JEWS LEAVING ENGLISH

Threats Against Hebrews in Northumberland Have Been Heard For Long Time—Fresh Strike Trouble at Liverpool.

London, Aug. 23. — Jews are leaving Ebbwvale and Tredegar in hundreds owing to the anti-Jewish outbreaks.

Threats have been heard for a long time past against the Jews in Northumberland, the complaint being that they have a monopoly in certain businesses, such as house furnishings, clothing and jeweiny, and charge exorbitant prices, it is alleged that they possess a large amount of inferior house property and compel their tenants to purchase furniture from them on the installment system. They also are accused of harbily evicting tenants who are unable to pay rents.


