# NFLUENZA MAY **DELAY VICTORY** LOAN CAMPAIGN

**Epidemic Causing Uncertainty** of Future Plans.

FINANCIERS' IDEAS DIFFER

Sir Thomas White To Make; Decision in the Next Few Days.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Montreal, Oct. 18 .- Plans in connection with the opening of the Victory Loan campaign on October 28 remain very much in the air because of the "flu" epidemic. The most disturbing feature of the outlook is that the epi-

feature of the outlook is that the epidemic is only now beginning to take hold in the West. Even if it cleared up in the east in the next ten days, it might be at the worst in the West at that very time. Opinions as to the best course to take are now being gathered from loan managers all over the country, and no doubt these will be submitted to Sir Thomas White for a final decision on his return to Ottawa in the course of the next few days.

Opinions of Financiers.

Opinion in the financial district appears to be divided as to the necessity or advisability of a postponement of the campaign. In favor of continuing as originally planned, it is argued that good headway could be made through newspaper publicity and canvassing by mail, even if the epidemic continued severe. Most people who will buy the bonds have made up their minds as to how much they will buy and will not be influenced one way or the other by the presence or absence of campaign propaganda.

For the benefit of those who need

ganda.

For the benefit of those who need urging the campaign might be extended a week or more, if the epidemic had passed of, by then, so that the full weight of campaign methods might be brought to bear on the laggards.

Against that is the fear that the loan's prospects would be injured unless the country could be worked up to a state of enthusiasm right from the start, as well as the fear that sickness might badly disorganize the working forces for the loan.

DR. HASTING'S OPINION.
Toronto, Oct. 18.—Dr. C. J. O. Hastings, M. O. H. of Toronto, is of the opinion that the epidemic here of the influenza has not reached its crest.
Under arrangement with the fuel controller coal was being furnished now first of all to those with illness in the house. Lack of proper heat, he declared, may mean the difference between ordinary influenza and pneumonia and death. 400 Quit Work in Moose Jaw and Calgary Civic Employees Revolt.

COMPANY MAKES OFFER

Senator Robertson Shows Concern-Prosecution Is Entered.

MOOSE JAW, Oct. 17 .- Four hunred of the C. P. ### COMPLETE VICTORY IS NOW IN SIGHT, SAYS LORD MILNER

Would Agree to Armistice if

Favorable to Allies. SMASH PRUSSIANISM FIRST

The British Secretary of War Warns Against Allied Dictation.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(Canadian Press dispatch from Reuter's Limited.—Lord Milner, the British secretary of war, interviewed today by the Evening Standard, said complete victory was in sight, namely, the destruction of the Prussian military machine. All other considerations faded into insignificance beside this aim. Punishment of the men who made the war and were responsible for its crimes; the question of

men who made the war and were responsible for its crimes; the question of reparation for wrongs and damage done; even tefritorial re-adjustments were all secondary to the rendering of Prussianism impotent for evil. If that one aim were achieved all the rest would follow naturally.

The Present Danger.

The present danger was that that aim be postponed by ulterior questions being raised in such a fashion as to strengthen the resistance of the German armies and people. For example, it was a serious mistake to imagine that the German people were in Jove with militarism. They had submitted to it partly as a security, partly owing to the glamor of its hitherto unbroken success, but there was, especially of late years, a rising revolt against the inclosed. ate years, a rising revolt against the junker and the jackboot. "When the junker and the jackboot. "When the German people see the complete and ignominious defeat of militarism and realize that that system has brought them ruin they will be as eager to do away with it as are the Allies," said the secretary of war. Hence the main task of the Allies was to hasten the day when the utter wreckage of the Prussian military machine would be demonstrated before their very eyes, he added.

Two Ways of Achievement.

This end might be achieved in two ways, namely, either by a complete and decisive victory leading to unconditional surrender, or by an armistice under such conditions as to guarantee that the military supremacy of the Allies should not be weakened, but rather strengthened by the cessation of hostilities. This second alternative would be as successful as the first in bringing about the utter collapse of Prussian militarism.

Lord Milner said the armistice under such conditions is certain to be at-tended by the realization of our full war aims. He was therefore anxious that nothing be done to postpone its ac-

that nothing be done to postpone its accomplishment.

Warns Against Dictation.

He was inclined to think that if the Allies at the present time attempted to dictate to Germany certain drastic changes in their own government as regards the constitution and personnel, the resistance of the German armies would be stiffened. His lordship said that after all there must be a German government to negotiate an armistice with, and complete transformation was already in progress.

"We should not be in too great a sham. The present holders of power are responsible to the Reichstag, and the Reichstag is the only popularly-elected mational assembly in Germany. It was in the interest of the Allies to see that stable government of some sort was maintained in Germany. As reparation has to be obtained, we don't wish to see Bolshevism and chaos rampant there."

