RUSSIANS PIERCE FOE POSITIONS SIX MILES

QUARTER OF THE KRUPP WORKS DESTROYED BY FRENCH FLIERS, ONE HUNDRED WORKERS KILLED

Stupendous Damage Done By Week-End Air Raid On Essen Is Dutch Report.

Amsterdam, July 10.-Les Nouvelles of Maestricht, Holland, reports that Dutch workmen, who were laid off at the Krupp works on account of the destruction of buildings in the recent French air raid, assert that a quarter of the Essen plant was destroyed. The material damage is placed at millions of francs, and it is said that 100 employees were killed and hundreds of others, including 45 French prisoners, wounded.

One, and possibly two French airplanes, dropped bombs on Essen last Friday. The official German report of the raid said only two bomb holes were found.

LIGHTNING BOLT KILLS AVIATOR AT CAMP BORDEN

Cadet Page Instantly Killed Trying To Rise Above Storm.

TWO OTHERS WRECKED

Cadet Donelin Is in Hospital With Broken Limb-May Not Recover.

Camp Borden, Ont., July 10.-Lightning was probably responsible for the death of Cadet Page of the Royal Flying Corps, whose machine crashed down on a road near Ypres Junction during the electric storm which broke over Camp Borden and vicinity last evening. It is surmised that the aviator was trying to get above the storm when he was struck and instantly killed. He was alone in the machine at the time. Cadet Donellin, who was also flying alone, tried to make a landing in a turnip field when his machine turned upside down on touching the ground He is in the camp hospital with a com pound multiple fracture of the right leg and a badly lacerated chin. He may recover. A third machine, which was caught in the storm, managed to mak a safe landing. The storm reemed to be somewhat of a cyclone, circling the camp, the centre of which escaped the full force of the lightning, although the rain poured down in torrents, accompanied at first by a strong wind.

Good Strategic Position, The strategic position in this sector is now clearly in favor of the Russians. The long-established Teutonic line has been definitely broken and the continuance of the Russian pressure points to the probable speedy fall of Halicz opening up the way to Lemberg along two firstclass railway lines. A dangerous salient already has been created around Halicz.

Each day now witnesses a new attack by the German crown prince along the Aisne front in Northern France, suggesting an attempt at a sustained offensive. The French guns are proving too much for the attacking ranks of Teutons, how-

Crown Prince Falls. Last night's attack on the Chemin-des-Dames plateau, the high ridge which the Germans lost in the spring campaign and are now trying desperately to recover, was even less fruitful than others have been at the outset. LONDON AND DISTRICT ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

Sergt. Haynes of St. Thomas Lost Right Leg at Vimy.

MANY SHRAPNEL WOUNDS

Soldiers Invalided Home Were in Much of the Severe Fighting.

Among the thirty soldiers who were given a warm welcome at the G. T. R. station last night on their arrival from Hallfax was Sergt. G. Haynes of St. Thomas. He was through the terrific fighting at Vimy, and was advancing with other comrades of the 91st Battalion, when his right leg was shattered by a "whizz-bang," and had to be amputated at the knee.

A Londoner who bears at least five severe marks of the heavy fighting along the Somme front is Pte. Jack Moon, of No. 1 Chester street. He was hit in both arms, both legs and the back by bursting shrapnel, and sustained wounds which confined him to the hospital for many weeks. Pte. Moon enlisted and trained here with the 70th Battalior

Pte. Thomas Harrison of St. Thomas, who went over with the 34th Battalion. sustained a broken leg and is invalided home. Pte. Thos. Hampton, of the old 33rd, was wounded in the leg and arm with shrapnel, while fighting on the Somme. His home is in Elenheim.

Sergt. E. Rogers of London, who went over with the 18th, is home owing to having his knee badly injured.

Pte. G. Walker of Windsor, who went over with the 99th Battalion, had his knee badly smashed by shrapnel in the fighting along the Somme. Pte. Thomas Harrison of St. Thomas,

and was drafted into the 2nd Battalion. While fighting on the Somme he sustained a serious gunshot wound in the shoulder.

