



Interesting Facts From the Annual Report of the U.S. Life faving Service.

Washington, Nov. 29.—The annual report of General Superintendent Kimball, of the Sife-Saving Service, show that the number of disasters along the field of the operations of the service during the year was 337. There were on board these vessels 2,570 people, of whom 2,550 were saved and twenty lost. The number of shipwrecked persons who received succor at the stations was 747.

The estimated value of the vessels involved in the disasters was \$5,584,160 and that of their cargoes \$2,700,365. Of this amount \$7,111,005 was saved and \$1,173,520 lost. The number of vessels totally lost was 60.

There were besides 170 casualties to said boats, row boats, etc., on which there were 353 persons, 346 of whom were saved and 7 lost. There were 36 other persons rescued who had fallen from piers, docks, etc., and who would have perished without the aid of life-saving crews. Assistance of minor importance was rendered to 213 other vessels in distress and 265 vessels were warned from danger by the signal of the patrol men.

The cost of the maintenance of the service during the year was \$1,009,235. There are 242 stations. The investigations held in each case of loss of life where the crews operated show that the persons who perished were entirity beyond the reach of human aid.





SIGNIFICANCE OF A RECENT MEETING.

A correspondent calls our attention to some remarkable features of the recent meeting in the Cronyn Hall in favor of on, the movement is forced, and not vol-untary. Our correspondent points out that not only is the initiation purely artificial, but the project owes its inception to Col. Denison, of and his brother, a professional military man temporarily living here, who, not finding the duties at the barracks for which he is paid by the Canadian taxpayers sufficient to occupy his time, spent several days in canvassing the city for an audience to listen to his views. Then comment is fairly made on the fact that a large portion of the audience was composed of either Dominion civil servants or professional military men, while the remainder was almost entirely made up of gentlemen connected with one religious denomination, and of adherents of one political party. These are facts pointed out to us as giving warrant to the confession of some who were present at the meeting that it was "largely a fizzle." It is true that Bishop Baldwin presided,

It is true that Bishop Baldwin presided, and expressed his sympathy with the movement, but we all know that while he is a pious and eloquent clergyman, and an exemplary citizen, he can by no means be said to be always practical in his views.

Principal Miller, who was moved to apeak strongly in favor of the project, is a newcomer in Canada, and can hardly yet be seized with the full extent of Canadian aspirations and democratic tendencies. Even on the trade question, the reverend gentleman searcely did justice to those who, while not believing in imperial federation as the heat deatiny for Canada, are strong advocates of British freedom of trade. Principal Miller seems to regard tr de restriction on this continent, which under imperial federation would almost certainly be made still more the policy of Canada and the States, as a good thing. He said that the trade restriction between Canada and the United States had resulted in the eponing up of more remunerative and more natural markets. Mr. Miller is not a Canadian farmer, or ha would know more on

Some of the speakers present at the meeting disavowed the intention of taking any steps to impair the self-governing powers of the celenies. To this, and to the necessities of a Canadian political party, do we attribute the present attempt to promote the view that the best future of the Dominion is to be found not in lon is to be found not in sturdy Canadian nationality, the people living in amity and in close alliance with both branches of the great Anglo-Saxon race, but in increased colonial dependence and subjection to taxation for wars in the making of which they can have no fair say. A destiny far more noble and profitable is in store for the Canadian people. The large majority of them know enough about militarism to avoid it or any fad leading to it.

At the same time, it is well that Capt. Denison's organization should have opportunity to state its views in regard to the future of the Dominion. We believe in the freest possible discussion and toleration of public opinion in regard to the destiny of the English race, and no harm can come from the airing of any project, however im-practicable. The safety valve of every free nation is free speech and toleration.

"To me the English-speaking commonwealth on the American mainland is simply one part of the great English folk, as the English-speaking kingdom in the European island is another part. My whole line of thought and study leads me to think, more perhaps than most of men, of the everlasting ties of blood and a peech, and less of the accidental separation wrought by political and geographical causes. To me the English folk, wherever they may dwell, whatever Emay be their form of government, are still one people. It may be that the habit of constantly studying and comparing the history of England with the history of old Greece makes it easier for me to grasp the idea of a people divided geographically and politically, but still forming in the higher sense one people. The tie that bound Greek to Greek was dearer to Kallikratidas than the advancement of Spartan interests by barbarian help. And so, to my mind, at least, the thought of the true unity of the scattered English folk is a thought higher and dearer than any thought of a British empire to the vast majority of whose subjects the common speech of Chatham and Washington, of Gladstone and Garfield, is an unknown tongue."