### The Spanish "Flu"

The chief topic of interest in London town during the past week has been the Spanish influenza, giving a hard run for first place even to the war and Allied victories. The same is doubtless true of every other place attacked by the relentless foe influenza, which appears to level its most deadly germ arrows at men and women alike in the "young adult" period of their lives, between the ages of seventeen and thirty-five. The majority of deaths from the highly contagious disease in this city have occurred among young people between these ages, the grim reaper singling out especially those between nineteen and twenty-five, according to the death notices daily appearing in the papers.

If your town, village or country neighborhood is still free from the malady t behooves you to give thanks and pray that it remain so. It behooves you, urther, to stay at home and not encourage visitors from a distance who might bring germs to your community. A little inhospitality now will be forgiven, in that it may mean life saving later on, or at least disagretable sickness avoided.

Spanish influenza is a fact. It is, moreover, a disagreeable fact. Cheerfully ignoring its existence doesn't render one immune. That is simply playing the part of the foolish ostrich. Worrying won't help, but sensible precautions

Since the advice of London physicians is eminently sensible and simple enough for anyone with a grain of common sense to follow, repetition of it herewith will doubtless be appreciated by readers who have not seen it in previous editions of the paper. editions of the paper.

WHAT DOCTORS ADVISE. Avoid crowds and crowded places.

Avoid crowded street cars, trains, meetings, picture shows, etc. Don't go visiting and don't encourage visitors.

Suspect everyone who has a cough. Keep away from such people. Keep the digestive organs in good working order,

Keep your hands clean, lest you carry infection to your mouth by Keep your teeth clean, and use frequently a good germicide as a

mouth wash and gargle. Common baking soda dissolved in warm water is one of the most effective as well as least expensive germicides to use as a mouth-wash and

Lemon Julce, diluted with water, is a valuable specific to use as a gargle and mouth-wash for the prevention of Spanish influenza. Listerine and peroxide, diluted with water, are among the gargles and mouth-washes recommended

Spanish influenza is contracted by catching the spray from getting in front of people who are coughing or sneezing.

CAMPHOR AND EUCALYPTUS.

Many people are pinning their faith to gum camphor as a preventive, and are wearing little bags of gum camphor tied around their necks, or carry bits of gum camphor in pockets or purses, in order to take a whiff now and then. The St. John Ambulance V. A. D.'s of No. 4 Nursing Division had attended more than 200 cases up to noon on Wednesday. Not one had contracted influenza, even with long hours of strain in waiting on the sick. They attributed this to the fact that they had been exceedingly careful to avoid catching the spray from coughing and sneezing, and also in regard to washing their hands. One school teacher V. A. D. stated that she and others each carried a little bottle of eucalyptus, from which a whiff was taken from time to time. By the way, it has been stated that sheets of blotting paper soaked in eucalyptus and hung up are effective preventives of the spread of the disease.

YOU CAN'T AFFORD TO TRIFLE.

Supposing the influenza germs manage to get across all the guards put up and to outwit the most strenuous prevention methods, there is one only rational course to pursue: go to bed and send for the doctor. The tendency of Spanish influenza to develop into pneumonia is the feature which is most alarming in the midst of the epidemic, the feature which has been responsible for all the deaths recorded. Neglect of even a very mild case (that is, apparently mild), may fatality. The experience of local physician and nurses attending cases is that fever goes up the fourth day, hence the fourth day is a critical period in the history of a case. Even after that, it isn't safe to trifle with Spanish influenza. You may get over it yourself; in the meantime, you may pass it along to some susceptible person who will be much more seriously ill than you have been. There is another feature of the case which should also be considered: Have you heard the people talk who personally recall the famous Spanish influenza epidemic of the winter of 1889-90 in Canada? Do you notice what they have to say about it? They were sick themselves, dreadfully But that wasn't the worst. So-and-so was never really well after the Russian influenza. It left him with a tendency to kidney trouble, which veloped into Bright's disease. Mrs. B- suffered thereafter with a weak heart.

The dread secondary infection from Spanish influenza, namely, bronchial trouble, in its acute state, pneumonia, is fully understood from painful experience in the places where Spanish influenza has gripped the community. The future will tell the story of weaknesses it has left in its trail, weaknesses that might have been prevented by proper precautions during an attack.

### How To Paison Other People

Would you deliberately hand another person, man, woman or child a cup of poison to drink? Of course you wouldn't. You would be too tender-hearted, even if it was just a mild poison for which an almost sure antidote could be

The idea of anybody asking if a thoroughly respectable persons like you could for a moment consider performing an action that might turn out to be murder! Of course you are indignant, righteously indignant.

It makes you shudder to read about those terribly wicked people who slowly poison their victims. You call that fiendish, diabolical.