Sergt. John H. Brown, whose home is in New York city, came to London and enlisted in the 29th Battery. He went to the trenches with a draft eighteen months ago. year should harvest enough vegetables and fruit during the summer and early fall to allow for the family table and canning besides. Many July vegetables, such as lima beans, cauliflower, carrots and beets continue their harvesting season throughout August, but in addition to these may also be canned celery, corn, eggplant, squash and tomatoes. The simplest and best method for the average housekeeper is the "cold-pack" method, as this eliminates the use of canning powders and is warrantably safe. There are three distinct rules to follow: (1) Blanching, which is really a preliminary heating in boiling water, to shrink the vegetable or remove the objectionable acids. (2) Cold dipping, which sets the color and hardens the tissues. (3) Sterilizing the jar, which kills all forms of bacteria. In this last step the product is packed in jars or cans while cold, salt and boiling water are added to each quart, and the jars with the set of crabappies.

Tomatoes—Scald in hot water to loosen skin. Pack whole. Add one level teaspoonful of salt to each quart. Partly tighten cover. Sterilize 22 minutes in open kettle. Rémove jars, tighten covers, and invert to cool.

Corn—Can same day as picked. Remove husks and sfik. Blanch on cob in boiling water from 5 to 15 minutes. Plunge at once into cold water. Cut the corn from the cob with a sharp knife. Pack tightly in jars. Add one knife for the hot surger in the fruit is ripe, it may be pared.

Will take from 20 to 50 minutes, depending upon the kind of crabapples. Peaches—To eight quarts of peaches allow one quart of sugar and three quarts of water. Put the sugar and three quarts of water together and stir over the fire until the sugar is dissolved. When the syrup boils, skim it. Draw the kettle back where the syrup will keep hot, but not boil. Pare the peaches, cut in palves, and remove the stones, unless you prefer to preserve fruit whole. Put a layer of the prepared fruit into the preserving kettle and cover with one of the hot syrup. When the fruit begins to boil, skim carefully. Boil gently for 10 minutes, then put into the jars and seal. If the fruit is not fully ripe, it may require a little longer cooking. It should be tender enough to pierce with a fork. It is always best to put only one layer of fruit into the preserving kettle at a time. While this cooking, the fruit for the next batch may be pared.

Ans.—It is a pleasure to reprint a recipe sent last year by "Aunt Nannie," for whom you so kindly inquire. The rose petals should be gathered each morning after the sun has dried the dew. Rose dough or pulp must be ground two or three times a day for a week or ten days, being careful to save all juice that drips out, and stir into pulp again; as it gets tougher it will have to be forced through the machine. Move beads up on pins as they dry and add more on. Don't take from pins till dry or holes will close up. Put one teaspoonful good olive oil in a bottle. Take to drug store and get a few drops of oil of rose added. Place a little of this oil on palms of hands and roll and rub the beads till they shine like satin.





A GOOD TIME TO BUY BONDS

"Is the present a good time to buy bonds?" is a question which we have been asked frequently of late, and one which may have been troubling you.

And our answer is: "It is a good time to buy bonds." With bond prices lower than they have been at any time recently, with present conditions fundamentally sound, and with promises of a period of great industrial activity for the future and corresponding profits for investment, there is good reason why those with surplus funds should avail themselves of the investment opportunities those with surplus funds should avail themselves of the investment opportunities now open to them.

The present low level of prices among even the highest grade bonds is not a reflection on their security. It is largely the result of the inattention which has been accorded them during the flotation of the War Loans, United States and Canadian. With the thoughts of investors and the entire energies of the bond houses centred on the successful flotation of the Government issues and the consequent neglect of other bond offerings, a decline in bond prices was a normal and natural result.

In view of the very limited liquidation of bonds in the last few weeks, however, and the improbability of further liquidation because of existing low price evels, it seems reasonable to suppose that an even limited buying demand will serve to stimulate prices to more normal levels.

With all bond prices low, it follows that those who are buying bonds for inwith an bond prices low, it follows that those who are buying bonds for investment, that is for income, should buy those bonds which are first, thoroughly safe, and secondly, which will yield them the best income for the longest period of time. In other words, to profit most by the present prices, the bond buyer will do well to consider good long term bonds.

