Washington, July 21 .-- An effort to have a provision in the bill makng it unlawful for a person to possess liquors in his own dwelling, was expected to be the storm centre of debate today in the House when consideration of prohibition enforcement legislation was resumed. Members, who announced they would attempt to have the bill amended with this point in view, declared the measure, as framed, permitted nearding by wealthy persons, thousands of whom are said to have stored in their homes enough wines and whiskey to last them a lifetime. Other members were said to feel that the "drys" had gone about as far as it was wise to make the legislation too drastic, would only bring it into contempt, and thereby defeat the ends to which the prohibitionists were

BELA KUN OUT OF HIS OFFICE

Soviet Minister of War and Foreign Affairs Deposed.

Vienna, July 21 .- It was a triumvirate of radical leaders that replaced Bela Kun at the head of the Budapest Soviet Government, according to dispatches to Vienna newspapers.

The three men composing the new Government are Varga, former minister of social protection. Moses Alpary and Tibor Szamuely. The new Government, according to the reports received, ordered Habrich, commander of the city, known as a "moderate" to turn over the city to them. 3,000 GERMANS IN SWITZERLAND TO GO HOME THIS WEEK

Large Number of Prisoners Do Not Wish To Return To Native Land.

WILL GET RECEPTION

Each Returning Prisoner To Get Bath and New Clothing.

Geneva, July 20 .- Three thousand German prisoners of war interned in serman prisoners of war interned in Switzerland will be sent home this week. Many of them do not wish to return to Germany, preferring to remain in Switzerland. Arrangements have been made by the representatives of Germany, France and Switzerland at Berne for the repatriation of 300,000 German prisoners in France by way of Switzerland.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT PLANS RECEPTION FOR RETURNING TROOPS

Berlin, July 20.—According to the government arrangements to handle returning German war prisoners, each trainload will be met at the border or at the port of debarkation by a welcome committee. The men will be given baths and new clothing. They will not be quarantined, but will be held for three or four days in order to facilitate demobilization. Each man will receive a minimum of 50 marks demobilization money, the pay being made according money, the pay being made according to rank, and also food money for eight weeks and a free railroad ticket to a self-chosen discharge point, from which a man will leave as a civilian, free from military service.

Teronto, July 21 .- Rumors that the Provincial Government intends to precipitate a general election in the fall, at the same time that the prohibition referendum is taken, finds no confirmation at the Parliament Buildings. Premier Hearst is out of the city today. Hon. I. B. Lucas, when interviewed, denied all knowledge of any such intention on the part of the Government. An announcement of that nature, he said, "is like the famous report of Mark Twain's death, grossly exaggerated.'

Old London a Riot of Color and Merrymaking and So Crowded People Have To Sleep in Churches, Schools and Parks-Gorgeous Spectacle Witnessed by Several Million People—Enthusias m Grows as Day Advances.

CUBA CELEBRATES WITH BRITANNIA.

HAVANA, July 20.—Cuba joined in with Great Britain in the celebration of the Allied victory in the world war and the signing of peace by a virtually complete cessation of industrial activities yesterday. All municipal offices and business offices were closed.

The British flag waved beside the Cuban banner over every fortress and public building in the republic, and was displayed at many private homes.

LONDON, July 20.-Land, sea and air forces of the British Empire and her allies marched Saturday in the triumphal victory parade to mark the return of peace. Several million people watched the gorgeous spectacle, their enthusiasm growing as each new excitement stirred their emotions.

When the British contingents came in sight the applause became a great roar, above which could be heard at times the shrill voices of women. London has not witnessed such a celebration since the late Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. Buckingham Palace was decorated on the exterior for the first time in its history. Huge flags of the Allies floated from the upper windows, and a wide streamer of purple and gold stretched across the facade. The royal pavilion, erected close to the beautiful Victoria memorial monument added color to the striking scene.

King George from his seat on the scarlet dais had a clear view through a colonnade of white pylons, reaching for more than half a mile to the admiralty arch. The troops marched past the

reviewing stand to the music of dozens of military bands. Cheering is Continuous.

Marshal Foch, leading the French forces, was given a hearty reception. So also were Gen. Pershing and the American and the other Allied leaders and their contingents. The tremendous cheering that greeted each national force was virtually continuous.

The Americans led the procession. It was 12:30 o'clock when they came marching with springy step and smart precision that would have gladdened the heart of a West Point commandant. As the Americans approached, the

Pershing, they marched in three battalions of 33 officers and 1.100 men each. Belgium had in line 440 officers and men, led by Gen. Gillian; France was represented by 990 men, and Italy by 835. There were five officers and 50 men from each of the other allied nations. Gen. Pershing dismounted 100 yards Gen. Pershing dismounted 100 yards beyond the King's stand and returned to it, where he was greeted by all.

Marshal Foch, Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty, Field Marshal Sir Douglas Haig and other commanders joined the reviewing party as soon as their contingents had passed. Vice-Admiral Beatty and Field Marshal Haig were given tremendous cheers. given treemendous cheers.