What about mingling with other people when you have, say Spanish influenza, since it is the contagious disease most prominent in everybody's mind at present? What about polluting the air with the spray from your coughing and sneezing and scattering the deadly germs to others? You have a very mild attack? That doesn't say the person who contracts it from you won't die of pneumonia. Of course, it will be difficult to trace it directly to you, since there is so much of the disease scattered around the country. But will you be any the less guilty because you don't know, and the world doesn't definitely know, that through your carelessness you caused the death of another?

Putting it strongly? There are no apologies in this case for calling a spade a spade, if the spade will only dig its way into the consciousness of people who haven't any conscientious scruples about passing communicable diseases along

Any number of people who commit such sins against their neighbors and their neighbors' children, aren't willingly guilty of wrongdoing. They just are asieep in regard to the golden rule in this connection. They probably have conscience, but it isn't awakened and enlightened conscience.

GOLDEN RULE BADLY TWISTED.

After the order came out a few days ago in regard to the closing of the London public schools until after the abatement of the Spanish influenza, a member of the city teaching staff said: "If they are going to close the schools, they should certainly close the Sunday schools, too. In fact, I think that there is more danger in the Sunday schools than in the day schools, for the reason the children are packed in more tightly in the Sunday schools. There isn't the same crowding in the day schools. You'd be surprised if you knew how frequently children are serenely sent off to Sunday school from homes where they have communicable diseases, at the time when the same children aren't allowed to come to day school for fear of passing along measles, scarlet fever, or whatever has broken out at

Is that applying the golden rule? What would you say if your precious little girl was taken sick with scarlet fever, and you learned that she had been sitting in Sunday school next to a little girl who had come from a home where there was scarlet fever. The other little girl wasn't at all sick. She was quite well enough to be in Sunday school. But she was what is known as a "carrier" of scarlet fever germs, and she carried them along to Sunday school, and passed hem to your little girl. Wouldn't you feel bitter? Never having passed along colds and things like that to other people,

How Betsy Hager Became the First Girl Munitions Maker in America.

She actually stood at the forge, and so skilled was she that her expert knowledge on several occasions saved for the colonists many munitions that would otherwise have been discarded.

Her real name was Betsy Hager, and she was an orphan, "bound out" to a farm family living near Boston. In those days there were no public institutions for dependent children, so, when Betsy's parents died at the time she was 9 years of age, the city fathers gave her into the care of this farm family. They were badly battered and seemed useless to all but Betsy's professional eye. She gave them a careful examination, then hurried back to Leavitt. She told him excitedly that on the battlefield there were some guns which she was sure they could make good as new. Leavitt rushed out to investigate. Before morning six pleces of artillery were in the back of the smithy. Day and night Leavitt and Betsy worked at the broken cannon, and six weeks later the repaired pieces, in perfect order, were on the battlefield doing service for the Americans.





### **500,000 SHARES IN PEACE STOCKS ARE SOLD IN ONE HOUR**

Greatest Activity in Months on New York Exchange.

New York, Oct. 18.—Notwithstanding official warnings from Washington that the war is not yet over the boom in peace stocks which began early in the week, today assumed broad proportions. In point of activity and scope, the movement rivalled the many war sesohio Gas and Sugars at gains of large fractions to 1½ points. Sales during the first hour aggregated almost 500,000 shares, or on the basis of over 2,500,000 shares for the day. Advances in those stocks which, it is considered, would benefit by a declaration of peace, ranged from two to ten points. The public as well as professional interests were buyers.

C'lls were the chief beneficiaries, amounting to new maximums at advances of between two and ten points, while metals, next in favor, recorded gains of one to three points. Rails moved upward one to three points. The market seethed with activity during the morning, the first hour's turn-over approaching 500,000 shares. ### CITY WILL BUILD **PURIFYING PLANT** AT THE RESERVOIR

Installed This Fall.

London will have a chlorination plant installed at Springbank reservoir. It will be built this fall. This was decided at the meeting of the public utilities commission on Thursday afternoon. The cost of the plant is estimated at between \$200 and \$300. This has been agitated by the board of health for some time, and the commissioners thought that the plant should be built to pretect them from any possibility of being charged with neglect of duty in the event of an outbreak of typhoid. The report of the Institute of Public Health on the water was read, showing that while 20 tests had been made, colon baccilli had been found in the water at the city taps only once. Applications for extensions of the water at the city taps only once. Applications for extensions of the water mains on Hume street and Salisbury Heights were favorably considered by the commissioners. The two extensions will cost \$300 and \$850 respectively. The work will be done as soon as possible. will be built this fall. This was de-

soon as possible.

Two applications for water were received from outside the city limits, and after some discussion they were laid over for further consideration at the next meeting of the commission. Commissioner J. Vining thinks it is illegal for the city to supply water to people living outside the city. It was also decided to leave the question of the purchase of membership tickets in the board of trade over until the next meeting. The report of the fire underwriters was received and filed.




