain it satisfactorily? Have I sufficient grade to drain the holes in the rear fifty?" If he does not ask himself these questions he is like a builder without a plan; he is working in the dark; his work cannot be efficient. All these questions the drainage plan answers, and more.

No matter how small the means for inmediate construction of drains, or how few the drains which one is about to instal, he should not do so without having first laid out a plan of which these drains will be a part. On rolling land such a plan is not hard to decide upon, because the differences in elevation are very pronounced, and any one who is familiar with such lands is able to intelligently plan a system of drains for them. But where the area is large and the topography irregular, or very flat, guesswork is out of the question. It is then that we must

large and the topography friegular, or very flat, guesswork is out of the question. It is then that we must resort to the tape and the levelling instrument for reliable information. A drainage plan shows first of all the differences in height or elevation between all parts of the farm over which the survey extended. This alwhich the survey extended. This allows the owner of the land to plan his own system of drainage. The pos-session of the levels for all parts of the farm lays bare the most advan-

session of the levels for all parts of the farm lays bare the most advantageous routes for the drains, from a study of the levels and contours of a plan it is possible to calculate the acreage which each main tile must drain. This information together with the fall or grade procurable is the only true guide to help us decide upon the size of tile needed in any given drain. It is only when the planner has a picture of the whole project before him that he can draft an efficient yet economical plan of drains for any piece of land.

Future Benefits.—The benefits of a plan do not end with the completion of the drainage system. Only those of us who have tried long and hard to find a drain, the location of which was nowhere recorded, know the value of guidance such as is offered by a plan. When a tile-drained farm is offered for sale the existence of a plan of drains adds greatly to the value of the farm. The plan is of equal value to both the seller and buyer. With proper care well-constructed tile drains will give good service for several generations; therefore for the convenience of our children and grandchildren it is necessary to have a plan of our underground drainage work.

There is another way in which a drainage plan is very helpful to a farm owner; it is a splendid guide toward ascertaining the acreage of any field or part of the farm. THRILLING JOURNEY IN-TO THE UNKNOWN.

Mrs. Rosita Forbes Tells an **Amazing Story of Courage** and Adventure.

Deep in the desert of Sahara, in Africa, lies Kufara, the secret strong hold of the Senussi, an Arab brother who live an ascetic life in remote

Until lately only one expedition had succeeded in penetrating to this hidden spot, but now a new route has been marked on the map by a brave explorer, Mrs. Rosita Forbes, an Eng-lish woman, who, in her book, "The Secret of the Sahara: Kufara," tells stories of courage, adventure

It was towards the end of 1920 that Mrs. Forbes started from Benghazi, the Mediterranean end of an old caravan route across the African desert, n her journey into the unknown. She med Bey Hassanein, of whom Mrs. Forbes says: "When he first consent to accompany me into the Lybian desert he assured me that he came for a rest cure. Later on he assumed so many qualities that it was difficult to marriage, a fanatic of the most bitter type when it was necessary to impress the local mind, my Imam when we prayed in public, and a child when he lost his only pair of primrose vellow

I doubt if we saw a dozen figures in the streets of Jef, yet it has a population of seven hundred. The women never set foot outside their houses. It must be an extraordinary life within a few square walls. I have never been in any Eastern town where life was so reserved and aloof. Presumably the men gos-sip, but if they do so they do it in each other's houses, for one neve sees a group in the streets."

Mrs. Forbes tells how some of the happiest weeks of her life were spent in Syria as the guest of an Arab Prince, whose kindness was wonderful and only equalled by that of a Sherif of Islam, in Jedabia. "We asked Sayed Rida if we could send him anything from Cairo, our thoughts running to fewel or a gold inlaid rifle. He asked for a green parrot and some gramo

'You see," he said, "my life is rather lonely: It is not wise that I go out and show myself very much to our people. Our family is holy and we must live a secluded life. We may not see dancing or hear singing. Our people would not understand, but sometimes when I am alone late at night I play the gramophone, for I

love music very much."
