A DISCREDITED REPORT. Paris, May 13 .- A correspondent of the Journal at Lamia, Thessaly, telegraphs under yesterday's date from that place saying he has learned from official sources that an armistice be-tween Turkey and Greece has been concluded. He adds: "This solution was impatiently awaited by all, for it is impossible to continue the war under the present circumstances. THE WHEELED TERROR.