The same fusion is going on in Canada and in the United States to-day, and it is destined to go on. We sometimes hear it asserted that the people of the United States must be regarded as a foreign race, having no sympathies in common with the inhabitants of Great Britain and of Canada because the modern English institutions. ## IN HUMANITY'S CAUSE.

The London Humane Society's Annual Meeting.

The Annual Report-Over too Cases
Under the Society's NoticeElection of Officers.

In Somerset Hall yesterday afternoon the annual meeting of the London Humane Society was held. In the absence of President Perrin, the chair was occupied by Mr. Andrew Thompson. Fred. Matthews, Talbot Macbeth, W. C. Coo, Squire Jarvis, Rev. R. Aylward, Rev. James Gordon, J. Clark, Inspector Minhinnick, Meedames Chas. Hutchinson, J. W. Jones, J. H. McMechan and others were present.

THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The secretary, Mr. W. C. Coo, submitted a very complete annual report. It told how that a dozen ladies and gentlemen met in the president's office a year ago to talk over the question of organizing a Humane Society, and how several enthusiastic members volunteered to procure subscriptions, until now they had 370 members, the worthy president himself securing 80. On Sept. 24 an inspector was engaged to devote all his time and attention to the work. Before the society was organized those who felt so disposed could abuse their poor animals without let or hindrance;

Before the society was organized those who felt so disposed could abuse their poor animals without let or hindrance; but when the society was organized and an inspector appointed they saw that they would be vigorously prosecuted if they did not treat God's creatures as they should, and this spirit of reckless brutality was discontinued in a great degree. Euring the year some 507 cases of major merit had been attended to while between 100 and 150 minor cases had had its attention. It was not presumption to state that were it not fow the work of the society these cases would have been allowed to pass by unheeded. From that statement it would be seen that the subscription of each member had covered nearly two cases that had come under the society's notice. The report made special reference to the case of one child who had been taken by the president from surroundings of sin and misery and placed in the home of kind foster parents. About \$50 worth of humane literature had been distributed throughout the public schools of the city, an act that would bear the fruit of human kindness in the days to come. At the society's instance a drinking trough had been creeted by the cowell in the market for cattle. Through its direct efforts the degmuzzling bylaw of 1802 had been suspended. Hand'in hand with other Christian organizations the society's had assisted in securing the erection of drinking fountains; a deputation had waited upon the Dehorning Commission and given its testimony in the matter. It had furnished the necessary literature in connection with the establishment of Band of Mercy work at the Industrial School. An effort was made to obtain a money grant from the City Connell, but once could be made as no provision had

THE LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

Woodstock Grocers Petition Against Shop Licenses,

But the Council Re use to Pass the Bylaw Without Further Con-sideration.

Woodstock, Nov. 20.—At last night's meeting of the Town Council a petition was presented against the granting of permission to sell liquor in grocery stores. The petition says:

"Whereas your petitioners believe that the enactment and enforcement of such a bylaw would prevent unfair competition in business, and would also promote the welfare of this community:

"Therefore, your petitioners humbly pray that your honorable body will be pleased to pass such a bylaw and submit the same to the electors of the municipality of Woodstock for ratification in accordance with the provisions of the statutes

the same to the electors of the municipality of Woodstock for ratification in accordance with the provisions of the statutes of Ontario."

The petition is signed by seventeen grocers as follows: Henry Canfield, John Butler, R. R. Fulton & Co., David Dodge, W. H. Wilson, J. Morrison, R. B. Thornton & Son, W. C. Wilson, John Kelley, E. Pott, Milliman & Nellis, J. B. Doyle, W. R. Watson, J. W. Whyte, Wm. Walton, Slaught & Gordon and Fury & Thompson. Mr. R. B. Thornton acted as spokesman for the petitioners. He said he appealed with confidence to the council, as he represented 17 out of 23 grocers of the town and because he believed they had a strong claim. The Ontario Government recognized that grocers who did not have a shop license had a grievance; in the words of the statute and the petition it was an "unfair competition." In 1883 a law was passed by the Legislature that no further licenses be granted to retail liquor in a shop where other commodities were offered for sale. The present grocers holding a shop license were not interfered with except as they were affected by the local outlon clause mentioned in the petition. except as they were affected by the local option clause mentioned in the petition, ited did not ask the council to indorse the He did not ask the council to indorse the principle, but merely to grant the prayer of the petition and allow the people to vote on the question. If the vote was taken as proposed at the municipal elections, the extra expense would not be heavy. The petition was signed by 17 out of 20 who had a right to sign it; therefore he felt sanguine the council would recognize their claim.
