Mara, the farmer, who lives in McGillivray Township about a mile and a half north of Clandeboye, who was given his preliminary hearing yesterday before Squires Chittick and Hodgins, on a charge of arson, and was as a result of the evidence taken committed for trial at the December sessions is an interesting one. Mara was released on \$4,000 bail, \$2,000 of which was his own surety, and two others of \$1,000

The Charge.

He was arrested on Friday last by High Constable Hughes on a charge of burning a barn belonging to Mr. Geo Carter. The barn was rented to William Patton, and was situated on a farm immediately adjoining that of Mara. The witnesses subpoenaed by the crown are John Hughes, Constable Alex. Shaver, Wm. Patten, Martin Ryan, A. Reith, J. Hotson, G. Carter, and Wm. H. Simpson.

The First Witness.

Wm. Patten was the first witness called yesterday, and stated that he has been a tenant on the farm for four years, and that his lease will expire on March 1. On Saturday night, June 26. he had retired between 9:30 and 10 o'clock, and shortly after midnight he was awakened by his wife and told that the barn was on fire. Witness stated that when he had gone to bed, as far as he could tell everything was all right, and there had been no signs of any fire in any of the outbuildings. He hurried out to the burning barn, and from all appearances the fire had started on the west side, and was burning in an easterly direction. No one was at the barn when witness arrived, but in a few minutes William Simpson and J. Hotson came, and

In the morning Mr. Patton said he examined the ground around the barn, and found marks of shoes learing towards Mara's barn, which is situated about 80 rods away. ### NEW BRITISH LAND TAXES.

Opponents of Mr. Lloyd-George's budget proposals are telling the English farmers that the new land taxes will press very heavily upon agriculture, and the farmer is being urged to fall into line with the land-owner and defeat the measure. As a matter of fact, however, as Earl Carrington recently told a gathering of farmers at Warminister, there is in the proposals no common enemy against which the two interests may make common

In the first place, by what is called the "Increment value duty," the Government proposes to levy a tax on the Increased value of land when it changes hands by death or by sale or

British Cruisers May Follow Trail of Wrecked Ship. Victoria, B.C., July 26.—There is a strong probability that the British 32 cruiser Algerine may be dispatched to among the islands for survivors of the Greenock ship Australian, just posted as missing at Lloyds, being hopelessly

15 overdue on a voyage from Mazatlan 28 to Sydney, N. S. W. The vessel left the Mexican port in 26 November and no trace has since 37 been found of her. The owners, Lang 29 and Fulton, of Greenock, have asked 18 the British admiralty to instruct the 20 warships stationed in the Pacific Ocean 23 to make thorough search along the route the Australian would take on

Hopes are entertained that the vessel may have gone ashore on one of the uninhabited islands seldom visited and that the shipwrecked men are still alive, like the crew of the lost British ship Dundonald two years ago, who for many months existed on an islet south of New Zealand, and the crew of the French bark President Felix Faure, who lived many months on an uninhabited island in the Southern Seas, subsisting on flesh of penguins they were rescued by a government

12 they were rescued by a g 37 steamer from New Zealand. The Australian took her crew at Antwerp on September 28, 1907. The 328 captain was James Hunter, of Liverpool; Chief Officer James Wright Lee, Gourock; and Second Officer Duncan Robertson, Glasgow. There were a cook, nine seamen and five apprentices.