THE FIELD OF CREDIT

The field of credit is wider than that of banking. Credit is a necessity in modern business. Its study is not one of practical measures as such, but of the principles that lie back of them. To liken a bank loan to a sale of goods is not very helpful unless one also shows wherein it is unlike. In both cases that party very helpful unless one also shows wherein it is unlike. In both cases that party is called "buyer," who offers the more generalized purchasing power, but in a sale of goods it is the seller who has a stock of material goods, whereas in the sale of a note it is the buyer-banker who possesses the only material involved, the money reserve. When it is said that a bank affords by anticipation the present use of future funds, an opening is offered for the whole theory of the circulating medium. Banking differs from other business, neither in the practice of buying and calling not in the keeping of a reserve, nor in the manage. tice of buying and selling, nor in the keeping of a reserve, nor in the manage ment of reserve by loaning more or less, but in the regulation the banker exercises over traders and manufacturers, who seek his guarantee. Undue stress laid by legislators upon bank notes is a sort of materialism. The fact that it is the practice for banks to "exchange" checks, but "circulate" notes, is also materialistic, and is illustrated by the early history of the Bank of Amsterdam. Bank policy in time of crisis deserves close study. Bank guarantee is especially significant and efficacious at that time. It alone stands between the business community and reversion to a primitive money or even to a barter economy. Credit is the foundation of modern exchanges, and must be explained independently of the crude ideas suggested by the hypothesis of a community employing solely money. Trade, production, transportation and exchange cannot be carried on without credit. Bankers do not produce, but the making of a loan is a distinct act meant to further the technical operation. It is not the productive act tinet act meant to further the technical operation. It is not the productive act itself. The loaner does not touch the material; he does not lay his hand upon the goods, nor put his shoulder to the wheel. Neither he nor his clerks stoke the boiler or open the throttle. Banking is back of all these concrete operations; it is general to all of them. It makes no difference whether the banker is loaning a manufacturer of iron, or of cloth, or to a cultivator of potatoes; his attitude oward all these businesses is the same. It is one of personal relation and guarantee. If a manufacturer were in doubt as to whether to put a certain pattern apon the market it would mean much that a rich and influential friend should say, "Go ahead! I will see you through." That is as far as the banker does nything tangible; and his act of interest is certainly neither a sale nor a pur-

Businessmen should get rid of any foolish fears that economy will bring on for everybody; the trouble is that there is more work in sight than can possibly be done, and the question is whether we shall cut off luxuries or necessities. The farmers are crying for labor, and the whole world is crying for food; the great industries like mining, lumbering, steel-making, cloth-making, transportation ship-building, car-building, etc., are clamoring for help; a million to two million men are wanted for the army and navy, and thousands of women will be wanted to take their places in shops and offices. The army must be clothed and shod. It is absurd under these conditions to talk of the danger of unemployment, and to urge that the people should go on buying what they do not actually need in order to keep labor from unemployment or to maintain business as usual. How is labor to be had to make uniforms unless it is released from making other clothes; how are looms to be had for blankets unless released from something else; how is steel to be had for ships, tin cans and agricultural implements unless some other consumption is curtailed; how are women to be had for offices unless

The very suggestion of a business slump brought forth the following from Secretary of Commerce (U.S.) Redfield. "There is not the slightest danger of such a thing," he declared, with the greatest emphasis, "not the slightest chance, On the contrary, there are not enough factories in the country to turn out all the things we need. Productive capacity is one of our greatest problems at this time. There has never been a time in the history of the world when a nation at war has been idle. Instead of a slackening of business we will have 120 per cent as a result of the war. Moreover, the war will result in far-reaching economic changes in this country. There will be readjustment, and we shall arrive at an industrial independence."

But to these operators a slump in the realty market spells disaster-bankruptcy. It has been said that about 70 per cent of men who die leave their estates in a heavily mortgaged condition. They have been operating mainly on other people's capital. And, as a result their heirs receive but a small equity in these holdings which are in almost every case over-valued and composed of non-income producing properties. That is why so many large estates are found to be insolvent when thrown into the probate court. And it clearly shows the general cause for estate shrinkage. Not a day passes but that the press heralds the details of some well known person's fortune having dwindled to nothing at death. These cases are so commonplace that editors seidom give them a conspicuous
